

Farm Safety Week Stresses High Rate Of Fatalities

Farm and home safety is a family affair, says Miss Dorothy Dixon, County Home Demonstration Agent. It involves everyday habits of living, working and playing and there's no safety engineer on the job to remove hazards and prevent acts of thoughtlessness and carelessness, she adds.

"We must realize that the human element and our own attitudes play a big part in our own actions. Likewise, the home atmosphere can be partly responsible for many of the farm and home accidents," she says. Some of these contributing causes are worry, dissatisfaction, annoyance, anxiety and unhappiness. Mental conditions may cause one to take unnecessary risks, be thoughtless in doing a task or even cause the development of wrong attitudes toward safety.

The home atmosphere, she says, should be cheerful; calmness should prevail, there should be understanding between all members of the family and all should work toward the development of a safety attitude for the family. "All accident hazards cannot be eliminated so we must learn to live safely with them. We teach our children by the examples we set and remember," she cautions, "don't teach by fear but by logic."

Farm safety is a family responsibility and it offers a challenge to every member of the family. Those who succeed will reap a harvest of happiness and satisfaction, concludes Miss Dixon.

Farming was rated as the fourth most dangerous occupation in 1948. Only transportation, construction work and mining and quarrying had higher death rates per 100,000 workers.

Fires cost American farmers nearly 90 million dollars in 1948. The preponderance of frame buildings and inadequate fire fighting equipment were listed as major causes for this total.

Motor vehicles and farm machinery were involved in over one third of the 4,400 fatal work accidents to farmers that occurred in 1948. Oiling, unclogging or adjusting moving farm machinery is an important cause of many farm work accidents.

Home accidents killed about 7,000 farm residents in 1947. Available statistics do not indicate any substantial difference between the causes of home accidents in rural areas and urban areas. Falls ranked first as the greatest single cause of all types of home accident deaths to farm

Nearly 7,000 farm dwellers are killed in automobile accidents every year. Almost two thirds of the annual fatal automobile accidents occur in rural areas.

The total time lost as a result of accidents to farmers in any typical year amounts to the time needed to produce about half of the annual average wheat crop in the U. S.

Recent studies on causes of accidents to farm residents in Wayne County, Indiana, revealed several important facts. Of some 408 reported accidents, 241 were classified as farm work accidents. Motor vehicles were second with 57 casualties. July was the most dangerous month with 43 work accidents and 29 accidents in other classifications.

Nine out of every 100 farm men suffered from some form of disabling accident while only 3 out of every 100 women were so injured. Spontaneous combustion caused \$82,000 worth of fire damage during the year the study was in progress.

New-Type Mattress Massages Pressure Areas of Bedridden

AKRON, OHIO.—A mattress that gently massages the pressure areas of the body of a bedridden patient, and thus reduces the danger of bedsores, has been announced as the joint development of the Firestone plastic company and the H. J. Rand foundation, Cleveland. The mattress, constructed of Velon, a Firestone plastic film, consists of a series of air cells one and one-quarter inches in diameter running its width transversely. Alternate cells are connected to a manifold which forms the edge of the mattress. The two systems of in-terspersed cells are alternately deflated and inflated at short intervals by a small electrically driven pump. This action produces a massaging effect on the patient's body. Bedsores, which result from the death of tissues due to inadequate nutrition from impaired circulation, have long been a worry to physicians. In the past the only possible

relief came from the manual turning of the patients, so as to relieve body pressure points on the mattress. With the shortage of nurses in many cases preventing proper attention to this detail, a mechanical solution to the problem which is plaguing hospitals all over the nation was sought.

Clinical tests have been made with the mattress since July, 1947, with very satisfactory results. Numerous patients, whose condition predisposed them to bedsores, have been placed on the mattress. Some were suffering from paraplegia, others had traumatic spinal lesions, others were recovering from fractures. Some could not be turned manually because of the traction employed in the treatment of their fractures.

In the group placed on the alternating pressure mattress no additional precautions were taken to prevent bedsores and none developed. Many patients with already developed bedsores have been placed on the mattress and their sores have healed well.

In addition to serving as an aid in the prevention and treatment of bedsores, the mattress reduces considerably the amount of nursing care required in these cases.

'Live' Ammunition Found In Army Post Scrap Pile

HOUSTON, TEX.—When army officials at the San Jacinto depot learned that a large percentage of "live ammunition" was among the steel scrap shipments being received there, a busy hustle resulted as depot employees set to work to render the ammunition harmless.

Col. James W. Frazer said the shipments contained about 5 per cent "live" rounds. The ammunition ranged from 37 mm to 8-inch shells. It was believed the "live" rounds came from an army camp near Waco.

