

Specialist Will Classify Livestock Wednesday At Bridwell Ranch

A livestock demonstration will be held Wednesday, August 23, at 10:00 A. M. at the J. N. Bridwell ranch. The Bridwell place is located 17 miles east of Stratford on the Gruver highway and 1/2 mile north.

The purpose of this demonstration is to give 4-H Club and FFA boys training in selection of feeder and stocker cattle to be placed on feeding demonstrations. U. D. Thompson, Livestock Specialist of Texas A. & M. College, will assist County Agent Goule in this demonstration. Mr. Bridwell will furnish the livestock and Mr. Thompson will classify the cattle into choice, good, fair, and other classes of feeder and stocker cattle.

This is an initiation of the commercial calf feeding program for the 4-H and FFA boys of Sherman County. The boys plan to feed out two or three car loads of calves this winter.

Parents of the boys and livestock breeders of the county are encouraged to attend this demonstration and the general public is invited.

Draft Boards Don't Have Two Answers

AUSTIN — Two of the most prevalent questions which men are asking state draft boards are: "When will I have to take my physical exam?" and "When will I be drafted?"

"These are two questions which local draft boards cannot answer," Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, said today, in commenting on queries which are coming in to the draft boards. "These two questions can't be answered," because there are too many intangible factors involved."

General Wakefield listed some of the reasons why local boards can't answer these questions: 1. Local boards do not know whether calls will be for an increased number of men or not. 2. Local boards cannot tell how many of their registrants will be found acceptable for military service or how many will be rejected. 3. Local boards cannot tell whether the world situation will improve or get worse. 4. Local boards cannot tell how many men will enlist for service in the armed forces now and in the future. "All these things have a bearing on the numbers which will be called for physical examinations and inductions," General Wakefield said.

Mr. Roberts was stricken with a heart ailment and arthritis. Through his years of illness he managed to maintain his cheerfulness.

As a native of Tennessee, he was a boyhood chum of Cordell Hull, former U. S. Secretary of State. Mr. Roberts came to the Conlen area in 1898. He could tell some interesting stories in which Hull, whom he called "Cord", had a part.

For more than a half a century, Mr. Roberts was a prominent wheat grower, civic and agricultural leader in his community. Failing health caused his retirement. He served as County Commissioner from the Conlen Precinct for several years.

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 in the First Baptist Church at Dalhart, with Rev. W. R. Lawrence, pastor, in charge. Rev. John R. Reeves, pastor of the First Christian Church of Stratford, assisted in conducting the service.

Funeral Services Wednesday For G. N. Batterson

Funeral services for G. N. Batterson, age 77, a former Stratford resident, were held in the First Methodist Church at Texhoma Wednesday afternoon. Mr. Batterson passed away at the family home in Texhoma Monday after a lingering illness of more than three years.

George Nathan Batterson was born August 26, 1872 to David and Nancy Knotts Batterson at Wellman, Iowa. He was the youngest of four brothers and older than two sisters, one of whom survives.

Mr. Batterson grew to young manhood on the farm at Wellman. When he was eighteen years of age, he went to assist an uncle living at Abilene, Kansas and remained one year. Returning to Iowa, he continued his farming interests at Lorenze. On April 12, 1899 he married Miss Margarite McFarland.

While at Lorenze he was a member of the Modern Woodmen Fraternity.

In 1906 he bought land near Texhoma. In 1908 he moved to this land, coming in an emigrant car containing the household goods, machinery, livestock, etc., to the community known as Union Center. He improved the original purchase and added three quarter sections, making it one of Texas County's best improved homes.

Mr. Batterson drilled the second water well in the Union Center community. This well soon attracted freighters enroute to Boise City and points north and west, for they were always welcome to water their stock and remain over night. Many interesting friendships and acquaintances have developed from this hospitality.

Mr. Batterson was a progressive farmer who encouraged the breeding of good stock. He was the first man in the Union Center community to sow wheat, and he owned the first tractor and the first combine which operated in that section.

In 1929 Mr. and Mrs. Batterson and their daughter moved to Stratford. They returned to their farm in 1935 and moved to their present home in Texhoma in 1943.

