Sherman County's Fire Control organization was completed in a meeting held at the courthouse in Stratford Saturday afternoon.

Team captains are E. W. Carter and Luther Browder for the Spurlock-Sunray neighborhood; J. N. Bridwell and S. W. Dewese for the Lx-Frisco neighborhood; Rennie Hamilton and Alfred Harland for the Texhoma area; Arlyn Haile and Chuck Smith for the Coldwater neighborhood; W. O. Bryant and Jim Taylor for the North of Stratford area; W. L. Pendleton and Earl Kirkwood for the West of Stratford territory; Percy Pronger and Kenneth Borth for the Pronger neighborhood; Bob Burgess and R. K. Everett for the Ruby neighborhood; and Don Sangster and Odell Pugh for the Stevens neighborhood.

The purpose of the County Fire Control Committee is to supply each section with a well informed organization for combating possible grass fires during the winter season.

Another meeting of the organization will be held at the courthouse at 2:00 P. M. Saturday. The purpose of this meeting is to list equipment on farms and ranches which may be used for fighting fires. Modern equipment which producers use to spray chemicals for killing insects have been used successfully in bringing grass fires under control.

An all-over County Supervisor is to be elected. Bob Brandenburg gave a report of the course conducted in Amarillo by J. O. Burnside, head of the Texas Forestry Fire Control Service.

The Stratford boys used a cow made of cardboard, and lost the second place honor by only an imitation technicality. Second place honor went to the Spearman F.F.A. team.

Tragedy Strikes Citizens On Mercy Mission

Tragedy struck Monday morning in the midst of a group of members of the Church of Christ who were on an errand of mercy, and took the life of Clyde Aly, youthful minister of the church.

The accident occurred on U. S. Highway 287 about five miles east of Washburn. The right front tire of the car in which A. B. Morris, Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Aly and 5-month old son, Clyde Aly, Jr., and Mrs. T. S. Brannan were riding, suddenly went flat, pulling the vehicle to the right of the paved highway.

Friends who have talked with Morris, said he was able to keep control of the car to an extent which would have prevented it from turning over but that he did not have sufficient control to avoid striking a roadside tree. The car collided with a tree described as being about 18 inches in diameter. The frame of the car buckled in the center and the top of the car was forced back over the rear seat.

Clyde Aly was killed instantly. Last rites for the deceased minister will be held at 2:00 P. M. Saturday in the Victory Church of Christ in Dallas.

Mrs. Clyde Aly, wife of the pastor, regained consciousness Tuesday night, but is still in a critical condition, in Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

Clyde Aly, Jr., five month old son of Mr. and Mrs. Aly, affectionately known here as "Chippy" is thought to have escaped injury except for bruises.

Mrs. T. S. Brannan is in Northwest Texas Hospital suffering from shock and multiple bruises. Her condition is described as fair.

A. B. Morris, driver of the car, has a fractured leg, multiple lacerations, and underwent an operation for impacted fractures of his right hand Thursday.

The local Church of Christ recently "adopted" a three-year old girl in the Church of Christ Orphanage at Tipton, Oklahoma, for whom they obligated themselves to furnish clothing and other necessities. Mr. Morris, Mr. and Mrs. Aly and baby, and Mrs. Brannan were enroute to Tipton with clothing and Christmas presents for the child, at the time of the tragic accident.

A motorist in an approaching car saw the accident and called Amarillo ambulances from Washburn, where they also notified Highway Patrolmen. The time of the accident was established as about 8:00 A. M.

Edgar Brannan, stationed with the Highway Patrol in Amarillo, was one of the investigating officers who found his aunt at the scene of the accident.

Mr. and Mrs. Aly and baby moved to Stratford from Breckenridge, Texas, in September, when he was selected as the minister of the local Church of Christ. He had just graduated from Texas Christian University and the Stratford Church was his first pastorate.

During the short length of time they had made their home in Stratford, Mr. and Mrs. Aly had made a large number of friends.

County May Secure Crop Insurance

R. C. Buckles, chairman of the County P.M.A. Committee, has called a meeting of all Community P.M.A. Committees, County Committeemen, and all producers interested in Government Crop Insurance, for 2:00 P. M. Friday, December 8. The meeting will be held in the district court room at the court house.

The Government Crop Insurance program will be discussed and producers will be given an opportunity to secure the program for the county if they wish. Briefly, the Government Crop Insurance program repays producers the approximate cost of planting another crop in case of total failure.

The Crop insurance program has been adopted by several Panhandle Counties. Mr. Buckles stated that the federal crop insurance program did not enable a producer to make money, but would make possible the planting of another crop in case of a total loss. He considers the insurance an important decision which must be made by the producers of the county. It is not likely that the county will approve the program unless it is favored by a major percentage of the producers. It is said that the present program is a great improvement over the program which was sponsored in this county several years ago, which proved very unsatisfactory.

