

# County's Oldest Citizen Succumbs To Brief Illness

Or Lasley, 94 year old Sherman County citizen, who remained active until recently, passed away Thursday of last week in the home of his daughter, Mrs. Blanche Cramer in Texhoma.

Mr. Lasley moved to the Stevens Community in 1905 where he engaged in stock farming, and made this his home until recent years.

Funeral services were conducted in the First Methodist Church at Texhoma Saturday by Rev. C. R. LeMond, pastor, assisted by Rev. H. A. Nichols, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Stratford.

Orland Isalah Lasley, 94, son of Margaret Lindsly and Jonathan Lasley, was born March 3, 1856 in Ohio. He departed this life November 2 in the home of his daughter, Mrs. Blanche Cramer. While he was young the family moved to Illinois, and from there to Wisconsin.

On January 30, 1881, he was united in marriage to Bertha Jane Hoover. To this union ten children were born, six of whom survive their father. Mrs. Lasley died in 1938.

In October of 1905 Mr. Lasley moved to Stevens, Texas, and lived there until four years ago when he moved to the home of his daughter, Mrs. Blanche Cramer, in Texhoma. During his active years he engaged in farming and ranching.

At an early age, he united with the Methodist Church, receiving baptism by his grandfather.

Children surviving their father are: Mrs. Alice Talman, and Miss Helen Lasley of Kansas City, Missouri; Mrs. Blanche Cramer, Sam Lasley, and Mrs. Margaret Hamilton of Texhoma, and Bill Lasley of Stratford. There are ten surviving grandchildren and a host of friends.

Interment will be made in the Lee Summit, Missouri cemetery.

# Wind Break Seedlings Are Available

Farmers who are interested in setting out wind breaks may secure trees from the Texas Forest Service. Trees must be used in wind break plantings. Application blanks may be secured in the Home Demonstration Agents office.

The following trees may be purchased for \$5.00 a thousand: Red Mulberry, Osage Orange, Catalpa, Desert Willow, Western Alpine, Black Locust, Red Cedar, Chinese Elm, Russian Mulberry, Green Ash, and Thornless Honey Locust. Only a limited number of Red Cedars are available.

No order for less than 100 trees will be accepted. The minimum charge for 100 seedlings of one species is \$1.00. Trees will be shipped at the time designated by the buyer.

It is to the advantage of those interested to order as early as possible as the service fills orders in the manner in which they are received. As an estimate on the number of trees needed for a three row wind break 500 feet long, the purchaser will need 100 trees that drop their leaves in the winter, and 68 trees which hold their leaves through the winter.

### Enlist Letters From U.S. To Spread Truth in Europe

NEW YORK—Henry Lee Munson who heads the letters from America campaign of the Common Council of American Unity, reports 35 million Americans are being urged to enlist in the propaganda war between the United States and Russia.

These people are first and second generation Americans who write letters to relatives and friends abroad. They write more than 250 million letters a year. "These are not pen pals writing to people they don't know, says Munson. They are writing to their parents, to their uncles and aunts and cousins or old friends. Their letters are read avidly and they are trusted."

Every week the council publishes articles designed to help the letter writer correct prevalent misconceptions about this country. These articles are now carried by 182 foreign language newspapers and by 186 foreign language radio programs in the United States. The council doesn't ask the letter writers to parrot high sounding abstractions about democracy and freedom. It does ask them to write as often as possible about their own personal experiences as Americans.

### Napoleonic Relic Found By London Carpenter

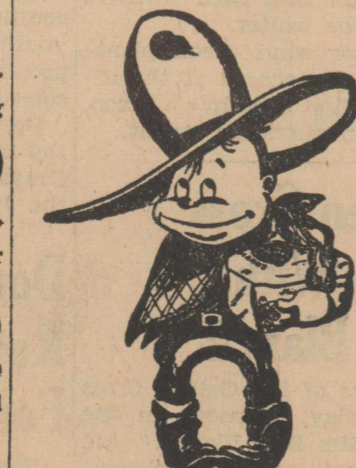
LONDON, Eng.—A London carpenter, Bert Hill, found a model sailing ship bricked up behind a fireplace in the Soho district, took it home and cleaned it.