The deceased pioneer became ill May 8, 1947, suffering a light stroke at that time. Although he made a partial recovery, he was confined to a wheel chair until last March when he became bedfast. He became unconscious last Friday and passed away Monday, lacking only 12 days reaching his 78th year.

Always active and interested in any political or civic enterprise for the betterment of the community or his fellow-man, he retained this interest throughout his illness and was always glad when his friends came in for a visit. He will ever be remembered as a kind neighbor, a loyal friend, and an outstanding citizen.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Margarite Batterson; his daughter, Mrs. Gladys Gumm, two grandchildren, Gary and Timothy Gumm; a sister, Mrs. Charles Shoff of Mayetta, Kansas; a half sister, Mrs. Nellie Huddle, Holton, Kansas; eight nephews and one niece.

Army To Call Reserve Officers In September

Officers of the Army Officers Reserve Corps, not assigned to organized troop units, will be ordered to extended active duty for a period of 21 months, or such other period as may be authorized by law, with or without their consent, according to an announcement by the Department of the Army, Col. Oscar B. Abbott, Chief of the Texas Military District stated Friday.

The orders will affect male

officers of all major branches of the army, including medical, dental, veterinary and medical service as well as the combat and service branches.

In the combat and service branches only company grade officers, that is, lieutenants and captains, will be called under this authority. All grades to include lieutenant colonels are subject to orders to active duty in the medical and dental services.

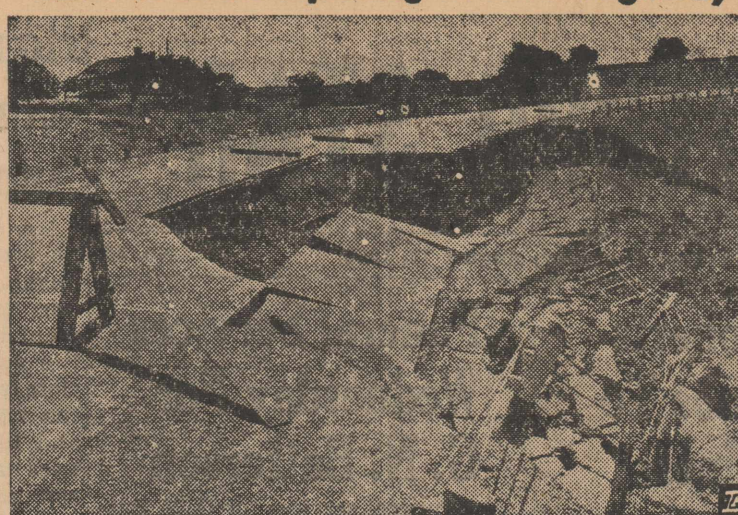
Officers selected will be ordered to duty from both the active and inactive reserve elements. Those assigned to Organized Reserve Corps troop units will not be called under this authority.

Processing of physical examinations will be expedited so that one-third of the officers will be able to report to their stations by September 22, another third by September 29 and the remainder not later than October 6. Officers selected for the call will be ordered to the nearest army installation for physical examinations, return to their homes and wait final orders, and will be granted a minimum of 21 days from the date of receipt of active duty orders to the

Cave-In Halts Opening of New Highway



PITTSBURGH—A section of the brand new Murray Hill road, in East Deer township, dropped off into soft fill June 7th, just before the road was scheduled to be opened to traffic. The huge hole that swallowed more than 100 feet of the two-lane highway left Allegheny county officials in a quandary, trying to find the reasons behind the dramatic collapse of the huge slabs of concrete. Construction costs already had been increased several thousand dollars by a series of slides which began May 15th. Engineers blamed a seam of "butter clay" 30 to 50 feet below the roadway. County Works Director Levi Bird, Duff explained the construction company and the county had no knowledge of the clay, because it is not customary to make a test drilling before making such a fill which was to have carried the road across a gully. The cave-in came in the midst of a controversy over the entire question of highway damage and its causes.

The college mother of 1950 drove 56 miles a day to attend classes twice a week. The past semester she drove 4,500 miles. Next fall she plans to be back to continue her work toward a degree. In addition to her studies, she gardens and cans 500 cans of vegetables and fruit each year. Her husband, Arthur M. Gilbert, is an electrical engineer. He and Mrs. Gilbert live on a 54-acre farm.

