

# UN Flag Unfurled Tuesday

The flag of the United Nations was raised with Old Glory on the front corners of the American Legion Hall Tuesday morning in a flag raising ceremony in which members of all the churches, civic and patriotic organizations participated.

Peals of the church bells followed by music of the church chimes heralded the opening of the program. Stratford's High School Band, under the direction of Dan Whitaker, played "America," and "America the Beautiful."

Mrs. T. F. Baskin, Jr., Mistress of Ceremonies, expressed appreciation of the home demonstration club ladies and others taking an active part in promoting the program, to the citizens who gathered in anticipation of better citizenship for the United States and in becoming members of the United Nations.

Rev. H. A. Nichols, offered a prayer for peace, and introduced Clyde Aly, minister of the Church of Christ, who closed the prayer service.

Mrs. Baskin described the ceremony as a means of developing the desire of United States citizens to be better citizens of the United Nations. Each nation, according to its strength, must contribute to the success of the United Nations, and America must assume a large share of those responsibilities. "There Shall Be Peace" was the theme of the fifth anniversary observance of the founding of the United Nations organization, as a mandate for its aims.

Mrs. T. L. Wakefield, a representative of Sherman County Home Demonstration Club ladies, presided at the presentation of the UN flag by Mildred Bennett and Stanley Folsom, 4-H club members, to Jimmie Jackson, VFW representative, Mike Burgess, American Legion representative, and Sonny Judd, Boy Scout representative, who raised the new flag while Leon Guthrie, Don Tusha, and Donnie Jacobs raised Old Glory.

Rev. John Reaves read the roster of the 59 nations who are members of the United Nations.

R. C. Buckles, President of the Sherman County Farm Bureau, introduced Hershel Coffee, professor of government and social economics at West Texas State College of Canyon, who delivered the principal address.

Hershel Coffee spoke of the occasion as one the citizens of the United States should approach in humility, avoiding arrogance, for the United States is virtually the leader of the 59 nations comprising seven-eighths of the population of the world. It is the purpose of this organization, he said, to establish world peace, security, and well being, and the aspirations of the people must not fail.

There are nations who seek to rule by violence, placing the state in unlimited sovereignty above the consideration of the people. This has involved military combat.

We live in a country which disallows the rule of force but do not enjoy that type of government on an international scale. Anarchy is the absence of order. Order is government. The United Nations organization is our only hope for a world government, the speaker said. There has been no world unity for approximately 1,500 years since the fall of the Roman Empire.

Disarmament treaties were attempted at the close of World War I. Collective security planned at the close of World War II did not succeed. It is the hope of those contributing to the purpose of the United Nations that it will maintain peace through the principles of justice and international cooperation in solving problems. The organization is also for the purpose of encouraging respect for human rights and fundamental freedoms. It is the center for harmonizing the actions of the nations, and a place to discourage suspicion and ignorance. It will be the purpose of the United Nations to talk out solutions instead of fighting them out for a settlement of differences.

Progress may be slow, and we may experience many disappointments in attaining these objectives in the United Nations. We have experienced many of those problems in our own government, Coffee said.

"God give us guidance as a nation that our leadership may enable less fortunate nations to enjoy the future," was the closing remarks of Hershel Coffee. A choir, composed of singers from the various churches, sang the "Song of Peace," led by Walter M. Pendleton, while the Stratford High School Band furnished accompaniment.

# Sheppard Views Government Expenditures

B. F. Sheppard, advertising manager of the Amarillo Times, reviewed government expenditures, and advised the close study of the cost of government at the Lions Club luncheon at the Palace Cafe Monday night.

After several minutes of humorous comment, Sheppard began his talk with the Biblical quotation, "A Living Dog Is Better Than a Dead Lion." We must justify our existence and no organization is stronger than its weakest link, the speaker told the organization.

There are few minutes of the day we do not think of money. Texas tax payers will feel the pinch of higher taxes through the spending program of the state government and the increased spending of the federal government. Sheppard reviewed the findings of the Hoover Commission in investigating the red tape and confusion of the federal government. Sixty-seven recommendations of the commission have been at least partially adopted, saving the tax payers approximately two billion dollars.

Sheppard viewed the Texas Economy Commission for which money is being raised at the present time as a money saving program in the reorganization of state government. Citizens of every section who are familiar with the process of state government have been appointed to study problems for the purpose of reorganization of state government. With higher income taxes, the increase of federal expenditures in additional tax money, it is necessary for economy in government, the speaker said. Several citizens from this district have been named to the Texas Economy Commission. Listen to their reports for the answer for securing more services for less money. Were it not for the productivity of this country, it would not exist today.

Nine months ago there were 816 divisions of the federal government employing two and one-half million people. Each individual citizen share of the national debt before the war in Korea was \$7,500.00. There has been no improvement in the accounting system of the federal government since it was instigated in the time of Alexander Hamilton, Sheppard said. Procedures of red tape in 1948 have cost as much as \$3,000,000 for processing items which originally cost only \$10.00. The Bureau of Ships is financed by 27 allocations which are made 12 times during the year. This allows very little opportunity for either economy or a business-like building program.

The Postal Department was recently ordered to cut down expenses, yet Congress voted not to increase first class mail rates and not to discontinue special delivery mail which has operated in the red for many years. The Texas Economy Commission will soon have necessary funds to begin its work. It is not the intention of the commission to reflect on any one, but to secure facts in order that government expenditures may be cut to such an extent that citizens may maintain their high standard of living.

We must not lose sight of our freedoms, we must keep our feet on the ground, and we must not allow the boys in uniform to forget what the present war is all about, Sheppard said in closing.

Vice-President Alfred Pronger presided at the meeting in the absence of President W. O. Bryant. Walter M. Pendleton led the opening song with Mrs. Pendleton, club sweetheart, at the piano. The song was followed by members repeating the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

Jimmie Forrest, Lautz, and Rev. Howard Curtis, Fort Worth, Texas, were introduced as visitors. Marvin Seaman was introduced as a new member of the club. Rev. M. E. Upchurch gave the invocation.

Rev. H. A. Nichols announced the meeting of the City Laymen's League for 7:30 P. M. in the Methodist Church Thursday night. A meeting of the executive committee was announced for 7:00 o'clock.

Frank Golladay and J. D. McDaniel were appointed program chairman for Monday night of next week. Kenneth Kendrick and Cone Donelson were named program chairmen for the Ladies night program.