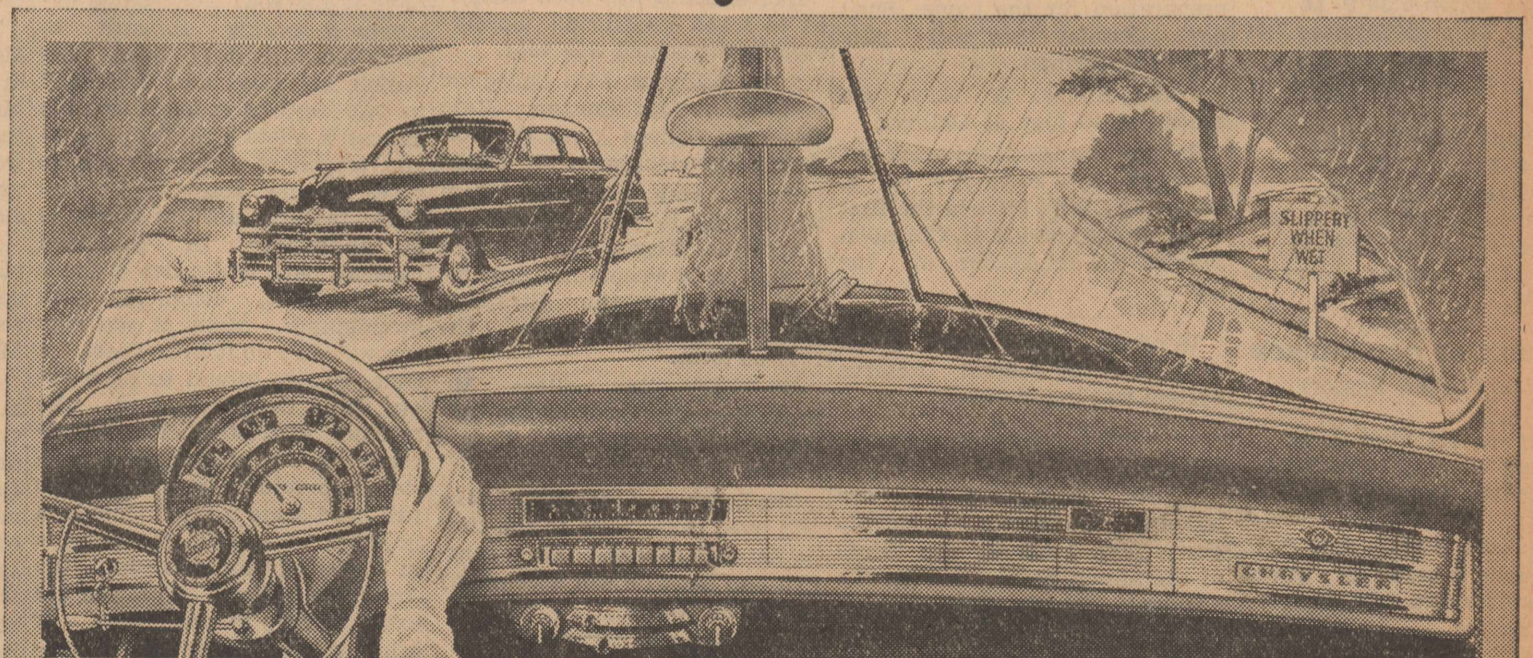

Wright Plans New Theater

HARTFORD, CONN.—A theatre where every gesture and tone of voice of the actors on stage can be seen or heard by every member of the audience. . . . A theatre where there are no "bad" seats. . . . A theatre, which in the opinion of its designer, Frank Lloyd Wright, will be so restful that it will be a pleasure just to sit in it.

This is the theatre, that if all goes well, will be built here in Hartford, a city that has made enough money from its insurance and arms manufacturing businesses to afford such community enterprises. At a Hartford club luncheon this week, Wright told leading townspeople and visiting theatrical lights what the proposed building would do for them and for culture in general.

Gray But Sprightly
The Wisconsin born architect, gray but still sprightly at 79, declared that the legitimate theatre, unless it mended its ways, was not long for this world. But with playhouses such as the one proposed for Hartford scattered about the country, he went on, the stage would be given the intimacy and excitement that it now so sorely needs.

"We want to have the kind of a theatre that can belong to a community, not simply be imposed on it," he declared.

Woman Sworn in as U. S. Treasurer

The Hartford venture, to be called the New theatre, has been commissioned by Paton Price, director for the last two years of the Canton summer theatre near Hartford, and two associates. Price plans to organize a professional resident company for the new playhouse, offering both winter and summer seasons.

As illustrated by a scale model Wright brought with him from Texas, the proposed theatre will be built on simple functional lines. The eight-sided main auditorium will seat the audience on a gradual downward slope, with the slightly raised stage at the bottom. There will be no balcony and no posts. The stage itself will be circular, with the inner portion revolving for quick scene changes.

Viewers Enthused
Theatrical people who viewed the model were enthusiastic. Cornelia Otis Skinner, declaring that the road had been dying partly because of a lack of suitable theatres, said, "All of us are going to be keen to play in the new theatre here."

Two possible obstacles were seen by some theatre spokesmen, however. The circular stage would make different type of sets necessary, a drawback for touring companies. And the proposed seating capacity, which Wright wants to hold to about 750 to insure the "intimacy" of atmosphere he is striving for, might not be enough to attract top flight road shows.

Wright contended, however, that the smaller seating capacity—about 500 less than most Broadway playhouses—would be compensated for by simpler scenery arrangements which would require less expensive equipment and personnel.

Burma Rebels See Glamour In Fame of Bandit Maid

RANGOON—Burma rebels are cashing in on the popularity of a "beautiful young maiden" who rides through the tropic nights on a white horse at the head of a bandit column.

To the government, she is just Ma Khin Nyunt, unglamorous leader of 300 bloodthirsty rebels. They are part of the guerrilla forces attacking police posts, railway stations, and bridges in the interior.

The Lady of the White Horse started banditry before the present civil war, and is still a thorn in the government's side after 18 months. Two other female Robin Hoods—one time school-teachers—are reported leading bands of women who give and ask no quarter.

Jack and Beanstalk Take Back Seat to "Bean Queen"

SWAMPSCOTT, MASS.—Jack and the Beanstalk had nothing on Mrs. Lucy G. Nickerson, "bean queen" of the Church of the Redeemer, Methodist, here.