Well Digger Trapped In Shaft; Rescue Efforts Are Futile

NEW YORK — While hundreds looked on and prayed, Dominick Atteo, trapped at the bottom of a 20-foot well shaft for more than 27 hours, died shortly before rescuers finally reached him. Atteo's courage was unbelievable. But burns, pain, exhaustion and pressure of rocks and earth were more than his strong frame could stand. The 45-year-old well digger was trapped in the 20-foot shaft he was digging beneath a Brooklyn garage when the walls gave way. He was buried to the armpits and one leg was pinned by a large boulder.

Men's Two-Pants Suits Reported Coming Back

NEW YORK — The two-pants suit, a wartime casualty, is staging a comeback. Max Udell Sons & company, clothing manufacturer, discovered that in a survey. A questionnaire answered by 203 retailers around the country disclosed that two-pants suits are growing rapidly in popularity. An estimated 34 per cent of retailers are going to get their suits with two pants. And "some areas, such as Detroit and Chicago, plan to buy all of their suits with two trousers," the survey said.

Two Pilots, Woman Saved From Plunge Over Falls

NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y. — Several persons have plunged over Niagara Falls in barrels and lived to tell about their much publicized stunt, but none had been rescued from certain death after falling or jumping into the river above the cataract, until recently. Two pilots and a woman were rescued by helicopter from a 100-foot plunge over Horseshoe Falls. The dramatic rescue was witnessed by hundreds of horrified spectators.

Early one morning recently park employees heard a woman's screams for help and found her clinging to a rock about 75 feet from shore. She was Mrs. Jeannette Bugay, 25, wife of a Niagara Falls taxi driver and mother of three children. The park employees tried to rescue her. One waded into the river while another held a rope fastened to him. The swift current, however, knocked him down and his companion pulled him to safety. Firemen then tried to get a rowboat to the woman, but failed. A helicopter was then called to the rescue. The craft, pontoon equipped, landed on the water near the rock to which the woman clung. Joseph A. Cannon, 30, one of the pilots, climbed out on a pontoon and slipped a rope about the woman. As he started pulling her toward the helicopter he slipped and lost his balance. The plane tipped over and the spinning rotor blades hit the water. Still clinging to the woman, the pilots climbed back aboard the wrecked plane which drifted about 35 yards closer to the falls before lodging on a rock. A hurried call was put in to the nearby Bell Aircraft Corp. plant and a second helicopter sped to

the scene. One end of a rope was dropped to the pilots in the wrecked craft. They tied it to the wreck. The second helicopter then dropped the other end to firemen on shore. A rowboat moved cautiously along the rope to the trio and brought them safely to land.

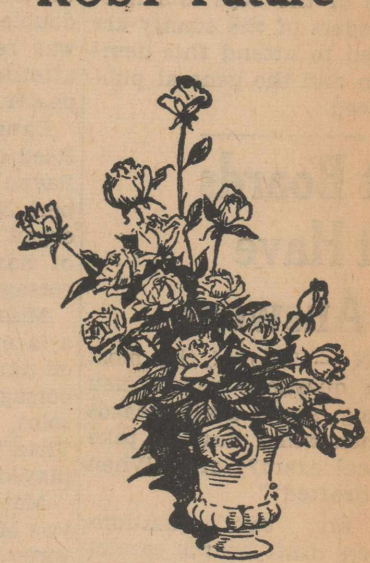

ALL OVER WORLD Dogs Work For Living

PHILADELPHIA—All over the world, dogs work for a living and appear to get as much satisfaction, if less money, out of their labors as do their masters. Companion dogs guide their sightless owners to business and social appointments. Guard dogs protect homes and industrial plants against nocturnal prowlers. Farm dogs herd cattle or sheep.

But Tom Farley, radio commentator who collects odd stories about dogs, tells of canines with more unusual occupations. For instance, everyone knows of human baby sitters but a dog that baby sits is more rare. In Pennsylvania, there's a Dachshund named Gloria that minds the infant son of her owner for a penny an hour. Human sitters would scoff at such a modest stipend, but to date, Gloria has rolled up a bank account of \$4.84.

