Dykes was a 17-year-old In 2001, Texas Governor sophomore at Muleshoe High

School in 1944 when he dropped out to volunteer for service in the Navy.

War veteran to receive high school diploma

"I felt like my country was more important than school. I wanted adventure and to serve my country," Dykes said. "You know, patriotism was very high Remembering the veterans

during WWII."

Dykes was stationed in the South Pacific during World War II on the USS Bosque APA 135. This ship was a part of the invasion of Okinawa and it was in Tokyo Bay on September 2, 1945, the day the Japanese signed surrender papers. This day was known as "VJ Day" (Victory over the Japanese).

Dykes was honorably discharged in 1946 after the war had ended. He was accepted into Eastern New Mexico University (ENMU) in Portales without a high school diploma.

"I convinced them I could do it," he said. Even though he was allowed to attend college, he said, "I have a lot of fond memories of Muleshoe and I just want to have that diploma from there. It's an honor."

After attending college at ENMU for one year, Dykes transferred to Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos to enroll in their vocational agriculture program.

After receiving a bachelor of science degree in vocational agriculture, Dykes taught high school students for fifteen years in various schools across the state of Texas.

In 1949, Dykes married Delphine Johnson and they had three children, Greg Dykes of Angelton, Texas, and Melinda

Three Mules were recently named to the District 2-3A honor teams. Bryan King was a first team selection and Juan Nuñez and Jarad Flores were named to the second team.

King was chosen for his prowess as an outfielder and his tenacity with the bat. King led the Mules with a .974 fielding percentage. He hit three home runs, scored 11 times and collected 15 RBI's during district games for a .493 batting

Nuñez made the second team as a fielder with an .800 fielding percentage. His performance at the plate greatly improved as the season progressed. Nuñez was hitting less than .200 during the early part of the season but improved to a .403 batting average during district. He also scored six runs and knocked in 12 more for the Mules.

Flores was chosen as a second team pitcher by pitching 25 innings and only giving up 13 earned runs for a 3.12 earned run average. He also had a .758 fielding percentage while hitting .403,

scoring 12 runs and driving in 13 others.

"I was very happy for our very young team," said Muleshoe baseball coach Gilbert Ramirez. "We had no seniors this year, were learning a new system and still tied for third place in the district. To have three players chosen to the all-district teams is like icing on the cake."

"With all of our team returning next year we should be a contender for the district title and should have six or seven






# KENW-TV Auction starts June 2


# Scholarships available for college ag students



I'm kidding. Well, I'm kidding at least a little. Getting my sermon that week wasn't quite that simple. I often wish it was. In this age of marvelous technology, wouldn't it

be a wonderful thing, should your preacher get in a bit of a sermonizing tight spot on Friday, if he could just plug in his computer modem, dial up 9-1-1 or some higher emergency code for some divine extension, and the phone line would sizzle and the computer would whiz and whir, and there, downloaded from on high right to his sermon file would be a made-to-ordermessage sent straight from Heaven?! (If anybody didn't like that sermon, they'd better be quiet about it!)

But, in a bind, snail mail is okay, too. And that's how my sermon came on that particular Saturday.

I went to the Post Office, pulled the mail out of the box, and there was a church bulletin from Little Rock, Arkansas,

complete with the column their preacher, John Gipson, had written that week, and it was just the sermon seed I needed.

John wrote about a man named Heinrich Heine. Heine was standing with a friend in front of Amiens, the great cathedral in northern France. Absolutely stunned by its magnificence, the friend asked Heine, basically, "Why can't people build such magnificent works to the glory of God today?"

Heinrich replied, "Cher ami, it's really very simple. In those days people had convictions; we moderns have opinions, and it takes more than opinion to build a Gothic cathedral."

Do you hear what he's saying?

No one ever built a cathedral because he thought it might be sort of a nice thing to do if he ever got the time, and it didn't rain, and he didn't have to work too hard, and it didn't cost too much.

No one ever built a strong and free nation just because he thought freedom was a nice concept as long as nobody had to pay much of a price for it.


Nobody ever built a strong church just because he thought it might be nice to show up on Easter and Christmas and occasionally thump the collection plate when it passed by.