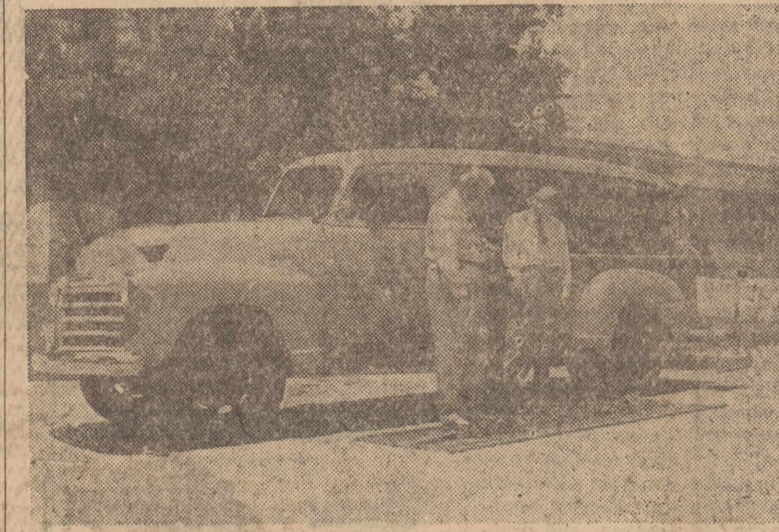

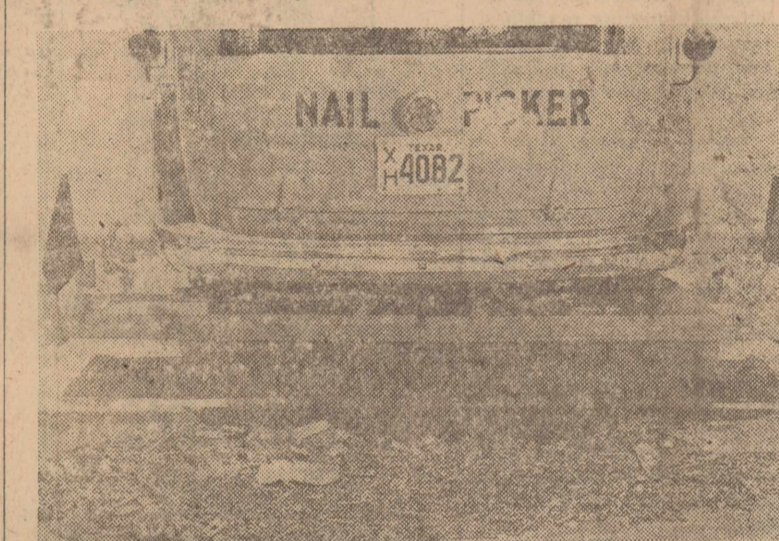

## Nail Picker Will Remove Nails From Sherman County Highways



A magnetic nail picker of the Texas Highway Department has been routed to the Amarillo district and will appear in Sherman County in the near future to remove nails and metal objects from the highways. It will be the first time this type of equipment has been used in the county for several years.

The magnetic nail picker will sweep the highways and road shoulders in this area of metal objects. F. S. Bailey, State Highway Engineer, points out to John Nations, Director of the Equipment division, the screws, nails, spikes, and other metal collected on a short run. Joe Webb of San Angelo is the driver.



Electric magnets at the rear of the nail picker collect loose metal objects. The magnets are activated by a large generator in the bed of the truck and are strong enough to pick up manhole covers. Gathered in this pile of scrap metal are 2,000 potential punctures.

## Telling A Story Of Poppy Day

## Cattle Grubs Expensive Parasites

Damage caused by cattle grubs each year in Texas exceeds \$20 million. Beef cattle producers and dairymen can do something about these losses and this is the time of the year when control measures must be used.

According to J. A. Deer, assistant extension entomologist of Texas A. & M. College, the cattle grub has a rather complicated life cycle. The heel fly which is the adult of the cattle grub emerges in the early spring. They lay eggs on the hair about the dew claws of cattle. The eggs hatch in a short time and the young grubs enter the skin then tunnel through the connective tissue of the animal's body until they reach the gullet of the animal. After spending some time in the gullet, the grubs move again through the animal tissues up to the back of the animal and here they cut a hole through the skin and form a cyst.

The grubs move into the back of the animal late in the fall, from September to December and after about 30 days, completes its development, emerges and drops to the ground. The grub enters the ground where it undergoes the change from a grub to the heel fly. The only time, says Deer that effective control measures can be used are while the grubs are in the animal's back and rotenone is the only insecticide that is effective.

For the small herd owner, the dust method of application will probably prove to be the most practical. A five percent dust should be used. The backs of the animals should be scrubbed with a stiff brush to knock off the scabs that cover the grub cysts. Dust the powder over the animal's back and rub it in so the dust will get into the grub holes. Treatment should begin about two or three weeks after the first grubs appear and Deer says to repeat the treatments three times at intervals of three weeks.

For the large herds, dipping or spraying is the most practical method to use in applying the rotenone. The dip or spray should contain seven and one-half pounds of five percent rotenone for each 100 gallons of water. Deer says if you spray the cattle, use a cattle chute. The sprayer should deliver at least 200 pounds of pressure and the nozzle should be held within four inches of the animal's back. You should use approximately one gallon of spray per animal.

Regardless of whether the dipping or spraying method is used, Deer points out that three treatments should be used at three week intervals. Controlling the grubs now will break the life cycle of the parasite and thus will eliminate the egg laying heel flies next spring. The annual loss can be reduced and livestock producers will profit from marketing grub free cattle.

### Newsmen Hunting For Ghost Report Something Found

LOCK HAVEN, Pa.—Maybe you believe in ghosts and maybe you don't, but a reporter and a photographer for the Lock Haven Express, who checked on a legend that the headless Frenchman of Kettle creek still roams those parts, won't say yes or no.

Legend has it that the ghost belongs to a French explorer who robbed a secret cave of Indian silver some centuries ago. The Indians, it seemed, avenged their loss by beheading the Frenchman.

Reporter Pete Stevenson and photographer Jim Patterson set out to track down the ghost. On a chilly, misty night they parked their car near a bridge spanning Kettle creek at Road Hollow. As they sat waiting, the only sound filling the night air was that of the distant pounding of a gas well drill working the night shift.

Suddenly a flickering, wavering form reared up less than 100 feet away. They edged toward the reddish white figure for a better look. A sound like that of a low, almost painful, moan could be heard. The figure glided away, up the bank and onto Road Hollow. It moved quickly in the faint moonlight. They ran to keep it in sight, but the headless Frenchman was gone.

Some say the Frenchman still roams the wilds of Clinton county looking for his head.

Some scientifically inclined folk scoff at the legend. They say the moan is nothing but methane gas seeping from crevices. A forest ranger offered the suggestion that the ghostlike figure is caused by glowing phosphorus clinging to moss and rotten logs in the damp woods.

And then there's the story of the silver. Woodsman Harry Walters showed Stevenson and Patterson a piece of silver the size of a golf ball. He said he found it in the woods. And there's a lot more of the Indian silver around, he said. Disbelievers had an answer for that too. They suggest it's some manner of ore that has become silverized over the years.

Maybe so, and then again, maybe not.

### Toothpick Goes Glamorous With Colors, Flavor

MERRILL, Wis.—The toothpick has gone glamorous, taking on colors and flavor.

The Merrill Woodware Co. was in need of greater market. The answer was found in red, green and blue toothpicks and mint flavors added.

They were first exposed to a market in the south and were such a success they will appear nationally. To all appearances the firm is going to have the biggest year in its 45 year history, thanks to the new twists on an old stand-by.