Spaniel Is Perfect Model

Modeling is the job of Butch, pet of animal artist Albert Staehle. You probably know the cocker spaniel from his merry antics which are pictured on covers of the Saturday Evening Post. Butch, who is now three and a half years old, has appeared as Post cover dog a record of 24 times. Staehle says he is a natural born ham and loves posing. He obligingly tears up slip-

pers, dons a raincoat, or dashes about the house with a nylon stocking between his teeth, for the sake of "art".

Perhaps an even more unusual occupation is eating for science in the laboratories where dog food formulas are worked out. Several of the makers of canned dog food, for example, maintain kennels where dogs have been fed on the same formula for ten generations. And when the U. S. Department of Agriculture set up standards for certification of the better foods a few years ago, they were able to study not only laboratory records but the dogs themselves to determine that the formulas would keep America's 20,000,000 dogs in sparkling health.

Placed In Zoo

Last, but far from least interesting, on Farley's list of odd canine occupations is pinch hitting for lions and tigers in a zoo. In pre-war days, the Budapest, Hungary, zoo had an animal population of 3,000. However, during the war, the animals were either killed by bombs or slaughtered for food and when the park was reopened, only 14 wild animals remained.

Officials, to enliven the vast park, placed dogs in some of the deserted pens. The dogs proved nearly as big an attraction as the lions, tigers and ant eaters they replaced, and Hungarians visited the zoo in almost pre-war numbers.

The law provides that anyone finding an article must make an effort to locate the owner. It was all very confusing to Noel who kept repeating, "I didn't steal anything."

Noel's attorney was indignant. "He didn't have it broadcast on the radio, either," he said sarcastically.

U. S. Official Defends Ban on BCG Vaccine

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Dr. Robert J. Anderson, chief of the tuberculosis division of the U. S. public health service, defended the government's refusal to license the vaccine BCG, designed to whip tuberculosis.

Said Dr. Anderson: "The controversy about its effectiveness has not been resolved by clinical application."

Furthermore, the vaccine has not met minimum standards for commercial production, he said. "If it is licensed, it will be the most unstable vaccine licensed."

Anderson admitted the vaccine has been used widely in other parts of the world, but said its usefulness probably is confined to "emergency" areas and test programs.

He also pointed out that BCG vaccination money would divert funds from present control programs and treatment of those who now have the disease.

BCG has been in existence many years, but its usefulness has been debated vigorously in recent months.





Man Throws Himself Under Car to Save Wife's Life

SEVIERVILLE, N. C.—A 75-year-old man used his body as a brake beneath the wheels of his automobile to save his wife from a plunge over a mountain cliff and certain death. Mrs. Alonzo A. Fassett said she and her husband had stopped their automobile at an observation point in the Great Smoky mountains near the Tennessee-North Carolina line. While her husband stood outside the automobile watching the sunrise the car began to roll toward a plunging mountain slope. She had not gotten out of the automobile with her husband, she said, because "I couldn't stand to look off from the dizzy height."

She screamed when the car first began to move, but her husband did not hear her. Then, when the vehicle was almost upon him at the edge of the cliff, he noticed the movement and tried to stop the car by shoving on it with his hands.

When that failed to check its progress, he threw himself prone. One of the car wheels crossed his body and the machine stopped as the front wheels struck him.

She was able to scramble from the automobile and get aid from a passing motorist.

Vets Over 40 Years Of Age Are Free Men

AUSTIN — Some men registered under the World War II draft act, now past 40 and 50 years of age, are attempting to advise old local boards of changes of address and status, although these draft boards have been out of existence for

years. As a result, these cards and letters are flooding local boards and Selective Service headquarters.

Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state director of Selective Service, states that "these men no longer have to advise of any change of address or status, as the law under which they registered was terminated by Congress in 1947."

The only men who are obligated to keep local boards advised are those registered under

the Selective Service Act of 1948, which became law on June 24, 1948, the state director pointed out.

"Any man who has registered with Selective Service in 1948, 1949, or 1950 is obligated to advise his local board of address and status changes," General Wakefield said. "Any man who registered with any local board prior to those years is not required by law to do so."

The state director said that every man should ask himself the question: "Should I be registered under the Selective Service Act of 1948?"