Zero Weather Follows Dry Snow Flurry

Only a trace of moisture was found in the light sprinkle which fell here Monday night and later turned into a dry snow storm accompanied by high north winds about midnight.

The thermometer dropped to 10 degrees during the storm. Tuesdays high was 18 degrees and the mercury dropped to one degree below zero Tuesday night.

Highway 287 was closed for a short time Tuesday morning south of the Canadian River. Ice on the pavement, covered by dry snow, made traveling unsafe.

Steel Squeezed Like Paste To Produce Large Shells

PITTSBURGH, Pa.—A new process of making artillery shells has been reported by the steel industry. Shells now are being squeezed into shape somewhat as tooth paste is squirted out of a tube.

The new method is called cold extrusion and saves a great amount of steel. By using powerful hydraulic presses, steel men now take a "slug" of steel five inches in width and height and squeeze it into a shell casing about 1 1/2 inches long.

Until the process was perfected recently, the shells were made by hot forging. In forging, the metal is shaped by heating and hammering. Hot forging of shells requires about 40 per cent more metal.

Cold extrusion has these additional advantages:

- (1) The cold extruded product needs practically no machining.
- (2) Little or no alloy is needed because good mechanical qualities are obtained by cold working the steel.
- (3) The glassy, smooth surface of the finished shell is a natural result of the cold extrusion process. No other operations are needed to acquire the finish.

Iron Age magazine, in discussion of cold extrusion of 105 millimeter shells, says the Mullins Manufacturing Corp. at Warren, Ohio, now is cold extruding "shells of better quality at less cost and with less material than they could by hot forging."

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
Daisy, the Cow, Rescues Farmer from Burning Barn

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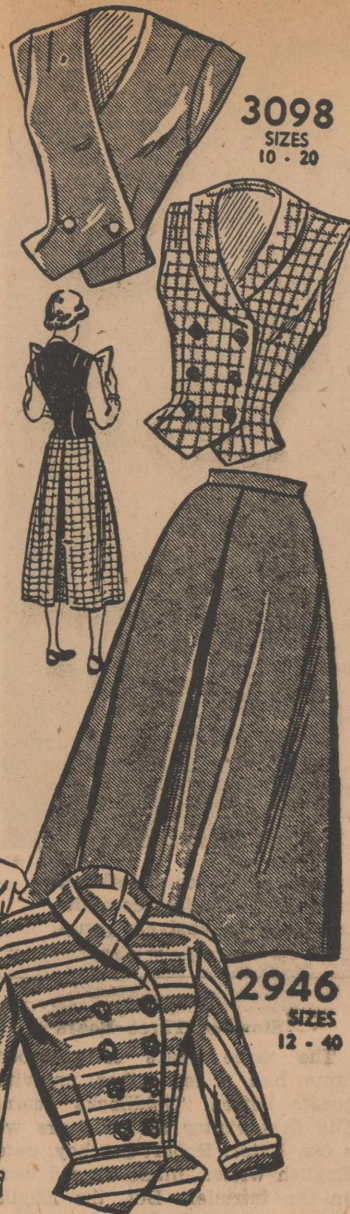

"SMALL BUSINESS"

President Truman asks the "Lame Duck" Congress for an "excess profits tax" retroactive to July 1, 1950.

Many small businessmen hope Congress will not act without getting an honest expression of opinion. They have asked the National Federation of Independent Business to make a nationwide poll on the question.

Since Korea, huge corporations have received phenomenal earnings. Therefore, an excess profits tax has great emotional appeal.

But small business is not engaged in a blind "holy" war against big business. Small business, resentful of certain big business practices, is not rushing pell-mell into supporting a measure that could wreck all business.

The method by which a profit will be determined as excess is the key to the entire question.

Any small business can have experienced bad luck during the base period used for a normal profit period. For example, a series of jurisdictional strikes promoted by big labor, or a "freeze-out" price war prosecuted by a big corporation, can make that base period one of sub-normal profit for an independent concern.

In order to compete, small business must continually improve equipment. This is done out of profits.

However, under tax laws, money spent on production facilities is not tax deductible. During

World War II this forced many small businesses either to close, or sell out to a big corporation.

Is it technically possible to write an excess profits tax law that will not ruin independent business? Many sincere Congressmen don't think so.

So when debates start, don't think all arguments against are by big business. Independent businessmen may have to be opposed for self-preservation. In previous votes, independent business has called on government to first try reduced spending on non-essentials.

Gordon Gray, presidential economic adviser, wants American taxpayers to give another 10 billion dollars to the Marshall Plan, plus billions for armament grants to friendly powers.

Already big corporations are working to capture these billions in business. This is evidenced by the private "star chamber" sessions held by Secretary of Commerce Sawyer at Sea Island, Georgia, with top industrialists. The press was barred.

This has created a storm of protest by organized independent business.

