

Beauty Queen Will Be Selected At Legion Hall Saturday Night

Stratford's loveliest lovelies will parade before the judges in the bathing beauty contest at the dance in the Legion Hall Saturday night. The winner of this contest will represent Stratford at the Wheatheart of the Nation contest in Perryton August 19 and 20. Any single girl with good reputation and character and properly endorsed by any business firm or civic organization is eligible to enter.

Prizes for the winners at Perryton are as follows: first \$200, second \$100, third \$50, fourth \$25, fifth \$25.

The Stratford Chamber of Commerce will award the local winner an evening gown and a bathing suit, plus expenses to the Perryton celebration where she will appear in the parade in bathing suit, and also at the dance on the night of August 19. On the 20th she will appear at the dance in evening gown.

It is understood that the event will be covered by Life magazine, and given national publicity, so some Stratford girl might turn up on the cover of Life. This information is not official, but was reported by a representative of another magazine who was in Stratford briefly a short time ago.

A number of entries have already been made, and others are pending but entries will be accepted until 9:30 Saturday night. Members of the Committee have been busy on other committees in connection with the Stratford Jamboree, and have been unable to contact all business firms and likely contestants, but any business firm or organization who wishes to enter a contestant, should contact Earl Bond, Delbert Cummings, Brown Ross, Chester Plunk, or C. F. Meinhardt. Also any girl who wishes to enter may contact them, and a sponsor will be found. Many business firms expressed a willingness to enter a contestant, but have not yet selected a girl, so any girl who would like to enter, may be sure of a sponsor. The sponsor is under no obligation whatever except a five dollar entry fee, which will help defray the expenses of sending an entry to Perryton. The Chamber of Commerce will see that the winner is properly escorted and chaperoned at Perryton.

1 New Drilling Location; 2 Wells Are Tested

Stanolind Oil and Gas Co. announces the location of the No. 1 Shoup, to be drilled 150 feet north and east of the center of section 80, Block 1-C.

Phillips Petroleum No. 1 Hussman in section 6, Block 1-C, was drilled to a total depth of 3,194 feet. It produced pay from 2,945 to 3,190 feet. The well was perforated and treated with 21,000 gallons of acid. It tested 4,724 million cubic feet of gas with a rock pressure of 422 pounds.

Gulf Oil Corporation No. 1 J. R. Collard in section 7 of Block 3, was drilled to a depth of 3,665 feet and abandoned as a dry hole.

There will be a lot of out-of-town floats entered, and the committee is planning on at least three or four bands being present. Several out of town range riders groups are expected to enter, and a fine parade is promised those who come to the Jamboree.