The answer, says General Wakefield, is simple. If the man was born on August 30, 1922, or after, he is required to be registered, provided he is not under 18. If he was born prior to August 30, 1922, he is not required by law to be registered under the Selective Service Act of 1948.

Males are required to register on their 18th birthday or within five days thereafter.

FACES DEPORTATION

Former GI Held as Spy

NEW YORK — Frederick E. Bauer, who gave up his French citizenship in 1935 to become a citizen of the United States and a member of this country's armed forces, may give up the fight to stay in this country and be deported to Germany.

Bauer was arrested in 1945 for investigation of charges that he was a German spy. The charges were said to be based on information discovered in Germany.

If he is deported, his wife, Wilma, a native of Rockville, Ind., and their two children, Carmen, 2½, and a son not yet six months old, will also be deported.

Served in U.S. Army

"I have been on Ellis Island with him for three and a half years," Mrs. Bauer said recently. "The children share a room with us. Unless we can get away from there within a few weeks we will have to give up and let them send us to Germany."

"It is like facing death. Even the Germans on Ellis Island called my husband a traitor to Germany. And those Germans, Nazis, were released on parole. Only my husband, who served loyally and well in the army here, was not allowed to be free under bond or on parole."

Mrs. Bauer first met her husband in Indianapolis. They were married on Christmas eve, 1944. He was a sergeant stationed at Fort Benjamin Harrison.

Bauer came to this country in 1930 and five years later became an American citizen. He studied law and was admitted to practice in the federal courts as a patent attorney. He was qualified by the U. S. supreme court.

In 1938 he returned to Germany to work. He related after his arrest that he had been appointed a spy by the Nazis, but that he had tricked them into this solely for the purpose of getting out of Germany. He acknowledged that the Germans had given him \$2,000 and two escorts who put him on a ship in Spain that arrived here in 1941. But he maintained that he never had carried out his assignment.

Joined German Army

By joining the German army, Bauer nullified his American naturalization, the U. S. government charges. The department of justice also insists that in view of his alleged loss of citizenship, he is guilty of illegal entry into the country.

The immigration authorities hold that Bauer should be deported to Germany as an alien enemy. Bauer contends that, even if his American citizenship should be cancelled, he would revert to French citizenship, not German.

"We just can't stand it any longer," Mrs. Bauer declared recently. "If he is deported, his wife, an American, and two children born in this country, will go with him."

Man Ignored 41 Years Makes Big News Now

ASHOKAN, N. Y. — For over 40 years Virgil C. Gordon has carried on at the same job and no one paid much attention to his daily reports.

In those 40 years Gordon has gone down every day into the "still box" beneath the surface of Ashokan reservoir that supplies New York with water and made his readings.

Now, when he makes a reading, every newspaper in New York city wants to know about it. For on those readings depend the future of the city that has suffered a serious water shortage.

He telephones his reports: "Ashokan down eight hundredths of an inch", or "up six hundredths of an inch". The small fractions are vital.

"The newspapers print my reports every day now," he said. "And I'm enjoying getting some attention for a change. I didn't think my job was important. But more and more I get the feel-

DISORDER—DISASTER



According to a recent survey, about 20 per cent of all home accidents are caused by disorder in and about the home. No better start toward eliminating this cause of home accidents can be made than by cleaning up the yard, for, particularly during the warm-weather months, the yard is the locale of many accidents.

You'll be sorry you allowed a rake to be left lying in the grass if you step on it some evening. A touch of antiseptic and an adhesive bandage—one of those ready-to-use dressings with the gauze pad already affixed to the adhesive tape—may take care of the damage; on the other hand, the penalty may be a broken nose.

Other frequent yard hazards are broken glass, boards with projecting nails, rusted toys, broken outdoor furniture. If there is a swing in the yard, check the ropes or chains. True, a frayed rope or worn link may last through the season, but the risk far outweighs the trifling gain.

The final check you should make is of a different kind. If there are healthy, energetic children in the family you have to expect a certain number of minor casualties in spite of all precautions. Make sure, therefore, that the medicine cabinet contains such basic first-aid supplies as antiseptic, burn ointment, gauze pads, roll gauze, ready-to-apply adhesive bandages and adhesive tape.

