

Boll weevil program assessment rates set

The Texas Department of Agriculture has established the 2003 assessment rate, due date and discount date for the Northwest Plains Zone of the boll weevil eradication program.

The assessment for 2003 in the NWP is \$5 per dryland acre and \$12 per irrigated land acre.

Growers with failed acres are eligible to receive a credit on those acres completely destroyed prior to the final certification date. Qualifying failed acres must remain free of all hostable cotton until a killing freeze to receive the credit.

Assessment notices will be mailed by August 21, and payment is due September 25. Growers who pay by September 10 are eligible to receive a twopercent discount on their assessment.

cessful scramble, these five Muleshoe FFA students will receive a \$1,000 calf purchase certificate donated by generous donors. The certificate is to be used for the purchase of a registered beef heifer.

This is the beginning of a yearlong project of grooming, feeding and caring for the heifer. Supervised by Sid Morris, agricultural science teacher, each winner must keep accurate and detailed

records of the animal's progress, submitting records to both the Houston Livestock Show and RodeoTM and the donor to chronicle the heifer's development.

In 2004, each winner will return with his animal to the Houston Livestock ShowTM in Reliant Center of a special competition and a \$250 bonus from his donor.



Tolerance is cowardly. Tolerance is putrid and pathetic.

Tolerance is so insipid as to be evil even though it is too blind to recognize evil when it sees it.

Tolerance is, as a virtue, piti-

fully weak and, as a king, absolutely disgusting.

As you may be able to tell, I have precious little use at all for tolerance and am convinced that not only is it not a blessing, it is a curse.

So there.

What? You want explanation? Okay. I'll try.

The main reason I think tolerance is unworthy to reign in this or any other society as "the highest virtue" is that to practice this pseudo-virtue, all you have to do, or be, or believe is, well, nothing.

Nothing at all.

What the true God, Jehovah, not the false god we bow down to and call Tolerance, demands in the place of tolerance is genuine love, the kind of love that loves unconditionally, strongly, actively.

Tolerance is weak-willed and passive, but love is not. Tolerance is content to simply refrain from actively hurting those around it and leave them alone, sometimes very alone. But love genuinely, actively, desires and works for the highest good of those it loves.

Some life-styles are so filled with pain that they should be abhorred, but nonetheless the people who practice them are always to be loved."



Protect your rights! "Render" your taxable property by April 15th.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year. The rendition form is available at your local appraisal district office...or you may draft a similar form.

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income—such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

Are there any advantages to you? The advantages of filing a rendition are:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district believes the value is higher, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 2001. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2002.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing 2003 renditions is April 15. Call your appraisal district for the last date the rendition may be postmarked, if mailing. You can get an extra 15 days if you ask for it in writing by the April 15 deadline.