Work on the blackened model with a toothbrush and scouring powder showed that every detail down to the smallest block-and-tackle of the rigging had been carved from bone.

An ex-seaman, Hill started to rig the vessel and then forgot about it for two years until he saw a similar model priced at \$1,100 in a London art gallery.

### Soviet Writer Nominates Future War Criminals

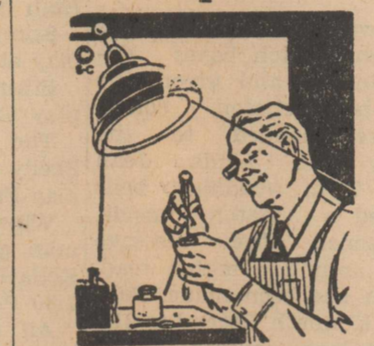

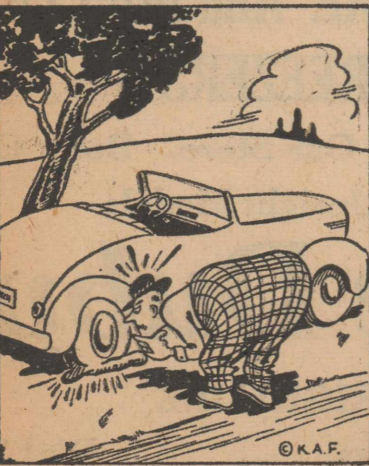

An objectionable musty odor that holds natural enemies at bay earns it the name "stinking pheasant."

## Jittery Europeans Near Panic When Sun Turns Blue

LONDON, Eng.—The queerest sky display since the haze of Halley's comet turned the sun and moon odd colors in 1910 took place in the skies over the North Sea recently. While baffled British star gazers traded notes on the phenomenon, colleagues in Denmark watched the sun which came up a strange blue. Jittery old folks queued up at some Danish banks, demanding their money for a hurried flight from doomsday.

Thousands of other Europeans—some fearful, some merely interested—strained for a glimpse of the heavens through clouds which covered much of the continent.

A superstitious few feared the end of the world. Others guessed there had been a terrific atom blast somewhere on the globe. Astronomers were divided into three main schools of thought on the cause:

1. The filtering effect of a far flung smoke from vast forest fires raging in Canada which spread a pall over northeastern United States, earlier.

2. A peculiar high cloud formation.

3. Dust blown high into the air in a storm or volcanic eruption far to the west.

A royal air force pilot who went up to investigate reported he found a layer of fine brownish dust, 5,000 feet thick, beginning at 38,000 feet. Curious or frightened Britons swamped telephone lines to observatories and weather experts.

In Denmark, the sun stayed blue for more than an hour. The royal observatory and Danish newspapers were swamped with telephone calls. Many persons insisted an atomic bomb must have gone off in or near Denmark.

In Rome, Paris and Brussels the sun was its usual color. In Oslo, Frankfurt, Stockholm and Helsinki it was hidden by heavy clouds.

## Salty Fare for Calves Saves Work in Feeding

To save work in the daily feeding of a little—and only a little—cottonseed meal to beef calves, U.S. department of agriculture workers hit on a method of mixing enough salt with the meal to control the daily consumption. With the right mixture they found that the calves would eat about two pounds of meal a day. The proportion of salt to meal had to be watched and adjusted from time to time. Generally one pound of salt with four pounds of meal was right, but a narrow ratio as one to three was sometimes needed. In fact, up to one pound of salt a day has been fed. Two pounds of cottonseed meal was just enough concentrated feed to keep the calves in thrifty condition on winter pasture at the Great Plains experiment station at Woodward, Okla. Without the heavy salting of the meal it would have been necessary to feed the meal each day exercising care to allow each calf easy access to the feed. The new way greatly simplifies the feeding and permits placing of bulk supply of the salt-mixture in the feeders.