He explains, "Teen-agers are under pressure all the time—

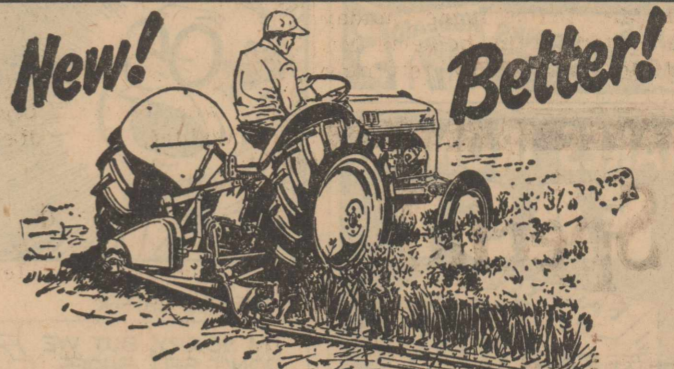

A Great Preacher?

Lesson for August 20, 1950

JESUS SAID of him that there had never been a greater man than John, the Baptist. Certainly there has never been a greater preacher, to this day. He had none of the aids a modern preacher has. He had no song leader, no music of any kind; no church organization, no building, not even a tent. He was not even in a village but in a bandit-infested wilderness. There was little "dramatic" about him or his methods.

Yet he started a tremendous revival, and he won higher praise from Jesus than any other human being received from him.

Dr. Foreman

He called his hearers "generation of vipers,"—snakes' babies, in modern words. He freely admitted he was no Messiah. When on a later occasion he had his doubts about Jesus, he did not conceal them, but told Jesus straight from the shoulder that he questioned him. And Jesus honored his honesty.

And so is a rare article. Those few persons in public life who are willing to speak their minds may make some enemies but they make more admirers. The odd thing is that people cover up their minds for fear they will be unpopular; whereas you will generally find that the candid person does not lack for friends.

Courage
T HAT BRINGS up another quality outstanding in this extraordinary man: his courage. He could stand up to the most prominent citizens and tell them they were sinners, and name their sins.

It doesn't take much courage to say you are a sinner, or to say that any one is. Aren't we all? It takes more nerve to speak out in plain language, as John did to the Pharisees and Herod for example. When he called on men to repent, he meant a specific repentance, not repentance-in-general.

In a southern state there was a prison chaplain at the penitentiary. One of the prisoners had been convicted of stealing funds from the state bank. But he never had admitted his guilt, in court or afterwards. He was stand-offish with the chaplain, though before his conviction he used to be a church officer and a praying man, the chaplain could hardly get next to him.

Finally one day he agreed to pray. As he and the chaplain knelt down together, the prisoner began: "Lord, thou knowest that we are all miserable sinners..." The chaplain stopped him. Leaning over he said to the prisoner: "What are you in here for?" The man was still a moment. Then in a quite different tone of voice he began again: "O God, forgive me for stealing from the State Bank." It was the first time he had ever admitted his guilt. But it took courage on the chaplain's part as well as his own.

Common Sense
ANOTHER QUALITY of John which deserves notice is his simple common-sense. Listen to what he tells the men who come with this question: What must we do? John's common-sense mind knew that repentance, just by itself, is not enough. Repentance is turning from something bad to something good, from wrong to right.

Let the man with two shirts share with the man who has none, he said. Let him who has food do likewise. Let the tax-collector be honest. Let the soldier stop grumbling; even in an "occupied country" a soldier must not be unjust or cruel.

Pointing to Christ
WHAT MAKES John best remembered is that he preached Christ. He is known as the forerunner; he was the man who said of Jesus, "He must increase but I must decrease." The preacher who calls attention to himself is an egotist, a show-off; the preacher who draws men's eyes and hearts to Jesus Christ may himself be small, but his work will be great.

Farm Topics

Self Serving Barn Great Labor Saver

Device Is Most Useful Developed in Years

One of the strangest, and possibly the most useful, agricultural devices developed in recent years is the cattle cafeteria.

The cafeteria is actually two steel Quonset huts, one built inside the other. Between the two, there is a space of about 10 feet. Hay brought in from the field is chopped and blown into the top of the larger

structure. It falls down on the other, settling between the two. When the space is filled, the cafeteria is ready for operation.

