"No court has the right to issue death sentences, and no person should
be executed except under the above two coniditions. Violation of this order
is an offense and liable to punishment," the communique said. There was speculation that the order was in response to fears of the

cution last Wednesday of millionair J Jwish businessman Habib Elghan

It was the second restriction placed by Khomeini on the revolutionary
courts, which are answerable only to him and his secret revolutionary
