# Khomeini puts stiffer limits on executions

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini put a new restriction on his Islamic revolutionary courts, decreeing execution only for persons who killed people or ordered them killed.

Pars, the official news agency, announced the execution of the 205th man to die before Khomeini's firing squads. And the ayatollah heading Tehran's revolutionary court appealed to supporters abroad to assassinate Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi, his wife, mother-in-law and sister, and several of his close advisers, including the former ambassador to the United States, Ardeshir Zahedi.

Khomeini, Iran's Shiite Moslem patriarch and the leader of the revolution that ousted the shah, said in a communique Sunday death sentences would be limited to those "proven to have killed people" and to "any person who has issued orders for the killing of people or who has committed torture resulting in death."

"No court has the right to issue death sentences, and no person should be executed except under the above two conditions. Violation of this order is an offense and liable to punishment," the communique said.

There was speculation that the order was in response to fears of the Iranian Jewish community and foreign criticism resulting from the execution last Wednesday of millionaire Jewish businessman Habib Elghanian. He was convicted of sending Israel funds that the court said were used to finance the killing of Palestinians.

It was the second restriction placed by Khomeini on the revolutionary courts, which are answerable only to him and his secret revolutionary council. Last month he decreed that soldiers and policemen who committed minor offenses during the shah's time were not liable to prosecution.

The latest victim of the firing squads was Parviz Torabi Marashi, the former governor of the city of Behbehan, in southwest Iran, the Pars agency reported. It said he was executed early today for killing, torture and destruction of property.

Ayatollah Sadeq Khalkhali, the chief of the Tehran revolutionary court, issued a list of most-wanted members of the royal regime and told a news conference: "Anyone who wants to assassinate these people in Iran or outside would be carrying out the orders of the court. They cannot be arrested by any foreign government as a terrorist because they will be carrying out the orders of Iran's Islamic revolutionary court."

His hit list included the shah, his wife, Empress Farah Diba, and her mother; Princess Ashraf, a sister of the shah; the last three royal prime ministers, Jaafar Sharif-Emamy, Gholam-Reza Azhari and Shahpour Bakhtiar; the former martial law administrator of Tehran, Gen. Gholam

However, Khalkhali indicated those he listed had not been formally tried in absentia by the revolutionary courts.

"The people of Iran have already condemned them," he said. "Their guilt is proven already.'

The avatollah defended the revolutionary courts and their procedures and said they were comparable to the Nuremberg trials of Nazi leaders

"Those who fought with God on earth or with his prophets, or who spread corruption on earth must be killed, or hanged after they are killed to show their bodies to the people, or their hands and feet must be cut off so they cannot move around, or else they must be banished," he said.

'We do not believe in Western law. Islamic law prohibits defense lawyers unless the defendant is dumb and cannot talk. Those who have been on trial - you can ask them yourselves - haven't been tortured so they can speak freely.

So far, the revolutionary courts have only passed sentences of death and imprisonment. No hands or feet have been cut off, and there have been no banishments. And although photographs of the bodies of those executed have been published, there has been no public display of the

# SALT faces 'risk', Vance says

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate runs the "grave risk" of killing the new strategic arms limitation treaty with the Soviet Union if it tries to amend it, Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance says.

And he warns that if the Senate fails to ratify the pact, it could cause 'some unraveling in the NATO alli-

Vance, who last week wrapped up lengthy negotiations with the Soviets on a new arms pact, argued the administration's case for treaty ratification Sunday on NBC's "Meet the Press." He was joined by Defense Secretary Harold Brown.

This treaty is a very carefully drafted document, drafted over a period of almost seven years," Vance said. "It is interrelated and intertwined, and various parts of it bear upon other parts. Therefore, to amend any part runs a grave risk of killing the treaty completely.

He added that he could "think of no real substantive change in terms of an amendment that wouldn't jeopardize the existence of the treaty.