Ever since Mrs. Nickerson called off a church supper because no Yankee church supper is proper without beans—which were too scarce and too costly—the Church of the Redeemer has been receiving generous gift sacks of beans from various parts of the country.

The latest gift, a 100-pound sack from the Elkton Cooperative Farm Products of Elkton, Mich., brought the total poundage of free-gift beans up to 350.

Reflex Action at Movie Touches off Old Pistol

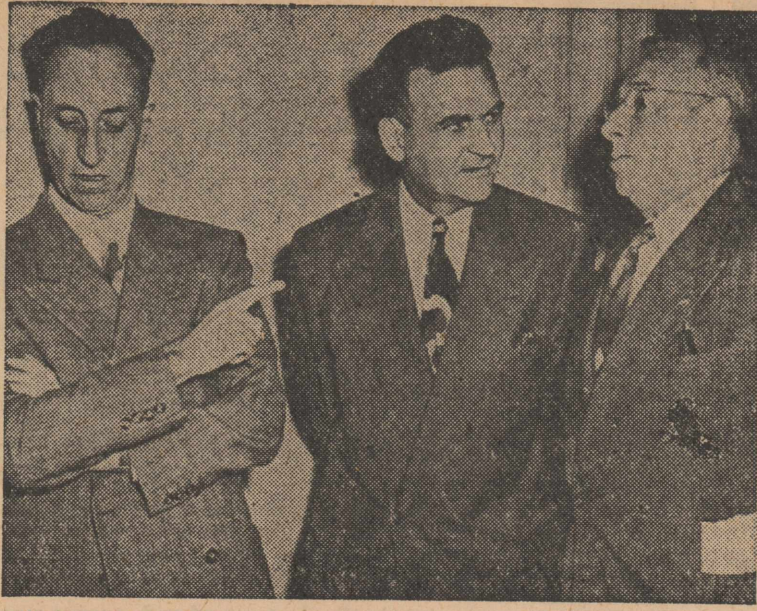

Liberty-Loving Osceola Can't Find Resting Place

CHARLESTON, S. C.—Osceola, who fought for Indian living space in Florida during his lifetime, still hasn't found a final resting place in his homeland 111 years after his death.

But efforts are under way to return his bones to Collier county, Florida, where 500 survivors of the one-mighty Seminole nation revere Osceola as the George Washington of his people.

Under a weathered slab in a weedy plot the famous Indian warrior lies on a spit of sand reaching into the Atlantic near Charles.

Around his grave rise the crumbling earthworks of Fort Moultrie. Osceola died in the fortress in 1838, a year after his capture by Gen. Thomas Jessup, who violated a truce to take his prize.

Osceola's protagonists—historians are divided on whether he was a great warrior or an unprincipled savage—say he died of a broken heart.

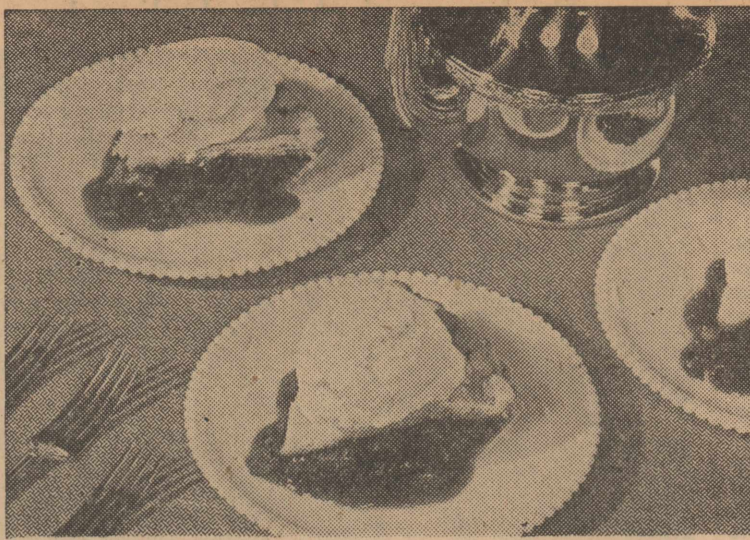

Today's paints are specialized formulas for specialized jobs. It's important that the formula balance not be upset by the user's dabbling, which may result in a so-called paint-failure.

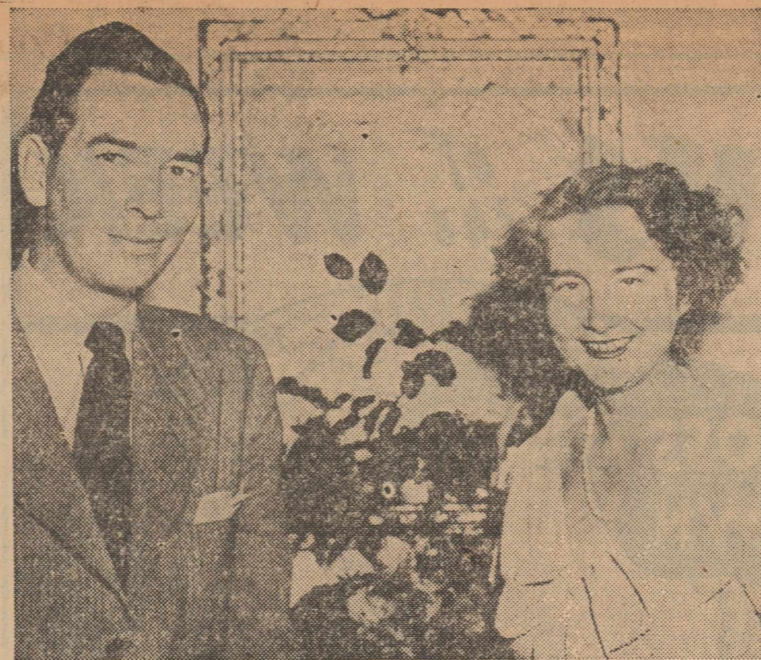

Communist Fallacy

LAST WEEK your Home Town Reporter gave the results of a poll on the question of whether or not we were moving toward a socialist government in this country, and the answers received from the home towns and rural areas of the nation were overwhelmingly in the negative.