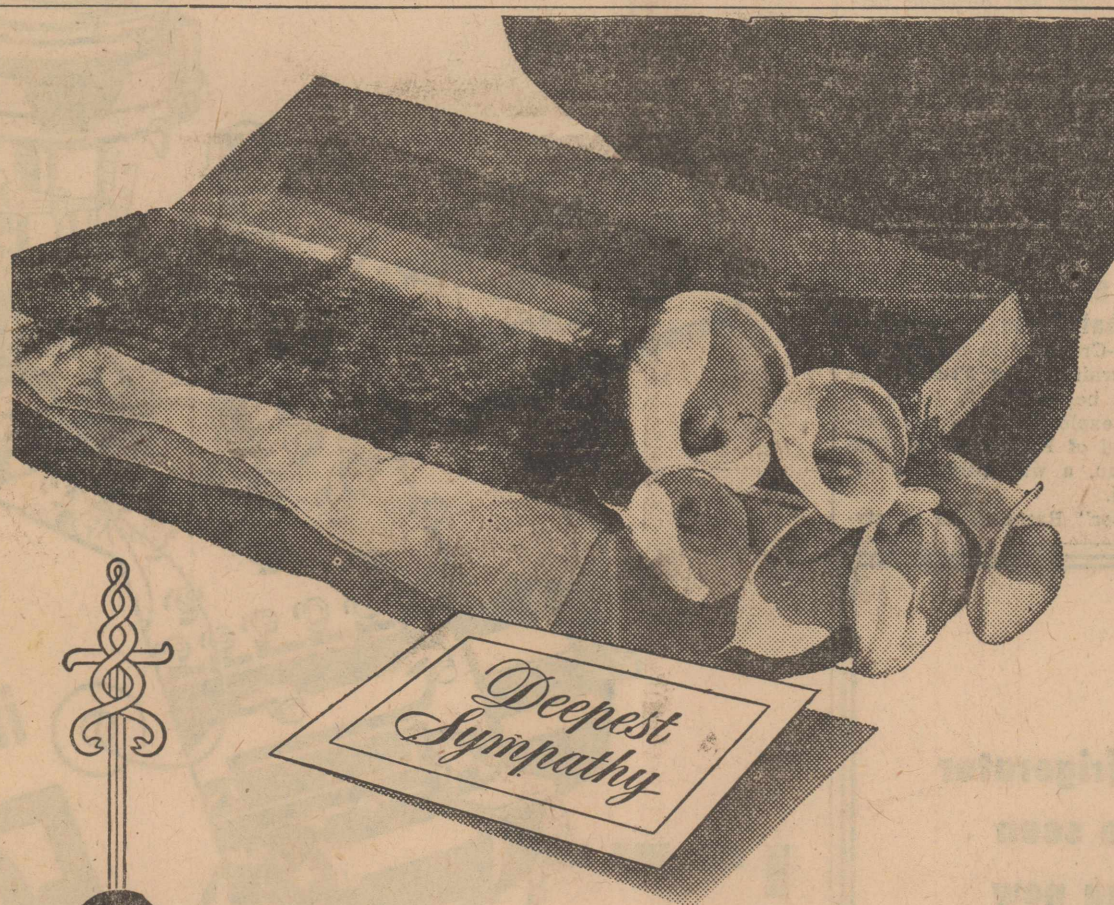

More Than Brains Needed For Success in Careers

CHICAGO.—Why does the college-trained man frequently fail at his first job?

The answer—he is still a child in one way or another, because he lacks one or more of seven basic traits.

That is the answer given by Dr. Robert N. McMurry based on a survey by his management firm which studied 1,167 trainees directly hired from college by 247 companies.

He listed the seven traits as: The ability to stay long enough with a company to repay the investment in training.

The ability to accept responsibility.

Persistence, or the ability "to follow a path to the end."

Self-reliance.

The quality of being agreeable to different groups and different persons.

Identification of his personal goals with those of the firm.

And the ability to exercise authority without belligerence.

"Absence of these traits, or any one of them, indicates failure of an individual to grow emotionally," said Dr. McMurry.

'Electric Brain' Causes Shock That Cures Maladies

PARIS.—Credulity is not an outstanding trait of the French, but one might believe so to judge by the lurid exploits over a thirteen-year period of Fernand-Albert-Didier Rameau, a wily person of 37, now in jail.

"Professor" Rameau, as he styled himself, was seized while comparing himself with style at International House of University City, reserved in great part for faculty members of the Sorbonne. The reason for his privileged status was his recital of a glittering record of achievements. These included the reputed bestowal of the Prix Curie, in 1938, a diploma cum laude from the University of Copenhagen, possession of the Silver Medal of the Paris Municipality and other impressive distinctions.



DARTMOUTH, ENGLAND — Police in Dartmouth, England reported that they had rescued British Communist Harry Pollitt from a village mob angered at Chinese Communist killing of British seamen. Before police hustled Pollitt from a Communist rally where he was scheduled to speak, John Akhurst, the father of a seaman killed in China, handed Pollitt a rope and note, suggesting that he use the rope. Pollitt is British Communist party secretary.

His outstanding accomplishment, however, and that which most awed his colleagues at University City, was his invention of an "electric brain," a battery-operated apparatus which, snugly fitted over the cranium of the afflicted, "cured" cancer, tuberculosis, gopher and such lesser maladies as athlete's foot, the shingles and the common pip.

REDS COMPLAIN

Upright Man In Bad Shape

MOSCOW. — The government newspaper Izvestia complained today against a Soviet biologist who held that man started on the downward path when he began to walk on his two legs.

This scientist, the paper said, is "an ignoramus."

The biologist, Izvestia said, really was a former pro-Czarist officer who had managed to worm his way into Soviet science circles.

S. D. Antipin, chief of the department of biology at the Kishinev medical institute, was the challenged scientist.

Izvestia said he had advanced this theory:

Man's greatest tragedy occurred when he ceased to walk on all fours and cut himself off from the animal world by assuming an erect position. If man had continued to walk horizontally, and rabbits had learned to walk vertically, many of the world's ills would not exist.

