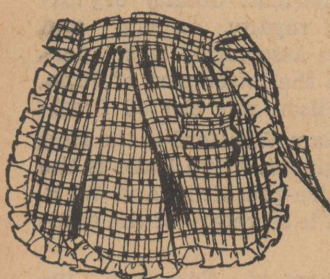

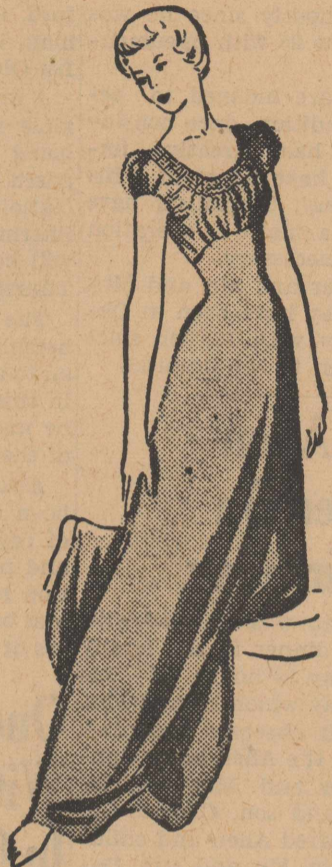

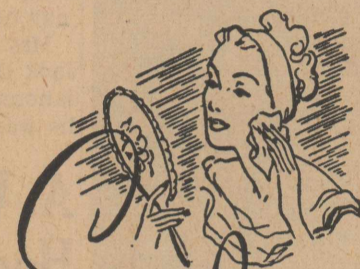


Demonstration Council To Have Sale



Old Playground Of Movieland Great Now Just Dateline

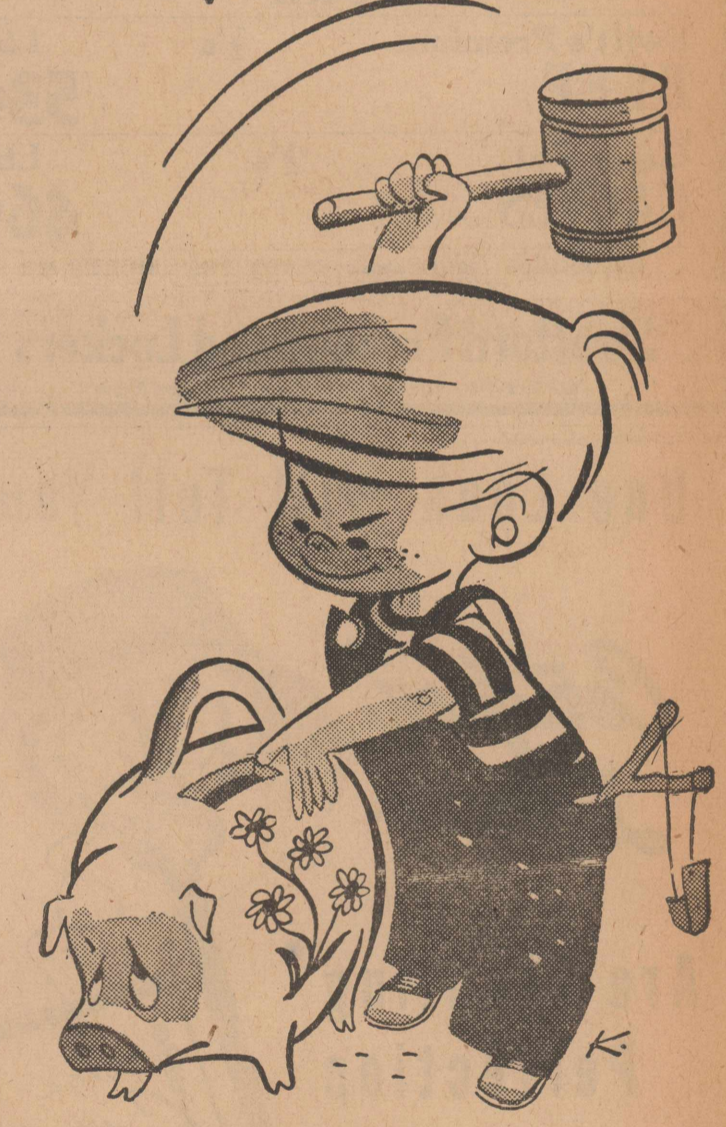

Animals Seem to Have Time-Telling Faculty

LOS ANGELES.—A University of California professor is known it was love. He passed zle, the "biological clock," that mysterious process by which many animals seemingly are able to tell time. Dr. Theodore Jahn, zoology professor at the university at Los Angeles, has set up a laboratory to find out more about this non-mechanical timepiece which has puzzled scientists for many years. For example, the eyes of a crayfish glow at night. When it is placed in a dark room for a period, the eyes will not glow during the day but will light up about the same time every night. The unique timepiece of the crayfish sometimes runs for three months under such conditions and functions without "rewinding." The doctor has studied this phenomenon among insects through means of electroretinograms, which are records of electrical changes.