Since the firm was purchased by W. D. Brown, Jr., in 1948, the emphasis has been on more toothpicks. The firm has spent \$50,000 in developing and constructing in its own shops the intricate machinery required to produce 15 to 20 million toothpicks a day.

**Largest Manufacturer**  
In 1950 the firm will stamp out 125,000 cases of toothpicks (30,000 to a case) for the world market, compared to 20,000 cases last year.

The big production gain will make the firm the nation's biggest toothpick maker. One reason, and probably the main one, is the firm's new and unique machinery which can stamp out toothpicks hundreds at a time from clean, straight basswood "ribbons."

Buying only top class basswood, the firm cuts it into two foot lengths which are then shaved into "ribbons" a little thicker than a toothpick and a little wider than a toothpick is long. The ribbons are fed into dies on the stamping machines, which punch out flat toothpicks. These are cleaned and polished, then dried before coloring and flavoring.

**Flavor is Added**  
As the toothpicks move down the drying platform, they are jiggled and bathed in moving air until they are dry enough to set off a delicate tilling mechanism. This drops them into a sorting and rejection machine.

Flavor is added in a separate soaking and drying operation. In addition to the packaged retail toothpicks, the company also packs large cartons of loose toothpicks for carload sale. Four such cars this year were sent to markets in China, Japan and other eastern countries.

"You'd be surprised how many

people still use toothpicks as toothpicks," said Frank Schuster, manager of the firm's Tomahawk plant. "But a great deal of them are used for food preparation and handling, such as at parties. People like the colored models. They help to brighten up a table."

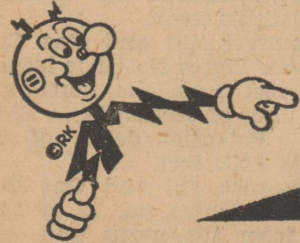

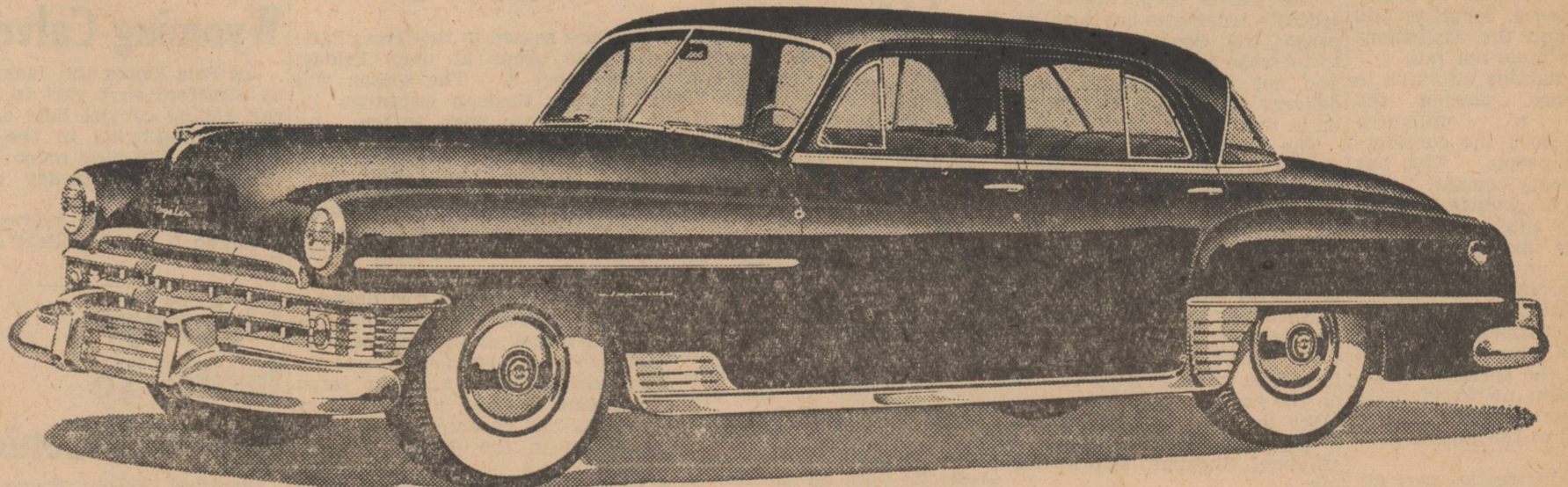

**Family Keeps Good Luck Coin For Over Century**

GERMANTOWN, Wis.—The Kenney family has kept one good luck coin for over a century. During that time it has been rattling around in the pockets of Kenney family members.

The coin was minted in 1818. Its early history has been lost but members of the family know that it was carried more than a century ago by John Blake Kenney, Washington, Pa. After his death, his son, Preston F. Kenney, also of Washington, carried it. When he died, it came into the possession of John F. Kenney of Germantown who has carried it for 35 years.

The coin is slightly larger than a present half dollar. Its edge is not milled, but has the words "Fifteen Cents or Half a Dollar" stamped into it. It may be significant, or it may not, but the figure of Liberty on the coin seems a bit plumper than she does on the coins of today.

**Lightning Turns House Into an Electric Toaster**

UNITY, N. H.—Lightning entering the home of Russell Schultz through the electric lines, turned the house into an electric toaster.

The first indication that there was something wrong came to Mr. Schultz when he tried to get out of bed. An electric shock threw him back again and again as he placed his feet on the floor.

Finally, he reached the cellar in heavy rubber-soled shoes. He was tossed several feet when he threw a master switch. The lights stayed on. His wife was knocked across the kitchen when she brushed against an oil stove.

"All the wires in the walls were overheated," Mr. Schultz said. "About 2,300 volts of electricity were coming into the house instead of the usual 110."

Electric company officials broke the circuit. Linemen reported lightning was the cause.

**Greeks Had Night Life**

NEW YORK, N. Y.—Prof. Oscar Broner, who will teach at the University of Chicago this year, reported recently that excavations reveal that ancient Corinthians had a gay night life.

Thirty-three taverns have been discovered. Wine jars, mixing bowls, drinking cups, dice and flutes played by the famed Corinthian girls—1,000 of them according to the Roman writer Strabo—indicate, the professor remarked, why the ancient Greeks regarded Corinth as the Paris of their time.

The tools for merrymaking are among the objects that have been recovered from the wells of the taverns into which the Romans hurled them in 146 B.C. when they sacked the city, killed the men and sold the women and children into slavery.

**New Device Keeps Food Fresh for Many Years**

CHICAGO—A new device that keeps food fresh for years has been demonstrated to the American chemical society.

It is a sterilizing gun that keeps raw or cooked meats and vegetables fresh and appetizing for at least four years.

It fires electrons, negatively charged particles. It does its sterilizing job in a millionth of a second.

Meat, fish, vegetables, fruits and dairy products are sterilized without changing their enzymes, chemical agent that promotes life processes.

The enzymes once were thought, erroneously, to be the cause of spoiling food. The electrons kill the tiny organisms that cause spoilage.

