And we have the bombs to do the job. If the opinion of these authorities is correct, this factor, plus an industrial production potential of near astronomical proportions, has check-

ed Russia for the time being. Another element of strength that is not fully appreciated is the growing efficiency and productive capacity of American agriculture. Food is a mighty weapon and our farms are producing it in record quantities. The magazine Country Gentleman recently described what has been happening on the farm: 'Ever since the end of World War II, farmers have been turning out, year after year, nearly a fourth more than in the year of Pearl Harbor, and it's hard to picture the peaks to which farm output might be pushed under necessity. Leading agricultural scientists now believe that the output of the farm plant of the United States could be doubled by putting to use all the production knowledge we now have.

"Significantly, the great upsurge in farm production during and since World War II came about with only a minor increase in acreage harvested. Furthemore, the gains were made in a period when farmers had fewer workers than prewar."

With all our prodigality, we are demonstrating as never before the achievements attainable by free men. It is these achievements that are now being felt in Korea and that are earning the respect of the other nations, including Russia.

Radioactivity

Death Without Noise

WASHINGTON - An invisible dust of radioactive "death sand" could spread over a city and kill its population by radioactivity without the noisy warning of an atomic bomb says Dr. Louis N. Ridenour, dean of the University of Illinois graduate school.

What would be done would be to collect the debris of smashed uranium atoms from atomic "furnaces" in which fissionable material was being "burned." About a dozen of these fission able products would be useful in warfare.

Very fine sand would be coated with these radioactive poisons and spread very thinly over the area where it was desired to wipe out life.

The person in a poisoned area has no way of knowing that he is in danger either by the evidence of his senses or by any unsophisticated tests. He may receive a lethal dose of radioaction before he knows that he is endangered, and yet a few days later he may die.

FAITH, S. D.-Loren E. Slocum, 79, denies emphatically that he's a hermit, although he has lived eight feet underground for more than 40 years. He takes the position that living underground doesn't necessarily make a man a hermit.

He argues that because he takes a three-mile walk daily from his dugout home on the prairie to nearby Faith he is out of the hermit category. He refuses to divulge what he does call himself.

Slocum is a widely known character of the Faith area. He arrived riding a horse across the plains, pulling an Indian style travois. Nobody knows for certain where he

In 1909, early residents were too busy settling Faith to pay much attention to the eccentric newcomer, but he became the topic of conversation when it was learned he had dug a hole in the open prairie northwest of the town and had moved

Slocum had had three other "homes" since he dug that first hole and all have been underground. His present dugout is a five by eight hole with a trap door leading downward and a three foot smoke pipe protruding skyward.

His few personal belongings are crammed in the small dugout and the rugged old-timer sleeps on a couple of rough boards. During the summer months Slocum cooks on an old-fashioned wood range that

sets on the debris above the dugout. "Some people have said my dugout isn't healthy," Slocum snorts. "But I've lived underground for 40 years and I'm still here and those others have been dead a long time."

The wiry dugout dweller has accumulated 100 acres of prairie land in the 40 years since he first rode into Faith. The land has no building and no life except rabbits, field mice and skunks.

Doctor Finally Presents Counterfeiting 60-Year-Old \$15,120 Bill

WASHINGTON .- Dr. W. Sinclair Bowen finally presented his bill for treatments he gave a woman patient for more than 60 years.

The bill came to \$15,120. Dr. Bowen presented a claim against the \$165,000 estate of the late Mrs. Louise M. Holmead.

For years, Dr. Bowen said, he treated Mrs. Holmead practically for free because he believed she couldn't afford to pay.

When she died she left him \$1,500



Russia Has Largest Army

mightiest army and air forces in the world.

An official estimate made recently by American military men placed Russian strength as of to-

1. An army of 175 divisions ready for combat, and the ability to increase this to 300 divisions within 60 days and 500 in a matter of months. Together with satellite armies, the Soviet can muster 40.000 tanks.

2. An air force "whose strength in nearly categories is now the largest in the world." It includes long range bombers but none with a range as great as this country's

3. The world's largest submarine fleet, including some smorkel submarines able to remain beneath the surface for long periods.

4. The ability to produce an atomie explosion.

Develop New Weapons

To combat this tremendous force, the United States is concentrating its efforts toward the development and production of revolutionary weapons, some of which made their first appearance during the war.

These American military experts contend that scientific advances make it possible to achieve relative security without spending to the point of bankruptcy. But they say this less costly way of matching Russia's military strength will still not be cheap or easy.

America's apparent long lead in atomic bomb production, plus the capacity of the United States air force to deliver the bombs, has been and is now preventing Russia from seizing western Europe.