However, Sen. Howard Baker, the Senate's minority leader and a candidate for the 1980 Republican presidential nomination, said Sunday he thought it was "very unlikely" the Senate would approve the treaty as

Two-thirds of the Senate must ratify any treaty for it to go into effect. Opponents of the pact argue the United States would not be able to determine adequately whether the Soviets were cheating on terms of the treaty because of the recent loss of intelligence monitoring stations in

President Carter and Soviet President Leonid I. Brezhnev are scheduled to sign the treaty at a summit meeting next month in Vienna, Aus-

Baker, who says he has not made a final decision on whether to support the pact, suggested that the Senate might ask Carter to take the treaty back to the Soviets to renegotiate parts of it. The Tennessee lawmaker made his remarks on ABC's "Issues and Answers.'

Another senator expected to be influential in the upcoming Senate debate, Sam Nunn, predicted the administration would have an "uphill fight" in winning approval but said ratification was possible.

The Georgia Democrat, in an interview on CBS' "Face the Nation," also said there was "validity to the argument of the administration, when they say that significant amendments could, in effect, be tantamout to defeating the treaty.

"But if I decide I cannot support the treaty as it now stands, yes, I will support amendments, and I will have to let the chips fall where it may, as far as the Russian interpretation of that," said Nunn, who chairs the Senate subcommittee on military man-

The Soviet press has run commentaries the last few days expressing the Kremlin's concern about Senate ratification.

In Sunday's editions, Pravda charged that American military-industrial circles opposed to the treaty are conducting a "hysterical" campaign in a last-ditch bid to scuttle it.

The Communist Party newspaper said, "Politicians in the United States who raise obstacles to the ... agreement assume grave responsibility to their own people" and the rest of the

Carter, in an interview Friday with out-of-town editors, again warned about the effect of a Senate rejec-

"Rejection of the treaty will have the most devastating consequences to our country and, I think, to world peace," he said. "It will sever, to a substantial degree, the workable relationship between ourselves and the Soviets.'

Vance, arguing for ratification, also ticked off the possible consequences of a Senate defeat: fueling the nuclear arms race, causing "grave concern" among NATO members and maybe even "some unraveling" in that alliance, and straining severely U.S.-Soviet relations.

He said rejection could hinder U.S. efforts to stem the flow of nuclear weapons to countries which do not

Defense Secretary Brown said the

treaty would enhance the nation's security and the United States would be able to verify its terms.

"There is no doubt in my mind that the world would be safer with the SALT agreement than without it," he

## Terry County man jailed in shootings of Lamesa pair

LAMESA — A 78-year-old man is dead and his 22-year-old son was in serious condition today after a shooting incident here about 11:25 p.m. Sunday, according to a spokesman for the Lamesa Police Department.

A 44-year-old Terry County man was in Lamesa City Jail today in connection with the incident, said Capt. Gary Brown. Bond was set early today at \$100,000, he added.

Dead is Vincent Vasquez Sr. According to officials, he died from a gunshot wound to the chest.

Admitted to Lubbock Methodist Hospital Sunday was Vincent Vasquez Jr., being treated for gunshot wounds to his left wrist, right hand and groin area, according to Brown.

The officer said he was told a man walked into the Vasquez residence on the east side of town and questioned the residents about another shooting incident which took place a month

The man then pulled out a .22-caliber pistol and began firing, according to the police spokesman.

A Terry County man was arrested about 1:15 a.m. today 11 miles south of Brownfield by Terry County and Lamesa officers, said Brown.

People are making more money today than they ever have in their lives, or even in the history of the United States. But, these same people are finding it harder and harder to make ends meet.

Even in Midland, which ranks among the top metropolitan areas in the state in the amount of money in bank deposits, people are discovering that saving for a down payment on a house is becoming more difficult.

And when a person finally makes it to that magic number for a down payment and he qualifies for a loan, there is no guarantee a money institution can fulfill his needs. Inflation is working like a two-

edged sword for potential homeowners and the bank or savings insti-



In Texas, especially, where the interest rate cannot rise above 10 percent, savings and loan associations are finding themselves on the short end of the money line.