A series of gates, hinged at the top, may be raised to feed cattle inside or outside the barn. The slats are spaced just wide enough to admit a steer's nose and are also hinged at the top. As the cattle make pockets in the hay they push against the slats. The constant swinging dislodges more hay from the storage area above and it falls down.

The outside gates provide shelter for feeding animals in cold weather.

According to reports from a farm where the "cafeteria" has been used, 44 beef steers have been fed through an entire winter with a total of four man-hours of labor. Once the storage area was filled, the farmer walked off, his job done for months.

The idea seems especially good for the northwest where winter feeding of relatively small herds is a constant, laborious chore.

Dimethyl Thallate Is Good Chigger Repellent

If you are bothered with chiggers—and most people have been this summer—extension entomologists suggest repellents containing dimethyl thallate as the most effective.

This solution should be applied around the tops of the stockings, or in a band around the ankles. They caution against indiscriminate use because the chemical stains some fabrics.

Once the chigger's got you, treating the affected portions of the skin with 5 to 10 percent solution of benzocaine in alcohol is recommended by T. H. Parks of Ohio State University.

There is no positive method yet devised for treating yards and lawns to eliminate chiggers, but many people have found dusting the lawn with powdered sulphur helps.

Parks suggests using the cheapest grade of sulphur available, and applying it generously to the lawn with a dust gun.

New Ramp

A recent development at the Union Stock Yard in Chicago providing low, wide steps instead of a clear ramp has proved highly successful not only in speedier handling but also in preventing costly bruises. The hogs ascend the steps at least twice as fast as when the old-time ramps were used, and injuries have become rare with this type of equipment.

U.S. Forests One-Fifth Original Size, Report

When Columbus discovered America, nearly half of the land area of what is now the United States was covered by dense primeval forests. Today these forests have been reduced to less than one-fifth their former size. Much of our standing timber today is poor quality second or third growth.

We're still cutting saw timber faster than it grows and further reducing our forests.

Ben Guill Reports To The People

During the last few weeks I have received literally hundreds of letters from the Panhandle asking why the United States

Government persists in coddling Communists at home at the same time that it is sending American boys overseas to fight Communists abroad. This letter is typical:
Dear Congressman Guill:
"While our boys are over in Korea fighting the Communists

we are over here coddling them. I am sick and tired of their insults and slander. Send them to their beloved Russia. Get rid of them any way you want, but get rid of them."
"My two last boys have gone into the United States Navy and I'm proud of them. But I can't stand by and see the very thing they are fighting stand up in our own country and mock us and plot our downfall. I insist that something be done right now."

The letter was signed by a member in Amarillo. I agree with this mother entirely. It's disgusting and bewildering that this government should give aid and comfort right here in Washington to those who wish to destroy us. We have been far too delicate about interfering with the so-called "civil rights" of those who would annihilate all civil rights if they had their way.

The most likely instrument of thwarting Communist infiltration into our Government is the Mundt-Nixon Bill. This Bill would make it obligatory for every Communist in the country to register and would set severe penalties if this regulation were not complied with. It would also make it a serious criminal offense for a Communist to accept or retain a position in the Federal Government or for a Government official to employ a Communist in a Federal position. The Bill would also make it obligatory for Communist front organizations to register and for the members of such organizations to make themselves known to the authorities.

The Mundt-Nixon Bill makes good sense. You would think it would be passed into law by acclamation. But it has had a very peculiar history in Congress. In 1948 the House passed the Bill by a huge majority. However, the Bill never was reported out by the Senate Committee on the Judiciary. Oddly enough the Republicans dominated the Committee at that time but they held up the Bill because there was some doubt about its constitutionality.

The objectionable parts of the Bill were amended and the Bill was re-introduced during the present Congress. The Senate Committee reported it out favorably, by a vote of 12 to 1 seven months ago. That left it squarely up to Democratic Senator Scott Lucas of Illinois, the Senate Majority leader, to bring it up for a vote. Senator Lu-

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cas, acting on Administration orders, has refused to bring the Bill up for a vote. In the meanwhile, the Mundt-Nixon Bill has been locked up in the House Committee for seven months. The hearings were completed seven months ago but there has been no committee action.

