



Military Pet Cemetery WASHINGTON - Visitors to Arlington National cemetery and its tomb of the Unknown Soldier know, if they listened to their guide, that not far away is a small burial plot for pets-the friends of military men and mascots of whole battalions.

It was started back in World War I when in 1918 a nondescript dog whose name has now been forgotten died. The men in the Third Cavalry buried him in a secluded part of Fort Myer, which adjoins the national cemetery.

The pooch had attached himself to the unit on a training march through Virginia. A sergeant looked out for him. Oldtimers at the fort recall that at command he would stand quietly beside his master's horse on

the parade ground.

There are about 100 pets dogs, cats, an alligator, a monkey, a rooster-buried in the plot now. At least a fourth of them lie beneath markers expressing the affection of their

Among the dogs are Smokie the "dear beloved pet" of the Fort Myer fire department, and Sgt. Yardbird, onetime mascot of Battery C, 55th Field Artillery.

In one corner is a tiny grave whose marker proclaims that Peepsie was especially valued by Col. and Mrs. Martin du Fresne now stationed at Fort Belvoir, Va.





### Colors

Now the Nose Knows

PHILADELPHIA.-Two Yale university scientists proved to a distinguished gathering that the lowly cockroach can smell colors, and can smell black in particular. Maybe, they think humans can, too.

Using several large roaches, a cage, and aluminum checkerboard, and some lampblack, Dr. Walter Miles and Lloyd Beck demonstrated the theory that colors affect the sense of smell through sudden heat loss in the smell organs.

The checkerboard was laid out in alternate squares of unpainted aluminum and lampblack, which had no smell, and the roaches were placed on the floor of the cage, half an inch above the checkerboard. The cage was especially equipped to conduct

The lights were turned out. and when the test was over the roaches were directly over the black heat-absorbing squares. The scientists explained that the roaches were drawn over the black squares because of heat flowing from the smell organs to the lampblack.

The aluminum, they said, threw back heat, and caused no heat loss to the sense of smell of the roaches. Because of noseheat loss, Miles said, they smelled the black squares.

The experiment was performed at a meeting of the American Philosophical society.

### Two U. S. Mints Coin 15 Million Dollars For China Nationals

DENVER, COL .- The Denver and Philadelphia mints have been ordered to coin 15 million dollars worth of Sun Yat-sen dollars for the Chinese nationalists, Mrs. Nellie Tayloe Ross, director of the United States mint, has revealed.

News of the emergency coinage for the Nationalists was revealed when some employees of the Denver mint were called back from their annual three-weeks vacation. Moses . E. Smith, superintendent of the Denver mint, at first refused to divulge the nature of the work for which the men were called back, because of what he called "strict secrecy imposed by Wash-

Mrs. Ross disclosed in a telephone interview, however, that the coinage was for the Nationalists. She said silver for the coins was being supplied by the Chinese government. Mr. Smith said the silver involved had been released by a transfer order from the treasury. About three million dollars worth of the coins are being made in Denver, he said.

### **Long-Armed Squid Becomes** More Popular on Menus

MONTEREY, CALIF.-To most people it's just a wriggly horror, but the long-armed squid is landing on more and more domestic dining

The jet-propelled relative to the lowly clam long has been caught commercially here for use as bait and for sale as food to foreign and local markets. Recently, though, dealers report nation-wide sales have increased.

One possible reason for the increased use is the cheapness, about 15 cents a pound.

Most of the squid caught here are small, but once in a while fishermen find a giant in their nets. One squid measured more than 11 feet from tip of tentacle to tip of

The squid, frequently confused with the octopus, has a narrow body, eight arms and two long tentacles. The two tentacles, equipped with suction discs to lock them together and studded with swiveled hooks, are used to seize passing fish for food.

The arms take the food from the tentacles, draw it up under the body and there the squid tears the food apart with its parrot-like beak.

It propels itself by drawing water in through openings back of its head, then expelling the water through a small tube. The tube may be pointed in different directions

controlling the direction of travel. For eating, the squid may be pre pared in a variety of ways. The tentacles, arms and body mantle may be fried or stuffed or broiled. It also is boiled sometimes for use in salads.