And while this gives us a feeling of satisfaction and security that our farmers and the people in the rural communities have their feet firmly implanted on the solid rock of democracy, individual freedom and the dignity of man, there were several answers upon which we touched in last week's column which lead us to wonder just how far-reaching some of the fallacious communistic propaganda has spread. One such letter was from the man in Oregon who said many of his neighbors believed in "Christian communism." This man went on to say that after much study "I have finally concluded the Bible in spirit taught Christian communism. . . . a spiritual interpretation of the Bible teaches peace and Christian communism."

As we pointed out last week the word "Christian" and the word "communism" are direct opposites and there can be no such thing as a Christian Communist. Communism is anti-God and anti-Christ.

The martyrdom of Cardinal Mindszenty and the 13 protestant ministers in Hungary, of Cardinal Stepinac in Yugoslavia and lately the program against Archbishop Beran and the church in Czechoslovakia and against all religion in Russia and the iron curtain countries is indicative of this anti-spiritual, anti-God stand of Marxian communism.

Everywhere behind the iron curtain communism has been openly at war not only with genuine political democracy, but also with religion of every type that recognizes man as a child of God and not the creature of the state. This Godless tyranny, by its very nature, is driven to do battle against God-fearing freedom because the two cannot exist side by side.

Communism judges man to be nothing but an animal to be regimented, so Red totalitarianism must fight any political philosophy which gives him dignity and makes him free. 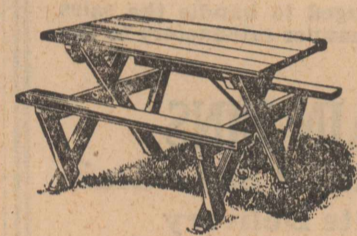
Polishing Stove

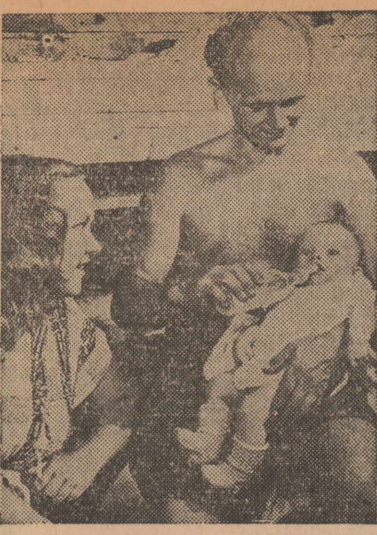

Radioactive Gold Provides Weapons Against Leukemia

MEMPHIS.—Radioactive gold has armed the medical profession with a potent new weapon for the treatment of leukemia and several other forms of cancer according to Dr. Paul F. Hahn, director of the cancer research laboratories, Meharry medical college, Nashville.
 Gold "does not offer any promise of a cure," Dr. Hahn emphasized, but it "represents a very satisfactory means of obtaining remissions" in cases of leukemia, a malady characterized by destruction of red corpuscles; Hodgkin's disease, which produces enlargement of lymphoid tissue, spleen, liver, and sometimes kidneys; and lymphomas, which are lymphoid tissue tumors.
 The gold, which is non-toxic and relatively inexpensive, can be administered by physicians to ambulatory patients at home, thus sav-

White House so Worn New Inside Is Needed

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The White House is so dilapidated that an entire new house will be built inside the hollow outer shell of the historic executive mansion.
 And none too soon, Lorenzo S. Wilson, White House architect, said as he conducted reporters through the empty house. He said it was a "miracle" that its central walls had not collapsed and killed someone.
 Only the outside brick walls, still scarred by the fire of 1814, will be left standing. When congress gives the go ahead on repairs, the whole inside will come down.
 The 149 year old presidential home is in far worse shape than anyone suspected. What started as "extensive repairs" will be complete new construction from cellar to roof.
 The White House was closed in November and President Truman and his family moved across the street to the Blair House, where they will remain until the reconstruction is completed. Once work has started, it will take 15 to 18 months to finish the job.
 Estimates of the cost of repairs now range from five to eight mil-

lion dollars. It would cost only two million dollars to build the house new, but that would involve scrapping historic trimmings.

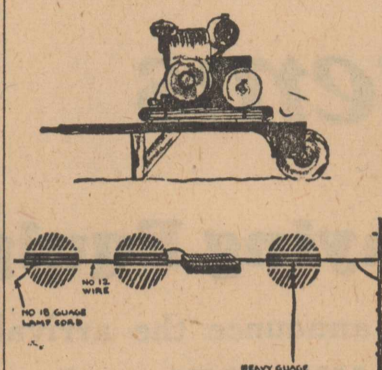

Electric Seine

An expanded version of an electric seine used on smaller trout streams in the East is paying dividends for the Kentucky division of game and fish.

The seine used by the Kentucky division was constructed by Leonard Joeris, division technician, and is a variation of one described by John T. Funk of the Missouri conservation commission.

