

Legumes Place Nitrogen In The Soil

It is possible to put nitrogen in the soil for five cents per pound if it is done by turning under legume cover crops. This information is based on reports

Corn yields rose to 104 bushels an acre on plots where crimson clover had been turned under for the purpose of adding nitrogen to the soil. Yields on plots where no legume was turned under, and on which no commercial nitrogen was applied, were only 50 bushels per acre.

Application of 100 pounds of nitrogen, in commercial fertilizer, raised the per acre yield to 102 bushels but the nitrogen application by this method cost 17 cents per pound. Tests conducted by Texas Experiment trays in the camera's path." Stations have given similar re-

No Ordinary Fence Stays A Small Boy, Court Rules

ST. LOUIS-As every mother knows no ordinary fence can thwart a small boy who wants to climb over it. The U.S. court of appeals has finally decided the same thing.

The tribunal upheld dismissal of a \$100,000 damage suit filed on behalf of 9-year-old Daniel Nolle of Minneapolis, against the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul & Pacific railroad.

The child's mother charged the railroad with negligence after Daniel lost a leg under a freight train in 1948. The suit claimed the railroad should have fenced in its Minneapolis yard.

But the court ruled that "no fence, other than a wholly insurmountable one like a castle wall", would have kept the child out of the rail yards.

Jet Drops Heavy Bombs At 500 Miles Per Hour

LOS ANGELES - For the first time in history, heavy bombs have been dropped safely and accurately from planes traveling at speeds of over 500 miles an hour.

North American Aviation company said bombs weighing from 500 to 4,000 pounds were dropped at altitudes varying up to 20,000 feet from jet-propelled bombers.

The company said that heretofore the highest speeds at which heavy bombs had been dropped successfully from an operational airplane were 350 to 400 miles an hour.

Engineers said the value of high speed bombers was nullified if bombs tumbled or fell erratically, because then accurate bombing was impossible. In the B-45 from which the tests were made the problem of air turbulence, causing bombs to act erratically, is overcome by folding or overlapping bomb-bay doors that slide upward inside the plane. Thus the bomb falls almost directly into the air stream.

New Light Process Found In Secret Luminous Agent

PASADENA, Calif.-Dr. Erwin F. Lowry, chief engineer of the Slyvania Electrical Products company, New York, reports a new electric light process by which glass can be illuminated has been developed.

The specially treated glass, he said, becomes lighted by attachment to two electric wires.

Of the two other basic light processes, he said that the incandescent lamp produces light by means of heated filaments inside a glass bulb, while the fluorescent process utilizes an electronic reaction in a gas-filled tube.



Spider Aviators Travel On Magic Carpets in Fall

Gossamer, the filmy thread spun by tiny spiders, adds a touch of its own to the traditional eeriness of the Hallowe'en season.

Dew-drenched, it spreads in countless cloud-puff coverlets on morning fields of grass, clod, and stubble. Or, borne on the soft air of a mild Indian summer evening, threads of gossamer may combine to form silken scarfs that float hundreds of miles on warm currents.

Gossamer is the vehicle of wingless flight practiced by spiders of many species through ages that man was earthbound. Newly hatched spiders possess an instinct for flight as the means of dispersing from their overpopulated birthplace in order to survive. Few winged creatures can surpass their flying

Climbing to a high point on a clod or blade of grass, the spiderling spins a thin gossamer strand and feeds it into warm air rising from the ground. Inserting an occasional fluffy crimp in the thread for the breezes to waft, the youngster soon has upward pull enough to carry him off. Flight can be somewhat controlled by hauling in or letting out the silk.

Spider aviators, catching trade winds, reach islands in the oceans several hundred miles from shore. They may travel for days before coming to earth.

Soft-Hearted Marine Adopts 9-Year-Old South Korean Boy

KOREA - Soft-hearted marines have done it again. They have adopted 9-year-old Kim Sun Chung whose mother and father were killed by North Koreans somewhere in the battle area.

A few weeks ago he was found by the marines sitting under a bridge near Pusan. He was dirty and ragged, but he was not crying. Korean children rarely cry.

The marines outfitted him with a green T-shirt, cut-down trousers and got him a pair of shoes but they were too big. So now he goes around barefooted.