**INTEREST RATES** in Midland are hovering around 9.85 percent, barely under the limit. But loan institutions are complaining that because they cannot charge a higher interest rate, they are losing money on the loans.

Mike Nance, vice president in charge of loans at Citizens Savings & Loan Association, said loan associations in Texas are having problems selling loans and making enough of a profit to lend out more money.

He explained that banks compile about a \$500,000 package of loans they have made to people in the community. This package is sold for a 90 percent participation to a second buyer, and the association retains 10 percent of it.



The problem recently has been that local savings and loan institupart two tions have been of a series paying the mort-

gage corporation 10.4 percent interest when they obtain money to loan to people. But, the bank itself can only charge 9.875 percent interest. meaning the bank winds up with a loss." Nance said.

To put it in simple terms, the savings and loan poeple buy their funds for home loans. If there is not enough of a spread between what they pay for the money and what they get back on it as a loan, they can't afford to loan

TO EASE THE situation, the S&L people are charging discount points to the seller. "This raises the yield on our loan so we can afford to sell it."

Each discount point is one-half of 1 percent of the total selling price of the house. The extra money makes up for what the loan institution is losing on the money.

Nance explained that about a year ago, the interest rate was 91/4 to 91/2 percent, and the secondary market rate was about the same. "We could sell loans and make money off them,"

The limit on interest rate is cutting out more secondary buyers, according to Joan Ramey, president of the Midland Board of Realtors.

"In Texas, 65 percent of our mortgage money is imported, or comes from out-of-state investors. With the 10 percent ceiling in Texas, investors have been putting their money in other states where the interest rate is higher." she said.

"This means a cutback on available funds to loan out."

THIS LEADS to another price squeeze in which the savings and loan people are borrowing money from their customers who take out eightyear certificates of deposit (CDs) and

then lending it for a 30-year period, Nance said:

In the last six months there has been an increase of money in the money institutions, and this came with the \$10,000 six-month CDs which yield slightly more than 9 percent interest, he said.

The current shortage of home loans seems to run in cycles, according to Nance. There was a period in 1973-74 and another in 1968-69. "The government needs money to cover its debts, and it holds back on home loan money. Then when the debt is covered, they come out with government subsidized house loans," the

banker explained. Mrs. Ramey said there have been more Federal Housing Administration and Veterans Administration housing loans made recently in Mid-

A USURY BILL before the state Legislature in Austin would increase the interest rate on loans to 12 percent, but it has been the subject of controversy. There has been an amendment attached to it, Mrs. Ramey said, which would alleviate the fear that future homeowners

would get caught with a 12 percent loan if the rates went down. The person could renegotiate his loan with the bank, she said.

And even if the interest rates go up, economists believe a house is one of the best investments. Michael Sumichrast, chief econo-

mist of the National Association of Home Builders, and Lew Sichelman, real estate editor for The Washington Star, wrote recently that, considering the consumer price index goes up 12 percent this year, a 10 percent loan would be beating that rate by 2 per-


"And because inflation is bound to continue, you'll be paying off that loan with cheaper and cheaper dollars," they wrote.

THE FIRST FEW years will be harder to make the payments, they agree. "But they (house payments) won't look nearly so large when your income increases a few thousand dollars more and the share of your income you pay toward the house de-





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## China charges Vietnam with trying to 'poison relations'

TOKYO (AP) — China charged today that Vietnam's claims to the Spratly and Paracel islands in the South China Sea are an attempt to "further poison relations between China and Vietnam.'

Xinhua (Hsinhua), the official Chinese news agency, said Vietnam should remove troops that have been in the Nansha (Spratly) islands since 1975 and give up its "illegal" claims to them and the Xisha (Paracel) group if it wants to improve relations

between the two countries.

The islands in the South China Sea have been "an inalienable part of China since ancient times," Xinhua said.