Information on what went on behind those closed doors will be related next week. It now appears that the Marshall Plan is benefiting a few huge American corporations as much, if not more, than it is benefiting the peoples of other nations.

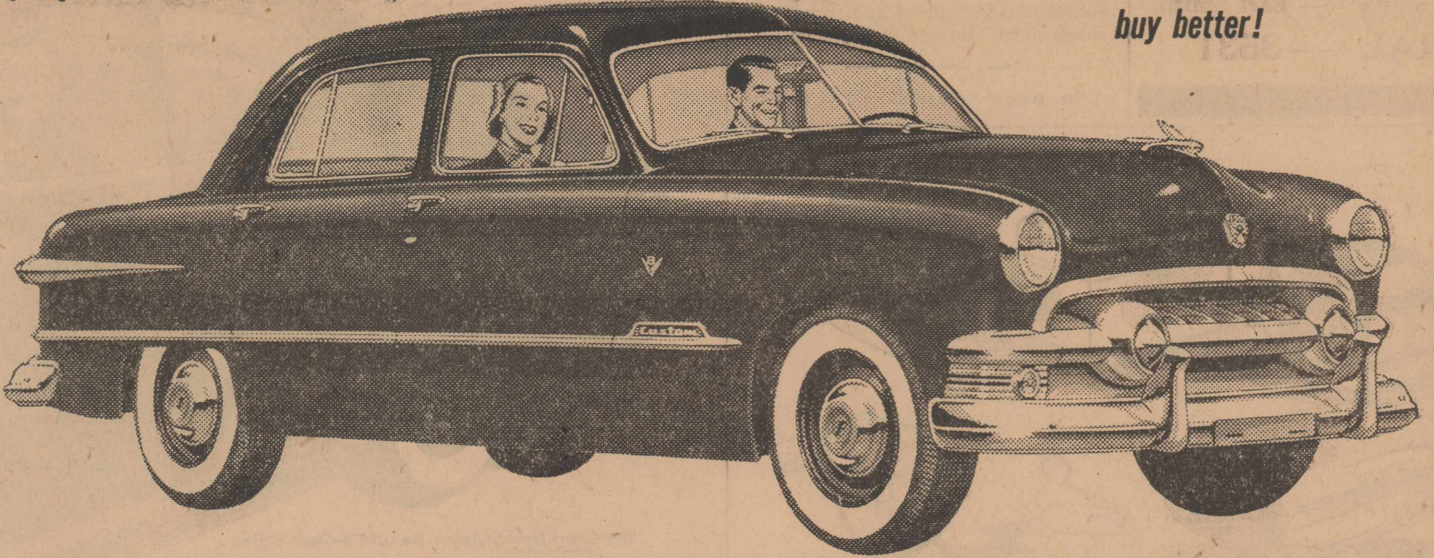

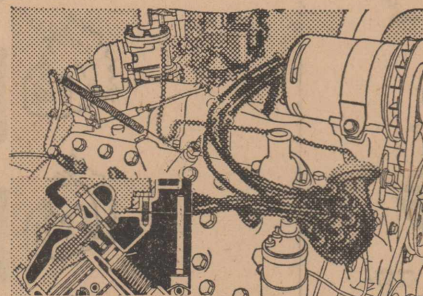

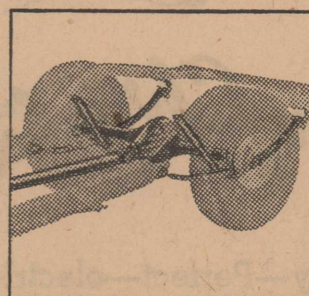

"There is no direct odor given off from the rinse," she continued, "and it gives the hair a glowing sheen. Besides making the hair soft, glowing and inviting, the liquor rinse raises the woman's own spirits."

Commenting on a New York report that champagne-shampooed blondes were turning American heads, she said, "We have never used champagne. I don't suppose South African men would be very pleased if we did, for beer is just as good."

The beer rinse is used satisfactorily with dark and fair hair alike. Clients have to provide their own liquor, as hairdressers are not licensed to keep or sell alcohol on their premises.

Germans Who Fled Russians Say They Are Ready to Fight

BERLIN, Germany—Thousands of Germans have fled the Russian occupied zone in the last year and every one of them would fight the Soviet if necessary.

Willie Reusch is an example. He was a pupil in Rostock in the Russian zone. When he finished high school—he was 20 having been delayed three years by the war—The Russians assigned him to a unit of the people's police.

Will was sent to barracks, given a uniform, and was to begin military training the next day. Instead, he escaped and made his way southwest to the British zone.

Many refugees come from the districts of Leipzig and Dresden in Berlin. But few come from the Baltic region. Willie's story was therefore unusual.

He will be given papers and concealed identity so he can be enrolled in a Hamburg university.

An emaciated, tall, blue-eyed fellow whose bony arms protruded from his tight fitting coat, he is intelligent and well informed. Willie has no illusions about the strength of the Russians and their activity.

