Strange Poison Takes Toll In Wohlford Herd

Twenty-one 2-year old heifers and 17 calves of the Sam Wohlford herd died Tuesday and Wednesday as the result of what veterinarians believe to be a chemical poisoning.

A strong peculiar odor was noticed near the Wohlford home Monday night in a pasture in which a gas well is located. As the dead cattle were first found in low spots where the odor was noticed Tuesday morning gas poisoning was suspected. The toxic poison continued to kill cattle during the day Tuesday and Wednesday afternoon although they were moved to another pasture.

Chemical analysis in the Pantex laboratories in Amarillo ruled out bacterial disease and plant poisoning as the cause of the animals' deaths.

Samples of soil, grass, and shale from around the gas well, and organs of the animals upon which autopsies were performed were sent to Dallas laboratories for analysis. Reports of the findings of the Dallas laboratories are expected Friday.

Wohlford's loss is estimated between \$13,000 and \$14,000. Elmer Heiskell recently lost 16 head of cattle. Veterinarians working on the Wohlford case have not made any comment on the similarity of the cases.

Gay extinguished the flames with a fire extinguisher. He believes he fanned out the flames on his feet while running for the extinguisher.

Bucky Walters Leads Marines In 10 Mile Reconnaissance Dash

Pfc. Bernard (Bucky) Walters, with the Fleet Marine Force Korea, gave a demonstration of his training in basketball and track work while volunteering his services with a patrol in enemy territory. He was commended by the Commanding Officer who gave him the highest honor or he had to offer, the last two cans of beer which the company possessed which were his ration.

Bernard's account of his experiences were related to his mother, Mrs. Blanche Walters, in the following letter.

Received your last letter June 25. As yet I haven't received your box and the three letters but I've sure got an eye open for them. Yes, I have been getting the Stratford Star. I realize my part of the letter to Wayne Harding was censored. You were right about the word scalps. I will try bringing them home with me when I can. If they censored the letter, the scalps probably wouldn't get through either. So if I can, I'll carry them home. We are allowed to take one souvenir home with us. That is all. I plan on getting a rifle or a burp gun. (If things end soon) I'll be home some time in the near future.

Mom, yesterday I really was given high praise. I went out with a squad patrol. My radio was needed. A Lieutenant, myself, and about 10 or 11 other fellows were sent out to get information. We were about five miles out and we set up a mountain perimeter defense, while the Lieut., myself and the radio and a fire team of four men, went on down the mountain and into a little village near a river. In one house we found an old man, his wife, 2 children and a small baby. The old man was crazy, the baby sick, and we couldn't get any information from them. So we continued our house to house search for what we might be able to find for information, and maybe a prisoner, as this village was of enemy nature. The UN troops had not taken it. It was located about 10 miles in front of our lines in enemy territory. We found one other old man in this village. He seemed to be about dead; not a thing moved. Believe me Mom, the village was just that, nothing but houses. This last man I mentioned was in his seventies, nothing but skin and bones. He was too weak to move and there were a million flies on him, all over his nose and mouth. He knew nothing so the six of us continued on our planned route when we noticed two of the enemy in a rice paddy. They saw us about the same time. Since our job was to gain information and not to engage the enemy in combat, we ducked into an irrigation ditch and crawled as far as it went. As we ended the crawl an open paddy lay between us and cover of trees. As man after man ran this open field not a shot was fired. That is until only 4 men remained. As the man ahead of me got up to run, things began popping. I was pinned down with two others. But one at a time we ran the open field, like we used to do the 100-yard dash in high school. Only this time, even with the 47 pound radio, the Lieutenant said I set a world record. The man who crossed behind me really came over fast too because the bullets kicked up dust behind his heels. But we all made it to the trees. As we kept moving in this manner a man at a time we had to turn up a ravine which I know was a 55 degree angle. Although there was no path we actually ran up it. Every time we would stop (excuse the expression) the damn Gooks shot at us, and we had to start running again. The heat was terrific. Finally after a couple of hours one man became ill with heat exhaustion, which slowed us down. We could go only a few yards at a time and he would fall. The sun got the best of him and he went out of his mind. The Gooks got within small arms fire and they began firing at us again. So we began running up even steeper mountains. You don't realize what physical endurance you can put out until a moment like that. I don't know how we made it but we got to the rest of our patrol and safety. The Gooks followed us all the way until we got to our mountain perimeter defense where the rest of the patrol was set for such action. Things quieted down from then on. It took us 12 hours all together to get out there and back. When we got back the C.O. (commanding officer) made this speech.