The foods have stayed fresh and tasty, in sealed containers, for as long as four years so far. The electron bombardment is done with a machine called a capacitor.

The electron treatment also can sterilize drugs and produce effective vaccines. One vaccine made this way is highly potent against rabies. The beam of electrons kills the virus causing the disease, but does not damage the virus' ability to produce antibodies.

**Whale**

**Hitchhikes a Ride**

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif.—The near catch of the year was made recently by Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Campbell. A 30-foot whale hitchhiked a ride on their yacht.

The Campbells were sailing their cabin cruiser off Pebble Beach when the whale plopped itself aboard, nearly sinking the craft.

"We were watching a school of fish playing around the boat when a gigantic wave rose just ahead," Mrs. Campbell said. "My husband was at the wheel. I braced myself against the side of the cabin and thought, 'This is the end.'"

Then they felt a "terrible impact."

"It was like a complete blackout," Campbell said.

The Campbells looked out the window and saw the whale twisting on the deck.

"We couldn't judge how long it was on the boat because it flopped off right away," Mrs. Campbell said.

During its brief visit the whale splintered the stern deck, ripped an awning with its tail, smashed a bulwark in front of the cabin and ripped up the port side deck.

The Chinese kept the secret of the silk-making process from foreigners for 3000 years.

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
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**Cup Dedicated**

Drinking cups include one with an inscription dedicating it to the cure of hangers through the powers of the spirit Pausikrepalos. There is no trace, however, of the morning after prescription. Other cups are dedicated to health, peace, love, safety and Zeus the savior.

On the soft earthenware of one container is scratched the romantic salutation, "O you who returned long after I have ceased to expect you."

The dice are six-sided, each side bearing the name of a god or spirit such as Aphrodite, Demeter, or Zeus. Prof. Broner said the workmen, who found 60 of the well-worn bones in a single well, promptly fell to rolling them.

The ancients played on marble topped tables, and one of them has been found. Cut into it is a description of the various dice throws. Another has a silver coin glued to it.

It was among these tables, archeologists think, that there circulated the Corinthian girls known as "sacred slaves." As servants of Aphrodite, these young women also played a part in the religion of the city. Actually they were trained entertainers in the manner of Japanese geisha girls.

**Gay Night Life**

Corinthian night life, carried on by the light of oil burning earthenware lamps, with its girls, gaming and drinking, centered in an open colonnade 80 feet wide and 500 feet long at the southern end of the market place. Along the front of the colonnade stood a row of 100 bronze statues of such artistic value that they were carried off by the Romans—the excavators have found only the pedestals.

In the rear of the colonnade were the 33 taverns. They were built of stone covered with fine stucco brightly painted and equipped with a system of plumbing that would be the envy of many a modern Greek tavern.

The lower floor of each tavern was divided into two 16-foot square rooms. The front rooms had wells 40 feet deep connected at the bottom with a channel of fresh running water in which milk, meat and wine could be kept cool. It is the only system of the kind ever found in Greece.

**Housewife's 'Bottle Note' Cheers Up Yanks in Korea**

COLLINGSWOOD, N. J.—Mrs. Elsie B. Pearce, a young housewife, mailed a letter recently addressed "for a soldier at the front who has not received mail." She wrote it on an impulse and the response has been wonderful.

She said she had received eight letters from soldiers on the Korean battle front showing how avid the GI's were for a friendly message from home.

The young housewife had enclosed a photograph of herself in her letter and had written: "This is something like putting a note in a bottle and sending it out to sea."

Her picture and written message ended up on a bulletin board at army headquarters in Korea.

A corporal wrote: "It helps to know that someone cares about our loneliness over here."

Another honcom expressed the hope that more persons "would take the interest in some of these boys that you have, because some of them are so young that they hadn't been away from home before they joined the army and now they seem lost without news from anybody."

**4,000-Year-Old Skeleton Found in Bronze Age Site**

SINGEN, Germany—A human skeleton, that of a woman, believed to be 4,000 years old, has been found near Singen and is proof of human settlement there from the early stone age to shortly before the Roman conquests.

The discovery was made near Lake Constance, together with the excavation of 10 other ancient graves.

According to experts, the excavation sites are the only ones in central Europe through which human history since 4,000 B.C. can be traced with continuity.

The 4,000-year-old bronze age skeleton was buried in a sitting position, facing east and had a ring, necklace, a large needle and two ankle hoops, all made of bronze, with her in the grave.

The other burial places revealed urns dating back 3,000 years.

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**Chimpanzee Learns To Ask for 'Mama'; Gives Bronx Cheer**

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. — Dr. Keith J. Hayes of Yerkes laboratories of primate biology, Orange Park, Fla., reports he has a chimpanzee that can speak.

Viki, says Dr. Hayes, can give whispered versions of "mama," "papa" and "cup"—and can exchange a Bronx cheer with you. The three-year-old chimp "has been raised as a child in our home," Hayes told the scientific world.

But he said the significance of his experiment did not lie in Viki's learning to say a few words "but rather in the great difficulty with which she learned them, and in the particular nature of this difficulty."

He says she has been trained to address a male and female researcher as "mama" or "papa" if she wants something. And she says "cup" when she wants a drink.

About that Bronx cheer—Hayes says that chimps are old hands at making such sounds, apparently for their own amusement. But, whereas with your run of the zoo chimp the cheer is just a solo job, with Viki it's a two way deal. You give her a cheer and she'll come right back at you.

Why do chimps ordinarily fail to learn to talk "even when exposed to human speech over a period of years?" Hayes' conclusion:

"The difficulty is much like that experienced by the human 'aphasiac'—a person unable to use articulate speech or comprehend words because of a brain impairment. In the chimp's case, Hayes figures, it's due to a brain which has not developed "as a typical human brain does."

**Brood Fall Chicks**  
Brooding chicks in late summer and early fall is a practice gaining favor among poultrymen since good fall pastures can supply much of the ration.

**Four Out of Five Fatalities Caused By 'Repeaters'**

MINNEAPOLIS—Four out of every five so-called accidental deaths and injuries are not real accidents at all, but are "invited" or directly caused by people with death-and-injury-producing habits, reports a study by Northwestern National Life Insurance company.

A new attack is getting underway on America's ghastly annual auto traffic toll of over 30,000 persons killed and nearly one and a half million injured. It is based on startling facts revealed by researchers into the attitudes and habits of the accident "repeater" culprit, now recognized as the cause of most of our so-called accidents, says the study.

A U. S. government survey of Connecticut auto driving records showed that four per cent of the state's drivers had 36 per cent of the traffic accidents reported during a six-year period. More recent surveys in other states have established that between five and ten per cent of the drivers regularly contribute more than half of the total traffic accidents recorded in those states, the study says. British and American researchers going back through thirty years of casualties have demonstrated that about 20 per cent of the population consistently have 80 per cent of all accidents of all kinds.