A clown rolled Carlson over and over in a patch of deep sawdust, extinguishing the flames, as the crowd applauded. Hospital attendants said today the youth is recovering rapidly.

### Great Care, Skill, Needed In Producing Maple Syrup

Maple syrup operations in Mame are generally classified as an agricultural sideline, but profits in good years have often erased the financial frowns from many a syrup

Producing high quality syrup is an exacting art, requiring painstaking care on the part of the operator during the evaporating stage to see that the liquid is drawn off at the "exact" moment to bring maximum returns. In addition, a great deal of time and effort must be employed, for it normally takes between forty and fifty gallons of sap to make one gallon of syrup.

Although in the last two years maple syrup production in Maine has been curtailed by unfavorable weather conditions, normally the state's syrup production will reach 62,000 gallons with maple sugar adding another 15,400 pounds to the crop total.

An interesting phase of the Maine maple syrup picture is that approximately half of the state's production of syrup and sugar is processed and sold outside the state by a group of French Canadians operating near the boundary line in Piscataquis, Somerset and Arostook counties.

For many years, these Canadians living near these boundary points have leased maple trees on wild lands owned by lumber companies and there manufactured syrup and sugar which is then auctioned off to out-of-state maple product concerns for resale.

Experts in maple product operations have declared that maple syrup tends to be stronger in flavor the further north that it is produced with the result that the Maine syrup has a distinctive flavor that satisfies the most demanding taste.

It is expected that Grade A syrup will bring this year between \$5.50 and \$6.00 a gallon to Maine producers.

### Cats on Backyard Fence **Howl for Definite Reason**

Too many people have a biasedand unfriendly-opinion of cats simply because they don't understand them, an anti-cruelty official

declares.
Dr. W. A. Young, managing director of The Anti-Cruelty society of Chicago and an official of the American Veterinary Medical association, told a recent Ohio conference of veterinarians that people who do not own and like cats, and even many people who do own them, lack proper appreciation of the feline temperament.

Cats nearly always have definite personal reasons for what they do, Dr. Young said, but the trouble is that not enough people understand these reasons.

To clarify "traits of the feline temperament which warrant better public understanding," Dr. Young cited these points: -Most of the caterwauling on

### **Professor Wins Damage Suit** For 5 Million From Uncle Sam WASHINGTON.-Louis H. Crook.

Catholic university professor, won a five million dollar patent suit against the government. The court of claims unanimously

upheld his claim to the invention of an ignition shielding system used by the government during the war to prevent electrical interference with radios in planes, automobiles, tanks and other vehicles. Crook, 61, dean of the school of

aeronautics at Catholic university, owns 25 per cent of the patent which expired in 1944. The rest belongs to Herman Jakobsson and Samuel B. Pack, deceased lawyers.

The court ruled that Crook's patent was valid and that the government infringed it in using the shield from 1937 until 1944. It called for an accounting to determine the exact amount the government owes Crook and co-owners of the patent. Some estimate this may be a minimum of five million dollars in roy-



### California's New Goal: The All-American Olive

There is no flagging in California's zest for superlatives. In the future the Golden Gate's olive industry will settle for nothing less than "ideal."

This search for perfection is not surprising in the light of the state's 85-year-old olive growing record. Less than 50 years ago its growers developed the popular canned ripe olive, an innovation of considerable importance to a 4,000-year-old in-

Today, University of California agriculturists are not content that the olive has been used through recorded time as staple food, tempting delicacy and medicine, and that its oil has served for soap, lamp salad dressing, and cooking fat. These scientists now seek to combine the best qualities of all olive varieties in one Americanproduced variety.

About the middle of the 19th century, when California was filled with many not too successful gold miners, olive growing experienced its first boom period. Wishful thinkers—relying on a saying of Pliny-accepted the fable that olive trees thrive best in adversity. Trees were planted on the most arid hillsides and given no care at all. The resultant crop failures gave the infant industry a serious setback.