Among the other sensational disclosures of western military men is their belief that there is now practically a military vacuum in western Europe which invites aggression. And they predict that this vacuum will cause a war if it is not filled by the time Russia has a substantial stock pile of atom bombs and a peak of military strength.

When will that be? Military experts report that no one outside the Kremlin knows, but have estimated it around 1953.

Startling Art Forgery Revealed After 126 Years

LONDON, Eng.—One of the most startling art forgeries in the history of art-probably committed about 1796-has been discovered by the British national gallery.

A recent X-ray of Van Dyck's portrait of Cornelis van der Geest. which hung in the National Gallery for 126 years, has proved that only the head was painted by the master and the rest of the half-length portrait is a forgery.

The painting of the head measured about 15 inches by 13 inches, and the body, painted apparently in the eighteenth century, was added, gallery authorities believe, with the view of selling the picture in England at a higher price.

The forger carefully laid in the wood on which the original head had been painted a larger panel of wood with the brand of the Antwerp Guild, and smoothed them to a continuous surface.

The forged painting was less well done and had to be altered. The painting has been rehung with the forged part hidden by a wide

Dutch frame of black wood.

Twenty-Two Times; She May Walk Again

CHICAGO-Marilyn Kay Howard is just a little girl-only 13 years old-but she has hopes of walking again following a series of rare leg

Her legs have been broken 22 times since she was two years old. She had to quit walking at the age of six. Once seated in a chair, she broke a bone simply by uncrossing her legs too fast.

Marilyn was born with a rare bone condition called osteogenesis imperfecta. It made her leg bones as brittle as matchsticks. By the time she was six her legs had been broken six times.

went a series of rare operations at Illinois Research Hospital. From both of her legs, surgeons removed sections of the main bone between ankle and knee. Then they cut this bone into slices less than an inch thick, threaded the slices into a straight stainless steel rod and put the reinforced bone back into her legs. The legs mended as

expected. So far she has been able to walk only with the aid of crutches or a walking support on rollers. She also wears leather braces, but physicians say all these supports probably can be abandoned in a few weeks.

The brittle bone condition usually clears up at the age of puberty, with the bone growing strong and thicker, physicians report. They expect to remove the steel rods

from her legs if her condition warrants. Already there is X-ray evidence of her leg bones growing

Said Marilyn, "I never gave up hope, but I sure was surprised when they told me I could walk again. It's wonderful."

Russian Soldier Reports Guerrilla War in Soviet

BERLIN-Sgt. Mikhail Kuratsyev, 24, who fled recently into the British sector of Berlin from Russia, reported to officials that a guerrilla war is being fought against Soviet rule in the Caucasus mountains.

Kuratsyev identified the moun tain rebels as survivors of the Chechen and Ingushi peoples who had been deported from their south-

ern mountain homeland to Siberia Kuratsyev said his home is only

five miles from the border of the former Chechen-Ingush autonomous republic, whose Moslem inhabi-

tants were deported en masse. "Some managed to avoid deportation and go into hiding," he said. "During my short visit in the Caucasus, I heard they were at present engaged in guerrilla warfare

in the mountains." He reported them a proud, independent people, adverse to any central authority-czarist or Sovietand they had long been a thorn in the side of the Soviet regime."

May Have Started in Africa

PRETORIA, South Africa -Two skulls found in a cave deposit by Dr. Robert Broom, a noted South African scientist, and his assistant, I. T. Robinson, are regarded by Dr. Broom as among the most important discoveries yet made today solving the problem of human evo-

The skulls are described by Dr. Broom as very large and almost certainly well within the human range. The ear region and the articulation of the lower jaw are typically human, and very unlike those of the gorilla and the chimpanzee, the cheeks larger and wider. The snout, unlike that of the gorilla, is quite short and the front teeth not larger than in man.

Dr. Broom said: "Our recent discoveries have shown that there lived in South Africa-perhaps a million years ago, perhaps more - various tribes of pre-men or primitive men. Some had small brains and some had fairly well developed, quite human brains. In some respects the small-brained are more manlike, in other larger-brained types seem more human. But we can definitely say that both are almost man and it seems highly probable that man originated in Africa.'

Science Says Man Can Live on Bread Alone, if Right Kind

WASHINGTON - Stanford research institute scientists report man can live on bread alone, if it business of farming becomes is the right kind. It must contain all the natural constituents of wheat, clared, and the need for a or have these added to white flour stronger Farm Bureau more ne- before it is baked.

And such bread alone would provide a better diet than that of the average American family today, the scientists reported.

