

50 Scouts Will Attend Colorado Mountain Camp

The first 50 boy scouts from Sherman, Dallam and Hartley Counties paying their initial tuition fee of \$2.00 will be those attending the Mountain Camp in Colorado, according to an announcement made this week by W. M. Teague, scout field executive.

Scouts will leave the Dallam County court house in Dalhart at 8:30 A. M. August 14. Highlights of their trip will include a visit to the scenic Royal Gorge, a tour of the penitentiary at Canon City, a visit to the Colorado Petrified forest near Canon City. Trout fishing will be enjoyed in Twin Lakes at Redville, Colorado. Swimming will be the main form of recreation at Canon City and at Salida. While at Salida they will visit the world's largest fish hatchery.

The total cost of the trip for each boy scout will be \$15.00. This includes a health and accident insurance policy protecting the scouts while they are on the trip. To be eligible for the trip the scout must be at least 11 years of age and have the approval of local scout leaders.

Scouts from Sherman, Dallam and Hartley counties who pay the \$2.00 registration fee will be among those making the trip providing they are among the first 50 making an application to attend the camp.

Twenty-eight scouts from over the district had paid their tuition fees Wednesday. Registration fees may be paid to any of the local scout leaders, Clifford Byrd, Jim Burt, or Arthur Judd.

W. M. Teague, field scout executive, will direct activities of the camp. Dr. Wayne Maxwell, Dalhart, will be the camp physician. Ernest Lovelace, Stratford, is the mobilization officer. Neal Hutton, Dalhart, is the angling instructor. Arthur Judd, Stratford, will act as the cooking advisor. T. O. Monroe will be in charge of the entertainment program.

8. Author of bill granting State Tax Remission to City of Higgins and Higgins School District to help pay the cost of rebuilding from the storm.

9. Supported passage of Veteran's Farm Loan Bill.

10. Secured passage of bill creating new Panhandle wide game district.

11. Supported and worked for bill authorizing \$5,000,000 appropriation for soil conservation program in Texas.

12. Never missed a vote on any important bills concerning the district.

Courses will be offered on the subjects of Philosophy and Policies of Farm Bureau, Membership Acquisition, Public Bureau Structures, Techniques for Presiding Officers, County and Community Organizations, and Recreational Activities.

Registration will begin at 2:00 P. M. Sunday, July 30. A vesper service that evening will be the first session of the Institute. Classes will begin Monday morning.

A Salute To 4-H Farm Safety

National Farm Safety Week is being observed throughout rural America, July 23-29. Now is the time to salute another nationwide safety activity in progress 365 days a year.

It is the 4-H Farm and Home Safety program carried on by nearly half a million 4-H Club members between the ages of 10 and 21. We are told that these youths, who conduct safety surveys of their home farms and neighboring farmsteads, have the best organized safety program in the rural field. They not only ferret out hazards, but follow through and correct thousands of unsafe conditions relating to farm machinery, livestock, homemaking, recreation, motoring, and scores of other things.

Since the project was launched on a national basis eight years ago, enrollment has increased five times. This would indicate that our farm boys and girls have steadily become more safety minded. It means, also, that in addition to the 4-H's themselves, safety education has reached parents, residents of the local community, club leaders, and extension personnel.

So it seems a foregone conclusion that many times the half-million young folks taking part in the 4-H safety program are influenced and benefited. Perhaps this widespread influx of knowledge will prove to be a direct route to decreasing the 17,500 fatal accidents to farm people each year; or save some of the 35,000 farm buildings destroyed by fire; or put to constructive use the \$1,000,000,000 in losses annually represented by these disasters.

County Invests More Money In Savings Bonds

Sherman County Citizens continue to invest their money in U. S. Savings Bonds. As of July 7 the county had an investment of \$29,606.25 in Series E Bonds during the current year. The county's quota for the current drive was \$11,000.00. The investment represents 269.15 percent of the goal.

Reynolds Named To State PMA Committee

Vern Reynolds, of Conlen, chairman of the Dallam County PMA committee, will be recommended to Agriculture Secretary Chas. Brannan in Washington for appointment to the State PMA committee of Texas at College Station.