After China drove troops of the old South Vietnamese government off the Paracels in 1974, "Vietnamese authorities had the cheek to claim the islands," the agency said.

"In April of the following year they flagrantly dispatched troops to invade six islands in China's Nansha

Island group," it said. "They are so obsessed by the ambition for territorial expansion that they have gone back on their words and showed bad faith in relations between nations.'

The Paracels are a group of uninhabited coral islands and reefs equidistant from the central coast of Vietnam and China's southern Hainan Island. The Spratlys, also uninhabited except for the Vietnamese troops, are midway between southern Vietnam and Borneo, and the biggest island, which is only 300 yards by 300 yards, was used by the Japanese as a submarine base in World War II.

# Loans no longer easily obtained

majority of loan applicants are people in oil and related industries.

To obtain a house loan, the applicant must have a good credit history, he emphasized. "If there are any problems, it would be better if the people would lay them out on the table when they're talking to a loan offi-

The rule of thumb is that a house payment, including insurance and taxes, is not to exceed more than 25 to 27 percent of the applicant's gross income. Nor should the applicant have more than six to eights months obligation on another loan.

Considering those payments with a house loan, the total cannot exceed 33 to 35 percent of the gross income, Nance said.

The bank also needs an appraisal to compare the fair market price with the selling price, and takes the lower

"Then, we consider the outlook for the applicant's future," Nance said. "If it's someone just starting out, you can bank on his increased earning

Taking a \$40,000 house, which Nance said is getting harder to find, a person could put 10 percent down, or \$4.000. This leaves \$36,000 for the loan. Figuring it at 9.875 percent interest, plus taxes and insurance, would put the monthly payment at \$401.

THIS AMOUNT would be affordable by someone making as little as \$20,000 a year, or \$1,660 a month.

But that \$4,000 isn't all that an applicant needs. He must come up with an estimated \$1,700 in closing costs. Altogether, a potential homeowner needs \$6,000 to be able to move into his house, according to Nance.

The way of life throughout the United States, he said, is people buy a house slightly more than they can afford and use it as an investment. In other states, a homeowner can borrow against his house. But in Texas, the only way a person can get his money out of the house is to sell

Because of the investment a house brings the buyer, Nance said he feels the reason for people not being in housing today can be traced to their not wanting a house or not being able to afford the closing costs.

'I feel anyone in Midland who qualifies and wants to buy a house, can

buy a house," he said. In determining a loan, he added the bank does look at the age of the house wanted and its location.

NANCE ALSO maintained the loan people "can not and do not do redlining" in Midland. Red-lining is where a section of town is considered a bad risk for loans and people living in that area have a difficult, if not impossible time, obtaining a loan. The practice is against a federal law, and the banks are checked by state. federal and independent auditors each year for this.

"We have processed loan applications on every quadrant of the city,'

Big Spring Street has been called the dividing line in Midland and people who want their house to appreciate at a high rate are advised to buy west of that line.



A couple of Realtors denied knowledge of the dividing line, saying it makes no difference where a home in Midland is located

But Virgil Jones, tax assessor-collector for the city of Midland, said the three most important factors in real estate are "location, location, location."

"No one can say that an acre on the south side of Midland costs as much as an acre in downtown Midland." he said.

Land values are not as high on the east and south sides of Midland, according to Jones. A three bedroom brick veneer home with two baths and garage is selling today for about \$25,-000 on the south and east side, \$40,000 on the west side and \$50,000 on the far

north section, he added. Construction costs will be the same. no matter where the house is built. But that house won't bring as much money later if it's located on the south or east sides of town, he noted.

"Anytime you are appraising property, location makes all the difference in the world," he concluded.

# U.S., China sign landmark trade agreement

CANTON, China (AP) - China today initialed an agreement with the United States which Commerce Secretary Juanita Kreps said opened the way for the two countries to expand their trade "to its full potential."

She told a news conference Foreign Trade Minister Li Quiang (Li Chiang) initialed the U.S.-China trade agreement in Peking, and it was being flown to Canton for her to initial tonight.