Attacks Scientist

Boris Lavrenev, Izvestia writer, scrutinized Antipin's career, and said he is a former soldier in Admiral Kolchak's White Guards, fought the Red army and then, when Kolchak was defeated, managed to pass himself off as a "biologist."

Lavrenev said Antipin taught at various medical and veterinarian institutions until he landed his job as a department head at Kishinev.

Citing some choice Antipinisms, Lavrenev quoted, "Every four-legged animal excels man. Since man raised his head up, he lost his sense of smell and by using artificial meat grinders instead of his own teeth he has weakened his chewing equipment."

Because of man's vertical position his internal organs are piled one atop another like the floors of a building, Antipin held, and his lungs are not properly ventilated, hence he is subject to tuberculosis.

"As the descendant of a four-legged animal, man is constructed on the horizontal principle and thus, by becoming vertical, he is as curious as a steam engine, rolling along on its back wheels," Antipin was quoted.

Dislikes Mouth

Lavrenev said Antipin was especially displeased with the human mouth and fulminated against women's lips.

"No wonder many women paint their lips as if to say—see I'm human, not a monkey," Antipin said.

Lavrenev said Antipin's magnum opus was entitled, "Rebuilding human organism on a horizontal principle, on the harmfulness of walking on the hind legs, and placing rabbits in a vertical position so as to lengthen their furs."

Lavrenev described Antipin as "an ordinary adventurer, crook, and ignoramus, slavishly addicted to idiotic Morganistic (Morgan is one of the leaders of the discredited Mendelian genetics school) ravings, having nothing in common with science."