In the region of the Baltic, he said, the Russians were "in very strong force, prepared for instantaneous battle. They could count on half the German population throwing in with them. At least 45 per cent of the people are Communist," he said. "The Russians have been there for over five years, and they began immediately working on the youths between 5 and 15. They have never let up."

He said there were 82 factories in the Russian zone working at top speed on weapons for the Russians and the people's police.

"Besides machine guns and small arms," he said, "they manufacture mobile units, heavy cannon, and the huge Stalin type tanks." While no airplanes are manufactured in the east zone, their parts are produced and shipped to Russia.

To Clean Teapot

Winter time is tea time. For a good cup of tea, start with a good clean teapot. Rinse the teapot after each use with a solution of baking soda and hot water—3 tablespoons soda to the pot of water. And don't neglect the spout—clean it by wrapping a damp paper towel around a skewer, dip into moist baking-soda and then dig into the spout from both sides. Rinse well in hot water.

Vaccinated Calves

Vaccination of calves at the age of six to eight months gives them a substantial degree of protection against brucellosis. However, this protection can be broken down completely by prolonged exposure to a heavy concentration of brucellosis germs, such as by placing the calves in a poorly kept herd with many infected animals.

The three bears of storybook fame had a few other uninvited guests before "Goldilocks" came. The first visitor to the bears was a fox. Later, Robert Southey, noted English writer, made an old woman an intruder. But, the English people, who took the story to their hearts, substituted the pretty, little girl.

Earth's Rotation Slowing, British Astronomer Says

WASHINGTON—Sir Harold Spencer Jones, Great Britain astronomer, reports the mean period of the earth's rotation is changing in two ways.

One change, he says, is well known and well understood. It amounts to about a thousandth of a second a century, sufficient to upset seriously some astronomical calculations. The change is due to the drag of tides over the beaches of shallow seas. This change also affects the day-length of the moon.

The other change, equally minute, is incalculable and unpredictable. Sometimes it hastens and sometimes slows down the earth's rotation.