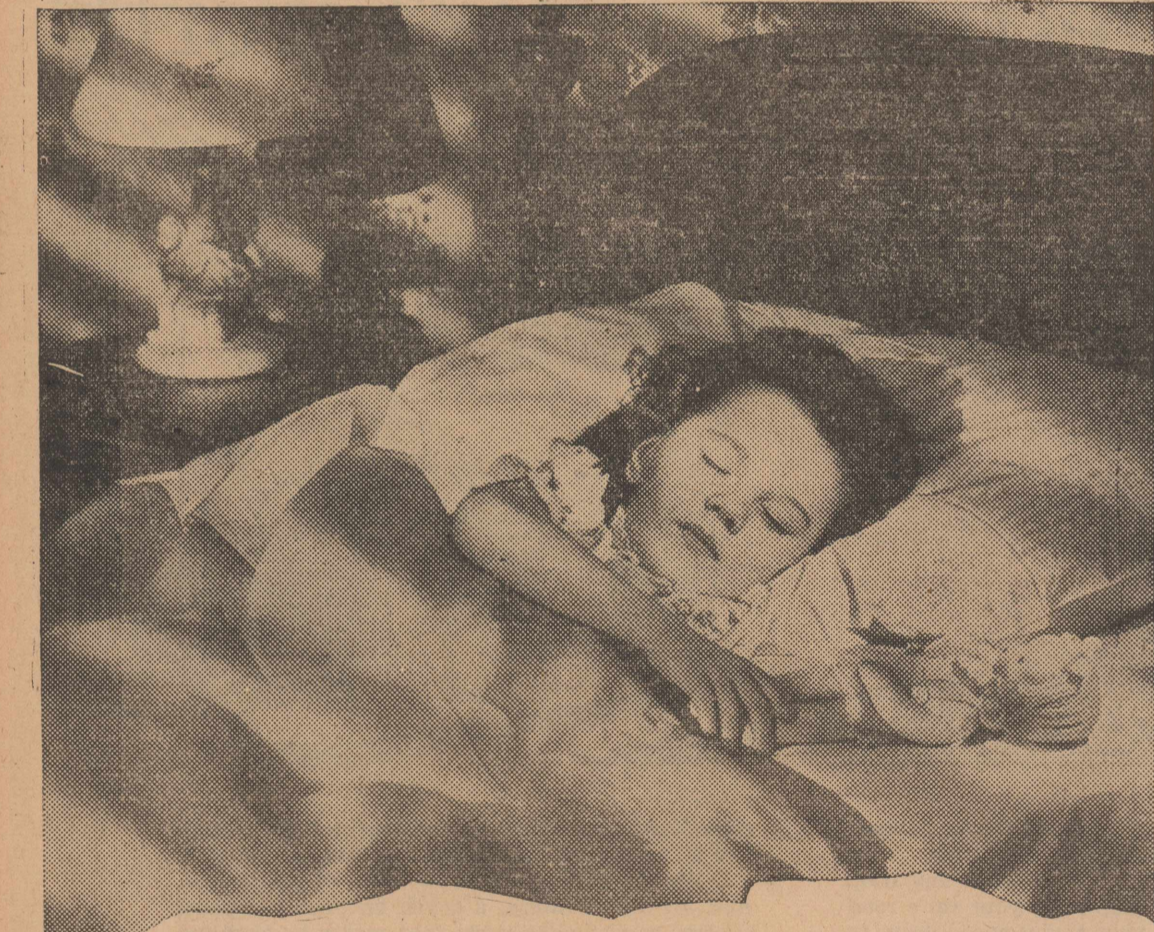

New York Schools Set Up Poolrooms for Children

NEW YORK.—Proficiency in the indoor sport of pool, which some persons used to assume was a mark of a misspent youth, now may be an indication of many fruitful hours passed in the schoolhouse long after classroom studies were over.

The board of education's division of community education, seeking to cope with the increasing problem of juvenile delinquency, has purchased 135 small-size pool tables and installed them in school community centers throughout the city for use in late afternoon and evening recreation periods.

Education officials hope this move will tend to keep boys off the streets and away from the dingy, smoke-filled commercial halls, where the sporty element is said to gather to the detriment of tomorrow's citizenry.

At the board's headquarters, 110 Livingston street, Brooklyn, Mark A. McCloskey, director of the community education division, said that a total of \$5,400 was expended for the billiard tables, which "were bought centrally for economy."

He hastened to explain, however, that the funds were "non-tax money" accumulated from membership dues in the community centers. Thus, he declared, when a youngster, proud of his after-school accomplishments, speaks of "our table" his allusion is not to be taken lightly. This pride in ownership, McCloskey indicated, was an important factor in maintaining the equipment in good condition and in holding the interest of the boys.

London Sniper Has Grudge Against Car Number "68"

LONDON.—A ghostly sniper with a grudge against streetcars numbered 68 made a no man's land of the Waterloo station-Greenwich route.