**"Show-off" Causes Accidents**

When the persons with the accident-producing habits are removed from any group of people, total accidents for the group nose-dive with startling suddenness, the study says. A large public utility concern employing several hundred truck drivers cut its traffic accident rate 80 per cent by simply taking the drivers with the bad accident records off their trucks and transferring them to other jobs—where they continued to have accidents, but hurt themselves instead of killing and injuring other people with their trucks.

In a driver research clinic conducted in Michigan, 100 accident repeaters studied had had 528 accidents and had been arrested 769 times for traffic law violations in a ten-year period. The typical accident repeater knew less about highway rules, got upset and "rattled" more easily under trying conditions, and tended to resent rules and authority. A "show-off" streak was also frequently found in such drivers.

A certain number of accident repeaters are found by the various state clinics' extensive testing laboratories to be abnormal personalities needing medical or psychiatric treatment; others reveal defects in eyesight, hearing, or muscular response. The vast majority, however, are simply persons with bad habits and wrong mental attitudes of resentment or contempt towards rules, regulations, and common courtesy.

**Recommendation Made**

The various state accident clinics have as their number one aim the identification of the potential accident-repeater in advance, or, at least, early in his destructive career. Then, vigorous preventive measures in the form of canceled permits, enforced safety training and future surveillance can be concentrated where they will pay off with maximum life-saving results.

From the numerous research records studied, the company summarizes basic recommendations for reducing our annual traffic slaughter: Set up scientific accident research clinics in all states—not in just a few. Empower them to call in for examination every driver with a record of repeated accidents or of repeated safety law violations. Cancel the driving permits of those persons found physically or mentally unqualified. Educate the safety law violators in traffic rules and try to change their attitude; then "give them the works" and remove them from contact with a steering wheel if they continue to violate safety regulations. With blame clearly focused on the group who cause most of our auto casualties, the public will demand and support far more vigorous traffic law enforcement than now exists in most localities.

**Police Bail Out a Sewer As Lost Ring 'Walks' By**

NEW YORK—Mrs. Kiki Andrews lost a diamond ring at the corner of 109th Street and Broadway and thought it went down a sewer.

Six policemen and four sewer workers went into action, hauling up bucket after bucket of murch from the sewer and sifting it. They brought up half a ton, but no ring. For three hours they labored, and naturally passersby lingered to watch.

Mrs. Lillian Peyton chanced by and asked what was in progress. Informed, she exclaimed: "Why I found the ring on this corner a couple of nights ago." She produced it and it was identified by the owner.

**New Horde of Genghis Khan Plans Paraguayan Invasion**

GENEVA, Switzerland — Descendants of the legendary war lord Genghis Kahn are about to launch another invasion—but this time it will be a peaceful one.

The international refugee organization has announced that 700 Kalmucks, descendants of the war lord, are going to settle in Paraguay.

After three years of waiting in Germany, because countries seeking immigrants passed over them because of their Mongolian origin, Paraguay finally has agreed to settle them on 900 acres of fertile valley soil southeast of Asuncion.

Oppressed by their Soviet masters and then gathered up by Adolph Hitler for slave labor in Germany during the war, the Kalmucks gravitated to each other in the IRO camps. They have defied and frustrated all efforts to separate them or settle them in smaller groups.

Paraguayan industrialists and financiers have granted enough land to provide approximately 50 acres to each family. With the ground will go a wooden house, a cow, a horse, 12 chickens and farming tools. During their first six months in Paraguay, the Kalmucks will also receive wages to permit them to buy food.

The ancestors of the Kalmucks came out of western Mongolia with Genghis Kahn in the 13th century in his ill-fated effort to subdue western Europe. They settled in Russia, farming and breeding horses.

**Heaviest Rocket Zooms Eighty-Five Miles High**

WHITE SANDS, N. M.—The biggest, heaviest rocket ever launched from White Sands ordnance proving ground has zoomed 85 miles into the stratosphere at a speed of 3,600 miles an hour.

Its war head was four times as big as the one the Germans began rocket work with. It was called a "flying laboratory" because it carried so many instruments. These were tossed clear during the flight and came back to earth by parachute for checking.

It was the fourth big rocket tested, all of which went 80 miles or higher. The instruments had been under construction for over two years.

**Hybrid Corn**

Corn grown from hybrid seed should not be saved for seed because the extra vigor of hybrid corn is limited to the first hybrid generation.

**Dehorning Cattle**

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Although water is essential to crop growth, the pounding of raindrops upon the bare soil surface is injurious to the structure and tilth of most soils. One objective of good tillage and cropping system is to provide a soil cover of crops or crop residues over as great a part of the year as possible, but particularly over the season of heaviest rainfall.

**Famous Dog Lovers**

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

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**FLUID BREATHING  
Radical New Test Planned**

CHICAGO—Can humans breathe a fluid instead of air? Sounds fantastic, but that is what scientists are experimenting with in one of the boldest projects being pushed at the Illinois College of Medicine. The U.S. Navy is supplying the funds.  
The experiment, employing a fluid in which oxygen is dissolved under pressure, will be tried this fall. A monkey will be dunked into a tankful of oxygen-impregnated fluid.  
Sounds more than fantastic, but not if you remember two things. Lungs use oxygen, not air. And many babies start life with amniotic fluid in their lungs. This is expelled when they take their first breath of air.  
A man with liquid in his lungs would be very durable. He could go deep into the ocean. He could survive starts and stops in rockets that would crush the chest of an air breather.

**Begun Four Years Ago.**  
The university's breathing project was started more than four years ago to investigate the cause of hyperoxic convulsions. This condition results when men are given oxygen at the pressure required for deep water dives. It causes convulsion and death.

Fluid breathing became an off-shot of this study. This possibility was discussed by Dr. S. M. Stein and Dr. Warren S. McCullough. They agreed that knowledge obtained from the project had shown that such breathing was theoretically feasible. The function vital to life is to get sufficient oxygen through the membrane coating of the lungs to the lung blood capillaries.  
Ordinary water would not do. It contains traces of dissolved free oxygen—enough to sustain fish with their large gill areas for extracting it—but not enough to prevent suffocation in an air breathing animal.

**Program Outlined**  
Dr. Stein has outlined this tentative program:  
A pressure tank will be filled with a liquid of the same chemical composition as amniotic fluid. Pure oxygen will be forced into the liquid under pressure. This step is similar to carbonating soft drinks with carbon dioxide gas.  
The test monkey's throat will be sprayed with an anesthetic. This will knock out the reflex center in the throat—the trigger mechanism that causes men and animals to choke when fluids enter the windpipe.

Then the animal will be immersed. The tank is equipped with devices for checking on all body functions necessary to life. There will be no danger of losing the animal through mishap, Dr. Stein said.  
If the experiment is successful, means will have to be worked out for its practical application to man.  
A helmet, with the special fluid surrounding the head and filling the diver's lungs, conceivably could be used for deep sea work. A rocket traveler could be immersed in a tank or breathe the fluid via tube from a container strapped to his back.