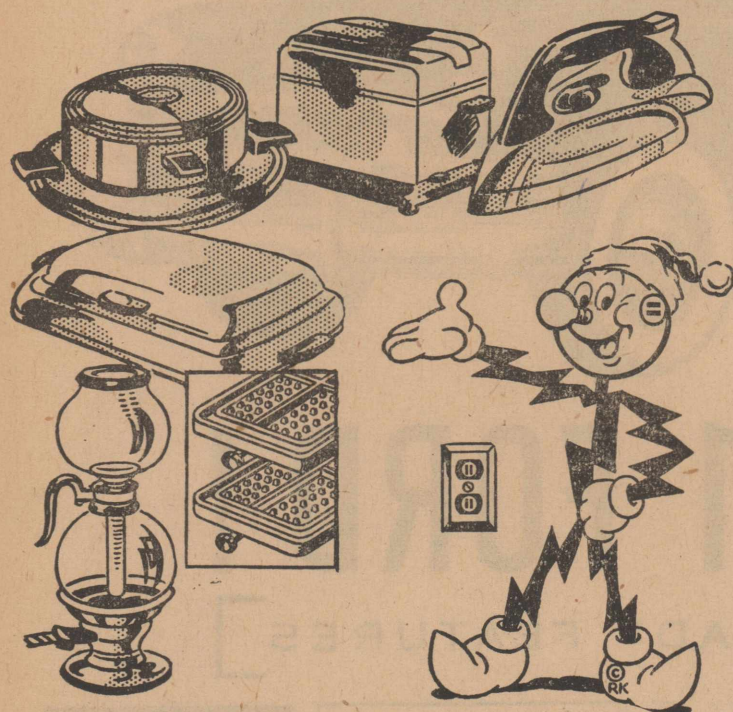

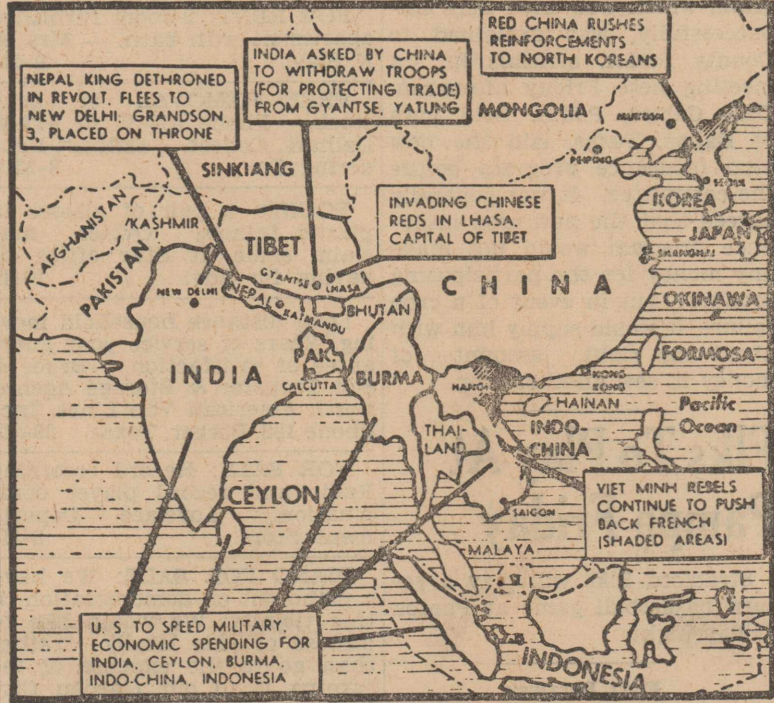

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

Vishinsky Names Only Conditions On Which Russia Will Make Peace; Weather Hampers Allies in Korea

(EDITOR'S NOTE: When opinions are expressed in these columns, they are those of Western Newspaper Union's news analysts and not necessarily of this newspaper.)

UNITED NATIONS: Formula for Peace

Russia's Andrei Y. Vishinsky in a slashing, abusing speech in the United Nations general assembly outlined a series of conditions which he said must be accepted before there could be world peace. He made it plain that there was no other possible ground for the settlement of east-west differences. The main condition of Vishinsky's speech was the demand that the Chinese Communists be allowed a seat in the United Nations. Russia has long battled for admission of China in the U.N., but the tone of Vishinsky's speech was much stronger than it had been on other occasions.

- The main points of Vishinsky's demands: 1. A pledge not to try to get around the veto. 2. Unconditional prohibition of the atomic-bomb. 3. Armed forces under exclusive control of the security council. 4. Aid to backward countries under international control. 5. Development of international trade without discrimination.

These were the demands reportedly given to Secretary-General Trygve Lie when he visited Prime Minister Stalin during his trip to Moscow in May. Lie's refusal to accept them is believed the reason the Russians opposed his re-election as secretary-general.

Many observers saw a threat in a part of Vishinsky's speech. He said if these demands were ignored it would be idle to think of peace being achieved through the U. N.

KOREA: In Ice and Snow

In ice and snow, with the mercury often below zero, United Nations forces in Korea continued a slow advance against Communist troops.

Snow and ice made operations slow and dangerous. Supply routes far to the rear were blocked making it necessary to depend on air drops.

Military leaders reported approximately 100,000 Chinese and Korean Communists were established in a 60-mile line below the great hydroelectric plants on the Yalu river border between Korea and Manchuria. An all-out battle in the area was expected.

The advance has been carried out behind devastating air attacks by the U. S. air force.

American officers said the advance was progressing "well," but just how fast they go depends on a great deal upon the weather. In many of the mountain passes wind had piled snow 10 to 12 feet deep. Meanwhile, the Russians are making new threats concerning the Korean conflict. Among other things, they charge that Japanese soldiers are now being used in Korea.

According to the Soviet, a Chinese-Russian treaty calls for their intervention whenever Japanese troops are used against the Chinese. Some sources believed this could be another step in the Russian plan for justification of her throwing men and planes into the conflict. Others believe, however, that Russia would not take such a step.

WHOLESALE PRICES

Wholesale Index at All-Time High

The bureau of labor statistics reported wholesale prices hit an all-time high during the second week of November. The new index was an advance of .6 of a per cent in one week and was 8.7 per cent above the June 20 level, before the Korean fighting. All commodities other than farm products and foods again advanced to another peak, 9.3 per cent above

NPA Chief



William H. Harrison, standing, national production administrator, ordered a 35 per cent reduction in civilian aluminum supplies and warned that the action will result in some unemployment and higher prices for aluminum products next year. The order is effective January 1, 1951.

DEFENSE:

Nerve Center Moved The air force announced that headquarters for the nation's defense against air attack will be moved from New York to Colorado Springs, Colo. The move takes the nerve center of air defense of the U. S. 1,650 miles from the Atlantic ocean, deep into the interior for safety reasons.

The move emphasized the fact that the oceans surrounding the country are no longer a barrier against attack. The swing to the west also lent emphasis to the strategic concept that if present tension with Russia should erupt into World War III, the gravest danger of aerial blows against the United States would focus on the northwest "gateway."

Observers pointed out that guided missiles, conceivably with atomic warheads, could be fired from submarines lying a few miles off the present headquarters, at Mitchell Field, N. Y., thus destroying the defense center with one blow.

The center now controls both the east and west air-defense forces. Some 800 military and civilian personnel will be assigned to the new center. Lt. Gen. Ennis C. Whitehead will be in command.

EUROPE:

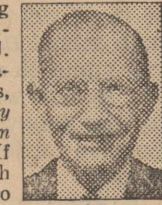
Prewar Production Western Europe, with American aid, increased exports and industrial output above prewar levels, the economic co-operation administration announced.