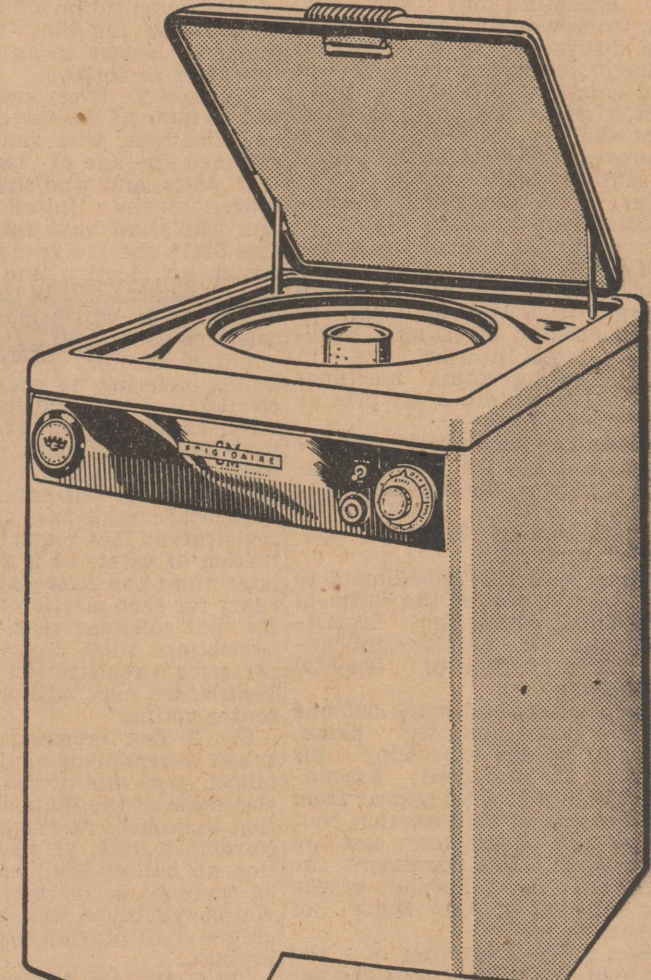

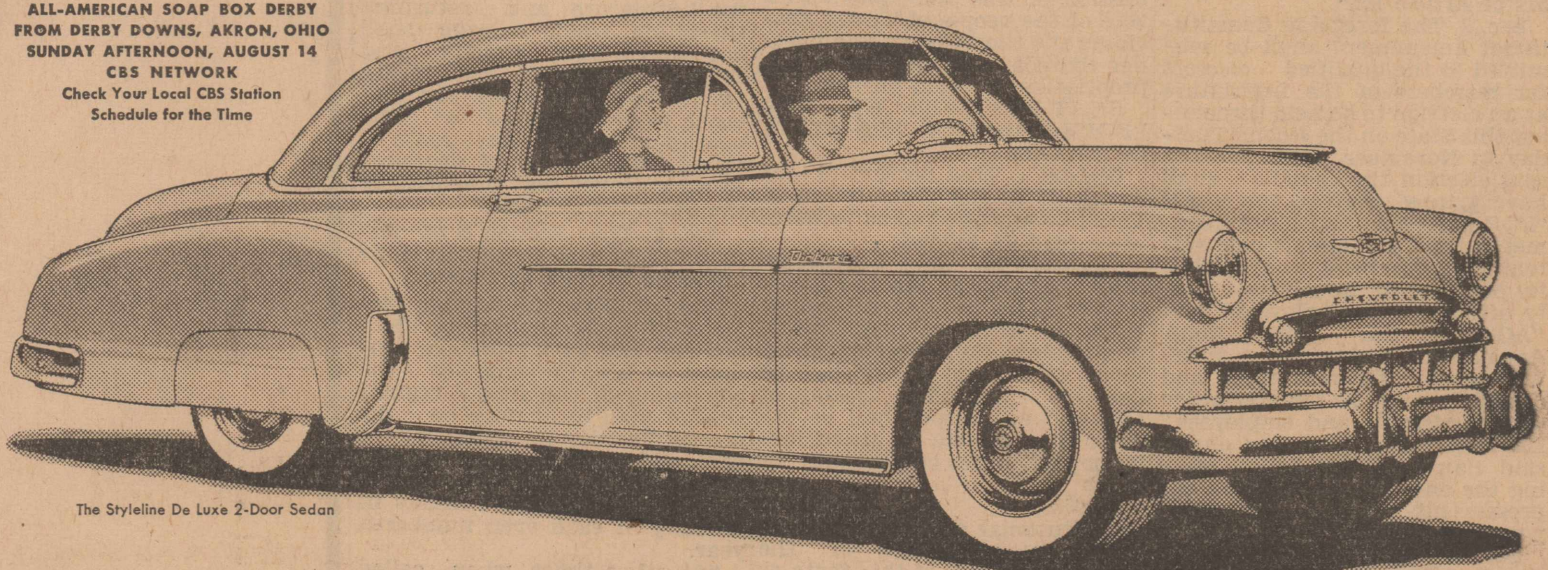

Proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature of the State of Texas to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts; providing for the Governor's proclamation and submission to the electorate.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section to be designated as Section 60, reading as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide by law for the establishment and creation of hospital districts in the counties of this State under such conditions as the Legislature may fix by law, and to provide for the support of said districts by a tax on the ad valorem properties situated in said counties; providing, however, that before any such district shall be created it shall be approved by a vote of the people in said district."

"Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts"; and

"AGAINST The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38

Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 63 and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county; and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51f of Article III.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949; and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees." Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes cast are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," the foregoing proposed amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof.

Sec. 5. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such proclamation, notice and election.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1

Proposing an amendment to Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution, repealing the provision making the payment of a poll tax qualification of an elector; requiring the Legislature to pass a general registration law for voters; providing for the necessary election, proclamation and publication by the Governor, and making an appropriation.

This provision shall be self-enacting. The Legislature shall pass a general registration law requiring registration of voters at a time not later than the first day of February for each election to be held for that calendar year, and the Legislature shall have power to prescribe a registration fee. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section, to be known and designated as Section 62-c, reading as follows:

"Section 62-c. The Legislature is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service Systems for county employees in the respective counties of this State, but any system so authorized and established shall be approved by a vote of the people in said county. Any Civil Service System established by virtue of this Section shall apply to appointive offices only, and the limitations on term of office heretofore provided by Section 30 of this Article shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of such Civil Service System. This Section shall not apply to counties having a population less than seventy-five thousand (75,000) people."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed or written thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein"; and

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

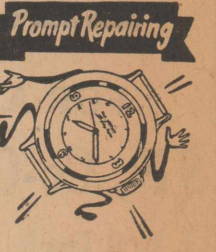

Then Berk announced he was cutting Miss Miller's rent 10 per cent. "Hot ziggy!" she exclaimed. "Oops! Maybe I'll have to report that!"