At first Kim was fed only rice, the traditional Korean staple, but his diet has been gradually changed to regular marine food. Now Kim won't eat rice any more.

He goes through the chow line and like the other marines eats cereal, grapefruit, bacon and eggs. Then he puts his mess gear through three cans of boiling water, just like the others.

Thousands of Korean boys and girls have been made orphans in the war, but Kim is one of the few who have a new home, a foster father, three meals a day and a place to sleep.

During an interview with a war correspondent he was rather quiet, but when Kim is alone with Private Marvin E. Younger of Dixon, Ill., who found him, he sometimes talks of Tarzan and the jungle boy-evidently he had seen them in the movies when he was living at home with

Kim likes Americans and Private Younger would like to take him back to the United States when the war is over. But those who know the technical difficulties think it will not happen. It is going to be tough on Kim, they say, when the Marines have to leave him behind.

Stonewall Jackson Scion Rides to Battle in Truck

MIRYANG, KOREA - In the days of the Civil War, Stonewall Jackson rode forth to war on a horse. The modern Stonewall Jackson, however, rides forth in a truck

A great-great-grandson of the famous general, from Salem. Ore., is a marine now serving in Korea. He saw action in the Kosong-Sachon drive on the south coast but returned to the rear with an infected foot.

When he returned to the front he got a ride on a hard wooden box housing hand grenades. Said the 18-year-old youth, "I'd rather ride a horse.

Youth Trapped Four Days In Strike-Locked Rail Car

CALGARY, Alta. - A Canadian farm youth was trapped in a refrigerator car when that nation's railroads went on strike and was confined 100 hours before rescued. Jack MacDonald, 19, told police he sneaked into the car in hope that it would take him to some outlying farm community where he could get a job as a harvester. Then the strike began and the car was locked and left standing in the

The youth said he spent his time sleeping and beating on the car door. Children playing near the car heard his weakened cries and called police. The youth was sent to a hospital, suffering from exhaustion and exposure.

"Being in the car almost drove me crazy," he said. "At first I became thirsty and hungry, but there was nothing to eat or drink. Then after a while I didn't care any

Death and Taxes Shrink Oilman's 19-Million Estate

NEWPORT, R.I.-If you inherited a \$19,000,000 estate don't think you would get it all. In fact, you would only net about \$2.8 millions.

As an example, the estate of Robert Walton Goelet, an oil magnate who died in 1941, amounted to \$19,-000,000.

But federal taxes took \$11,572, 448; New York state tax \$2,693,096; Rhode Island state tax \$1,269,859; Utah state tax \$2,717; Province of Quebec tax \$6,833; Province of New Brunswick tax \$7,898; administrative expenses \$966,000; appraisers' fees \$250,000.

Then after other minor expenses the amount remaining to the four heirs was \$2,808,615.

Revenue Department Says Bootlegging Up 25 Per Cent

WASHINGTON-Bootlegging is up 25 per cent over last year.

At the end of June 30, the internal revenue commission reported, federal men seized 10,929 illicit stills, compared with 8,008 the year before.

The alcohol tax unit also made 10,209 arrests, 1,294 more than the previous year. Criminal cases terminated amounted to 5,982, with

4,677 cases still pending. The commission said 140,599 gallons of mountain "moonshine", 21,-874 more gallons than during the year before, were confiscated. In addition, 4,892,608 gallons of mash were seized.

High Frequency Sound Waves Used in Gall Stone Illness

A new technique for breaking gallstones by high frequency sound waves has been developed.

Experiments which have been restricted to anesthetized rabbits and a dog, open up the possibility that gallstones may some day be treated without surgery. If gallstones can be successfully fragmented by high frequency sound waves, or ultrasound, the small, broken pieces may then pass into the intestines and be excreted through natural elimination.

(High frequency sound waves are waves which vibrate with a frequency too high to be audible to the human ear).

In these experiments, the ultrasound was introduced through an abdominal incision and directed on the gallstones without damage to the surrounding tissue of the ani-

Thus far, doctors have limited their research to the proof of two basic points: first, that gallstones can be fissured or fragmented by ultrasound; and second, that live animal tissue surrounding the gallstones need not be damaged during the brief exposure to ultrasound.

