NEW CANAAN, CONN.—Here's a house designed to bring the outdoors indoors. It sits on the edge of a grassy plateau overlooking the gently rolling hills of Connecticut and was designed by Philip C. Johnson, Director, Dept. of Architecture, Museum of Modern Art. The four walls are polished Pittsburgh plate glass supported by thin steel beams, the floor is polished brick, it has an accoustical ceiling and is warmed by radiant heating. As you're used to thinking of it, this house is not a complete dwelling, just a single unit of an entire living space. Other units are a large lawn or "floor", a contrasting brick guest house and a display of sculpture outside. The entire tree-bordered grass-covered piece of ground binds them together. Also, it's not a house in the conventional manner, but rather a single large room. Except for the bathroom it has no inner partitions. The bathroom and fireplace are back-to-back in a large floor-matching brick cylinder. Furniture is positioned to create the illusion of different parts of the house. For privacy, and to keep the sun's rays out, pandanus drape-like cloth hung from metal tracks in the ceiling can be moved to par-tially or completely cover the walls.

Seek More Data **Right** now several Bible students and amateur scientists are seeking more explicit information. These men arrived in Turkey and announced they were heading for the frigid Ararat summits despite the frowns of the Soviet neighbors. The Ararat peaks, known as "Great" and "Little," are far in an eastern corner of Turkey where Iran and Soviet Armenia come together. The Russians fear that the explorers merely want to take a peek over the iron curtain.

"It is quite enough to look at a map to understand the real meaning of the biblical amusements of these Anglo-American imperialists," the Moscow newspaper Pravda asserted recently. "The true purposes of such an expedition are as far from archeology as Egerton Sykes is from Great Grandfather Noah.

Turks Unimpressed

Sykes, a leader of the present expedition, is a white-haired, rough and ready amateur of the sciences. He was a British diplomat courier during the war and was caught in the German invasion of Poland. After the war he looked for the fabled lost continent of Atlantis. He believes that the flood which Noah survived may have been part of "a vast cosmic disaster" that brought death to the lost continent. He is the more convinced because he has found some 600 flood legends in the lores of many nations.

A year ago the search for Noah's ark was spurred by new tales from the Ararat hills. A farmer told his neighbors that he had seen a ship's prow protruding from a canyon of ice and snow. Because of the unusually warm summer of 1948, he explained, there was a greater melting than at any other time in memory, and therefore the strange object was partly revealed. Other peasants climbed the mountain and saw the prow, it was said, but none of them had cameras to record the sight. Then the snows came and buried the ship again. The Ararat summit is snow covered the year around, and is only accessible during a few weeks of August and September.

May Day Disappoints Communists; **New York Students Stage Riots; Gambler Admits Making \$100,000**

MAY DAY:

Disappointing

Outside Russia, May Day proved a great disappointment to the Communists.

In Berlin, for instance, where the Reds had hoped for strife, a half million people, drawn from both halves of the divided city, roared defiance to the Soviet Union and German communism and pledged allegiance to freedom.

At least 500,000 staged a spectacular demonstration in the British zone, dwarfing the well-organized parade only a few blocks away. The Reds claimed that 800,000 participated, but east-sector police on the spot volunteered that the crowd was no more than 250,000.

And, although the meetings were next door to each other, there was no outstanding violence. A flurry of stone-throwing and a few fist fights was the extent of battle.

Of the speakers, aging Mayor Ernest Reuter of Berlin was the most popular. The crowd applauded and cheered when he said, "We Berliners are not afraid of anything.

In New York, the annual May Day parade was held to the tune of jeers from spectators and a few fist fights. About 13,000 persons attended the rally, the smallest number in years.

Also on the home front, the little town of Mosinee, Wis., experimented with communism for the day and a strong-armed "guerrilla" band ground 2,000 residents under the heel of a mock Communist boot

The mayor was forced to surrender the town, the police chief was executed, a consentration camp was filled with hymn singers, churches were closed and food rationed. The residents of the little town felt it was well worth while.

As a result of the narrow escape, English political observers said they expected Prime Minister Attlee to enforce even stronger discipline on attendance of Labor members of the house.

Observers said that the vote also gave a true picture as to just how narrow the balance of power in the British government has become.

BELGIUM: Crisis Again

For the third time within a year the Belgians will vote on the question of the exiled monarch's future. The new election was ordered after the collapse of a final effort to constitute a new coalition government of social christians and liberals for the recall of King Leopold III.

Observers predicted that the next election would be as indecisive as the recent referendum.

Library of Congress Bans Further Literature Awards

WASHINGTON. - Congress has moved to avoid disputes such as that over the Ezra Pound poetry prize by ordering the Library of Congress not to hand out any more literary awards. Chairman Theodore Green

(D., R.I.) who announced the decree, said his joint senate-house library committee would not investigate the Pound award, as had been demanded by a group of house members, but added that there would be no more such awards. The now insane Pound, who is

Crippled Farmer Defrauded By Carnival Soothsayer


GREEN BAY, WIS .- The stories of persons fleeced of savings while on fruitless search for treasure, or to escape witchlike curses, continued to increase.