When it was learned that olive culture required work but was worth it, about 80 types of olives were imported from Mediterranean countries to mix with the Mission variety, first brought to California by the early Franciscan missionaries. Most of the imported varieties were good for olive oil, the chief use of the American olive at the turn of the cen-

Then, Californians discovered that olives could be ripened on the tree, the bitterness neutralized and the fruit canned. As a result, most of the many foreign varieties were allowed to die out, leaving the Mission, Manzanillo, Sevillano, Ascolano and Barouni, the state's chief varieties today.

### **Interior Colors Affect Lighting** In The Home

the various rooms in the home can very materially affect the amount of artificial light needed to give comfortable and economical lighting. For thrift with light, either daylight or electric, there is an advantage! in light colored walls, woodwork and furnishings, says Mrs. Bernice Claytor, extension home management specialist of Texas A. & M. College.

She points out that in many cases homemakers in redecorating the home are using the deep shades now in vogue for wall paper, interior paint, curtains and other furnishings. This shift in colors may require more lamps or the use of higherwattage bulbs for adequate illumination, especially for the rooms where the more tedious home tasks are performed.

To be adequate, she says good lighting must satisfy four major requirements. There must be plenty of light for adequate seeing and this will vary with the task. Good lighting is free from glare. The proper placing of lamps and fixtures will give the proper distribution of light and in turn will mean an absence of shadows on visual tasks.



### **Animal Once Thought Extinct Discovered** On Haiti Peninsula

WASHINGTON-On the brink of oblivion for more than a century, an animal once believed to be extinct has been rediscovered, and a freshly-killed specimen is in the hands of the Smithsonian institution to prove it.

It is a Haitian species of the hutia, ratlike distant relative of the guinea pig and porcupine which was last collected in 1830 and described by the French naturalist Cuvier.

Since then no living specimens have been reported, although there are quite close relatives in the Dominican Republic, Cuba Jamaica and some other West Indian islands. They represent a meager remnant of what was once a large flourishing family of rodents.

The Smithsonian has received from Anthony Curtiss of Portau-Prince a freshly killed specimen collected on the southwestern peninsula of Haiti. Here the little creature apparently has found its last refuge.

Although scientists have assumed that this hutia was extinct, Curtiss wrote the Smithsonian that "it is well known to the country people of the region, who have dogs trained to catch it."

A near relative in the Dominican Republic is known to live in hollow trees, and dogs are trained to drive it out. The Haitian type is believed not to be a tree dweller, owing to the structure of its

It is quite closely related to the long-extinct "giant rat" of the West Indies, which probably became extinct about the time the first white men arrived in the New World. Its remains are common in cave deposits and Indian kitchen middens, and it may have been an important Indian food.



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



### Wingless-Chicken Eggs Flown to Great Britain

DES MOINES. IA.—The first wingless-chicken eggs ever sold since Peter H. Baumann placed on public display 400 of the "disarmed" birds he has developed over a 12-year period of evolution, were flown to Great Britain recently. The eggs will be used to hatch wingless chickens in Lon-

Mr. Baumann, who is a veterinary supply salesman, caused a raising of the evebrows of farmers. poultrymen, agriculture editors and chicken consumers when he placed his wingless birds on public display.

His new breed, which took \$15,000 to develop, produces fatter drumsticks and a surplus of white meat instead of the bones and tough joints of wings.

Several orders for live wingless chickens, including one "just a block from the White House," came from across the country, but he has not decided yet how many of his birds he will place on the market, Mr. Baumann said.

AUCKLAND, NEW ZEALAND-This is about a wild rabbit named Betty, that refused to stay wild and has been making headlines down here.

Pretender Fights for Afghan Throne

KARACHI, INDIA - Tension between Afghanistan and Pakistan is tightening as a claimant to the Afghan throne continues his attempts to raise an army in the troubled tribal area between the two semihostile Moslem nations.

The claimant is Amin Jan. whose brother, Amanullah, vacated the throne in 1929 and now lives in Italy. Amin Jan wants to replace the present king, Zahir Shah, and figures an army might help.

Amin Jan is German-educated and has an English wife. He was arrested in Peshawar following his brother's abdication and was deported by the British to Rangoon. Later he was transferred to the Allahabad Jails. He was released in 1948 and allowed to proceed to

He already had made one start on an expedition to Kabul, Afghanistan's capital. But on reaching the border he found the number of irregulars -Mahsud tribesmen-had dwindled to 30, Amin Jan called the expedition off.