Traffic Lights in 1914 Abolished as Unnecessary

Traffic signs and signals have become such a necessity in modern life that the National Safety Council has conducted a "Signs of Life" campaign to promote better public understanding of them.

But only 36 years ago an electric traffic signal was a curiosity, not a necessity. The first electric traffic lights were placed in operation in August, 1914, in Cleveland, O. The red and green lights were operated by a policeman in a booth on the corner. After a short time, however, the signals were removed because they were unnecessary.

The next step in traffic signals consisted of towers in the middle of Fifth avenue, New York City, and in Detroit. The lights were not used to guide vehicles directly, but to relay instructions to other towers. The colored lights had different meanings, too. In New York, red stopped all traffic, green meant stop for north-bound traffic, and amber meant go for northsouth traffic.

The first electrically interlocked signal system was installed in Houston, Tex., in 1922. Nine intersections were controlled from a central point.

The red and green lights finally used in controlling street traffic were adopted from the signals al-ready in use by the railroads.

Chicago Man **Earns Country's Gadget King Title**

office that combines the chaos and quaintness of a toy shop, hock shop and antique shop, Robert Kahn reigns as the country's gadget king.

Surrounded by a display of gadgets and novelties that overrun his office's filing cabinets, book shelves and window sills, 41-year-old Kahn helps chart the course of the nation's multi-million dollar gadget

Kahn, whose gadget interest stems from his youth, has had a long-time flair for designing and marketing items that usher in the nation's fads and crazes. It was Kahn who flooded the country a few years back with the tiny Swiss weather houses that found their way into millions of

The popularity of the weather forecasting house had long languished in this country. During the war when the government restricted weather reports, Kahn figured people were still interested in information on the elements. On a hunch he purchased some rejected rifle butts from the government and contracted with a manufacturer to fashion them into weather houses. Kahn's clairvoyance paid off more than a million dollars.

Inkless Straight Pen

Before the weather house venture, Kahn invented a straight pen that proved a bonanza to students. It wrote with water and eliminated all mess and smudge that went with ink pens.

Surrounded by several dozen other gadgets on a window sill in his office, where he is owner of a Chicago advertising agency, Kahn displays one of the most amazing of present day toys, a talking doll. The doll, with an internal phonograph er as articulately as an actress. Talking dolls have been on the market for years, but they have not reached the level of articulateness attained by Kahn's.

Now, to add to this hodgepodge of wizardry and wonderland known as the gadget industry, Kahn has concocted the ultimate in gadgets. The "Telzall," as he calls it, is truly a Rube Goldberg device. Worn on the wrist like a watch, it combines nine utilitarian items that for years individually have been stock pieces in scouting and camping paraphernalia.

The "Telzall," in addition to telling time by a sun dial, predicting weather and providing users with a magnifying glass and compass, contains a ball point pen, tape measure, signaling device, and charts of the Morse code and the contellations. This fantastic compact ensemble is little larger than an ordinary wristwatch.

In all, Kahn has marketed about 200 gadgets. "Telzall" and the inkless pen are inventions of his own. Kahn's other items come from old ideas which he has polished up and renovated. Kahn dusts off old ideas with a Midas touch that turns them to gold. Such was the phenomenal success of his weather houses, that five million of them were sold.

Sells His Ideas Kahn doesn't manufacture novel

ties himself. He sees the possibilities in an item and then endeavors to sell it to a manufacturer. He tussled with more than a half dozen companies before he could convince one of them of "Telzall's" utility,

Most of Kahn's gadgets are sold by mail order. In 1948, Kahn handled three million dollars worth of auto seat covers by direct mail. The previous year he mailed 150,000 "friendship" rings at \$2.95 apiece. And last year's mail orders on 24inch dolls exceeded the number of similar dolls sold by Sears, Roebuck and Company.

Affable Bob Kahn, who is to gadgets what Henry Ford was to the automobile, maintains there is always need for something useful. If a push button novelty saves time and effort and gets a few laughs, it serves a purpose, says Kahn.

Increased Use of Tobacco Noted in United States

WASHINGTON - The agriculture department reports the recent jump in cigarette prices may cost smokers in the U.S. an extra 125 million dollars in the year started July 1.

