Photography Course Begins Wednesday

Practical experience in picture making, processing and editing will begin Wednesday for a group of high school and junior college teachers from across the nation who have enrolled in Tech's Photo Journalism Workshop.

Sponsored by a grant from the Newspaper Fund, Inc., a subsidiary of the Wall Street Journal, this will be the first such workshop sponsored by the Fund and also the first of its kind to be held in this area, said W. E. Garets, head of Tech's journalism department.

The program offers two hours of upper division-graduate credit. Ralph Sellmeyer of the Tech journalism staff, will direct the two-week course of instruction which ends July 28.

Paul Swensson, executive director of the Newspaper Fund, will be on campus Friday to confer with staff and students and will be principal speaker at a luncheon in Tech Union.

Along with actual practice in pic-

ture taking, processing and printing, the intensive course will emphasize management of darkrooms for student publications, pictorial reporting, editing and layout.

During the 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily schedule, workshopers will attend lectures, participate in discussions, and complete special picture assignments. Afternoons will be largely devoted to laboratory work and field trips to newspapers, photo

shops and printing establishments. Participants are pre-registered from such distant points as Portland, Ore., Redding, Calif., and Taylors, S. C., Garets noted. Workshopers receive grants covering room, board and tuition, but pay their own transportation costs. They will live in residence halls on campus while here.

Classes and labs will be conducted in the journalism building.

Students Honor Garlin For 47 Years Service

Dr. Raymond E. Garlin, retiring professor of education, received a plaque of appreciation from his 12 students in education 5351 Wednesday.

It was the last time Dr. Garlin met class. He has taught 47 years, 38 of them at Tech. Dr. Garlin has a bachelor of arts, master of arts and a doctors degree from the University of Texas. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa.

He came to Tech in 1927, two years after the college opened. He has watched the enrollment grow from about 1,500 to over 14,000.

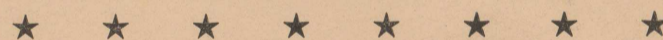
Dr. Garlin was head of the education department from 1943 to 1950.

Wednesday's ceremony was a surprise to Dr. Garlin. He was holding class in the Tech Union, but it was the last day of the semester.

The students in the general education for graduates course joined their professor in coffee and doughnuts. After the refreshments, Dr. Garlin began his lecture, but was interrupted by a student who said that there was other business to attend to.

Dr. Garlin then was given the plaque inscribed, "Dr. Raymond E. Garlin in appreciation of outstanding service to education."

Dr. Garlin, who lives at 2617 22nd St., feels that today's teachers are much better prepared than they were in the past. He says the two most important things in teaching is for the teacher to understand his subject and to understand his student.

Around 4,000 May Register

Enrollment for the second term of the summer session is expected to be between 4,000 and 4,500.

Registration for the first summer term reached a record high of 6,450, according to Floyd D. Boze, registrar.

Second term registration began Monday and will continue today from 8 a.m. to noon and from 1:30 to 5 p.m. Classes will begin 7:20 a.m. Wednesday. Classes will meet for one and one half hours each time and will observe a 5-day schedule, Monday through Friday of each week.

Finals for the second summer term are scheduled Aug. 18-19. Commencement exercises will be conducted Aug. 21 for summer graduates.

Official tabulations for the first summer term showed 5,037 undergraduates and 1,413 enrolled at the graduate level with men outnumbering the women by 3,506 to 2,944.

Also on campus for varying periods of time during the month were approximately 2,000 others, including junior and senior high school students, business people, housewives and professional workers who were attending non-credit music camps, workshops and short courses.

Former Tech Student Added To Mitchell Trio

John Denver, a former Tech student, has recently been selected to replace Chad Mitchell as the third member of the Mitchell Trio.

Mitchell is leaving the trio to try a solo career.

The popular folk-singing group is scheduled to appear on campus Oct. 1 as a Union-sponsored program.