Oak Ridge Opens First Public Museum On 'Man And Atom'

OAK RIDGE, TENN.—As part of a broad program of public education in the field of nuclear sciences, the Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies has established the world's first permanent museum dealing with atomic energy. To be known as the American Museum of Atomic Energy, the exhibit was opened to the public on March 19, when the security gates to the town of Oak Ridge were removed and the community itself adopted a normal residential and business role. The museum is operated by the institute, a non-profit educational corporation of nineteen Southern universities which conducts a program of research and training in the nuclear sciences under a contract with the atomic energy commission. The exhibit includes the "man and the atom" show which was shown at the New York City golden jubilee last summer. It is described as the most complete exhibit ever assembled in the field of atomic energy. The display is housed in a 32,000-square-foot structure used as a cafeteria during the war. A nominal fee is charged for admission and the proceeds will be used for improvements in the exhibit. The institute has assembled a trained staff for the museum.

Hamburg Night Life Irks British Occupation Force

HAMBURG.—The sign on the door of the plush Atlantik Hotel still says verboten to Germans. Sickly kids beg cigarettes as British cars roll up. Half a mile away across the Alster, the picturesque lake in the middle of Hamburg, stands another hotel, The Esplanade. There are no signs here because this is a German place. Inside The Esplanade, waiters in tails hover over prosperous-looking men with beautiful, expensively dressed women. A band plays far better jazz than you can hear in a British club. Outside stand the kids, this time begging from Germans. This is Hamburg, 1949. The feverish pulse of currency reform has given the city a Parisian glow. Everyone agrees it's the most luxurious place in Germany. One reason may be that it's a port, another that the bombs which wrecked the out-skirts spared the center. At night thousands of lights twinkle around the beautiful Alster. If it's night life you want, you can go to The Esplanade, or The Tarantella, or a place called Er und Sie (he and she), done in cream and dark blue in the best New York

tradition. A bottle of good champagne costs 35 marks. At the official rate of exchange, this is \$12.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 32
Proposing an Amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto another Section following Section 15, providing that the stucco structure may provide for trials in lunacy cases without a jury; further providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto the following Section 15, to read as follows:
"Section 15-a. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for waiver of trial by jury in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."
Sec. 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, A. D., 1949, at which election all ballot shall be printed thereon.
"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases." Each voter shall scratch out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.
Sec. 3. That the Governor of the State of Texas issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22
Proposing an Amendment to Article V, Section 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Judge of the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law; providing for election proclamation and submission to qualified electors of the State.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 7 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:
"Sec. 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a General Election, a Judge, who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall be licensed to practice law in this State and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court in this State, or both combined, for four (4) years next preceding his election, who shall have resided in the district in which he was elected for two (2) years next preceding his election, who shall reside in his district during his term of office, who shall hold his office for the period of four (4) years, and shall receive for his services an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature. The Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law. He shall hold the regular terms of his Court at the County Seat of each County in his district at least twice in each year in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall have power by General or Special Laws to make such provisions concerning the terms or sessions of each Court as it may deem necessary.
The Legislature shall also provide for the holding of District Court when the Judge thereof is absent, or is from any cause disabled or disqualified from presiding.
"The District Judges who may be in office when this Amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be

submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 8, 1949, at which time all ballots shall have printed thereon:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law;" and
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law."
Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.
Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Hero
Bests Sergeant York
HONG KONG.—The Chinese Communist radio has come up with a Sergeant York tale that goes the Tennessee sharpshooter one better.
It is said that a lone communist guerrilla, Chiu Yin-shan, armed only with a shoe, had captured 49 Nationalist soldiers while he was walking down a highway in Kiangsi province.
Chiu met seven Nationalists, the broadcast said, and having exhausted his supply of hand grenades, he pulled off his shoe, brandished it and shouted, "Hand over your arms or you die." Thereupon, according to the broadcast, the soldiers flung down their arms. Soon, 42 more soldiers appeared and surrendered when Chiu fired two shots from the captured rifles, the radio reported.