The experimenters found that the salt had no ill effects on the animals. To get the calves accustomed to the salty fare, the two-pound-a-day allowance of meal was fed in an introductory period with a daily increase in the proportion of salt. After the calves had learned to eat the required mixture, it was easy to mix it in bulk and shovel it into a self-feeder. Then the calves ate the desired daily allowance with no further need for daily attention—a substantial saving in labor.

### A PLAN FOR RELIGIOUS UNITY

(By Clyde Aly)  
Part 3: Text: Ephesians 4:3-6.  
"Endeavoring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body, and one Spirit, even as ye are called in one hope of your calling; One Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all who is above all, and through all, and in you all."  
**1 Lord, Unity of Authority**  
Christ now has all authority. Matt. 28:18. Peter declared that God has now made Jesus both Lord and Christ. Acts 2:36. "Lord" means one supreme, one with authority. "Christ" means "the anointed one," the king with authority.

The crying need of the religious world is to recognize and submit to the authority of Christ. There can never be unity until it is done. We should all be willing to act by Divine authority. But when men write creeds that serve as authority and look to men instead of Christ, division will continue.

There can never be unity until all submit to the same authority.

**1 Faith, Unity of Doctrine**  
Jude wrote that we should contend for the "faith." Jude 3: "A company of the priests were obedient to 'the faith.'" Acts 6:7.

"But speak thou the things which become sound doctrine." Titus 2:1. Paul left Timothy in Ephesus that he might "charge some that they teach no other doctrine." I Timothy 1:3.

The apostles and their co-workers all taught the same doctrine. No one had a right to his own belief. All had to preach the same gospel, Gal. 1:8, since there is only one true gospel. Hence, the early Christians all heard the same doctrine preached, all believed the same, and all obeyed the same commands in becoming Christians.

Baptism is a religious practice. Most religious bodies practice what they call baptism. This is one of the things the religious world is divided over. When Paul declares that there is "one baptism," it does not sound as if every person has a right to be baptized according to his choice, and to submit to what he thinks is baptism.

The Lord has not left us in the dark on this question. The Bible plainly illustrates how baptism was and should be performed. Both the preacher and the one desiring baptism should go unto a certain water, both should go down into the water. Acts 8:36-38. The candidate is buried with Christ by baptism and raised to walk in newness of life. Romans 6:3, 4; Col. 2:12. In baptism the body is washed with pure water. Hebrews 10:22 (not just the head wet.) A complete burial of the body in water is conceded by all leading Bible commentators to have been the practice of the early church.

As to the design of baptism, it was to be saved. Mark 16:15, 16. Christ saves only the obedient, Heb. 5:9, and baptism is a plain command. Acts 10:48. Therefore, all had to be baptized to be saved by Christ. Peter commanded baptism "for the remission of sins." Acts 2:38. Why is it that preachers will not tell dying men and women what the Bible says?

As long as preachers repudiate what the Bible says, and preach what they think it ought to say there can never be unity.

Furthermore, there was no Holy Spirit baptism when Paul wrote this passage, nor at any time since. I Peter 3:20, 21.

If all would follow these plain passages on baptism, there would be unity of practice.

## Non-Sectarian Program Stresses Spiritual Life During November

A national, non-sectarian program to stress the importance of spiritual values in personal and community life will concentrate nationwide attention in November on religion and the religious institutions of America. The annual movement is called "Religion in American Life" program.

"There is abroad in the land a hunger for spiritual things," Charles E. Wilson, national chairman of the program, told a group of religious leaders in discussing plans for the 1950 campaign.

"We must therefore take full advantage of our opportunity here," Mr. Wilson said. "We must enlist the cooperation of every church and synagogue in the land. Having done so, I feel sure that, both as a nation and as individuals, we can all derive the full measure of inspiration, strength and guidance that only religion gives."