The report was based on extensive experiments with rats, whose nutritional requirements are almost identical with those of humans.

Rats fed only highly fortified white bread grew almost precisely at the same rate and in the same state of health as those fed a mixed diet which, it had been determined necessary constituents.

This was essentially the same bread as could have been made of whole wheat flour. It was only necessary to add water and minute amounts of vitamins A and D.

Rats grown on ordinary bread partly fortified with vitamins, on the other hand, grew at less than one-third this rate and showed various abnormalities. Notable were deficiencies in ability to reproduce.

The experiments demonstrate, says the Stanford report, that "highly enriched bread supplied more of the nutritional factors necessary to well-being than the diet eaten by millions of Americans."

Few Americans, of course, ever attempt to live on bread alone, and Store. the ordinary diet is so varied that there is relatively little obvious dietary deficiency. A diet of which bread constitutes by far the major part, however, is fairly common in some countries where little effort is made to fortify the dough.



So that growers may make er grains with respect to stortheir production plans, the Se- age charges on loan commodities cretary of Agriculture has an- delivered to CCC. nounced that price support on the 1951 wheat crop will be at the same parity level as for the 1950 crop, B. F. Vance, Chairman of the State Production and Marketing Administration Committee, said today. The action was taken in accordance with legislation which directs that support for field crops be announced in advance of the planting season.

Mr. Vance explained that support for the 1951 wheat crop will be at 90 percent of parity but not less than a national average of \$1.99 a bushel. This figure is based upon the latest parity price information available. If parity is higher at the beginning of the 1951-52 marketing year, the support will be increased. While the mandatory price

The boa constrictor is a formidable snake of tropical America, although not in the class of the giant anaconda, or water boa, of central and South America, it reaches a length of 10 to 15 feet.

Since the boa constrictor may be as big around as a man's leg, and weigh 50 pounds or more, one can a transmission wire, and in the case of Panama's 44,000-volt line-vice

The term boa constrictor is often popularly misused for any big snake, ncluding the pythons of Asia and Africa. Properly, the name belongs only to the second largest serpent of the new world tropics. now called by scientists constrictor constrictor.

This constrictor is a non-poisonous member of the reptile family that squeezes or constricts its prey to death. It is a good climber, and sometimes captures birds and small animals by reaching out from a tree or branch around which it has wound its tail.

As the boa constrictor's skin is capable of extraordinary expansion, it can swallow animals of some size; but tales of its devouring large horned deer and grown men are discredited. Actually, it usually avoids humans when possible, and is thus relatively harmless to man, despite the fears of many natives living in

its neighborhood. Docile When Tame

This snake, especially the South American variety, is a handsome one. Its brownish background, shading to brick-red at the tail, is decorated with striking elongated bars of tan, cream and other colors. The Central American specimens are less colorful but larger than those of South America, and have

a reputation for vicious dispositions. When first captured, boas are often savage, the Central America type striking and hissing like steam radiators when approached. Once tamed, however, most of the snakes are docile, and therefore much in demand for zoo and circus exhibition. Sales prices quoted by animal brokers may be eight to 10 dollars

per snake foot. Serpent dealers and exhibitors recall many odd and amusing incidents in handling their unwieldly charges. One collector, transporting two South American boa constrictors to the United States, was required to "brush their teeth," when they picked up a mouth infection. With the aid of several sailors holding the long reptiles down at various points, he was able to use a spare toothbrush to wash out the boas' mouths with healing peroxide. Last fall, Paris strollers, seeking nothing more exciting than a browsing trip along the book stalls of the left bank of the Seine, encountered a torpid 10-foot boa stretched out

Court Room Game Allowed To Answer Poker Question

LYNWOOD, Calif.-Justice of the Peace Ralph C. Dills was all for the experiment. He, like a great many other people, would like to know if poker is a game of chance, or skill.

The judge allowed three men, arrested on suspicion of gambling, to stage a draw poker game in his court in an attempt to prove it's a game of skill.





For Better Fishing

Never invade another's fishing area.

When meeting another angler, particularly in a trout stream, get out and walk far enough around him so as not to scare the fish for a reasonable distance ahead. If he is fishing a pool—stay away from the pool unless it's large enough to fish well beyond his range. Even so, it's good streamside relations to ask whether your own operations will interfere.

When moving in a boat keep reasonably clear of trolled lines or still fishermen. Never invade the extreme casting range of another. Avoid unnecessary noise or other disturbance.