The department also reported that a record probably would be set in tobacco purchases of all kinds because of high employment and income levels. It said the nation's smokers consumed 335 billion cigarettes in the year ended June 30, a new record. That was some three billion more than in the previous

Despite the record consumption, total manufacture of 383 billion cigarettes was about seven billion less than in the previous year, due to the smaller output for export, the report said.

The department said five and a half billion cigars were smokedabout 3½ per cent fewer than in each of the two preceding years. It added, however, that the cigar demand is expected to pick up in the last half of this year.

New Cortisone Treatment Cuts Cost for Arthritis Sufferers, Doctors Report

Newark, N. J. - What is proving to be a revolutionary new development in the treatment of rheumatoid arthritis was disclosed in a report just published in the Journal of Clinical Endocrinology.

Five scientists discovered that when insulin, the drug used in diabetes, is given simultaneously with cortisone, very much smaller doses of cortisone than heretofore used may be effective. This combination was reported to produce the same degree of relief in arthritis as when cortisone is used alone in the customary large doses.



Hospital tests, under Schering grant, brought good news for arthritics

The new treatment reduces the quantity of the scarce new "mira-cle drug" used. Thus, the method enables the doctors to cut the cost per day for treating hospitalized arthritis patients with cortisone from \$12 to as little as \$3 each, the report said.

Cortisone is the adrenal com-pound reported by Drs. Hench and Kendall, of the Mayo Clinic, a little more than a year ago as producing spectacular improve-ment in rheumatoid arthritis. Its use in medicine has been handi-capped, the scientists explained by its potential dangers and the

extremely high cost of treatment.

The principle of using insulin together with cortisone was developed by Dr. Edward Henderson, Director of the Clinical Research Division of Schering Corporation, Bloomfield, N.J., and basis of animal and laboratory experiments conducted at the College of Physicians and Sur-geons of Columbia University by third member of the team, Dr. Harry Seneca.
The research workers have stated that the new method does not merely cut the cost of treat-ment to one-half or less, but also

Twelve patients with typical rheumatoid arthritis were hospitalized in the St. Barnabas Hospital at Newark, N. J., for this study. Some were early cases and some were chronic of 20 years standing with far advanced arthritis.



Gives Tips For Handling **New Foods**

Old style, palate tickling, succulent smoked hams like you used to prepare for special Sunday dinners are giving way to the tenderized and ready-to-eat

Increased danger of spoilage comes with the change, Health Officer Geo. W. Cox says. Used to be you could salt down a ham, then home-smoke it slow and easy. When done, you could hang it on the back porch easily accessible for quick slice.

Those days are fast waning, for city bound folks. Ask your butcher for a smoked ham nowadays, and you get two choices: "tenderized", or "ready-to-eat." They look the same, and have some of the old sweetness. But there the similarity ends, Dr. Cox says.

Since less preservative salt is used in the smoking process, today's ham products have to be placed under immediate refrigeration, the same as any other meat.

"Tenderized" hams are smoked at a temperature of approximately 129 degrees. Dr. Cox says that means they have to be cooked before eating in order to kill any trichina larvae that

may be present. "Trichina larvae, which cause trichinosis, are killed at a tem-perature of 137 degrees F." the officer cautioned.





Newcastle Disease A veterinary medical bulletin re-

ports that research veterinarians in Egypt have had encouraging results with a vaccine treatment for chickens sick with Newcastle disease. The treatment is credited with rethe technique would be useful against the American form of this disease. Egyptian investigators also have found that they can save the lives of many infected chicks simply by good nursing and handfeeding. Due to the weakness and nervousness accompanying a Newcastle attack, many chicks are unable to get to feed and water troughs under their own power. The result is that some of them die of starvation and dehydration rather than from the effects of the disease.

Sound Waves in Liquid What happens when high-powered sound waves are turned on a mixture of materials in a liquid? Plenty, according to Alfred Weissler of the naval research laboratory. The vibrations of the sound waves push individual molecules of the liquid back and forth a million times a second with a force 250,000 times that of gravity. 