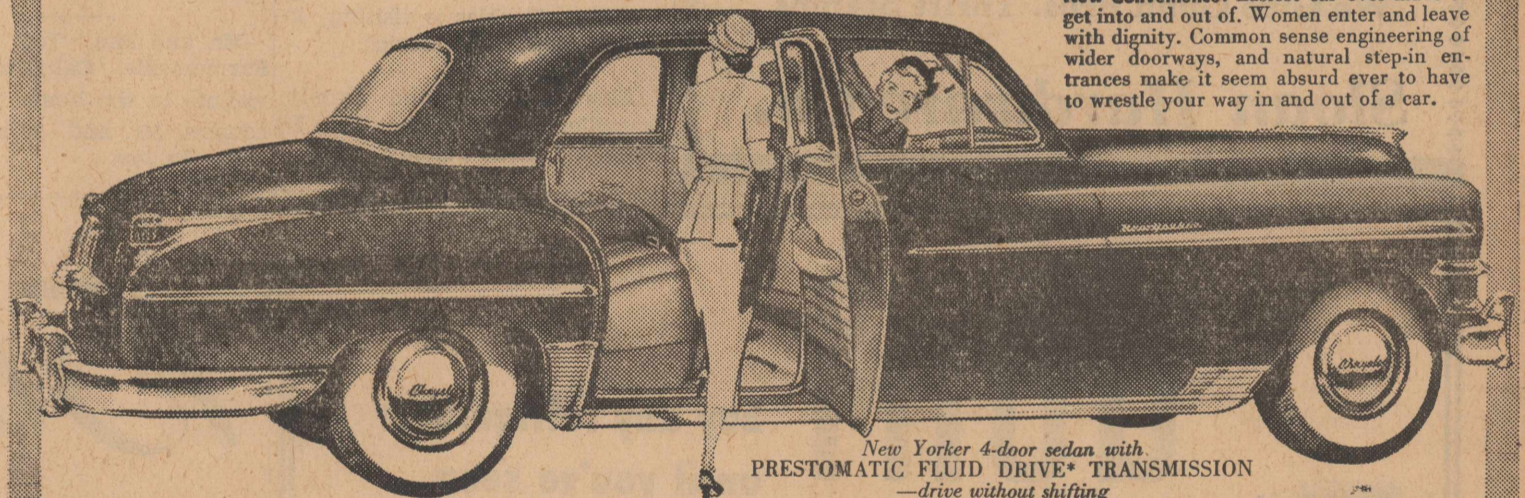

Footwear Fashions and Foot Health

The style picture in shoes is bright as can be. Warm weather sparkle shows up in the illustrated open sling pump of yellow suede kid, with dark leather sole for contrast, comfort and vitality.

Shoes are showing lots of lacings, slivers of straps to fill in the shell of the shoe, bold cut-outs, mesh-like details. Pumps appear in inspired versions, with toplines scalloped, looped, jagged or scooped for extra profile interest. There are lots of flats, soft toes, trick openings at the back, and slim, square tapered toes. The square toe is particularly important in the new shoes with extended soles of natural leather. So is the curved built-up heel, some of which will be in shades contrasting to or complementing the upper.



If anybody cares what's doing in Paris — the one in France, not Texas — three trends are worth noting: the weight of walking shoes has been cut in half by one leading bootier; wedge heels are tabu; and open toes are seen on the snappiest and snobbiest style-setters on the Champs-Elysees. Most American femmes will applaud all three trends. Our own shoes, using the supple strength of leather soles as their foundation, are setting new records in summer lightness. Open shoes are still going strong. And the wedge shoe is strictly an off-the-Avenue style anyway.

Shakespeare was no podiatrist, but he knew the connection between foot health and beauty. In Romeo and Juliet he described the young heroine:

"So light a foot
 Will ne'er wear out the
 everlasting flint."

Beauty is impossible without a graceful walk. Did you know that men unconsciously judge a woman's age by the way she walks? And the average male will tell you nothing makes a woman more unattractive than an uncomfortable looking gait, "over-dressed" feet or shoes that looked as if they were intended for two other people!

Have a podiatrist or competent shoe fitter help you select the right last. Next buy shoes with an eye to fit, materials and purpose. Keep your vanity in check and get shoes long and wide enough to keep from pinching. Insist on the best materials — leather soles underfoot, to give your step a firm but flexible foundation and the benefits of leather's ability to "breathe." Remember what you'll use the shoes for, and you won't end up doing housework on stilt heels, or going

on a long shopping trip in ballet slippers.

Think of your feet and the care you owe them, and you may be like the poet Tennyson's dream girl: "Steps with a tender foot, light as on air
 The lovely, lordly creature floated on."

School surveys show that most foot troubles begin in childhood, through ignorance of the rules of foot hygiene and shoe fitting.

When baby begins to walk, he needs shoes to help him keep his balance, give him the utmost protection, and yet not crowd his toes or cramp foot muscles.

At this stage give the child shoes high enough for ankle support. The counter should be flexible, but snug enough to hold the heel in shape. The uppers should be of the softest leather, giving the toes plenty of room to spread and wiggle. The soles must be of leather thick enough for adequate protection, but extremely flexible to insure free movement. Good baby shoes have roughened surfaces on the leather sole, as an anti-slip precaution.

Don't let the young hopeful wear shoes after his toe has grown to the end of the shoe. Chances are your baby was born with perfect feet. Simple precautions will help to keep them that way.