"Due to your patrol activities in which you carried a 45 pound radio besides your ammunition and pistol, while the rest of the patrol carried only ammunition and rifle which weighed about 15 pounds, and while carrying radio and said pounds did so at no

strain, underwent unbelievable physical endurance while under fire from enemy troops, did so carry radio of said pounds over terrain undesirable even to the enemy, did so run, and was first to climb such heights with no complaint, or show of physical strain whatsoever, while other men carrying only rifle and ammunition, were overcome by heat exhaustion. Did carry and transmit to our lines, every detail of patrol's exploits, by radio while accomplishing these impossible physical feats." "I present to you Mr. Walters, an example of a true man and Marine, the highest award available for me to give you at this time." "I present to you in gratitude of the men who were on patrol with you, and who told me of your undying physical endurance, these two cans of Pabst Blue Ribbon beer, which are the last two in the company, which were mine. I present to you."

I might add that he laid it on plenty thick. If you were being shot at you could be first up a mountain top. To be truthful with you I wasn't about to stop. Anyway I got skippers (C.O.'s) only two cans of beer which was like hitting a gold mine. You see now days its so hot here that a can of beer is a true life saver. In fact anything liquid is a life saver. I not only got the beer but a day just lazying around to recuperate. Also Mom I want to say I was actually praying along with every one of the six men all the way back. It just so happened the Good Lord heard our prayers. (I'm sure Bro. Nick would like to know that.) I had only two thoughts during the experience, prayer and of you. But during this time I new some way we would make it.

Mom don't think I do this patrol business all the time. It so happened the radioman who was to go was sick and so I (like a fool) volunteered myself and radio. So don't worry, I don't go on patrols. I usually just sit here, write letters and take life easy. I know you think I'm trying to ease your mind a little, but it's true that I have no dangerous job. It just so happened the Good Lord wanted me on that patrol, so he made the radioman sick, and had me go in his place. The Lord had me experience the rest of these experiences of a patrol to prove to me, that believing in God and home and family, will bring a man through strain he doesn't know he can endure. Don't worry mother I am home O.K. and safe as a baby now. As I said before, danger is not my job. I usually set back here and write long letters to you, so don't worry. I will not pull that trick again. It just so happened the Lord wanted to prove a point to me, and did so by placing me on the patrol.

I'm still waiting for the cookies with hungry eyes and so are a couple of dozen other guys. P.S. Enclosed are leaflets U.N. pilots dropped to the enemy encouraging them to give up for a fair deal.

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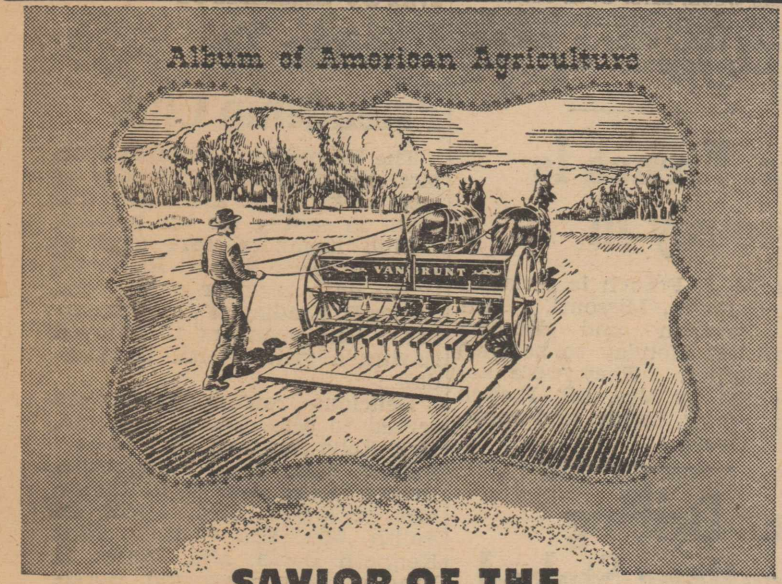

Popular Trees
A number of reports are coming into the County Agents office of small worms defoliating popular trees around homes. These worms can be controlled with application of DDT as a spray on the foliage. Application of 50% strength wettable DDT powder at a rate of one pound to twenty-five gallons of water has given very good results.