The announcement was made in Dalhart through Bill Alexander, administrative officer of the Dallam County PMA Committee.

At Friday's Panhandle meeting in Amarillo to discuss adjustments to the PMA summer fallow rule as it applies to wheat growers, a 12-man committee was named to choose a man to serve on the State PMA committee as a representative of wheat growers.

It was pointed out that there has been no wheat representative on the state committee since the death two or three years ago, of C. L. Thomas of Pampa.

The 12-man committee, Alexander was advised, chose Carl J. Kuper of Dalhart for recommendation to Secretary Brannan and Mr. Reynolds as first alternate. When Kuper said he could not serve, Reynolds automatically became the choice to serve on the state board.

After Mr. Thomas death, federal and state agriculture authorization reduced the membership of the State PMA committee from 13 to five, Alexander said, so that if Secretary Brannan appoints Reynolds as recommended by the 12-man Panhandle nominating committee the State committee will likely be expanded to six.

Reynolds' nomination to the state committee will be forwarded to Ben Guill, of Pampa, congressman of this 18th Texas district, at his Washington office and he will formally present it to Brannan.

Panhandle businessman, the Panhandle farmer and the Panhandle worker. I phoned the White House and asked for an appointment with the President. I wanted to see if something couldn't be done quickly to help the thousands of people in the Panhandle who were suffering because of the strike, and who were merely innocent bystanders with no interest and no part in the controversy between the railroad and the union.

I also put in long distance calls to Chicago and spoke to Arthur J. Glover and E. C. McDaniel, of the Switchman's Union, and Mr. Farrington, one of the top executives of the railroad.

In substance, I told them this: I am not entering into this without any preconceived ideas about who is right and who is wrong. I certainly recognize the right of a man to bargain collectively. That's an American right. But I do know that perfectly innocent bystanders in my District are being hurt, that hundreds of people are

being threatened with unemployment, and that there is need of immediate compromise and settlement.

I suggested that I gather together a group of Congressmen whose Districts were most affected by the strike and fly with them to Chicago so we could sit down with representatives of both sides of the controversy and work out a solution whereby the railroad could be operated while discussions were taking place.

Both sides were considering this plan seriously and favorably when the White House called to say that the President had just ordered seizure of the Rock Island and that the Army would

take over operation until a settlement could be reached.

No single event since I came to Washington, not even the notorious Tidelands Decision nor the Communist invasion of South Korea, brought so much correspondence to my desk as did the strike of the AFL Switchmen's Union against the Rock Island Railroad.

Since the President had the authority to intervene, I was asked to plead the case of the

ILLUSIONS

Invents Five Tricks Yearly

HOLLYWOOD — Howard Thurston, believed by many one of the greatest magicians that ever lived, has been dead for 12 years.

Now, Harry A. Jansen, known professionally as Dante, has stepped

into the role as the country's leading magician. If not the leading magician, certainly the most inventive.

Dante, who is white-haired and wears a goatee, was Thurston's constructionist (carpenter) for the magicians' sawing stunt. When Thurston died, Dante acquired all his tricks and was named his successor.

His greatest trick, illusion as it is called in the trade, is sawing a woman in half. Invented in 1920, he has improved it to such perfection that it seems uncanny.

"Now I can move the two halves around the stage. The head, in one half of the box, sings. The toes, on the other side of the stage, wiggle," he said.

Invents Illusion

He explained he has been making magic for 50 years and has originated 25 major illusions and 40 lesser ones. This, he claims, surpasses the invention of all other leading magicians put together.

Every March Dante turns out four or five new illusions. That's the extent of his inventing for a year. The remaining time is spent on tour with "Dante's Cockeyed Inferno," consisting of a boxcar load of paraphernalia and a troop of 30 performers.

Among Dante's illusions is the barbershop travesty, where he winds up shaving himself. He is also inventor of the getaway, in which a pretty girl steps on a scale, drops in her penny, and vanishes.

"It takes more than just carpentering to create a first-class illusion," he says. "It takes imagination, then the skill to carry the whole plan out. The apparatus has to be correctly made, light, portable, easily set up and knocked down. Too many magicians find themselves lugging around boxcar loads of equipment."