Don't splash or bang rocks needlessly when stream fishing. Don't throw things in the water, even after you've quit a pool. An oncoming angler may have to wait longer than necessary for things to quiet down. At least he'll think so. Don't put down the fish by walking close to a stream's bank unless you're fishing or unless you're sure it won't hinder the operations of another.

When running an outboard, be sure to cut down speed when necessarily passing close to fishermen. Never lessen another's angling opportunity by damaging, needlessly, the fishes' room and board.

The destruction of such cover and food larders as overhanging branches (which may impede your own casting) by cutting; the removal of bankside trees and stumps, logs, rocks, beneficial aquatic vegetation, sod and the like definitely is bad news for the fish. Don't do it. Of course, never pollute either the water used by the fish or the landscape used by the human eyes. Never needlessly cause or contribute to muddy water or cause a waterway to become silted or otherwise choked. Don't obstruct the passage of fish.

Never take more fish than actually will be used.

Let usage, rather than laws, govern the maximum number and minimum size of the fish you take Never unnecessarily injure a fish which may be released. Use a disgorger.

Never cause the introduction of an unwanted species.

Never dump bait pails. The careless or unwitting introduction of yellow perch bait has ruined many a trout water. Young carp often are very hard to distinguish from "shiners."

Tolerate the other angler's point of view or selection of gear.

Be careful with your hook. No Joe is welcome in any boat, for example, if he shows an inclination toward side-swipe mayhem. Learn to cast without endangering others.

Taking ten minutes after the bank-side lunch to plunge fresh-cut willow shoots well into the ground may pay amazing dividends during your own fishing lifetime. There are always ways to improve unproductive water. Often a man can do much in a few hours, especially to help control erosion or to establish cover - or even to improve the beauty of the stream. It's funny how fishing anticipation generally runs much higher on a pretty stream or at least one not unnecessarily messed up by Man. ΔΔΔ

> North Koreans launched one attack in force, its objective the city of Taegu, temporary capital of the South Korean republic and supply terminal for U. N. forces. It failed. In some of the bloodiest fighting of the war, U.S. and South Korean troops smashed the offensive, held Taegu, and then proceeded to smash bulges all along their lines.

One of the most spectacular operations of the Korean battle was the concentrated air attack on an assembly area at Waegwan, involving 98 B-29's each loaded with 40 500pound all purpose bombs. The load was dropped in a rectangle 71/2

miles long and 31/2 miles wide. General MacArthur, commander of United Nations forces, in a report to the security council said: "The ground fighting continues to be of a most savage character." Our outnumbered forces face an enemy with "almost fanatical determination. The whole operation has assumed the character of a major campaign." He went on to ask for troops from other members of the United Nations.

To date the number accepted for action in Korea included Thailand 4,000, the Philippines 5,000, Turkey 4,500, and the United Kingdom 7,-500. It will be several weeks before they can be brought to battle.

Military observers agreed that the picture had changed, but added that it will be "a long and hard winter in Korea."

The department said 72,800,000 acres of wheat may be planted. If ial yields are average, this acreage would produce 1,150,000,000 bushels. This year's crop is estimated at 996,000,000 bushels.

In fixing the wheat support at the highest possible level, Secretary of Agriculture Brannan said:

"We believe the wheat-production and price-support programs have been developed to protect the interests of both producers and con-

The price support announcement had been expected, since Brannan is required by law to announce supports in advance of planting; winter wheat planting starts this month. Only farmers who keep within acreage-allotment limits can get price supports.





Newspaper Advertising Sales Set All Time High

NEW YORK-Newspapers remain the best advertising means according to latest reports.

Newspapers led the nation in advertising sales last year, the Magazine Printers' Ink reports with a total volume of newspaper advertising amounting to \$1,905,000,000, an all time high.

The newspaper percentage was 36.6 of the total with direct mail advertising accounting for the second largest share with 14.5 per cent. The direct mail method was 9.6 per cent higher than last year and amounted to \$755,600,000.

Radio was the third largest segment with 12.2 per cent of the total. Radio advertising amounted to \$633,800,000, an increase of 2.7 per cent over 1948.

Magazines fell behind the previous year by 3.9 per cent. Farm papers advanced .5 per cent, business papers were down 1.1 per cent, outdoor advertising fell .8 per cent, and the miscellaneous group advanced 6.8 per cent.

The survey showed that total volume of all advertising amounted to \$5,202,200,000 in 1949, an increase of 7 per cent over 1948.

Florida Snake Hunters Find 10 Foot 'Baby' Boa

JACKSONVILLE, Fla - A boa constrictor has been captured in Florida according to reports of Dr. W. T. Neill, biologist and college professor.