Use of Television In Religious Work Being Recognized
NEW YORK.—That television will become increasingly important as a religious, as well as a cultural and entertainment vehicle, seems assured.
The possibilities of television have been recognized by religious leaders from the beginning, and church groups more and more are discussing ways of utilizing the new medium, described by one spokesman as "essential to the work of the Christian church today."
Television programs of religious interest already have become familiar to video audiences.
Latest innovation is a religious-news program, first of its kind, recently launched by station WRGB in Schenectady.
Known as "Through the Eyes of Religion," the new program consists of news analyses, talks, photo illustrations, and live shots. The program is now on a 10-minute spot every two weeks, but is expected shortly to be presented on a weekly basis.
Until now, the most impressive use of television has been in the presentation of significant church ceremonies.

God Fish Experiment Seen Aid to Far North Explorers
DETROIT.—Future Antarctic and Arctic expeditions may benefit from experiments in which cod fish will get heat stroke.
The fish are Arctic cod which thrive in the icy waters of the far north. They are going to be dropped, by Dr. John Field of Stanford university, into waters comparable in temperature to those of the Pacific ocean, off the California coast.
Human swimmers may shiver in these waters on a July day, but to the cod they are hot water. Although he expects the cod to die, Dr. Field has reason to believe they might survive if they could be adapted to the higher water temperatures by slow degrees. He will try this in later experiments.
Dr. Field's experiments are being carried on at Point Barrow, Alaska, under a contract with the U. S. office of naval research which is interested in the mechanisms by which animals and fish adapt themselves to extremes of heat and cold. He reported some of them at a meeting here of the federation of American societies for experimental biology.
Arctic cod, he found, can live in waters as cold as three degrees below freezing because their metabolism, or rate of bodily chemical reactions, hold up well at low temperatures.
Rotation of the earth on its axis is from west to east.

BRITAIN WORRIED 'Rock' Apes Grow Fewer

NEW YORK.—With fewer than 20 of the famous Barbary apes still left on the Rock of Gibraltar, Great Britain, ever conscious of the legend that "when the apes go, the British go, too," again is taking steps to "reinforce" the unique garrison at the gateway to the Mediterranean Sea.
Gibraltar's apes, the only simian species living wild in all Europe, have roamed the cactus-covered upper reaches of the 1,350-foot Rock for centuries, notes the National Geographic Society. Numbering 100 or more in the 19th century, they have dwindled alarmingly close to the disappearing point several times since. On each occasion a new batch of "recruits" replenished the colony.

Apes Rounded Up
As a focal nerve center in the war—General Eisenhower directed the invasion of North Africa from "Gib"—and a citadel bristling with military activity, the Rock no longer could risk the danger of roving apes possibly causing wild confusion and serious damage. Accordingly, they were rounded up and placed in captivity for the duration. Most of those at large today are replacements brought from Africa after the end of hostilities.
The powerful tailless creatures, the size of big airdales, are not really apes. They are macaques, native to the forests of Barbary south across the strait in northwest Africa.
Scientists believe they first came to Europe in prehistoric times when the Mediterranean was a lake and the Strait of Gibraltar was dry land. The modern explanation is that pet macaques brought from Barbary frequently escaped or were freed from bondage by humans and found hospitality and sustenance in the labyrinth and vegetation of the Rock.

Even a few dozen Barbary apes running wild could make Gibraltar seem infested, so constant were their acts of mischief at times. Many are the stories of their destructive or playful descents, always by daylight, on shops, dwellings and barracks, as well as on civilian and military inhabitants of the community.
Officially Protected
In a noble experiment, the British gave the Gibraltar apes official protection in 1856. They were added to the garrison strength, given limited food rations and placed under a sergeant, "Keeper of the Apes." On one occasion they rewarded their benefactors by noisy warnings of an attempted surprise attack by a Spanish force.
In general, however, they took advantage of their immunity by acts of thievery and damage to property and human dignity. The worst offenders were arrested and sometimes exiled to distant zoos. After 1880, their liberty was curtailed.
The leader of one band, caught stealing kits from the garrison, had his head and face shaved closely. His gang would have none of so bare-faced a scoundrel, and greeted him with a shower of sticks and stones. Whereupon he returned to take up humble quarters with the soldiers who had punished him.