Bees Engaged in Building Record Honey Pot for 1950

The honey pot of the nation is again full to overflowing. A prelimnastitis, as they do against certain | inary report of the U.S. department of agriculture estimates that nearly 230 million pounds of honey will be harvested from the beehives of the nation this season, the second largest crop on record. In addition, the 500 billion bees were sufficiently busy during their short lives so that they gathered from the flowers of the fields and trees sufficient nectar to produce an added 500 million pounds of honey or more to take care of their own needs. It takes a lot of honey to feed the baby bees which come along so rapidly when individual queens can lay 1500 eggs a day and keep that job up day after day without even asking for one day off in seven.

> Leading areas of production this year are the north central states, notably Minnesota, Iowa, Ohio and Michigan, which produce light-colored delicately-flavored honey from clover and sweetclover; and the Western area, including California, Texas, Colorado, Wyoming and Idaho, with a wide range in flavors from aromatic orange and thistle to full-flavored alfalfa and cotton. However, bees are to be found in

every county in the country, and the 500,000 beekeepers of the nation are scattered very widely.

In 1949 a much greater appreciation has been evident than formerly of the value of bees in pollination, and thousands of colonies have been placed in or near fields of alfalfa or other legumes for which honevbees are rapidly becoming the principal means of pollination. Although native ground-nesting bees are not quite in the class of the buffalo and the mourning dove in scarcity, clean cultivation along fence rows and the increasing use of insecticides are so rapidly reducing their numbers that they can no longer be depended upon for the efficient pollination which they once performed for the legume



Brown shoes can be dyed black temporarily if you just polish them twice with a good grade of black polish.

If a pair of new shoes feel as though they're going to rub blisters on your heels, beat them to the punch by putting strips of adhesive tape on your heels before the blisters arise, instead of after. That should keep them from arising at all.

You can brush out the cuffs on men's trousers easily if you take out the stitches holding the cuff and replace them with metal snaps. From then on, unsnap the snaps, brush, then snap the snaps.

It's a cinch to get rid of the stuff that blue serge picks up. Take a large piece of adhesive tape and rub the sticky side of it over the serge.

To dye white shoes black, try using quick-drying black enamel paint. It often wears better than liquid or paste dyes and doesn't rub off so easily.











Ratio of Elders Doubles in Century

The ratio of elders to those at the main working years of life has doubled in the United States during the past century, and has increased by nearly two thirds

One hundred years ago there were only about six persons at age 65 or older for each 100 of the population at 20 to 64. By 1900 the ratio had climbed to eight, and since then it has risen even more rapidly and is now 13.

Although the segment of the population at 65 or over has been increasing, the relative importance of the dependent population as a whole has declined, due to a rapid drop in the ratio of children to the population at the main productive ages. The number of children under 18 per 100 persons at ages 20-64 has been cut in half, from 107 in 1850 to about 54 in 1950.

In very recent years, however, due to the war and postwar spurt in the birth rate, this trend has been reversed and the child population has increased at a more rapid rate than people at ages 20-64. This will continue for at least a decade, even if allowance is made for a steady decline in the birth rate from its present level, and at the same time the population at the older ages will continue its long-term upward climb.

As a result, we are entering a period when the country will have to provide for the expanding social and economic needs of both its large child and aged populations, each growing at a faster rate than the population at the main work





Authority on Termites Catalogs 1,932 Species

A complete catalog and revision of the termites world has been issued by the Smithsonian institu-

It lists a grand total of 1,932 species of these wood-eating insects, known chiefly to the general public as pests but to students of insect behavior as among the most remarkable examples of social evolution. The work is by Dr. Thomas E. Snyder of the department of agriculture's bureau of entomology and plant quarrantine. Dr. Snyder is among the world's foremost authorities on termites. He not only has made extensive collections but has studied the habits and control of the insects through most of the

western hemisphere. The catalog gives the "white ants"—a bad misnomer—a new family tree, and several hitherto unknown and living and fossil genera and species are listed. The wood eaters are most closely related to the cockroaches and thus can trace their lineage to the earliest known insects that swarmed in the ancient forests at least 25,000,-000 years ago. The termite order itself is at least 30,000,000 years old and has undergone extensive evolution, although some of the most primitive forms still are in

Superficially the termites resemble ants-their most devastating enemies. They seem to have followed parallel lines of evolution, both in body form and in their remarkable social organization.