Joeris's seine consists of a two-strand rubber-coated cable of No. 12 wire, 150 feet long. The first 50 feet of the cable form a lead wire from the generator. A probe pole is securely attached to the cable at either end of the remaining 100 feet. These probe poles are 7 feet long and tipped with a strip of copper plate (20 inches long and 3/4



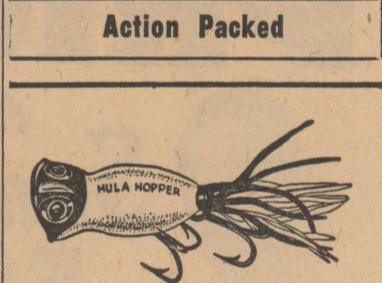
Shown in the top drawing is the generator used in powering the electric seine, and, below, details of the seine's construction.

inches wide) folded over the lower end. The seine between the poles is held up by 14 floats made from 18-inch sections of 2x4-inch lumber. Twenty-seven additional electrodes are spaced at 3 1/2-foot intervals between the two poles.

The power plant, or generator, is an alternating current type, belt-driven, and develops 6 1/2 horsepower at 2,400 rpm's. This generator is larger and more powerful than most generators in use for electric seines or shockers throughout the United States at the present time.

The seine works very well in relatively clear water less than four feet deep. The seine shocks all species of fish equally well, but the large fish seem to be shocked more successfully than the fingerlings and fry. If the seine is moved slowly, little danger of killing fish is apparent. All species of fish recover rapidly and sustain no damage.

This writer saw Joeris and fellow workers of the Kentucky division use the seine in Elkhorn creek, near Frankfort, Ky., and can testify to its effectiveness. However, Joeris, who apparently is a perfectionist, says "no attempt has been made . . . to evaluate the success of the seine in various types and conditions of water because sufficient reliable data has never been collected.

Continuing and increasing reports of its effectiveness are proving that Fred Arbogast & Company's famed topwater lure, the "Hula Popper," is really making fishing history. The impressive voluntary testimonials from enthusiastic anglers demonstrate, as nothing else could, just how deadly the "popper" is in angling for bass. A killer, especially for big bass, the "popper" obeys the slightest wrist command. It can be made to pop, plunk, twitch or jerk at will, or to make plenty of noise and confusion on the surface. Two North Carolina fishermen, Ed Howell and W. G. Hood, Jr., of Goldsboro, claim that "if bass don't strike it, they ain't there." The Hula Popper floats when at rest and the small hula skirt goes into action, imitating a live bug. It seems to make bass fighting mad. The Arbogast company also makes the "popper" in fly-rod size, and it, too, is bringing in the bass.

Watch It!

Wisconsin conservation wardens are blaming the Chinese for some undersized trout found in fishermen's creels. It seems the Chinese, in placing rulers on trout creels, are something less than particular about the accuracy of the rulers. As a result, some of the creel rulers are from three fourths to five-eighths of an inch short on the seven-inch length. The wardens concede that the fishermen bought these creels in good faith.

Picnic Plans

WHEN YOU PLAN an outing, good food that will please everyone has to be part of the picnic plan. In addition to this, have a "packable" lunch that you can carry in a shopping bag, string sack, bandana or hamper.

The less preparation you have at the picnic grounds where everyone will be famishing, the better will be the lunch. If you want to cook the hamburgers or ribs or frankfurters on an outdoor grill, that's all to the good, since this whets appetite to a tantalizing sharpness. However, if you have to wash fruits and vegetables, and pare or scrape them when you get there, this may seem like something that can be done much more easily at home.

A SAVORY, well-seasoned meat should be the main interest of the lunch, however. For some this may be old-fashioned picnic 'burgers, roasted frankfurters or barbecued ribs. These are easy to serve on buns which can be purchased ready made, and then simply split and buttered and even toasted while the meat cooks.

Picnic 'Burgers
(Makes 12 'Burgers)
3/4 cup chopped onion
2 tablespoons fat
1 pound ground beef
3/4 pound ground veal
3/4 pound ground pork
1 teaspoon salt
3/4 teaspoon pepper
2 tablespoons soy sauce
3/4 teaspoon dry mustard
1 dozen hamburger buns

Brown onion in fat in a large skillet. Add meats, salt, pepper, soy sauce and dry mustard. Cook over low heat for 45 minutes, stirring occasionally. Split hamburger buns and fill with meat mixture. Top with picnic sauce:

1 cup tomato sauce, catsup or chili sauce
1/2 cup cider vinegar
6 tablespoons sugar
3/4 cup chopped onion
3/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper
3/4 cup chopped green olives
2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce

Mix all ingredients together in a saucepan and cook gently over low heat for one-half hour, stirring occasionally. This makes two cups of sauce.

Is it barbecued ribs that you like on your picnic? Here's a delicious and easy way to prepare them: cook the ribs in a pressure saucepan at home to speed the process and then finish in the oven or at the picnic grounds in a skillet, basting them with the sauce.

'Barbecued Spareribs
(Serves 5-6)
3 pounds spareribs, cut in pieces
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
3/4 cup water

1 cup light cream or top milk

Peel and dice potatoes and cook in butter until slightly browned. Add seasonings. About five minutes before serving, add the cream and heat thoroughly.

3 ripe tomatoes, diced
1 1/2 cups finely shredded cabbage
1 cup sliced green onions
3/4 teaspoon salt
3/4 teaspoon pepper
5 tablespoons light cream
1 1/2 tablespoons vinegar

Combine all vegetables in salad bowl. Add seasonings. Blend together cream and vinegar and pour over salad. Toss lightly and serve on lettuce.