**Newest of Heavy Metals  
Not so Heavy After All**

CHICAGO—The discovery of a new metal, much lighter than expected, has been announced by Dr. Edgar F. Westrum of the University of Michigan. The metal is americium.  
Plutonium, the modern atom bomb element, is the universe's ninety-fourth element and heaviest substance among the ninety-eight elements known. Americium, just obtained in its silvery metallic form, has only about half its parent's density.  
This means that even though americium's atomic weight is greater than that of plutonium, two bricks of americium would be necessary to counterbalance one of equal size made of plutonium. This is because inner forces give the americium atom a more expanded structure.

**Colonial Day Tanning**  
In colonial days the leather used for shoe soles was so hard that it broke even the best awls. Modern tanning produces leather soles which retain the strength of the predecessors, but are flexible enough for greater comfort.

**Granulated Sugar**  
Refined granulated sugar is chemically the same, whether it comes from cane or beet.

**Safflower Acreage**

Safflower is on the move at last. In the doldrums of experimentation for two full decades after its first importation from Russia and India, safflower, or false saffron, covered no more than 2,000 acres on America's northern great plains by 1946. Then, earning new support as a commercial crop, the spiny-leaved plant spread to 40,000 acres by 1949. Current government estimates indicate the 1950 safflower acreage will be almost four times greater than last year. Furfural, used in the plastics industry, can be made from the hulls. Paper, cardboard, and plastic products can be made from safflower stalks.

The river's sands have been producing since Nebuchadnezzar reigned in Chaldea and were already old when Tutankhamen ruled in Egypt.

The takings are modest today, a week's work will yield only the equivalent of a day's salary for an office worker. The dust is used by Granada's jewelers.

The gold is referred to in the Bible with praise for its fine quality and is the Tharsis gold of the Greeks. The river's burden of gold was exploited by Iberians, Carthaginians, Romans, Vandals, Visigoths and Moors.

### Soldier Loses Papers, Army Can't Decide on His Rank

KOREA—George Adrian of the First cavalry division is all mixed up. He doesn't know whether he is a lieutenant, a sergeant, or a corporal.

A mortar platoon commander in the Pacific in World War II, he was discharged as a lieutenant. He left the University of South Carolina to re-enlist—as a sergeant. But he lost his papers. The adjutant general ordered him reduced one rank until the papers were found.

That brought Adrian up to the Korean war—and Korea, where he is with a heavy mortar outfit, as a corporal.

Now Corporal Adrian hears from home that he may become an officer again—just as soon as he is recalled to active service.

### Dane Spent 20 Years In Asylum by Mistake, Finally Declared Sane

TOPEKA, KAS.—John Crabb, 59, who spent almost 20 years in a Kansas mental institution "by mistake" has been released and has returned to his native Denmark.

He was released after intercession by a group of Danish insurance men who brought the matter to the attention of state authorities. L. P. Ristine, superintendent, said there is every indication that Crabb never was insane.

"He was a victim of circumstance," he said. Crabb's long imprisonment was attributed to his lack of knowledge of this country, his inability to speak the language clearly and to his fiery temper and determination to prove his sanity.

He had lived in this country almost 20 years at the time of his imprisonment. At the time he was taken into custody he was a dish washer in a restaurant. Co-workers scoffed because he worked while standing on crutches necessitated by a foot injury.

The undercurrent of resentment flamed when one of the workers made advances toward a waitress for whom Crabb had an affection. Crabb threatened the man and was taken to jail.

There he became despondent and refused to eat. Police referred his case to the state hospital. Crabb insisted he did not belong in the institution. He refused to work and failed to co-operate in his effort to prove his point. At one time he was listed as incurably insane.

Relatives, including a nephew in

Denmark, fought for his release without success. They enlisted the help of a Topeka insurance group as a last resort. Crabb was finally declared sane, but it took almost 10 months to complete necessary arrangements for his release.

When he was released he flew to New York and took a boat to Europe.

"I'm not resentful," Crabb said as he left the hospital in a new suit provided by a group of Danish insurance men. "I'm just glad to get away."

# Peace Talks Proposed by Stassen; U. N. Forces Cross 38th Parallel; High Prices Weaken Defense Plan

Harold E. Stassen, president of University of Pennsylvania as he announced contents of a message he sent to Soviet Generalissimo Joseph Stalin proposing that they confer and urging Russia to "stop the drift to war." Stassen's message was delivered to the Soviet embassy and a copy to the state department.

## STASSEN: A Just World Peace

Harold E. Stassen, president of the University of Pennsylvania and twice an aspirant for the Republican presidential nomination, stepped in where angels fear to tread.

The former Minnesota governor wrote a letter to Premier Stalin suggesting that they confer on steps that need to be taken to achieve "a just world peace."

Stassen was quick to point out that his letter was written without consultation either with President Truman or the state department; that is, Stassen had written to Stalin in his private capacity and the letter had no official inspiration.

Stassen declared that, if his bid was successful, he would have "four or five of this country's top citizen leaders" accompany him to Moscow for the conference.

There is a possibility that Stalin might accept Stassen's proposal. In fact, some quarters believe the Russians will jump at the chance, if for nothing else, at least for the opportunity to pound out the old propaganda line that the Soviet is anxious for world peace.

There is little possibility, however, that anything constructive will come of such a meeting. Whatever Stalin and Stassen's delegation might agree upon would have no official standing and in all probability would not coincide with American foreign policy.

As could be expected, Stassen's gesture produced political overtones immediately. One Democratic spokesman pointed out that the initiative of any such project properly belongs with the state department.

## RISING COSTS: Cut 750 Jet Fighters

The howl of the housewife that prices have climbed beyond any reasonable or sensible level was taken up by the air force which reported between April and September increases weakened the force's purchasing power by an equivalent of 750 F-86 jet fighter planes.

The cost increases in essential materials, John McCone, under-secretary for air, told the house armed services subcommittee would run about \$315 million.

The under-secretary cited many examples. Among the increases were crude rubber, 128.9 per cent; aluminum, 2.9 per cent; copper, 23.6 per cent; tin 32.9 per cent; plus signs of accompanying wage rises as another basic factor in cost estimation.

It all boils down to the fact which the housewife has long known: prices are climbing by leaps and bounds. If the increases were hurting the armed service then perhaps something would be done to relieve the pinch on the general public.

Rep. Carl Vinson, member of the armed services committee, was blunt about the situation: "Let's not kid ourselves. Congress has a choice of seeing these programs cut (4,428 new aircraft by 1952), or coming up with additional appropriations to meet these rising costs."

## U. N. Flag 'Superseding' Old Glory

"We want nothing from Korea. We want no bases there. We do not want to and will not threaten any other country through the temporary presence of American troops in Korea on a U.N. mission," Warren R. Austin, American delegate to the United Nations told the general assembly.

## KOREA: A Future Hope

The United Nations gave Gen. Douglas MacArthur the signal to cross the 38th parallel in the final campaign to crush the Communists and the future hope of a unified Korea.

But the delay in giving that approval may cost the U.N. forces in manpower and material. It gave the Communists time to collect their shattered forces and prepare for another stand, whereas a continued attack by U.N. troops when the Reds were in full flight could have ended the war quickly.