The agreement still must be signed and submitted to Congress for approval. Mrs. Kreps said she hoped that could be accomplished within the next two months, but the end of the year would be a more realistic target

date. "For 30 years the people of the United States have had little or no commercial, or other, contact with nearly one quarter of the population of the world," she said. "Today we take a major step together in resuming the unimpaired exchange of goods and services - and therefore the exchange of experiences, ideas, and

The secretary said the agreement would establish a framework for orderly trade and business, provide reciprocal most-favored-nation status and eliminate a major obstacle to

granting of official credits to China. She also said it would greatly increase business contacts through trade exhibits, individual firm offices and other aids, and would assist medium and smaller-sized companies which have done very little business with China.

"In short, as a result of this agreement we shall be able to expand trade between our countries up to its full potential," she said.

U.S.-Chinese trade was \$1.1 billion in 1978. After diplomatic relations were established in January, U.S. officials projected the figure would hit \$2 billion in 1979 and reach \$3 billion to \$4 billion a year by 1984.

"It was negotiated under terrific pressure and with quite different conceptions," Richard N. Cooper, undersecretary for economic affairs of the Commerce Department, said of the pact. "The Chinese wanted a very general agreement. Our side wanted a lot written down. ?

"There was quite a bit of difference

between the Chinese and American drafts. Part of the process has been our trimming away some of the detail that we would like to have seen in the draft and the Chinese accepting greater and greater detail than would

have been their first preference.' The U.S. Trade Act of 1974 has numerous requirements that the Chinese never faced before in a trade agreement. It requires that U.S. business people receive multiple exit and entry visas and other aids. It requires protection of the U.S. market from disruption by imports and it requires protection for U.S. patents, trademarks and copyrights. Mrs. Kreps and Cooper said that

before the signed trade agreement is submitted to Congress, the administration wants a signed textile agreement. Negotiations for this resume Wednesday in Peking.

Mrs. Kreps left Peking Friday after the signing of a pact that will repay Americans \$80.5 million for assets seized by China in 1949 and free an equal amount of Chinese assets frozen by the United States in retaliation. That document had been holding up the trade agreement.

She also signed four science and technology accords and a trade exhibition agreement, then toured Shanghai and Guilin (Kweilin). On Tuesday she goes to Hong Kong, and on Wednesday to Tokyo for talks there on business and finance.

## South Africa orders interim government

WINDHOEK, South-West Africa (AP) - South Africa today ordered the establishment of an interim government - a white-dominated assembly - for the territory of South-West Africa.

The move is in defiance of Western plans for U.N.-supervised elections leading to independence and follows stepped-up attacks by black guerrillas battling South Africa's control of the territory for 13 years. The territory is administered by

South Africa under a post-World War I, League of Nations mandate revoked by the United Nations in 1966.

In a proclamation published in a government gazette today. Justice M.T. Steyn, the territory's administrator-general, announced the creation of the interim government and said the new South-West Africa-Na-

mibian National Assembly will begin operating May 12. The territory is officially called South-West Africa-Namibia. The 50-member assembly will be

comprised of the territorial assembly elected last December, plus 15 members to be picked by current mem-

The December elections gave the white-dominated Democratic Turnhable Alliance a majority of seats in the assembly and failed to win international recognition. The U.N. settlement plan would have delayed elections until all the black parties had adequate time to campaign.

The new government will make laws and be able to repeal or amend any law or act of the South African Parliament that affects the territory, but its legislation must be signed by

the administrator-general or the state president, Steyn said.

It will not control any legislation affecting the international status of the territory, or the National Assembly itself, he said.

"Up to independence, the umbilical cord between South Africa and SWA-Namibia will, of necessity, have to continue to exist," Steyn said.

In 1966, black nationalists of the South-West Africa People's Organization began a bush war for control of the mineral-rich territory about twice the size of California.

Last week the government accused SWAPO guerrillas of stabbing to death a white grandmother and her two grandchildren and killing a white farmer. SWAPO denied the charges

but the government reacted with stricter security rules.

