Around 4,000 May Register

Enrollment for the second term of the summer session Ralph Sellmeyer of the Tech journis expected to be between 4,000 and 4,500.

Registration for the first summer term reached a record high of 6,450, according to Floyd D. Boze, registrar.

Second term registration began Monday and will continue today from 8 a.m. to noon and from 1:30 to 5 p.m. on campus Friday to confer with Classes will begin 7:20 a.m. Wednesday. Classes will meet staff and students and will be prinfor one and one half hours each time and will observe a Union. 5-day schedule, Monday through Friday of each week.

Finals for the second summer term are scheduled Aug. 18-19. Commencement exercises will be conducted Aug. 21 for summer graduates.

Official tabulations for the first summer term showed 5,037 undergraduates and 1,413 enrolled at the graduate level with men outnumbering the women by 3,506 to 2,944.

Also on campus for varying periods of time during the month were approximately 2,000 others, including vehicle mishap seven miles north of junior and senior high school students, business people, Orogrande, N.M. housewives and professional workers who were attending non-credit music camps, workshops and short courses.



Johnnie D. Odum, a senior at Liberty High School in Liberty, has been named the 1965-66 winner of the Pan American Petroleum Foundation honors scholarship in petroleum engineering at Tech.



Workshops Continue During Second Term

Workshops, short courses and clinics of various types continue as Tech begins its second summer term.

The School of Business Administration's accounting department is currently sponsoring its third annual short course on electronic data processing for high school students. The program began Monday and will continue through July 23.

Classes meet from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday in the Bus. Ad. Bldg. The course is voluntary, extracurricular and carries no credit toward graduation. Instruction is under the direction of Mrs. Luta Eaves, assistant professor.

Methods of improving nutritional values in diets of low-income families have been emphasized in Tech's short course for home economists which ends today. The five-day course has been conducted by Dr. Mina Lamb, head of the department of food and nutrition. The short course carries one hour of graduate credit.

Tech's Summer Music Camp for junior high and elementary band students began Monday and will continue through July 23. Band camp is open to any student who will be in a junior high or elementary band next September and also to high school sophomores, said Keith Mc-