If this spray fails to control the worms chlordane may be used as recommended by the company producing the chemical.

Unless these worms are controlled they usually defoliate the tree and may do considerable damage, besides making the tree rather unsightly.

Picking Peaches

(By Dorothy Dixon, County Home Demonstration Agent)

Popular as peaches are, food shoppers should know them well enough to do an expert job of buying. With the peach season coming on, the following pointers should be remembered. Choose mature peaches, which have a creamy or yellowish ground color. This is more important to look for than the pretty blush which some well-flavored varieties never have at all. Avoid peaches with dark green ground color, for these are immature and will not ripen satisfactorily.


The firm-textured clingstone peaches are grown mainly for commercial canning and are also well suited to home pickling. The freestone varieties are favorites for table use and also for home canning because of fine flavor, even though they do not hold shape so well.

Yellow-fleshed peaches offer a bonus of somewhat more vitamin A value than the white-fleshed kinds. But generally speaking, you can expect a half-cup of sliced raw peaches to provide about 15 percent of the vitamin A and about 10 percent of the vitamin C recommended

AROUND THE HOUSE

If possible, avoid using water on venetian blinds because, on wooden ones, it may cause warping and cracking of the paint; with metal ones, rust is always a hazard when the paint gets thin.

If you're too proud to wear a dustcap for housework, better forget your pride when sifting ashes or doing similar dusty jobs in the cellar. Get your shower cap from the bathroom and put it on.

If you can afford the space when curtains are stored, hang them full length on coat hangers to avoid wrinkles and creases.

Ordinary oil paints are seldom satisfactory on hot-water boilers. Even if the paint is applied while the boiler is cold and dry, the subsequent heat will crack the paint.

To save floors in muddy weather, fashion your own shoe cleaner to keep just outside the door. Nail an ordinary scrubbing brush upside down on a block of wood; or, to be a little more elaborate, attach two brushes, face to face, about five inches apart, on the wooden block. Family and guests have only to run their shoes between the brushes to get the mud off before entering.

Rubber heel marks and the like can be removed from wooden floors easily by rubbing them with a cloth dipped in kerosene, benzine, gasoline or cleaning fluid. None of these liquids will damage the finish on the floor, but all will remove any wax that's present; so be sure to re-wax the spot after removing the marks.

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons

Community Living

Lesson for July 22, 1951

THERE is one way to get along in any neighborhood without any trouble at all: just have nothing to do with any one. But that is no only not a Christian way of living it is not practicable.

You need the community and the community needs you. If you want to tell the world goodbye, go rent yourself a room on the 17th floor of some apartment house in New York. You won't be bothered with callers! But if you live in the typical American town or country community, you not only cannot help knowing every body more or less, but you want to know them, you need to know them.

The Community Includes Everybody

SOME communities cease to be communities and become exclusive clubs; no strangers can break in. A lady in a very old county in a long-settled state, said of her next-door neighbor: "That family came here sixty years ago; they don't really belong here."

Now a true community ought to include every one in it, and it isn't a real community until it does. Jesus' parable of the sheep and the goats suggests this.

The trouble with the "goats" was that they just never saw the down-and-out members of the community at all. Your own neighborhood has in it, perhaps, some lonely people unfortunate people, some human left-overs. What is the community doing for them?

The Church and Its Own

ONE practical thing that Christians can do for their communities is to see to it that no Christian suffers want. However much we may disagree with the Mormon there is one feature of the Mormon church which the rest of us might take to heart: in all the depression of 20 years ago, there never was a Mormon on relief.