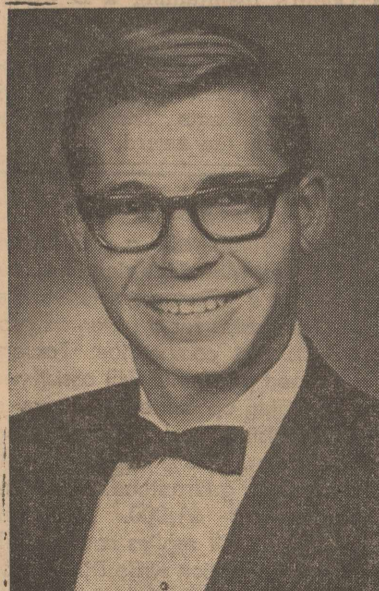
Denver, whose real name is John Deutchendorf, attended Tech for

two and one half years. He was an architecture major and a member of Delta Tau Delta. While at Tech, he started playing the guitar for money. When his performing dates increased, Denver decided to give up studying completely and try his hand at performing. He moved to Los Angeles where he has worked for the past year.

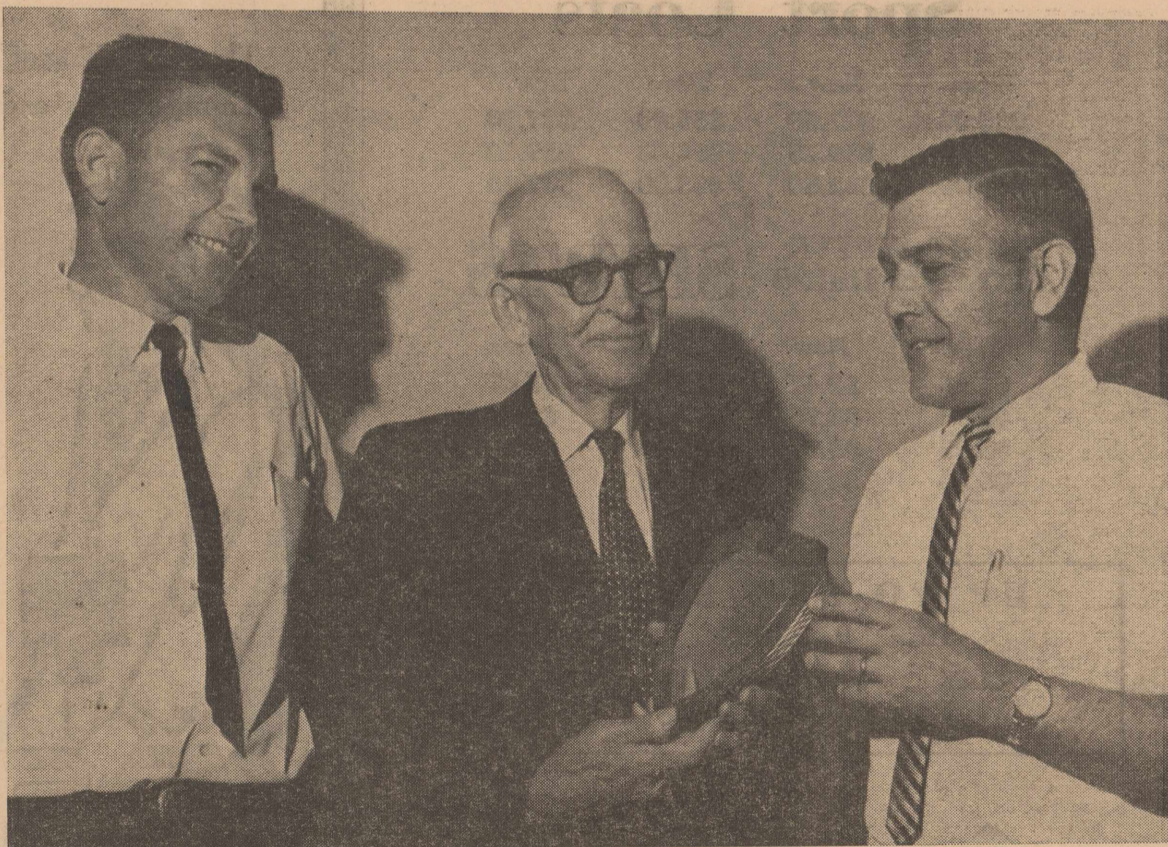
A few weeks ago, Denver was a nightclub singer, performing in and around Phoenix, Ariz. at the "Lumber Mill." Also, during the past 15 or 16 months, he has had several engagements at the "Ledbetters" in Los Angeles. Originally set to perform for two or three weeks, Denver was so favorably received that he returned several times to run up a total of 58 weeks in less than a year and a half.