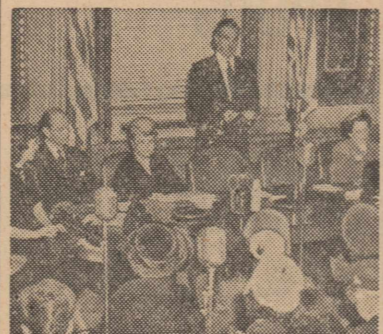
It was the old story of immature thinking and lack of plans on the part of the western nations. Had the situation been reversed, is there anyone who thinks the Reds would have stopped long enough to let U.N. forces regroup? They would have continued to attack and secure any necessary approval later.

But be that as it may, the general assembly finally got around to voting on the invasion of North Korea, approving it 47 to 5.

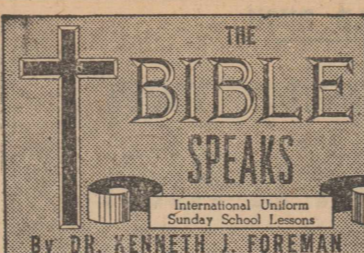
The assembly authorized:

1. That "all appropriate steps be taken to insure conditions of stability throughout Korea."
2. "That U.N. forces should not remain in any part of Korea otherwise so far as necessary to achieve some other aims of the plan."

Lesson for October 29, 1950

**FEW PEOPLE** would care for a diet of sawdust, mixed with old bacon rinds and with carbolic acid for a drink. Yet some people who are very careful of what goes into their stomachs are astonishingly careless about the intake of their minds.

What goes into your mind counts for more, and lasts longer, than what goes into your mouth. What you eat can kill you—your body, that is; but what you think, what you read, what you hear, can kill your mind. It can even kill your soul. You can afford to be particular. Down at the Cracked Cup Cafe they give you no choice. If you don't like the 50c dinner you can walk out; and if you are at all particular you will walk out. But at the best restaurants you are offered a wide choice, and the experienced diner-out will read the menu carefully before ordering.

Are you a Christian? Then don't feed your mind at the mental equivalent of the Cracked Cup Cafe. Go to a better spot. The beauty of food for the mind is that the best costs no more. The best foods for the table are rather expensive; the best mind-foods, soul-foods, are not.

## Ear-Gate

WHAT you listen to, good for your mind? What's your intake, by ear? A woman who had roomed in another woman's house for some time was looking for a new place. Her old room was inexpensive, sunny, convenient, clean; there was nothing wrong with the room. But she had to listen to the landlady every day, and from her she never heard good of any one.

"If I stay there any longer I shall go crazy," the roomer confessed to a friend. "She'll get me to thinking the way she does, and she thinks everybody's a crook."

In Tennyson's "Idyls of the King" is that fine rule of the Round Table: "To speak no slander—no, nor listen to it. . . . Listening to slander, trash, mean and malicious gossip, day after day, is bound to have a serious effect on any one's mind."

## Eye-Gate

THE STRANGE thing is that Christians can be seen taking the greatest of pains picking out the right food for their dogs and cats and yet never exercising the least choice in what comes into their minds by ear or eye. They will let the radio run on hour after hour, they look at whatever the television puts on the screen—the dirty with the clean, the trash with the jewels from front to back, or vice versa, they read all the comics whether they are amusing or not. But when it comes to picking out something good for their minds, really going to the trouble of selection, and paying out folding money for it, how many, even Christian people, will do it?

It would be interesting to compare what most people spend on quite unnecessary stuff like soft drinks and cigarettes, with what they spend for books in a year's time. Would you like to sit down with a great and good man or woman and let him talk to you by the hour, to give you the best of his mind and heart? It can always be done—with a good book. Not, usually, the best sellers!

An intelligent Christian woman recently had to move almost a thousand miles; when you move that far and have to pay by the pound for what you take, you screen your stuff pretty carefully. "I am throwing away all my best sellers," she said. "There's not a one worth wasting freight on." She was right about most best-sellers. But the old-time, long-time, all-time best seller of them all is the Christian Bible.

## Is Your Mind a Vacant Lot?

IT IS MORE than a question of what you read and see and hear. An even more serious question is: What do you think about? Good reading, even the Bible, was never meant to be a substitute for thought. One of the great books of ancient times was "Consolations of Philosophy," written by a man in jail with- out a book in his cell. But the fine books he had read were in his head and heart, and when he became a political prisoner, alone and poor and friendless, his mind was still a garden. What is your mind—a vacant lot littered with junk?

## Household Hints

Large mesh sacks—the kind that oranges and onions come in—make swell dish cloths if you just boil them in water for fifteen or twenty minutes. They shrink down to the proper size, but most of the color will stay in them unless you add laundry bleach to the boiling water.

Coffee and tea stains are the commonest cause of dingy looking dresscloths. Keep your cloths sweet smelling and clean looking by putting them in a wide-mouthed jar filled with half water, half laundry bleach, whenever the cloth isn't in use.

Sheets usually wear out in the middle while the edges are still in good shape. Before too much wear takes place, cut the sheet in half lengthwise; sew the two former selvage edges together and run a hem around the new rough edges.

Here's a stunt that'll give you positive protection against moths for a wool bathing suit or sweater, without sprays, flakes or repellents. Wash the garment thoroughly, get it completely dry; then roll it up tightly, put it inside a clean quart-size mason jar, and close the top tightly. No moth can penetrate as long as the cap is tight.

### New Drug Cuts Treatment Cost Of Arthritis

NEWARK, N. J.—What is proving to be a revolutionary new development in the treatment of rheumatoid arthritis was disclosed in a report just published in the Journal of Clinical Endocrinology.

Five scientists discovered that when insulin, the drug used in diabetes, is given simultaneously with cortisone, very much smaller doses of cortisone than heretofore used may be effective. This combination was reported to produce the same degree of relief in arthritis as when cortisone is used alone in the customary large doses.

The new treatment reduced the quantity of the scarce new "miracle drug" used. Thus, the method enables the doctors to cut the cost per day for treating hospitalized arthritis patients with cortisone from \$12 to as little as \$3 each, the report said.

#### Cost of Drug Cut

Cortisone is the adrenal compound reported by Drs. Hench and Kendall, of the Mayo Clinic, a little more than a year ago as producing spectacular improvement in rheumatoid arthritis. Its use in medicine has been handicapped, the scientists explained, by its potential dangers and the extremely high cost of treatment.

The principle of using insulin together with cortisone was developed by Dr. Edward Henderson, director of the clinical research division of Schering Corporation, Bloomfield, N. J., and by Dr. Marvin Weinberg, his associate, on the basis of animal and laboratory experiments conducted at the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Columbia University by a third member of the Schering team, Dr. Harry Seneca.

The work was done through the cooperation of Dr. George C. Schicks, Director of St. Barnabas Hospital, Newark, N. J., and Dr. John W. Gray, distinguished rheumatologist and Director of the Arthritis Clinic at St. Barnabas, and his associate, Dr. Evelyn Z. Merrick.

