Tortillas easy to make

corn fake crumbs A test of the recipe produced tortil-

tortillas do when baked. The tortillas
were quite tasty when spread with butter and eaten warm.
For the best results, , ake and serv
he tortils in the tortillas immediately, If they are
leftover and dry out, cut them into leftover and dry out, cut them into
triangles and deep-fry to make tostaditas to garnish reprried beans, use as dippers with guacamole and so forth. or cut them into squares and deep-fry
the squares to make croutons for
soup. When preparing the tortillas, bake
hem just until the edges begin to dry out before turning. Do not allow them to become crisp.

Mix corn flake crumbs, flour and salt. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Make a well in center and add water all at one time. Stir with a fork just until dough holds together. On a lightly floured surface, knead dough gently 10 to 15 strokes. Divide dough into 16 pieces. Form each into a ball. Cover and let stand for 20 minutes. \\
Roll out balls of dough on a lightly floured surface into eircles \(\mathbf{1 - 1 6}\) inch thick and 6 to 7 inches in diameter. \\
Heat a very lightly greased skillet over medium heat. Cook each tortilla 45 seconds on one side. Turn and cook on other side 1 minute. Turn over