Butterscotch Bars
(Makes 3 dozen)
1/2 cup butter
2 cups brown sugar
2 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 1/2 cups sifted flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 cup chopped nuts

Melt butter in a heavy saucepan. Add sugar and bring to a boil over low heat, stirring constantly. Cool. Add eggs, one at a time, beating thoroughly. Stir in vanilla, then flour which has been sifted with baking powder. Fold in nuts. Pour into a greased and floured 7 x 9 inch pan and bake in a moderate (350°) oven for 30-35 minutes. Cool, then cut in bars.

When broiling meat on an outdoor grill, trim off excess fat and snip the edges so the pieces of meat won't curl. Let the fire burn down to red coals, then set a grill three to five inches above the coals and start broiling meat before flames die down.
When using a skillet on an outside grill, set it about 5 inches above the coals.
If you are using sauces for the meat, keep down the fat amount and use more catsup or chili sauce. The fat sputters!

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

By DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

SCRIPTURE: Psalms 34; 37; 46; 91; 138; 74; 143:6.
DEVOTIONAL READING: Isaiah 26:1-10.

God Can Be Trusted

Lesson for July 31, 1949

EVEN if you do nothing else with this lesson, it will be a good thing to learn by heart some of the Psalms of Trust which have been selected for your study this week. They are far too rich to be treated in one column.

Who Can Trust in God?

PSALM 34:16-22.) Not every one has a right to trust in God. Those who do not believe in him, do not love him, work against him, try to break down and corrupt those who do believe in him—these need expect nothing at his hand. But there are three classes of persons who are encouraged to put their trust in God. One is the "contrite," the repentant, those who sincerely wish to be cut free from their sins—these can surely trust in God for forgiveness. One who cannot trust God for forgiveness has no right to trust him for anything else. Then the "righteous," as the Psalmist calls them, have a right to trust in God.

If that word means only the perfectly and altogether good people, it would leave all of us out. But in the light of the Bible as a whole, the righteous are those whose dominant desire is to love and serve God.

Their service is imperfect, their love is far from perfect, and no man is without sin. But if you can say with Peter, "Lord, thou knowest that I love thee," then you have a right to trust in God. Also the broken-hearted can safely trust in him. Whoever else may break your heart, God will not. He is the great Mender of hearts. For the little sorrows there may be lesser comforters; but the real heart-breaks only God can cure.

Why Trust God?
PSALM 37 gives one answer: The opposite of trust is worry, and worry never did any good at all. Worry eats into the mind, casts no light, gives no strength, solves no problems, worry makes any trouble worse. Then the writer of Psalm 34 gives another reason for trust: he had tried it. If trust in God were simply a doctrine of theology or a theory of preachers, not many people would take it seriously.

Trust is really passed on by a kind of contagion from heart to heart. If there are not more people who know what trust means, it is because those who have known have kept it too much to themselves.

It would be a wonderful stimulus to most churches to have a little "cell" of people who would really agree to trust God every day.

When to Trust in God
ONE of Dicken's famous characters used to make a great point of being cheerful under the most un-cheerful circumstances. Anybody can be jolly when everything is lovely, he said. There's no credit in not worrying when there's nothing to worry about. Although the writers of the Bible, one and all, trusted in God, not one had an easy life. Read Psalm 46, for example; it gives a picture of a world much like ours of today, shaken to its foundations, torn by wars, a desolate, discouraged world. If it made sense to trust only under bright skies, religion would have perished long ago.

For What Shall We Trust God?

NO ONE PSALM puts the whole truth in one nutshell. If you read Psalm 91, for example, by itself, it would seem to prove that if you trust in God you will never die a violent death, nor an early one; but too many saints (and indeed our Lord himself) had died early and violent deaths, for us to take Psalm 91 in that way. Trusting in God does not mean he will give us long life. It means he will give us strength to match our days.

It does mean he will give us all we need. It does not mean we shall be shielded from troubles. It does mean he will save us from troubles greater than we can bear. It does not mean that in this life we shall be wholly free from burdens or from pain; it does mean we shall have strength in our souls (Ps. 138:3).

Which is the greater thing—to be a weakling wearied by a straw's weight, or to be one of God's athletes, able to bear the worst the world can pile on?

PRIZE CONTESTS

Every Entry Gets Judged

CHICAGO, ILL.—Some men and women are sure of making money on prize contests.

They don't take part in them. They get paid for handling the entries.

These specialists handled more than 10 million pieces of contest mail last year for the Reuben H. Donnelley corp., prime operator in that field.

Volume rises and falls in pace with the popularity of the contests. The flow of mail reached flood stage a couple of years back when Bob Hope's radio sponsor was giving away four cars a week. They were sent to folks who wrote the best rhymes starting with "my favorite brunet."

The judges filed and forgot the winning jingles. But they remember a verse that got nothing more than a laugh. It went like this:

"My favorite brunet
Is Hedy Lamarr.
Just send her to me
And keep your new car."
Didn't Make Grade

Hearty A. M. Andersen, Chicago manager of Donnelley's direct mail division, explains:

"This one amused us, but it didn't make the grade on the Donnelley objective rating system."

Most contests are put on to stimulate sales of new or established products. They are advertised on the radio and in newspapers and store displays. Prizes are offered.

Contestants have to write jingles or short essays, provide a name for a new kind of food, or fill out testimonials stating "I like this because. . ." They may have to send in wrappers or box tops, too.