The Religion in American Life program started last year as an outgrowth of the united church canvass, a campaign like the community chest in which local churches and synagogues unite to conduct simultaneously their independent fund raising drives. The broad, fundamental appeal of the Religion in American Life program can be adopted to intensify every religious activity in the local community.

#### 3,000 Communities Take Part

Throughout the entire month of November, the message of religion will reach Americans everywhere with the theme: "Take your problems to church this week—millions leave them there!"

Last year 2,946 communities participated in the national program with local campaigns. Judging by the reports from all over the country which are being mailed in to the national offices, more than 3,000 communities will take part in the November campaign. In these communities, churches and synagogues are joining in united action to focus local attention on the indispensable values of religion. Roman Catholic churches participate in the program in many communities.

In one sentence, the goal of this campaign: To bring to the attention of everyone the importance of religion and religious institutions and to awaken in every single individual an awareness of his own responsibility to attend and support the church or synagogue of his choice.

#### Vigorous Program

"It is through such vigorous efforts in behalf of religion," Mr. Wilson said, "that we can bind our country together in a mighty union as a good church nation."

In obtaining the final objective, the program is expected to increase regular attendance at services of worship, create broader participation in religious life, enlist new members, secure adequate financial support for churches, increase attendance of children at Sunday schools, and help sustain evangelistic and humanitarian work at home and abroad.

Church attendance throughout the United States is expected to increase considerably during November, even in those communities not taking an active part in the Religion in American Life program.

Officials of the organization sponsoring the November observance reports there has been a great increase in church attendance in the past few months. This program is expected to help maintain church attendance throughout the country.

#### This Scrambling World

ON THE "outside" what is the rule? David Harum put it in a nutshell: "Do unto your neighbor what he would like to do to you." "Every man for himself and the devil take the hindmost." "Every man has his price." "Look out for Number 1." "Blessed is he that tooteth his own horn, for he that tooteth not his own horn, the same shall not be tooted."

People get tired of living in a world like that. Something tells them that the everlasting scramble is not the way to live, there must be a better way. Suppose they could look down the street and see that better way actually being put into practice by a little community of people?

They ought to be able to see it wherever there is a Christian church. But—is the average church that kind of community? Do the members treat one another (on Mondays, that is) with more understanding, consideration and affection than the local atheists or Non-Christians show toward one another? Indeed, is there anything whatever that seems to link these First What-is Church people together with a common bond?

#### Making Fellowship Real

IN A large city there will be a page or more of Smiths in the telephone directory. These all have the same name, but most of them don't know one another and don't care. Too often it is this way with Christians even in the same congregation. They all bear the same name, but that is about all.

What they ought to have is fellowship. This is not a mere word. It can be a real thing. It is like a two-way blood transfusion, in the realm of personality. It is interflow of life. It can be the source of the Christian's finest growth and service. Musicians develop musically through sharing with other musicians. Every "Future Farmer of America" is going to be a better and more enthusiastic farmer through his associations with the F.F.A.

So our Christian faith and life are kept glowing and growing through the fellowship of like-minded persons. One thing your Sunday school class, and indeed the whole congregation, may well consider seriously, even adopting it as your Project for the Year is this: What can we do to make fellowship more real in our church?

#### Wider Horizons

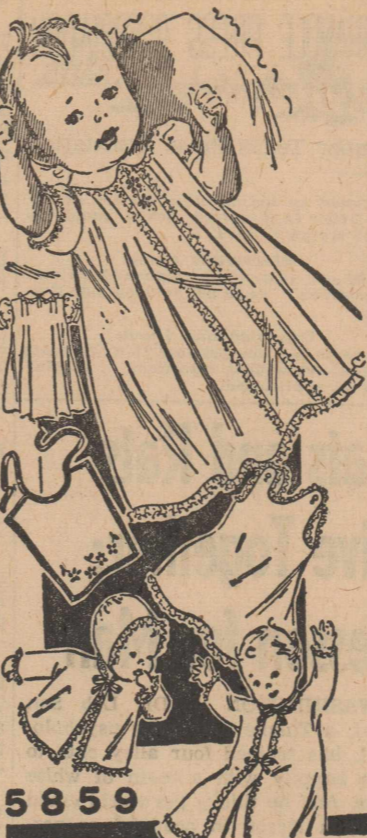
CHRISTIAN fellowship needs not only to be enriched; it needs to be enlarged. In a town or section where denominational lines run sharply across the population, there is too much cross-fire. Such a community has a hard time being a community. Many a denomination has been afflicted with the disease of pride. Loyalty to one's own denomination too easily replaces loyalty to the kingdom of God.