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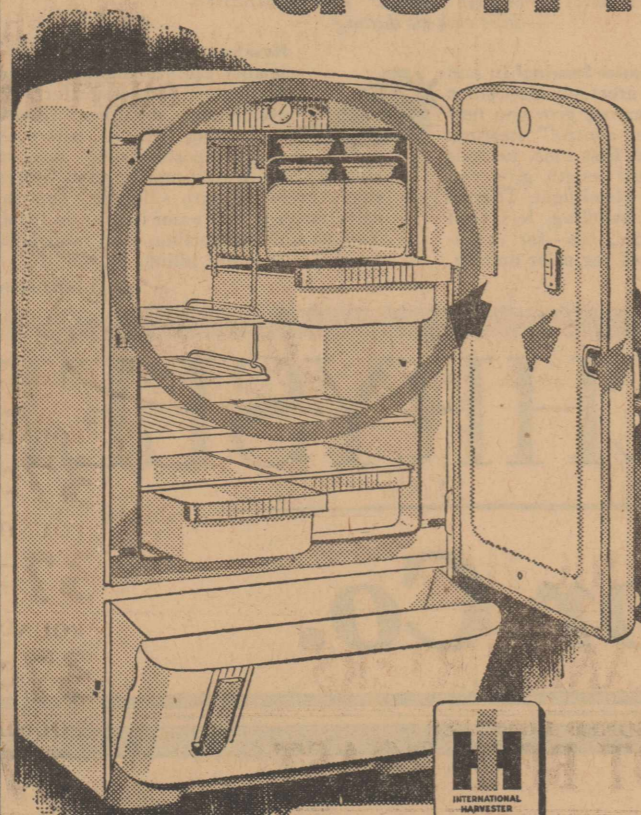