Auto Easy to Purchase In Prague for \$8,000
PRAGUE.—If you want to buy a car for \$8,000, it can be done easily here.
Just walk into any outlet for the nationalized automobile industry in Czechoslovakia and you can get a Skoda 1101 tudor sedan for a mere 415,858.80 crowns (\$8,317.16).
If you have a ration permit, it will set you back only half that, 203,505.40 crowns, but you will have to prove very specifically that you have some really valid reason for needing a car.
On the free market you needn't prove anything except that you have the money. (Four hundred thousand crowns represents about 80 months of the average worker's pay, or about 10 months of this country today.)
The Skoda 1101 is a small car, considerably smaller than the 1933 Chevrolet but a little larger than the German Volkswagen.

Jerusalem Scrolls Found Oldest in Old Testament
JERUSALEM.—A two-man scientific expedition to the Dead Sea has returned here with what they said was evidence that the Jerusalem scrolls are the oldest known manuscripts of the Old Testament.
The world first learned of the existence of the scrolls when Syrian scholars called them to the attention of the American School of Oriental Research in Jerusalem a year ago.
Discovery of the ancient leather-bound papyrus in a half-closed cave in August 1947, has been described as "the greatest manuscript discovery of modern times."
A first estimate of their age placed them in the first century before Christ.
Their monetary value has been conservatively estimated at more than a million dollars. But their worth to the Christian-Jewish world is incalculable.

Navy Official Chides 'Gadget War' Beliefs

WHITE OAK, MD.—The assistant secretary of the navy for air, John Nicholas Brown, has chided scientists for spreading the idea that wars might be won easily with gadgets and "extraordinary" weapons.
"The ability of a human being to survive the blows of his enemies, in whatever form delivered, is immense," he said in a speech for the dedication of the central unit of a new \$35,000,000 navy ordnance laboratory.
"His capacity not only to survive, but his faculty of continuing to fight, is amazing," Brown continued. "The faculty with which he finds means to counter the most highly developed machines of warfare is discouraging.
"The idea of war easily won by means of extraordinary weapons is an old one and very appealing. It is an extremely dangerous concept to propagate. I fear it may tend to give our people an idea of war very far indeed from that justified by the facts as we know them.
"It must be confessed that much of the misapprehension regarding the nature of war stems from commentaries by men whose knowledge of science vastly exceeds their experience in the awful actualities of combat."

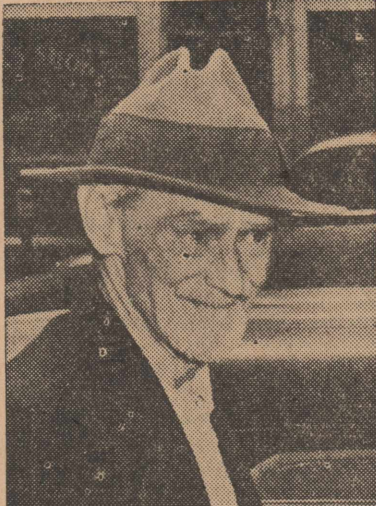

Has Doctors All a "Flutter" Over His Heart



DENVER, COLO.—Ninety pound Walter E. Urwiler, 85, whom veterans administration doctors claim is one of seven persons in medical history who can "flutter" his heart at will, is awaiting trial in Denver on charges of defrauding government hospitals. Urwiler is accused of using his heart fluttering ability for 30 years to gain admittance to government hospitals as a "heart attack" victim case. He "collapsed" recently on an Elmhurst, Ill., street. Wary doctors at a government hospital charged he was the man they wanted for "back board bills".

MIRACLE SURGERY

Doctors End Long Torture

SAN FRANCISCO—An unprecedented operation which restored the ability of a 43-year-old man to swallow has been reported by three University of California surgeons. A gunshot wound caused the affliction of the unnamed patient. He had to take all food and liquid through a tube that by-passed his throat. Any attempt to swallow caused coughing and strangling. He could not appear in public.

After three years of this torture, the man was on the verge of suicide, the surgeons said in a medical publication, *The Annals of Surgery*.

Bullet Cut Nerves
The doctors, Howard C. Naffziger, H. Glenn Bell, and Cooper Davis, found the bullet had cut four important face and head nerves. The nerves could not be restored. The surgeons decided to try to cross-connect some of the healthy muscles of the throat to replace those made useless by nerve degeneration.

Medical books did not show the surgeons all they needed to know about swallowing. Slow-motion X-ray movies of normal swallowing and the patient's attempts to swallow showed for the first time, they said, the mechanism of the procedure.