Denver was selected from over 200 aspirants who were auditioned in all parts of the United States. When the Mitchell Trio knew that Chad was leaving, a nationwide search was undertaken to find a replacement. Mike Kirkwood of the Brothers Four, who had seen Denver perform in California, suggested him to Milt Okum, the arranger and musical director for the Mitchell Trio. A week ago Denver was contacted to audition and hired.

On the agenda are performances of "Julius Caesar" at Canada's renowned Shakespearean Festival, Stratford, Ont., and "The Taming of the Shrew" at the American Shakespeare Festival and Academy at Stratford, Conn.

Highlighting the New York City schedule Aug. 8-13 will be Shakespeare's "Troilus and Cressida" in Central Park plus six outstanding Broadway and off-Broadway performances, including "The Glass Managerie," "Luv," "Judith," and "The Subject Was Roses."

In Kentucky

In Kentucky the group will see the internationally famous production of "The Book of Job" by Orlin and Irene Corey at Pineville, and "Reynard the Fox," a medieval animal fable by the Belgian playwright Arthur Fauquez, a new production of the Coreys, at Hardin.

During stopovers on the 5,000-mile trip, tour members also will visit backstage at famous theaters, see summer stock company productions, visit professional costume and lighting firms, scene studios and theatrical collections in libraries and museums. They will hold group discussions, enroute, of current plays and new developments in the American theater. The tour offers three hours of extension credit.

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Odum Wins Engineering Scholarship

The award was announced jointly by C. F. Bedford, Foundation vice president, and by John R. Bradford, Dean of the School of Engineering.

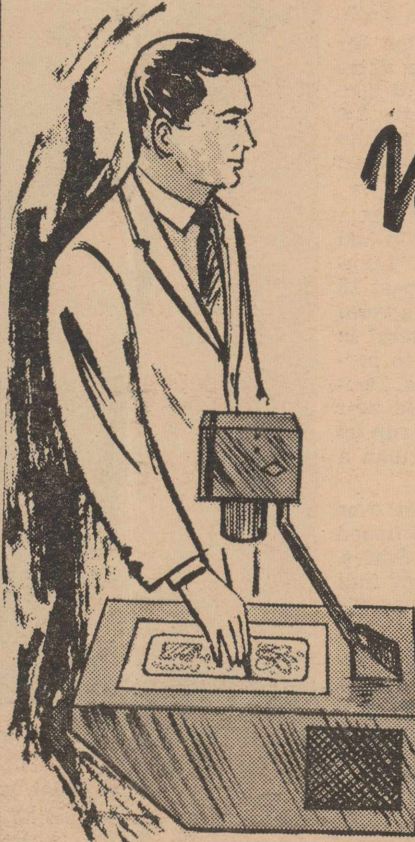
Bedford said Odum will receive a scholarship award of \$700 for the first year, \$800 for the second year, \$900 for the third year and \$1,000 for the senior year.

After the first year, continuance of the award is dependent on Odum's maintaining a B average or better in his college studies.

Odum was selected as the winner by college officials who considered his high school record along with other applicants. The college will administer the award.

Applications are being accepted at radio station KFYO, 914 Ave. J for the Miss Astro, Lubbock contest.

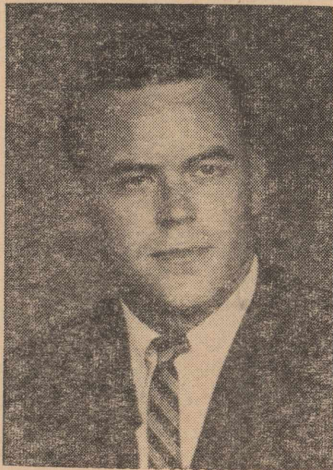

Last year's local winner was Kay Burleson, Tech junior who is also the reigning Miss Lubbock.