The magician Kew Houdini, along with other famous tricksters. He says Houdini knew very little. His specialty was escaping from a locked trunk.

Makes Tricks Complicated

Dante reports it may take years to perfect an illusion. His "million-dollar illusion" of sawing a woman in half was comparatively simple when first invented. Now, with years of work and thought, it has become a complicated trick. Audiences are fascinated and often horrified as the two halves of the woman are moved about the stage, one half singing and the other wiggling its toes.

Copyright of illusions is difficult, Dante says.

"About all we can do is make them so complicated they can't be duplicated. But imposters are always trying."

Thurston, even after death, wanted to carry on in the trade. He made a pact with a friend, Claude Noble, that on the anniversary of his death Noble would try to contact his spirit.

Every year for 12 years, Noble

has visited Thurston's tomb and called to his spirit. There has been no manifestation.

Electricity in Brain Cause Of Many Headaches, Report

DETROIT—The American psychiatric association has a new explanation for headaches and dizzy spells.

The association reports it may be caused by buzzing of electricity in your brain. The association also believes it may be a cause of restlessness.

The buzzing is rapid pulses of electrical energy, 30 to 40 a second. This is half to more than half as fast as the pulsations of alternating current in your house electric lights. It occurs in both the central and forward parts of your brain.

The veterans' administration hospital at Hines, Ill., and the University of Illinois college of medicine gave an exhibition of the discovery to the association.

Eighty-five per cent of persons with these fast waves suffered from headaches, 70 per cent were restless and 55 per cent complained of dizziness. Also, 75 per cent said they had spells of some sort and many of them had suffered personality upsets.

The discovery was made possible by pasting little electrodes on the skin or scalp, with fine wires attached to carry away the current. The experiment was made during drowsiness.

The report said that sleep takes the blanket off the brain and lets the waves out better than during wakefulness.

The sleep studies showed that sometimes one side of the brain beats faster electrically than the other. This happens in hemiplegia, a common trouble among wounded G.I.s. In hemiplegia part of the body is paralyzed, but only one side. This paralysis comes from the brain.

Kidney X-Ray Pictures Improved by New Chemical

Use of a new chemical in taking X-ray pictures of the kidneys produces fewer undesirable reactions in patients, according to two University of Michigan doctors.

The new substance, which gives a white silhouette to the kidneys under X-ray, is called Urokon.

The substance was studied for a period of 18 months in a total of 1,481 patients at the University of Michigan hospital by Dr. Reed M. Nesbit, professor of surgery, and Dr. Jack Lapides, instructor in surgery and a United States public health service postdoctorate research fellow.

In a 30 per cent solution, Urokon was found to produce relatively fewer cases of nausea, vomiting, foreign taste, arm pain and allergic reactions than the compounds most widely used at the present time, the doctors reported.

The Urokon solution was admin-

istered to patients by intravenous injections to enable the doctors to detect abnormalities such as kidney tumors, enlarged kidneys, injuries to kidneys and the presence of kidney stones.

In the study conducted at the University of Michigan hospital, four X-ray exposures were taken on each patient, the doctors explained. These included one pre-injection film, one film five minutes after administration of the radio-opaque substance, another film 15 minutes after injection, and a fourth film with the patient in an upright position immediately following the 15 minute exposure.

all necessity for further talk. But, the question still remains: what can be done in the future to protect the innocent by-

stander in a dispute between management and labor?

Senator Donnell of Missouri has introduced a Bill which would make arbitration compulsory in a railroad strike. This Bill may come up for a vote during this session. The idea of compulsory arbitration is not a good one. I am opposed to forced labor. Neither the officials of the Rock Island nor those of the union thought the Donnell Bill would be advisable, since both sides think they would be at the mercy of the political ideology of the arbiters and have no means of recourse against a discriminatory decision.

But, it still may be that the Donnell Bill is the only way to protect the innocent bystander from being caught in the middle. I would like to hear what you people back home think about this. I admit I don't know the answer and I don't think anyone in Washington is certain of the answer.