The report was an encouraging trend in the west's battle against communism. The gains must be increased, however, to support the load of arming for defense against communism. The E.C.A. said: "The urgency to rearm has emphasized the importance for western Europe of continuing its progress toward the economic goals of the recovery program. The required expansion in military production cannot be achieved unless Europe's economic base is further strengthened."

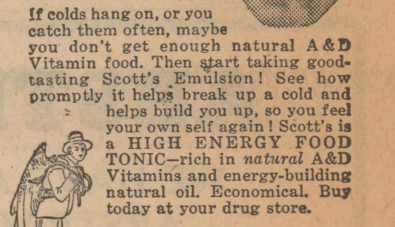

Bit of Wyoming's Wild West Retained in National Parks

"Away out west" in Wyoming, something not yet old has been added to Uncle Sam's Jackson Hole national monument and Grand Teton national park.

The Rockefeller family's gift to the U.S. government—covering more than 33,000 acres of land lying within these two areas—is new by recent presentation. It is old because it includes bait of the pioneers' "Wild West," to be held untouched for nature lovers amid the cultivated fields, ranches, and expanding communities of modern America.

In northwest Wyoming, just south of Yellowstone, the Jackson Hole and Teton regions recall scenes of natural grandeur which greeted the first explorers and fur trappers to push into the Rocky Mountain country of Indians and wild game. Then vast numbers of elk, moose, bison, black and grizzly bears, deer, and beaver populated these mountains and valleys.

Many wild animals still haunt the western Wyoming region. Visitors report that antelope race their cars along open-range roads; beavers often annoy farmers by damming irrigation ditches, and Jackson Hole ranchers have built high fences to protect their haystacks against marauding elk.

The first white man to see the majestic Teton Range rising west of the lush green valley now known as Jackson Hole is believed to have been John Colter. In 1807-8, this woodsman and trapper, previously on the Lewis and Clark expedition, crossed and recrossed the mountains. Traveling alone, with a 30-pound pack and gun, Colter also penetrated the northern wilderness on this trip, discovering Yellowstone.

Tastier Drinking Water Promised by New Technique

City drinking water free from unpleasant odors and tastes has been made possible by a new technique which for the first time can isolate and analyze the water's minute organic contaminants.

The water supply of key cities along the Ohio river will be investigated by using the new test as the first step in removing the impurities.

In the course of a year the average adult will consume less than a quartet teaspoonful of organic matter present as impurities in the water he drinks. Yet this small amount of organic matter can and frequently does impart a wide variety of unpleasant tastes and odors to a year's quota of water for an adult.

Big strides forward are being made in successfully handling the taste and odor problem this minute quantity of organic material causes. However, the exact nature and chemical properties of the trace amounts of organic matter in the water have remained almost completely unknown. What has long been needed is a method for recovering the extremely dilute dissolved organic matter from the water so that its composition and properties might be investigated.

Enemies of Lemming

The most dangerous natural enemies of the lemming are the snowy owl, the arctic fox and ermine, who depend almost exclusively on the lemming as their winter fare. The snowy owl—white except for sharp, black bars across the body—is a born and trained hunter, equipped with ice-pick sharp claws for seizing a victim. Though the owl travels south during a season of lemming migration, he rarely breeds outside his home in the arctic circle. The ermine, thin and sinuous, is more successful than the fox in hunting down the lemming in the rodent's years of scarcity. The ermine can travel the lemming roads—built in the winter under a heavy blanket of snow—while the fox must smell and search and dig for his food.

Christmas Seal Idea Conceived By Danish Clerk

Credit for conceiving the idea for Christmas seals belongs to a Danish postal clerk, Einer Holboell, who in the holiday season of 1903 was sorting mail in the postoffice of Copenhagen. As he went through the stacks of Christmas mail, it occurred to him that if each sender bought a sticker and attached it to each package, the proceeds would aid in fighting tuberculosis and add color to the gifts.

He mentioned it to some of his fellow workers. The scheme appealed to them and it was passed along through the office. The clerks discussed it with customers. The idea spread about Copenhagen, and eventually King Christian heard about it. The ruler approved and decided in favor of trying it with Queen Louise's likeness on each stamp.

It was too late to put the idea into execution that year, but in 1904, four million seals were sold in the Copenhagen postoffice. So popular did the stamps become that Holboell heard of one old woman who returned some letters without Christmas seals, declaring emphatically that she didn't want to know people who didn't use the stamps.

A woman, Miss Emily Bissel, who worked with the Red Cross, started the sale of seals in this country. She was seeking \$300 for a little open air hospital for tuberculosis patients. She designed a stamp and persuaded friends to help with the printing and sale of them. When the campaign bogged down, she went to Philadelphia where she met Leigh Mitchell Hodges, a columnist for the Philadelphia North American. He heard Miss Bissel's plans and discussed them with E. A. Van Valkenburg, city editor. Van Valkenburg gave full approval and told Hodges to give the project his entire time. He also asked for 50,000 seals to be sold in the newspaper's office.