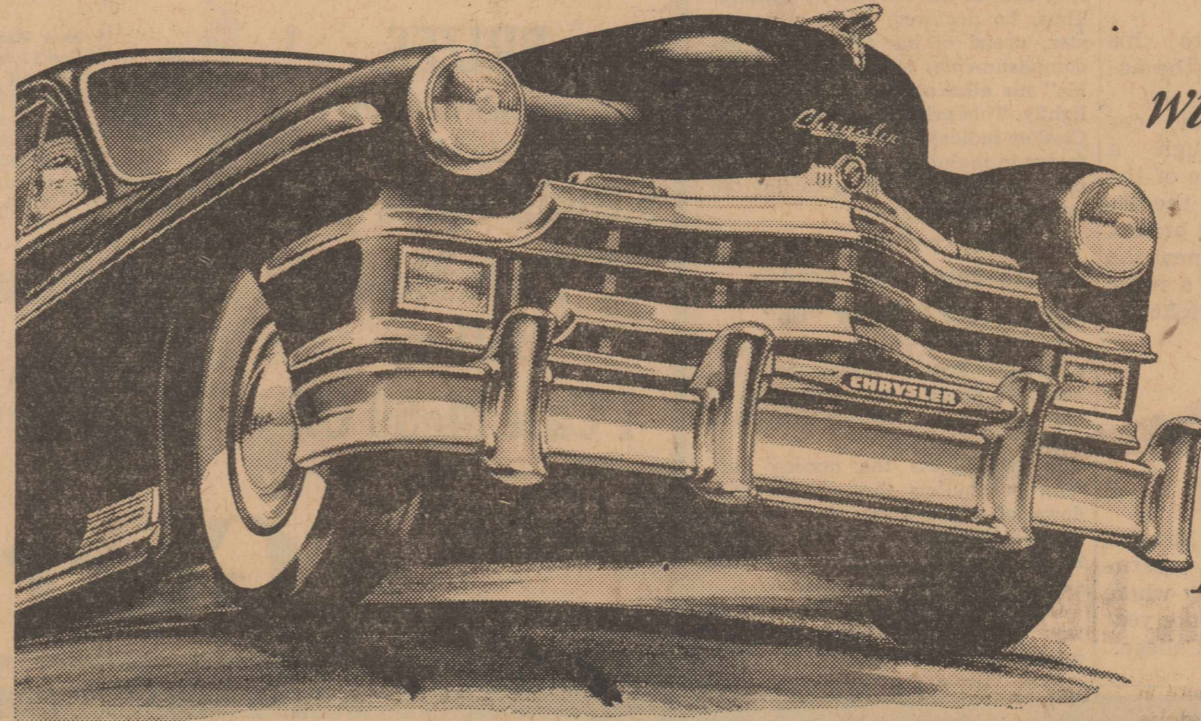

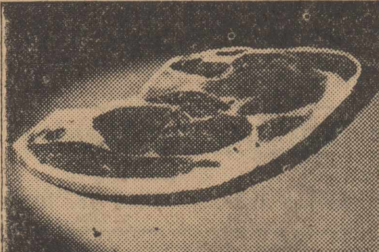

Q. What is the name of this cut of meat? A. This is a wedge-bone sirloin steak. Q. Where does it come from and how is it identified? A. This cut of meat is from the loin end of beef. It is identified by the wedge-shaped bone. This largest sirloin steak also contains a part of the backbone. Q. How is it prepared? A. Sirloin steak is prepared by broiling or panbroiling, depending on the thickness of the steak—thick steaks should be broiled, thin steaks pan-broiled. To broil have the steak cut at least one inch thick. Place the one-inch steaks on the broiler rack two inches from the heat and two-inch steaks three inches from the heat. When one side is nicely browned, season with salt and pepper, turn and finish cooking on the second side. Steaks cut one inch thick require 15 to 20 minutes for rare done, and 20 to 25 minutes for medium done. Two-inch steaks require 30 to 35 minutes for rare done and 40 to 45 minutes for medium done. For panbroiling, place the steak in a frying-pan, cook slowly on one side, then on the other, turning as often as necessary to insure even cooking. Pour off the fat as it accumulates in the pan.