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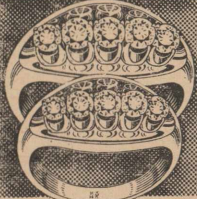
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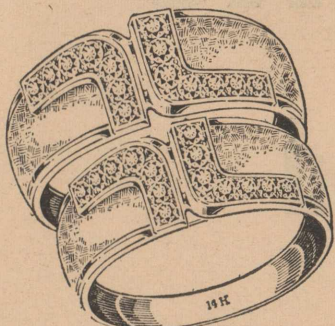
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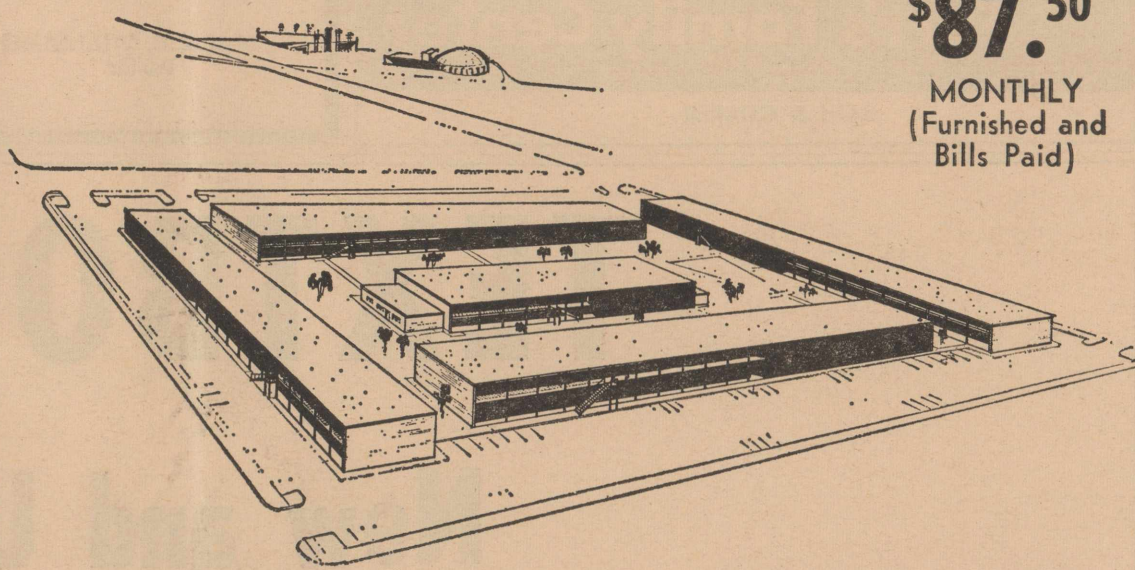
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Workshops Continue During Second Term

Workshops, short courses and clinics of various types continue as Tech begins its second summer term.

The School of Business Administration's accounting department is currently sponsoring its third annual short course on electronic data processing for high school students. The program began Monday and will continue through July 23.

Classes meet from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday in the Bus. Ad. Bldg. The course is voluntary, extracurricular and carries no credit toward graduation. Instruction is under the direction of Mrs. Luta Eaves, assistant professor.

Methods of improving nutritional values in diets of low-income families have been emphasized in Tech's short course for home economists which ends today. The five-day course has been conducted by Dr. Mina Lamb, head of the department of food and nutrition. The short course carries one hour of graduate credit.

Tech's Summer Music Camp for junior high and elementary band students began Monday and will continue through July 23. Band camp is open to any student who will be in a junior high or elementary band next September and also to high school sophomores, said Keith McCarty, director.

The Keyboard division, scheduled July 26 through Aug. 6, will be open to students and teachers of all ages. Sidney Foster of Indiana University will be guest artist-lecturer.

Pre-registration has passed the 385 mark in Tech's eighth annual journalism workshop Aug. 8-13.

Registration will remain open in newspaper and yearbook sections until Aug. 8, although quotas for photography workshops, limited by lab requirements, have already been filled, said Phil Orman, director of student publications.

Miss Zafer Cetinkaya, senior from Istanbul, Turkey, has been named recipient of a \$250 scholarship presented by American Friends of the East, Inc., of Washington, D.C.

Miss Cetinkaya placed second among 132 students nominated by American colleges and universities in the annual awards program honoring outstanding students of the year from Middle Eastern Countries. She was the only woman student listed among the top ten.

The Home Economics major also has been granted a one-semester extension of her 1964-65 international scholarship from the Home Economics Association, which will enable her to obtain her bachelor's degree from Tech in January, 1966.

Miss Cetinkaya, who holds a grade point average of 3.70, is a campus leader as well as a top student. She was secretary-general of Tech's Model United Nations this past spring and was co-chairman of

the annual Women's Day celebration.

She has served as secretary of the Junior Council; librarian of Phi Upsilon Omicron, home economics honorary, and as representative to the Assn. of Women Students from the Tech chapter of the American Home Economics Association.

A graduate of American Academy for Girls in Istanbul, she has done all of her college work at Tech where she enrolled as a freshman in September, 1962. Her parents reside in Istanbul.