Probably in most small communities the separate congregations are not large enough to do this kind of thing effectively; but surely in a community where there are as many as three or four different denominations, they might all plan together so that whenever any Christian got into a strait, the rest of the Christians would stand by to help him.

There will always be a need for general organizations such as the Red Cross or the Grange and the Community Chest; but if Christians always stood by Christians, the rest of the community would at least have less to worry about.

It Takes All Kinds

THE ideal community is one in which everybody is a Christian and indeed all belong to the same church. But such communities are few and far between. Most of us live pretty close—and sometimes uncomfortably close—to people who are not Christians, except perhaps in name, and who may be hard to get along with.

How can we live with such people in a Christian way? Paul, in Romans 12, makes some practical suggestions. He knew very well that no city or town in the Roman Empire was Christian or anywhere near it; yet he shows how to have the Christian spirit never-the-less.

Christians should be the most valuable members of any community. But are they? Is this true in your community? If so, what is it that the Christians contribute? And if not, is it maybe the Christians' fault?

The Law Above Laws

A group of people who act toward each other in no better way than the laws of the land require may be a neighborhood but it is not a community.

The laws (and useful they are, to be sure) can regulate our behavior, but they cannot touch our hearts. They can forbid us to harm our neighbor, but they cannot force us to feel kindly towards him. For complete community, something more than law is necessary; and again Paul puts us on the track of it.

Love is above all law; it does not break laws but it goes far beyond them. It is not the law-abiding citizens who are the best ones; the true ornaments and treasures, the First Citizens of a community, are the love-abiding.

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Iron Curtain Also Cuts Bering Strait Fur Swaps

Washington, D.C.—The Iron Curtain is also a Fur Curtain between Big and Little Diomedes.

No longer do American cigarettes, tea, flour and sugar buy Siberian fox pelts and walrus-tusk ivory across the three-mile channel of icy water which separates Russian from American soil, midway across Bering Strait, the National Geographic Society reports.

Russian soldiers man a lookout post on a rocky shoulder of Big Diomedes Island, easternmost sentry station of Soviet sovereignty. Staring across the International Date Line at U.S.-owned Little Diomedes, for three years they have cut off all trade and social calls among Eskimo families who literally have relatives on both sides of the world, yet are only a few minutes' paddle apart.

Since the glacial age the Diomedes, twin mountain peaks protruding above the surface of Bering Strait, have served as steppingstones between Asia and America. In 1867 Russia sold Little Diomedes with Alaska to the United States, but retained Big Diomedes.

Each island supports an Eskimo village. Their inhabitants scratch

a living from sea and land by hunting walrus, whales, seals, bears and foxes.

Little Diomedes families, living closer to Siberia than to Alaska, once traded regularly with their Russian neighbors.

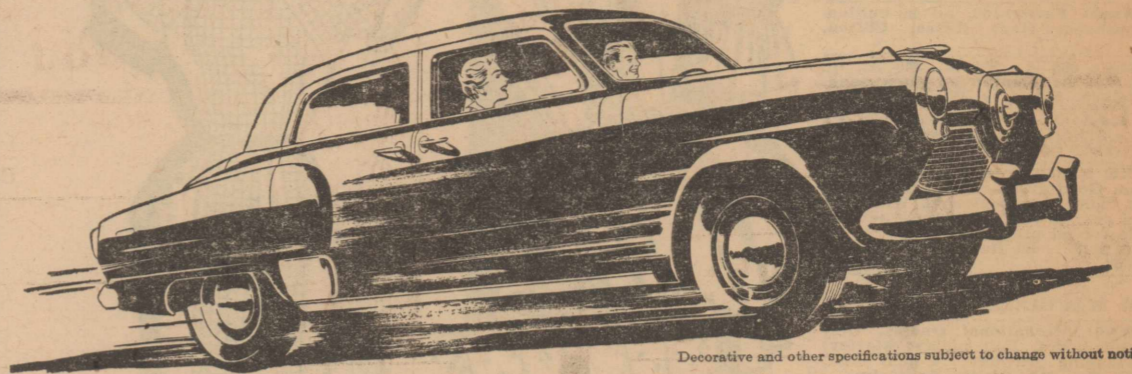