Psychiatry Employed In Choosing Names For New Products

CHICAGO.—Picture a business executive reposing on a couch in a psychiatrist's office.

He may be choosing a new brand name for his products.

Because, says a new study of 637 brand names, the psychological method is one of the best ways of choosing your brand name.

It uses the word association test developed by psychologists to uncover the mind's hidden problems. You simply repeat the associations suggested to you by a word given by the psychologist. Your answer gives him clues to what's wrong with you, if anything.

Now the method has been adapted to discover what, if anything, is wrong with brand names. The study, made by William Archer Jr., of the Robert N. McMurray Co., management experts decided there is much wrong. Here are the findings:

Of the 637 names involved in the study, "only 12 per cent were found to contribute materially to the sales appeal of the product."

"Of this 12 per cent—or 76 names—six names had been selected by what appeared to be chance or sheer good luck. Another 24 names were selected through use of a previously successful company or brand name, and 46 were selected by using most or nearly all the methods' recommended in the study."

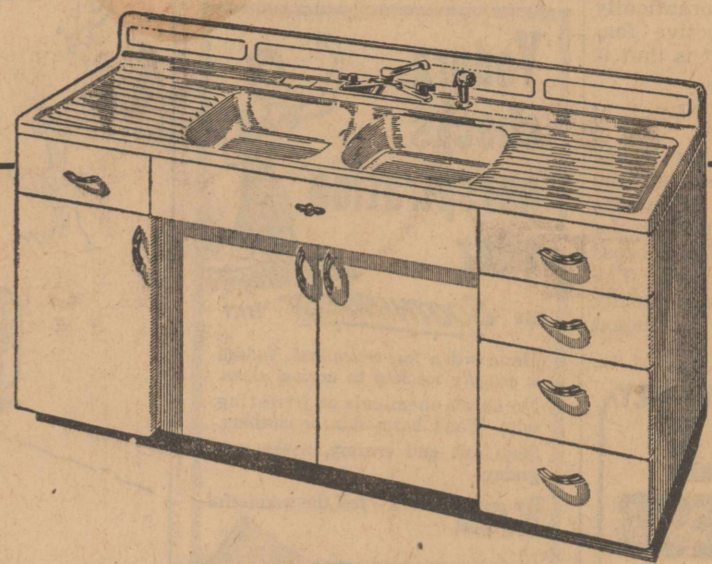