Intense interest has focused on the cortisone treatment of arthritis for over a year since it was first announced at the Mayo Clinic, but physicians have been handicapped by the limited supply of the drug, its prohibitively high cost, and certain unfortunate side effects which develop incidental to the treatment, when large doses of cortisone are used. Many efforts have been made to produce the drug in larger quantities and at lower cost, but prior to the St. Barnabas research nothing had been done to make smaller quantities of the drug serve the purpose.

#### 12 Patients Studied

The research workers have stated that the new method does not merely cut the cost of treatment to one-half or less, but also offers a means of avoiding some of the dangerous actions of the drug, very familiar to physicians who have had experience with cortisone. In addition, it the cost of treatment finally within reach of the majority of arthritis sufferers.

Twelve patients with typical rheumatoid arthritis were hospitalized in the St. Barnabas Hospital for this study. Some were early cases and some were chronic cases of 20 years standing with far advanced arthritis.

### Shamefaced Detroit Plans Memorial to Young Soldier

DETROIT, Mich.—The city of Detroit, ashamed of itself for forgetting to honor the first American soldier brought home from Korea for burial at home, got busy and planned a perpetual memorial for him.

The soldier, Pvt. John Maruso, 19, died of wounds received in Korea. Only 20 persons attended his funeral and there were no proper honors, only a makeshift tribute.

Ashamed of the slight, Mayor Albert E. Cobo immediately ordered the city's flags at half staff. The park superintendent offered to dedicate a new recreation site to Maruso. And plans for a permanent memorial were started.

Mrs. Lena Maruso, Johnny's mother, was not offended by the slight. She said, "Johnny, he was awfully young to go. It would be nice if Detroit would do something to remember him."

### 4,000-Year-Old Stone Axe Factory Found in England

LONDON—An archaeological society reports that excavations in England have uncovered a stone-axe factory that existed nearly 4,000 years ago.

The society said that a large factory, which produced weapons and instruments that were traded all over the country and across the Irish sea, once existed in the Langdale valley.

Because of the altitude of the factory, 2,500 feet, it is presumed that the hewing of the rock took place in the late spring or summer, the rough material being carried away to be finished sometime during the winter at a more permanent settlement beyond the valley.

### GOLD RUSH

## Fishermen Hit It Rich

CORDOVA, Alaska — Alaska's crab fishermen have struck it rich — a \$300-a-day bonanza.

The strike is as rich as any of the lucky old-time sourdoughs early day gold findings.

"A yarn that a couple of men were making \$300 a day in a new gold strike would arouse terrific excitement," Clarence Martin, Cordova Times publisher reports. "Yet the crab fishermen are making that kind of money—and it is just as good as if it came in nuggets." Cordova is one of the big producers of canned and frozen crab. The species is known on the Pacific coast as the Dungeness. But until recently all of the Cordova area catch was taken from Prince William sound, adjacent to the town.

#### Catch 3,000 a Day

Because the sound's crab beds always supplied enough of a catch to make a good living for the fishermen, few of them ever ventured outside.

It was during the closed season in the sound that a venturesome fisherman decided to try his luck in the Gulf of Alaska—the vast body of north Pacific water that washes the breadth of Alaska's southern coast.

He put out his traps and brought in a first day's haul of 3,000 crabs. A Cordova packing plant paid him 15 cents a crab—\$450 for his day's efforts.

Some half a dozen fishermen were working the same area, each with from 100 to 150 traps. After several weeks of fishing, the boats continued to bring in from 1,800 to 2,500 crabs each. Small boats are manned usually by a man and a boy, or by two men at most, so the daily take has been running \$150 to \$200 each.

Since the fishermen already had the traps for the Prince William sound fishing, just about the only additional expense is for the bait and the boat operation.

#### Processors Earn Big Pay

The men and women who process the crab meat are making big money, too. The packing plant crabs "shakers"—they literally shake the meat from the shells—are the elite of the packing crews. A skilled "shaker" can remove about 450 pounds of meat a day. At nine and a half cents a pound, that's \$42.75 for a day's leg shaking.

All this is happening in a season when the crab catch has been slim in such normally happy hunting grounds as Washington state coastal waters.

Cordova fishermen believe they have tapped a vast storehouse of crab meat, and that they have only touched the edges.

#### Formosa, Jap Planned

Although it has been a Chinese-populated city for centuries, the Nationalists' new seat of government on the island fortress of Formosa is largely a product of Japanese planning. Most of its modern government buildings, large public parks and museums, and palm-shaded boulevards were built during the 50 years of Japanese control. A majority of current maps still identify it as Taihoku, its Japanese name in this period.

### Another Fallacy Revealed, Rabbits Don't Like Carrots

CLEVELAND, O.—Br'er Rabbit doesn't have a yen for carrots—another fallacy falls apart, so scientists report.

In tests with a new rabbit repellent Br'er Rabbit showed so little interest in carrots that the researchers discontinued using the food. Far more popular were beans, lettuce, corn, tulips, daffodils and hyacinths.

In tests at the University of Florida the new repellent greatly reduced the amount of damage in vegetable and flower gardens. Cotton-tails that nibbled at and damaged 80 to 100 per cent of the lettuce plants in untreated patches, steered clear of lettuce that had been sprayed or dusted, the scientist reported.

#### Foot Care

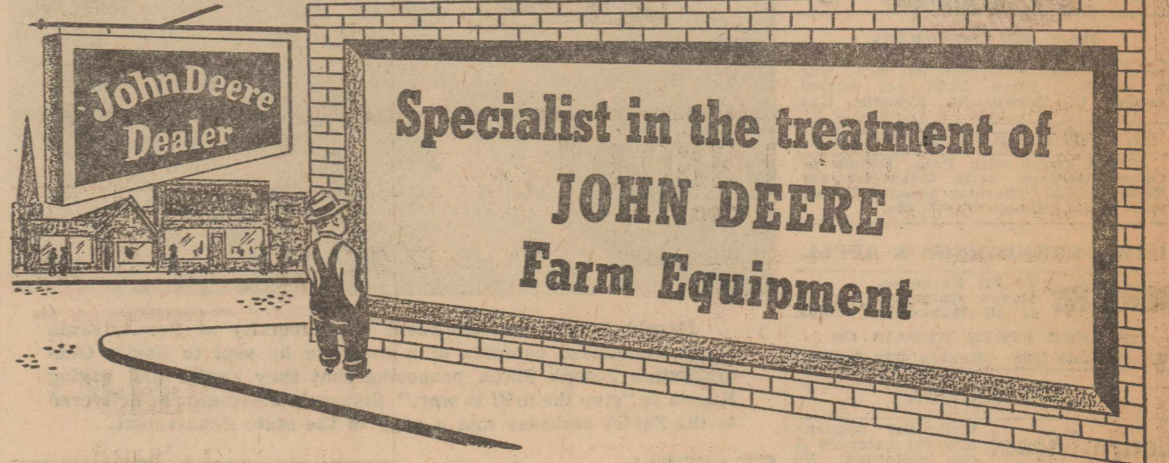