The campaign brought startling results. Miss Bissel found she had \$3,000 instead of \$300 she had started to raise. And the Christmas seal campaign became a national institution.

First Yule Card Designed in 1842

Supplying the U.S. with Christmas cards is a \$100,000,000-a-year business, employing 500,000 Americans. Yet the first Christmas card, engraved a little over a century ago, was a financial failure!

The world's first Yule card was designed in 1842 by William Maw Egley, a 16-year-old engraver's ap-

prentice in London, England. Space was left at the bottom for the sender's signature. William printed 100 copies, intending to sell them to his friends.

But the conservative English scoffed at the idea. Egley and his cards were forgotten, until one of the historic greetings was accidentally discovered in 1941 in the British Museum.

With changing social customs, Christmas cards rapidly won popularity after being reintroduced by a courageous publisher in 1862.

Dunce Gap

The Capitelli is a special feature of the Christmas feasting in Italy. It is served on a plate and looks for all the world like an aggregation of miniature dunce caps.

These little caps are made of noodle dough and encase a filling consisting of white meat of chicken and chopped pork mixed with egg and spices.

A whole plate of these inch-high "dunce caps" are served with sauce or dressing known as Montarde de Cremona which, made of fruits, mustard and spices, has a tinge of mustard but does not bite and is therefore known as "a mustard which is not."

Sharing Our Faith

Lesson for December 10, 1950

SCRIPTURE: Acts 8:1-13; 18:1-7; I Corinthians 9:16-17; II Corinthians 5:17-20; Philippians 1:12-16; 2:12-18. DEVOTIONAL READING: Romans 1:8-17.

A COMMON sight in cities of ancient times was the "libation." Statues of gods or goddesses stood at every prominent corner, in every yard; they were as numerous as billboards today.

Before one of these statues some one would be pouring out wine from a cup or goblet, an offering of thanksgiving or dedication. Saint Paul even used the libation as a figure of speech to describe himself. My life, he said to his friend Timothy, is being poured out—there was not much left of it, but all of it, every drop, would be poured out as an offering to God.

Dr. Foreman

Miser of Life or Spender? PAUL was no miser of life. If life was a full cup, it was not a cup with a tight lid, not like one of your grandmother's jars of very special preserves to be saved and saved but never used. Paul was a spender of life. Whatever God had given him was to be poured out, not to be saved.

There is something in every one's cup of life; something that spoils if kept too long, something fragrant and beautiful when poured out in service. The miser of life finds that life at last turns sour on him. The spender of life finds that as he has given, in the same measure it will be given him.

Faith Can't Be Hoarded ONE very important part of our Christian life is highlighted for us in this week's Scripture: his faith. Indeed, faith ought not to be a part of life for the Christian. Faith is no more a "part" of life than sunshine is a part of the out-of-doors. Without the sunshine there might as well not be any out-of-doors. So without faith the Christian's life would be mere existence.

The question is: What do we do with our faith? Do we keep it for ourselves alone or do we pass it on?

Last summer a man tried to get a grocery store to take back 100 pounds of sugar which he had laid up during World War II. He had hoarded it till it was hard as rock and he could not use a pound of it. (The grocery would not take it back, and it served him right.) Faith is like that. It is sweet and good—but only if we use it and share it, not if we keep it to ourselves.

What is Sharing Faith?

SHARING your faith means helping others to have a faith at least as strong as your own. All around us there are persons who have no faith at all. They are discouraged, blue, bewildered, at loose ends—in the sad old phrase, they are lost. Sharing your faith means sharing it with just such people.

With some things, the more you give away the less you have left; but the arithmetic of religion is different. The more you give away, the more you have. Shared faith is living faith; shared faith is growing faith.

There are more ways than one of sharing our faith. One way is to talk about it. A person can "give a testimony" in a prayermeeting, and share faith that way; but this is not the only way. A person who merely talks about faith is a little like a gardener who is proud of his own garden and brags on it, but never helps his neighbors with theirs.

How Can We Do It Every Day?

REMEMBER, what we are really trying to share when we "share the gospel" or "share Christ" is not an argument, a set of propositions. The big thing is not arguing other people into becoming Christians.

Very few persons have ever become Christians because someone one talked them into it. Talk has its place, and every Christian should be eager to say a good word for Jesus Christ at every chance. But good words for Jesus have their best effect when they come from a life that is really His.