Sponsors pay Donnelley a fee for handling the contest mail. The letters are addressed to a post office box in Chicago, New York or Los Angeles. The firm has offices in all three cities. One of them takes over the sifting and judging job.

The bags of mail are picked up at 1 p. m. That gives the postal clerks time to sort the mail that comes in on overnight trains.

The entries are read and screened by four sets of judges. All are Donnelley employees. All are college graduates. The final judges—who pick the winners—are Donnelley executives.

Every Entry Judged
"Every entry is carefully considered," Andersen says. "They are evaluated on a basis of the contest rules, usually aptness, sincerity and originality."

The contest crews find many surprises and chuckles in the mail bags. Things like rhymes spelled out in a crocheted table scarf or in the frosting on a cake. Thousands of entries were wrapped around eggs—most of them thoughtfully hard boiled—one Easter season.

Sacks have yielded income tax returns and love letters that were sealed in the wrong envelopes, sly offers to split the first prize 50-50, pies, cookies, photographs—and one long dead fish.

The number of men and women who work on contests depends on the size of the contests. Andersen says as many as 600 have been on contest duty at one time. He says the concern handles about 75 per cent of the national contests. It had 100 in 1948 and expects to handle as many this year.

Dunkerque Hero Gets Five-Year Prison Term

PARIS.—Lieut. Gen. Alfred Facalde, who fought off the Germans at Dunkerque, was stripped of his rank and condemned to five years' confinement by a court-martial for having offered to join the German Waffen SS while a prisoner in 1944. Lieut. Gen. Rene-Paul Dubuisson received a four-year suspended sentence but was deprived of his rank

and personal wealth, while Maj. Gen. Jacques d'Arras was acquitted.

Fagalde, who also was stripped of his personal wealth, pleaded just before the court pronounced its findings that he had never intended to serve in the German army but had merely wanted to get the chance to return to France.

HIGH JINKS

Menageries Take to Air

CHICAGO—Airline people speak of 1948 as the year of flying menageries.

The lowly worm had his day in the air, along with lobsters, snakes, ducks, tigers, chimpanzees, bears and assorted house pets according to Joseph D. Boylan, director of cargo sales for American Airlines.

Boylan said the scheduled aviation industry's 16-million-dollar airfreight business last year included a lot of oddities in and out of the animal kingdom.

A parrot flying by Flagship from Mexico City to San Antonio was reportedly refused admission to this country because it used profane language.

Too Much Sunshine

Somebody in Dallas grew tired of all that sunshine and had 25 pounds of bona fide New York snow shipped by air after the pre-Christmas storm in the east.

The Oregon chamber of commerce sent 60 pounds of soil to be sprinkled in the Dallas Cotton Bowl New Year's day, so the Oregon football team wouldn't have to play on "foreign" soil. The Webfeet lost to Southern Methodist anyhow, 12-13.

In Los Angeles a shipper sent his dog to the airport in a crate marked "Rush! This dog expecting." The dog gave birth to three pups before plane time. Upon her arrival at destination it was found some wag had scribbled across the crate, "Too late!"

Out of Mexico a new item in food-stuffs became a regular note on airfreight manifests: fried pumpkin seeds. It seems they are favored as appetizers in some parts of the U. S.

One December night an airfreighter took off from Newark, N. J., with a crate of baby chicks and two monkeys. When it arrived at Buffalo cargo handlers nonchalantly loaded it with three crates of prize turkeys weighing 45 pounds each; five crates of chinchillas, two canaries, a stone deaf kitten, three dogs, and two crates of fancy pigeons.

Catalogues Fly

Even the ubiquitous Sears Roebuck catalogues took to the air when 20,000 pounds were flown from Boston to Frankfurt, Germany.

A Syracuse political leader paid off an election bet by parading in front of the city hall with a lion he had shipped on American Airlines from an animal farm in Boston.

A woman in the Middle West who attributed her recovery from tuberculosis to the goats' milk she received from Los Angeles had two of the special alpine goats shipped to her by flagship to keep as pets.

A chimpanzee anxious to arrive in Hollywood fresh for a screen test went from Cincinnati by air and won a part in the movie "You Gotta Stay Happy."

Boston dispatched a flying Noah's ark last August when it loaded onto one airplane: a lion, a wolf-hound, a Weimaraner cat, 11,000 baby chicks and six tons of fresh fish.

During the year American carried human eyes and whole blood; precious serums and iron lungs; radio-active isotopes, hurley sticks and gold bricks. "It's getting so you can't surprise a cargo handler any more," Boylan said.