Whatever be your own church connection, there are unnumbered true Christians outside the bounds of your church. Do you know them? Do you worship with them from time to time? Do you encourage visitors from other churches? Not only in other denominations but across lines of race and color you can find a thrill in coming close to Christians who may even be much better Christians than yourself.

Young people in your church may be interested in a new organization which is interested in bringing together the thinking of young people in every land. Young Christians can bring to such a project the insight and the spirit of Christian Faith, and learn to know young Christians in other lands than ours. ### Cats and Rats Live Together; Lesson for Man

WASHINGTON — Dr. Loh Sen Tsai, a Tulane university psychologist, has trained four alley cats to live happily with a team of white rats. And he thinks the world could learn a lesson in peaceful cooperation from them.

These natural enemies, the doctor reports, have been trained both to live together without mayhem and to help one another get a good feed by overcoming mutual handicaps.

"So why not human beings, races and nationalities?" asks Dr. Tsai. The cat candidates for a peace prize came from alleys just a couple of blocks away from New Orleans' world famous Bourbon street. Since they were alley born and alley raised, they presumably had had experience "in foraging for little rats."

His idea was that if cats who were old hands at chasing rats could be trained to be chummy with them, the evidence of the experiment would be most convincing.

#### How They're Trained

The cats were trained with the rats in this way:

They were placed together in cages until they got accustomed to living, playing and eating together. Then Dr. Tsai set out to teach them the value of teamwork.

He worked out a device he calls the "Tsai cooperation apparatus." It has three separate compartments, separated one from another by a screen gate which can be raised and lowered.

The first section is the entrance, or "release box", where a cat and a rat are assembled for each test. When a gate is raised, the animals move into the second chamber, where the cooperation takes place.

To get into the third compartment—where a dish of food awaits them—both the rat and the cat must step on floor buttons simultaneously. When this is done the gate goes down and they are free to enter and eat the food.

But if only one of them steps on a button—or if both step on the same button—they get nowhere.

#### Lesson for Mankind

It took some time for the animals to get the idea. But now a given cat and rat team can breeze right through to the chow line in two or three seconds.

If one of them is purposely kept in the entrance chamber while his teammate gets through to the cooperation chamber, the partner in front will press a button that releases his buddy from the entrance room. Then both of them go to get into the food chamber.

What's this got to do with world peace?

Dr. Tsai says the people of the world must learn to cooperate in order to save the planet from atomic destruction.

"From research like this, such factors as common background, common motive, training and best age for training can be varied independently and studied. The results will throw light on the problem of world peace and international cooperation, upon which the entire fate of mankind depends."

**Policemen Report Saucer Floats to Earth, Dissolves**  
PHILADELPHIA, Pa. — A new theory of what happens to flying saucers has been put forth by four Philadelphia policemen.

Patrolmen John Collins and Joseph Keenan reported that they saw a mysterious object about six feet in diameter floating in an open field. They summoned other officers. Then they approached the object and turned on flashlights.

Collins tried to pick "the thing" up. The part touched by his hand dissolved, he said, leaving a sticky, odorless residue. Within a half hour the entire object had evaporated. It was so light, the policemen reported, it had not even bent the weeds on which it had rested.

The police notified the federal bureau of investigation—but there was nothing to show FBI agents except a spot on the ground.