The major result was to stir up a new dispute between Pakistan and Afghanistan, already arguing over control of the tribal belt stretching along the frontier.

Kabul radio complained that Pakistan was backing Amin Jan. Pakistan replied that it had warned the Afghans about his activities and urged tribesmen not to join him. Observers here, however, declare that Pakistan would be pleased to see Amin on the throne.

### It Pays to be Ignorant, Says University Professor

SOUTH BEND, IND.—Ignorance is bliss—and it's better for a student to be ignorant than wrong. That's the opinion of Dr. Mortimer J. Adler, a University of Chicago law philosophy professor.

"The trouble with most students today is that they are not ignorant enough," Dr. Adler told a University of Notre Dame convocation. "Instead of being ignorant, most students have erroneous opinions.'

Wrong opinions are worse than ignorance, Dr. Adler said, for this

"Before you can give knowledge to a person in error, you must get rid of the error. The problem of eradicating the error doesn't exist in the ignorant persons, since he knows he doesn't know and so is more easily given knowledge."



### Why Families?

Lesson for July 16, 1950

THE ENGLISH language has a word not found in the original word not found in the original he followed the boys ashore. Beauty of the opera, Marguerite states: "My voice is my living. I smoke Camels! They're cool and mild—they agree with my throat!"

- word not found in the original languages of the Bible; it is not in Latin, German or French for that matter. It is the word "home." But homes were not invented in England or Ameri-

ca; the ancient peoples of the world had homes even if they had no special word for them. The story of Ruth is a homestory, a family tale. It comes

from the times of the Judges, which were very rugged times in-

deed. To read the Book of Judges you would think that everything was plots and wars and murder. There isn't a peaceful story in the book. And then comes the story of Ruth, to remind us that even in those terrible times there were happy people, people who minded their business and worked hard and stayed home and loved one another. The bright spots in today's vast seas of misery are just what they were in Ruth's time.

Working Together
"A HOME is a place to go when everything else has shut up" is not a true proverb. For if that is all it is, it is not a home. It is only a boarding house and not a very attractive one at that.

It is the people who live in it who make it. But just throwing people together within four walls, even if the people are closely related, will not make a home. When you read the story of Ruth you see one thing standing out: they were all working people.

To this day, there are rewer divorces in the country than in the cities, and one big reason for that is that country families have to work together, while city families often have little in common. In the country everybody turns to and does something about the house, everybody helps everybody else; while in the cities where so much is done by machines and houses are very small, there isn't much a family can do together. Still, it is worth while for any family to try to work out something that they can all do together.

Unity in Variety

TT is striking that in the Bible the warmest expression of devotion shown by one person to another, is expressed by one woman to her nother-in-law, by Ruth to Naomi. Ruth was of a different race and eneration and nation. Yet she akes Naomi's family for her own.

That illustrates another beautiful feature of living in a family. You learn to live with all kinds of people. Even in so small a group, no two are alike. And the thing that holds a family together almost better than anything else is not similar tastes in breakfast foods, or identical eduactions, or equality of age or temperament: it is common ideals, it is agreement about the im-

portant things in life. What do you, for example, think s the greatest thing in the world? Do your family agree with you? If they do (or you with them) then you have a basis for a happy family life.

Unity in Worship

HIGH ideals, held by all in common, are almost the best family cement: but better and best is religion. When you read the story of Ruth you are struck not only by their high ideals but by their natural, heart-felt, everyday religious faith. It comes out in the remarks of Boaz. It was one of the things that no doubt had attracted Ruth to the family in the first place. The climax of her famous promise to her mother-in-law is "thy God shall be my God."

It is at best confusing, and at worst tragic, when families are divided in their religious faith. Some one has said that when the father belongs to one denomination and the wife to another, the children are likely to become Nothingarians.

The old family pew, happily not out of style in many places, is more than a quaint custom. It is a fine symbol of family life at its best. Where are the most of the broken homes? Among the families where father and mother send the children to Sunday school while they themselves lie around at home reading the paper, or among the families where all go to the house of God together? A home without real religion is a home without its surest foundation.



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