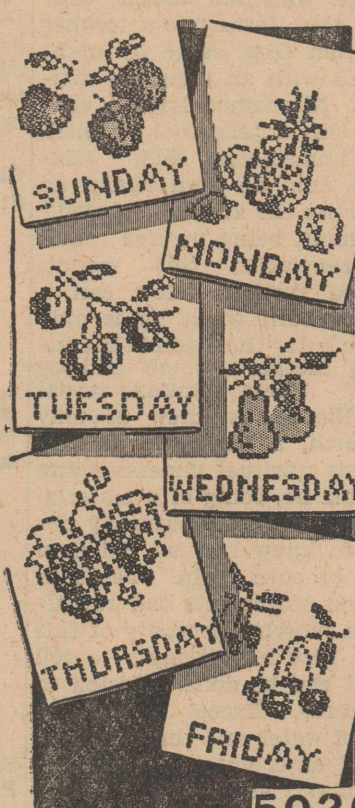
A Christian whose faith is something put on on Sundays with the "church clothes" is not going to have any great success as a soul-winner. We can't share faith we don't have; we can't share second-hand or imitation faith. NICODEMUS AND THE NEW BIRTH

(By Clyde Aly)
 Text: John 3:5

Nicodemus, a ruler of the Jews and one who had become convinced that Jesus was a teacher sent from God, came by night to Jesus with an inquiring attitude. Nicodemus having confessed his intellectual belief, Jesus immediately said, "Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God." Nicodemus, being puzzled and wondering what this meant, inquired further, "How can a man be born when he is old? Can he enter the second time into his mother's womb and be born?" These questions reveal that Nicodemus knew of only one birth, a fleshy birth, and that his spiritual understanding was dull. So, being of a material understanding, he naturally desired to know how an old man might be born again. Jesus, in his first statement, had revealed the supreme necessity of this birth; now he attempts to tell how it can be done. Listen to his words, "Except a man be born of water and the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God." As in the fleshy birth, certain elements are involved, so also in the spiritual birth. Jesus says that water and the Spirit are the two essential elements of this birth.

As to the significance of these elements the world is at variance. It is indispensable that a man be born of both to be born again, not begotten of one and born of another. True it is that the Greek word used here for "born" can be interpreted as "begotten" or "born." However, the laws of exegesis will not allow two meanings to be given to a word of definite action at the same time. Hence, one must be "born" of both water and the Spirit. It is seen that baptism is the act by which we are placed in and delivered from the water, according to the teaching of the Spirit, and thus we are born of water and of the Spirit. The Spirit has appointed water as the means for this birth.

Jesus spoke and in so doing corrected Nicodemus' mistaken idea of the birth. He says, "That which is born of the flesh is flesh; and that which is born of the Spirit is Spirit." Jesus meant a moral transition of the spiritual man.

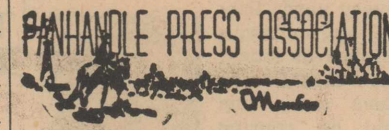
"Marvel not that I said unto thee, Ye must be born again." Jesus well understood that Nicodemus was unaware that the spiritual man and not the fleshy body was the subject of this birth. Hence, he continues with an illustration. "The wind bloweth where it listeth, and thou hearest the sound thereof, but canst not tell whence it cometh and whither it goeth; so is everyone that is born of the Spirit." Even for our own understanding of this illustration we must realize the situation of Nicodemus, that is, his difficulty in understanding the second birth. With this in mind

we can readily see that Jesus meant to convey the idea of the existence of a spiritual man, which is changed by the new birth, not by a miraculous means, but through baptism as appointed by the Spirit. The fact is that as the wind cannot be seen nor traced, so the transition of the inner man is invisible and is not comprehended in a material sense.

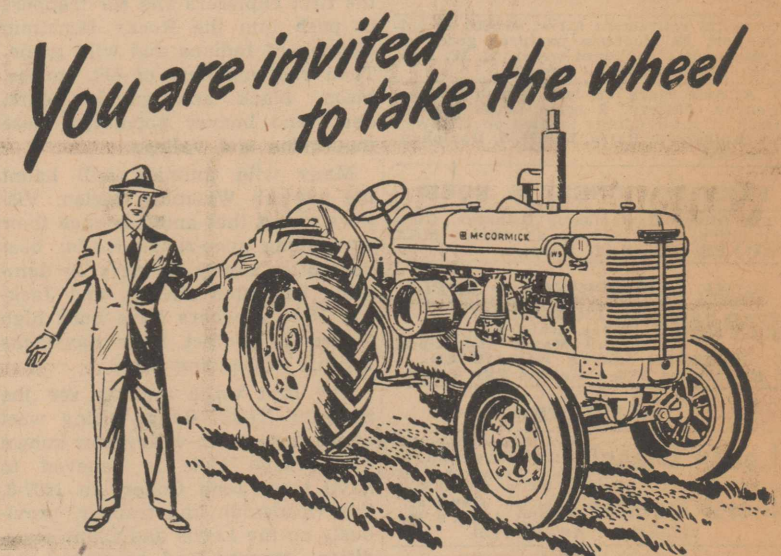