The committees are dominated by administration committee chairmen who are almost dictators when it comes to reporting legislation out for action on the floor.

Why has the Mundt-Nixon Bill been kicked around? Because of pressure from special interest groups with bloc votes to deliver. The Political Action Committee of the CIO has been particularly active in defaming the Bill. The argument has been that the Bill would violate "civil rights" and would create a Star Chamber which would be able to persecute anyone who disagreed with it.

Of course, the Bill would do nothing of the sort. It requires that hearings be held on every disputed case. Under the present procedure, the Attorney General, on his own responsibility, issues a list of organizations from time to time which he labels "Communist Front." This is done without any hearings at all. That is Star Chamber procedure, if you will.

Despite the threat of a fifth column within our own government, the powers that be have been playing politics in the face of national disaster. It is my opinion that once the Mundt-Nixon Bill became law you would see hundreds of Reds and fellow-travelers scurrying out of government employment.

Certainly, anyone who plays politics with important legislation such as this is being a bad American. Consider this: the Department of Justice now believes that Russia would not have the atom bomb today if traitors within our own Government had not given the Communists our secrets.

However, it doesn't matter if the legislation is introduced as a Republican or a Democratic Bill. Politics is of small importance, if any, when the fate of the nation is at stake. The important thing is to get the Bill passed as soon as possible.

Some of our most left-wing Congressmen who have opposed the Bill bitterly are now beating their breasts and shouting "Me Too" in favor of the Bill. They have been hearing from the folks back home. The folks back home are angry and they have every right to be.

I've said this before, but one cannot repeat it too often.

This country is in danger. Its danger is worse than at any time in its history. Anybody who can't put the safety and future of this country above politics should be kicked off Capitol Hill. This is no time for partisan politics or bipartisan politics. This is a time for non-partisan Americanism.

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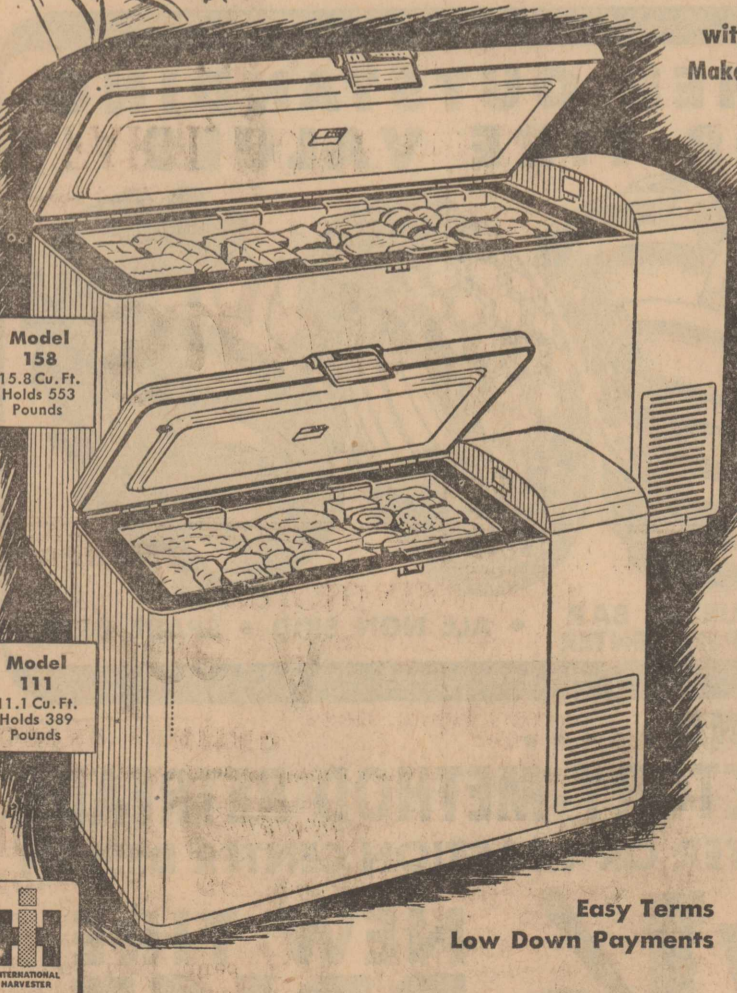