Before operating on the patient the doctors experimented on three monkeys.

One of the things about the patient was that some of the useless muscles in his neck bulged out when he tried to swallow, obstructing the throat passage. The doctors bound these muscles with a strip of thick, tough sheathing tissue which normally covers the main bundles of blood vessels and nerves in the neck.

The other main difficulty was that the patient's Adams apple would not rise. This is one of the important movements in swallowing.

Surgeons Split Muscle

The surgeons made a lengthwise split in a muscle which runs from the back of the head to the base of the tongue and the chin. This muscle normally retracts the tongue. Part of the muscle was left for the tongue. The other part was tied to the Adam's apple, restoring its ability to rise. The patient was afraid to try his rebuilt throat at first, but

now is swallowing normally, the doctors said. The new operation may help some war wounded.

Filibuster Would Permit Senators to Die Talking

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The ancient and honorable custom of filibustering is based on the proposition that a senator may talk himself to death if he chooses.

American legislators have been taking advantage of the filibuster "right" ever since the nation was born, but now some senators think it's time to put an end to it. Sponsored by Republicans, a proposal to change senate debate rules also have support from some Democrats.

If they have the voice and constitution, senators may now, under certain circumstances, talk as long as they wish. Senators have kept the floor for hours or days and—in relays—for weeks and even months to defeat a proposed law.

They don't talk, necessarily, to persuade opposing senators. They may just talk to make the opposition so weary it will give up out of boredom.

The fabulous Huey Long of Louisiana read the Bible, offered advice on love affairs, told how to fry oysters and make "pot likker," read a biographical sketch of Frederick the Great and quoted Victor Hugo. Long was supporting an amendment to the national industrial recovery act in June, 1935. He talked 15½ hours but lost the debate.

BOMBAY, INDIA.—Four idols were washed ashore on the Bombay beach. They were picked up by Hindu pandits, set under a pipal tree and worshipped.

Three of them were 18 inches in height and the fourth 9 inches. The first was the elephant-headed god, Ganesha, the awarder of all luck; the second the monkey god, Hanuman, who fought under Rama for the recovery of his wife, Sita, from the demon king in Ceylon. Ravana; the third of Nandi, the bull on whom god Shiva rides, and the fourth has not yet been identified.

None could say how they came to be washed ashore, but they are giving headaches to two officials—the curator who wants them for the museum if no one claims them, and the magistrate-collector who must accord permission if the people want to worship them.

Physicians Give Patients As Good Care as They Get

CHICAGO.—Physicians give their patients as good medical care as the doctors give themselves, the Journal of the American medical association asserts.

It said that a survey by Frank G. Dickinson, director of the association's bureau of medical economic research, showed that the average age of American physicians at the time of death was 67.3 years, as compared with 67.5 for the average white male.

Heart disease accounted for 42.2 per cent of the deaths among physicians studied, as against 38.9 per cent of the deaths among white males of comparable ages.

Cancer, second leading cause of death in this country, ranked third among physicians probably because of ability to recognize symptoms early and begin treatment promptly, the Journal said, adding: "Apparently the members of the medical profession cannot give their fellow members longer life than their patients enjoy."

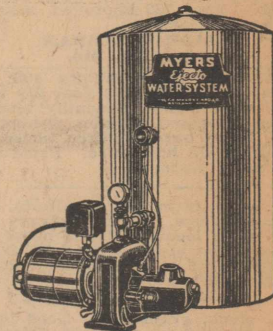

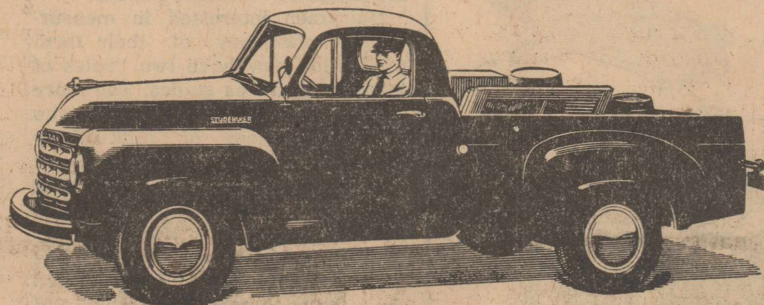