I have one suggestion which may point toward an answer. Perhaps we could solve the problem by passing a bill which would place the big labor unions under the same anti-trust laws which govern other big businesses. This law would amend certain sections of the Norris-LaGuardia Act, the Sherman Anti-Trust laws and the Clayton Act so as to eliminate the possibility of one union, or one union boss, endangering the economic health of the entire country.

After all, if all the doctors, or all the farmers, or all the steel-makers in the country decided to quit operating all at once, the Government, quite rightly, would step in immediately. I fail to see why a nation-wide union of highly specialized and valuable workers does not fall into the same category. In our highly organized civilization, every job is an important cog in the machinery of existence. When all the cogs of one type stop working, the machinery grinds to a shuddering stop and thousands of people are hurt.

It is obvious that something must be done to clear up the present situation. The innocent bystander must be protected. I would very much appreciate it if you would send your

Monarchists Renew Efforts To Put Don Juan on Throne

MADRID — The on again, off again movement to restore the Spanish monarchy has undergone a recent reorganization in an effort to speed up the restoration, it is reported.

Emissaries have been discussing ways and means of putting Don Juan de Bourbon, son of Alfonso XIII, on the throne. The move is reported to include a willingness to cooperate with liberal groups, excepting, of course, the communists. Some of the more realistic monarchists are said to wish forming a well-knit group that would forget factional quarrels and class prejudices that have hampered all past work for the restoration.

They are convinced that the only way to restore the monarchy is to cooperate with socialists, anarchists and other republican parties. These groups have agreed, it is reported, to work with the monarch until free elections can be held to settle the form of government.

One source reports that the Council of the Realm has been discussing with Generalissimo Francisco Franco some amendments to the law of succession, which covers the whole question of monarchy.

Such reports renew the speculation that Generalissimo Franco may be preparing to assume the title of regent. The possibility of such a move has made many monarchists believe it all the more imperative that they make some vigorous move for the restoration.

A strange situation exists in Spain. Ruled by a dictator, one not generally liked in the United States, Spain is legally a monarchy. For this reason the monarchists are more outspoken than other groups in the country.

When any of them are arrested for their outcries, they get far more lenient treatment than members of other parties. The court makes it clear they are not being punished because they are monarchists but because they have threatened the peace and security of the state.

**Gasoline Versus Liquefied Petroleum
[Butane-Propane]**

Liquefied Petroleum gas, commonly called Butane, or Propane, or Bottled Gas, is the best motor fuel. Entering the engine as a dry gas, prevents crankcase dilution, or thinning of lube oil, or washing of the cylinder walls with resultant cylinder wearing. The lube oil may be used much longer, which means a great saving in your oil costs.

Being a dry gas it leaves no harmful carbon in the engine. Practically no exhaust or smoke or obnoxious odors.

Rings, valves, cylinders and all moving parts lubricated from the crankcase will last much longer, which naturally cuts down your maintenance costs, besides reducing to a minimum your lost time, while truck, tractor or other equipment is being repaired.

LP Gas is not unduly hazardous. Its limits of inflammability or explosive range being narrower than other commercial fuel. Observing safety regulation as set forth in National Board of Fire Underwriters pamphlet No. 58, and with precautions taken similar for gasoline or natural gas, will avoid dangers.

One of the first questions usually asked is, how does LP Gas compare with gasoline? Gasoline, of course, is a liquid. Butane is a gas unless compressed to a liquid. Butane weighs less than gasoline. Even though gasoline contains more BTUs than Butane, Butane allows a more perfect carburetion.

Butane enters a heat exchanger (or converter) in liquid form from the tank. There it is expanded in both the high and low pressure chambers to a dry gas and enters the carburetor to be mixed with air to the proper combustion mixture. The fact that it is in a dry gas form, much the same as air, makes it possible to have better control of combustion mixtures. This means that the motor has a greater chance to burn more completely this type of fuel. A more complete combustion means elimination of heavy carbon deposits in combustion chamber and ring glands, thus cutting down motor wear. Butane entering the motor in a dry form mean that piston and cylinder wall wash is eliminated and lubricating oil, instead of washing away, performs its proper function. This feature alone makes possible an increased life of the motor by many thousands of miles. There are trucks operating out of Los Angeles, pulling heavy loads, through hot country which have traveled in excess of 100,000 miles without removing cylinder head, grinding valves or replacing piston rings. Motors operating under these conditions have been checked and the cylinder wall wear has been found to be negligible.