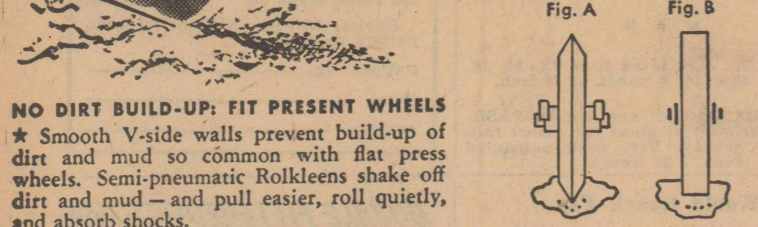

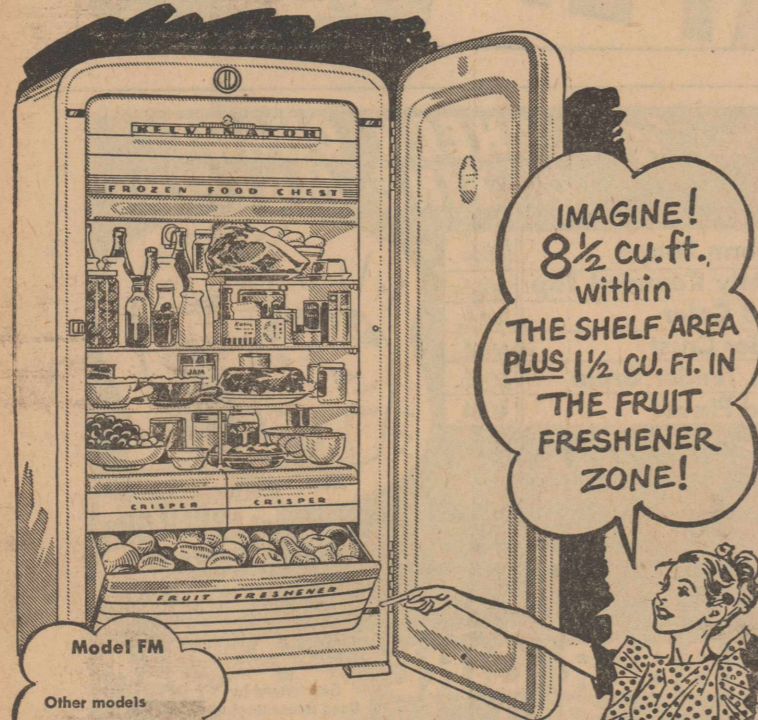

Gangland Victim's Body Left at Hospital Door

REVERE, MASS.—The emergency gong at Revere Memorial hospital clang early one day. Two nurses, who were having a cup of tea, answered the summons. As they swung open the door, the propped up body of a gangland victim slid into the reception hall at their feet.

The dead man was identified as Robert S. Holmes, 36, wanted for a Lawrence, Mass., bank robbery. Police said he had died an hour earlier from a bullet wound.

Gangland's vengeance, police believed, was the result of an alleged attempt by Holmes to withhold part of the \$10,000 loot of a recent dice game in Woburn, Mass.

Holmes, a state prison parolee, was the last of four participants in the Lawrence bank robbery in 1936 to meet a violent death.

Delivery of Holmes' body was well timed to take advantage of one of the most quiet periods at the hospital. The time was 4:45. Only one person in addition to the two nurses apparently heard the gong. She was Jean Boucher, a patient. She looked out a window and saw

two fatless men run from the hospital steps to an automobile whose motor was running, and speed away.

Soil Protection Crop

Annual lespedeza is a crop which can be used both for forage production and soil building. Lespedeza is usually seeded into the grain in early spring. It continues to grow after the grain has been harvested and can then be cut for hay, or left for seed which may be harvested late in the fall. Another alternative is to leave the entire crop on the land and turn it under in preparing the land for cotton. As a soil protection crop, lespedeza provides cover on the land during the winter months, thus retarding erosion. It adds organic matter to the soil and, being a legume, it lessens the need for commercial nitrogen.

Breakfast, Important Meal

People who are careless about their breakfasts may ask whose business it is if they choose to live that way. But it does concern others. Ill nourished people are not at their best, and in this machine age they jeopardize the safety and lives

of others. Children in families which start off the day with scanty or unappetizing breakfasts are off to a bad start for school or work. Thus continually deprived in their growing years, they fail to build the stamina necessary to resist disease and premature aging. There is no end to the ills of a people who cheat their stomachs at the first meal of the day.

Facts About Pole Star

The pole star changes. Owing to an effect called precession of the equinoxes the point in the sky directly over the north pole shifts in a circle among the stars. The star in the little dipper which we call the Pole star is merely a transient occupant of that post. In the future we will have other pole stars. For example, the one called Alderamin, in the constellation of Cepheus, will be there about 7,500 A. D., and Vega, in Lyra, about 14,000 A. D. About 23,000 A. D. Thuban, in Draco, will again be the pole star, as it was around 2,900 B. C., when some of the Egyptian pyramids were built.

Elderly Miner Rescued After 10 Hours in Shaft

SEAMOKIN, PA.—A 62-year-old miner was rescued after he had been trapped for almost 10 hours by a cave-in at the bottom of a 20 foot anthracite mine shaft.

Efforts of the rescue workers were rewarded after a day-long series of trials as new coal falls threatened to take the life of Alexander Pochekilo before they could clear away the first coal slide.

The man was buried upright by a slide of coal and dirt while he and his son, Joseph, 22, worked in their independent mine at near-by Sagon. Joseph, trapped to his waist, was freed within an hour. Chinks in the coal allowed air to reach the father. To prevent further slides, the rescuers built a fence of timbers around him. Then, scooping the dirt in a five-gallon bucket and pulling it to the surface with a winch, they freed him. He was brought up with a rope.

Expert Says Man Must Turn More to Ocean for His Food

AUCKLAND, N. Z.—Man must turn more to the ocean for food to survive, Dr. J. L. Kask of the United Nations food and agriculture organization told the Pacific Science Congress.

"The ocean is man's next frontier—it may be his last," the speaker told the congress, holding its first session here since the war.

He said that the Pacific Ocean, which covers more than one-third of the world's surface supplies less than half the world's fish supplies.

There was sufficient evidence of untouched stocks of fish to warrant the United States government in appropriating a million dollars this year to investigate the fisheries of the Central Pacific, Dr. Kask said.

Most fishing has been done in relatively shallow waters, the speaker explained. Echo sounders found huge schools of edible fish at considerable depths. He urged wise exploitation of fishery resources and elimination of wasteful, cutthroat competition.
