Commissioners agree to consolidate voting boxes By MARSHALL STINNETT

Journal writer

The Bailey County Commissioners Court awarded a \$42,910 contract to D & L Masonry of Lubbock for brick tuckpointing and painting on the outside of the courthouse. The work should take about 100 days.

In other business, the Court agreed to consolidate some voting boxes in Precinct 4 for the special election on May 3 and the possible runoff election. They agreed to consolidate the Needmore box with the City Hall box and to consolidate the Nazarene Church box with the courthouse box.

The Court also approved permanently moving the Needmore box to the City Hall location.

Judge Marilyn Cox told the Court that the roof of the Needmore Community Building was falling in and there was no heat in the building.

The used motor-grader brought \$18,900. The low bidder was Bob McAfoos of Clovis. The first time the grader was advertised for sale there were no bids.

Debbie Shurbet of Muleshoe was appointed by the Court to the Bailey County Child Welfare Board.

Russell Lepard was granted an easement by the Court to put a water line under county road 173.

The Court approved paying \$212,499.29 in bills for the month of January

Group works to improve rail crossing safety

How to improve the safety of the railroad crossing at the entrance of Muleshoe Livestock Auction was the subject of discussion during Monday's regular meeting of the Commissioners Court.

Included in the meeting were representatives of the Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railroad, the Myers family, who own the auction company, the Court and members of the late Darrell Davis family.

Davis was killed at the crossing during the Saturday livestock sale two years ago. His family has filed a lawsuit against the railroad claiming Davis was killed as a result of "negligent acts and omissions" of the railroad, its agents or employees on November 11, 2002.

The case was settled just before the meeting.

County Judge Marilyn Cox settled one long-standing issue concerning if the crossing is public or private. She produced 1956 minutes of the Commissioners Court showing the Court had authorized the crossing.



Improvements for this crossing were discussed during the Commissioners meeting Monday. It was decided to ask the Texas Department of Transportation to place signals and cross guards at the crossing.

The Myers have been providing a flag man to help watch for trains on Saturday, which is sale day, but all agreed that more needed to be done.

Veterans eligible to apply for Cold War certificate

The Bailey County Veterans Service Officer, Dawn Merriott announces that veterans who served in the military anytime during the Cold War era which is defined as the period of service from September 2, 1945 to December 26, 1991 and received an honorable discharge are eligible to apply for a "Cold War Recognition Certificate."

Veterans must provide acceptable supporting documents for their proof of service such as any official government or military document with the recipient's name, social security number or military service number or foreign service number and dates of service.

The Cold War Certificate Program is in accordance with

Section 1084 of the fiscal year 1998 National Defense Authorization Act. The Secretary of Defense has approved awarding Cold War Recognition Certificates. Due to the remarkable success of this program, turn around time for mailing certificates will be a minimum of six

There is no charge for a Cold

War Recognition Certificate and please note that no medalhas been authorized or issued for Cold War recognition. National Guard and Reservists are eligible.

The 11th annual New Mexico Ag Expo, sponsored by Plateau Wireless and New Mexico Bank and Trust, Feb. 25-26, will host the Working Ranch Horse Competition of the season on Wed., Feb. 26, beginning at 11 a.m. (Central time) in the Special Events Arena at the Roosevelt County Fairgrounds.

This is the fifth Ranch Horse Association of America (RHAA) sanctioned competition for the Ag Expo. Billy Frank Good, chairman of the Working Ranch Horse Committee, is expecting to have a full show.

"RHAA sanctioning al-

lows those entered in this contest that qualify to compete in the RHAA finals in Abilene, Texas," said

There will be three classes in the competition, a Junior Class, Senior Class and a cowboy class. According to Good, the cowboy class is for competitors who are not members of the Ranch Horse Association of America and has not earned more than \$500 in competition.

The Junior and Senior classes are for RHAA members only. However, RHAA rules apply to all classes of competition.

"A horse less than five years old, as of the competition date, is in the Junior Division," said Good. "Senior Division horses are five years old and older," he added. "Payback will be made according to RHAA

The riders may be male or female, recommended 18 years old and above. Entry fee is \$75 per horse for the Juniro and Senior classes and \$75 per horse for the Cowboy class, plus a one-time Ranch Horse permit. Riders may enter more than one horse.

Horses must meet certain qualification to enter the competition. They may be gelding, mare or stallion. The owner must have owned the horse for one

year prior to the competition for the Junior and Senior classes. There is no length of time ownership requirements for the Cowboy class.

Horses must have a negative Coggins test conducted in the last 12 months prior to the competition, along with current health papers or passports. The horse may be any breed registered or nonregistered. Good said winner who rack up a specific amount of points, will advance to the national finals in Abilene, Texas.

ETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor,

I don't know where to begin...so I will start by recounting events and thoughts that go through my mind daily.

I was scheduled to work in the area for the week of February 3, and a friend and I had planned to spend the evening with my parents. My friend and I had turned in Monday night when I heard the blood curdling screams of "CALL 911!!!" I ran to find my 17year-old brother straddling my dad, giving him chest compressions while my mother was on her knees giving him breaths. I called 911 and frantically asked for help. I asked for the

Lazbuddie ambulance because "they will know where to go." I eventually had both the 911 operator in Muleshoe and Friona on the line.

The operators continued to ask questions and for directions. I fumbled with the directions... thinking, "this is not necessary, the Lazbuddie ambulance will

However, the operators had no intention of sending the Lazbuddie ambulance. My brother continued to give compressions. He could tell I was getting nowhere and yelled, "CALL MRS. WEIR!"

My friend looked up the number and used her cell

phone to call. My phone call with her lasted only a few seconds. Lazbuddie EMS volunteers arrived in a matter of minutes.

"Why didn't I call her first?" We are trained to call 911. Why couldn't 911 help us? I am sure the answer is political or monetary...which seems to contradict the nature of 911 emergency services. Could a life have been saved? Only God knows: Could the trauma and pain for my family have been reduced? There is no doubt!

I know this letter can't change things for my family but I pray that it can change things for the people of the Lazbuddie

community that need emergency services in the fu-

The Lazbuddie community is fortunate to have a trained and capable volunteer EMS and fire department. I can only hope that in the future, the 911 system will acknowledge this.

If the 911 system continues to respond in this way to emergencies in the Lazbuddie area, you may want to consider training your children and yourself to call another number.







Board members present at the old Santa Fe Depot on this night were Dan Throckmorton, Betty Kirby, Sammie Simpson, Ladene Spears, Dustin LaVonne Wilhite, McKillip, Lonnie Adrian, Jim Allison, Vivian White, Jean Allison, Jenne McVicker, Gary Boyles, Gene Rogers, Student-Community Action Club (SCAC) representatives Stacy Mata, Elida Diaz, Landon Sheets, Jodi Hawkins, and Center Hostess Dolores Harvey.

Dan Throckmorton, president, conducted the business meeting and told the members that the foundation for the old ranch house has been poured and as soon as the mover has the house prepared, it will be moved.

Members expressed the desire to go to south Bailey County and observe this historic moment. Magann Rennels of Channel 6 has also asked to go out to film this move.


SCAC representatives said that the club is planning a Valentine's dance to raise funds for the Heritage Center. All money raised