OIL DILUTION

The fact that oil dilution is eliminated, increases the oil life from 3 to 5 times that of oil used on motors burning liquid fuel. When changing to butane it is advisable to buy a motor oil recommended by oil companies to be used in connection with a butane-propane burning engine.

The heavier the equipment and loads, and nearer full throttle that engines are operated, make ideal conditions under which butane gives greatest economy.

UN Survival Hinged On Korean War

There has been great disillusionment in this country over the United Nations. The high hopes for world amity and civilized solutions of international difficulties that were held out when the organization was created have not materialized. And so, in many minds, a feeling

has arisen that the UN is a dismal failure, and that it might as well follow the League of Nations into oblivion.

But there is another side to this great question. It was well expressed by Raymond Moley in one of his newspaper columns when he wrote: "It is to be hoped that public opinion in the United States will modify its pessimism concerning the United Nations. Walter Lippmann made the strong point that the United Nations is the only means by which Asiatic interests can be mobilized in the

interests of Security. That is because the remaining independent Asiatic nations must themselves participate in stabilization, and in so doing work side by side with the nations of the West.

"Our own stake is enormous. We must not forfeit the assets of the Japanese potential or neglect the Philippines. For once the Soviet appears in the warm waters of the Pacific, it will develop sea power and challenge our position in the entire ocean.

"The United Nations must do or die, and if it dies, civilization everywhere will be in grave peril."

The failures of the UN, which have been very largely due to Russia's constant use of her veto power in any matter that does not further the Soviet policy of world communist expansion, have overshadowed its achievements. The UN has brought together the nations of the

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world, and the vast majority of them are on the side of the West. Countries with a total population of something like a billion people have formally expressed, through the UN, their opposition to the communist invasion of South Korea. And the UN acted promptly, and to the limit of its existing capabilities, when the Korean crisis arose.

The UN has protected our own position in Korea. There we are acting, not just on our own hook, but as an agent of the UN. We are following exactly the provisions of the UN charter, which are to block aggression wherever it may appear. We are, therefore taking on the job of policeman in that tragic little country.

It may be a long time before the world learns what the Korean war will lead to. In the meantime it has cast a brilliant light on the effectiveness of our vacillating policy in Asia. It also seems to have some startling failures. We were taken completely by surprise, our intelligence apparently could not have been poorer, and we did not realize how well prepared for war the Korean communists were. However, as Herbert Hoover said, we have made our decision, we must abide by it, and everything that is necessary to win must be done. For us to lose in Korea would be the final shattering blow to American and United Nations prestige throughout the world. This is what the Russians are hoping for. It would be the greatest victory the Soviet Union could gain.

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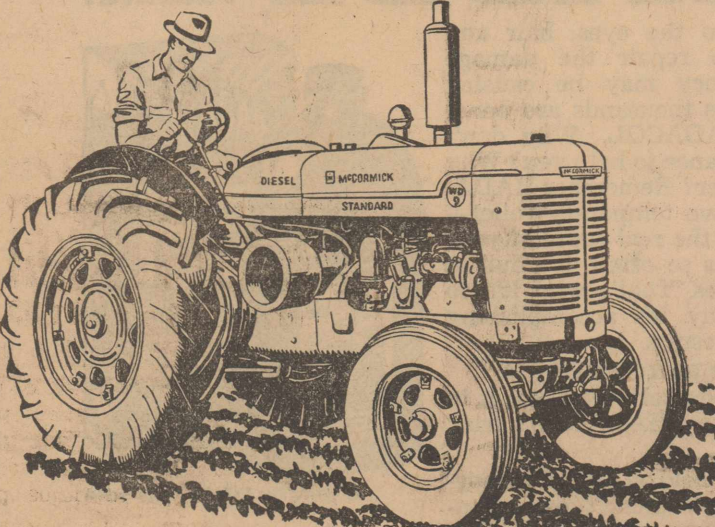
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Time to Paint Radiators