#### Man snake-sits for 36 days to set record, but he's still not satisfied

HARTBEESPOORT, South Africa (AP) - A 25-year-old carpenter got into the Guiness Book of World Records after 36 days in a snake pit, but he says he may stay two weeks more to protect his record.

Peter Snyman grinned - very carefully - when Jack Seale, the cuarator of the Hartbeespoort Snake Park, told him he had broken the world snake-sitting record on Sun-

ing around him. "Now that I've broken the record, the inclination to get out of the cage is greater." He originally planned a 40-day stay, but he might hold out for 50, he said.

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


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
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
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
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
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## Dole announces his candidacy

RUSSELL, Kan. (AP) - Sen. Bob Dole, shedding his gut-fighting image of the 1976 campaign, today announced his candidacy for the 1980 GOP presidential nomination and declared "I will neither attack my opponents in the Republican Party nor the incumbent president."

Dole made the announcement at a city hall news conference in Russell, his hometown.

The Kansas senator, whose hard-hitting style drew criticism as the GOP vice presidential candidate in 1976, said in this campaign, "I will be speaking with our friends in the Democratic Party as well as Republicans and independents, believing that neither party has a corner on wisdom.

"We seek not a Democratic approach or a Republican approach to the nation's future, but we seek the correct approach and it will combine the best thinking and best efforts of all."

Dole also said he "will offer no slogans...I intend to promise only the possible, so that when I am successful in my aims I shall not disappoint you."

He called for a reduction of the role of government but added that "I do not intend to campaign against those who serve in government .... Those who serve in government reflect the nation: human, with human strengths and human failings.

Dole said the belief that the federal government has "magical powers" to solve society's problems "ignores the fact that there is no power on earth greater than that of the individual in a free so-

This western Kansas community of 6,000 declared today "Bob Dole Day." Most businesses delayed opening an hour for Dole's announcement and schools were closed for the morning.

"It's history," said Mayor Roger Williams. Dole's 76-year-old mother Bina said, before the announcement, she had "mixed feelings" about the campaign ahead.

"I just feel that there's no thanks for what he's going to do," she said. His declaration isn't likely to surprise many people, least of all his rivals for the nomination.

Dole kept right on campaigning after the votes were counted in November 1976, and it was clear that the Ford-Dole ticket had lost the presidential election to the Democratic slate of Jimmy Carter and Walter Mondale.

Dole has been to all sections of the country, addressing groups large and small. In 1978, he campaigned for any Republican who hinted he'd like

Despite all the travel, Dole still doesn't rank among the front-runners for nomination in any of the

As the vice presidential candidate in 1976, he earned a reputation as a gut-fighting campaigner. As he explains it now, that was his role in the campaign and he doesn't regret it.

Miss Goolsby and Estes are both accused of forging the signature of Tyler businessman Billy D.



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
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
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
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#### **Britain's Thatcher**

nothing if not a referendum on Margaret Thatcher's bold claim that her country's descent into socialism can and should be not merely slowed, or even halted, but reversed.

JAMES N. ALLISON (1902-1975)

That this utterely sensible view could cast Britain's new prime minister as something of a radical speaks volumes about how far Britons have drifted down the socialist road.

In the election, Mrs. Thatcher's Conservative party won a comfortable majority in the House of Commons and so she should rule for the full five-year life of the new Parliament. And surely Mrs. Thatcher's margin of victory over the opposition Labor party will do nothing to dilute her determination to cut taxes, restore a greater measure of freedom to the economy, rein a meddlesome bureaucracy, halt the deterioration in Britain's military strength, and, most radical of all. whittle down the power of the unruly trade unions.

A lesser leader would shrink from the enormity of the task. Mrs. Thatcher is not one to shrink. After hearing of her views on the need to measure up to the challenge of Soviet militarism. the Russians dubbed her "the Iron Lady." It's a "title" in which she takes perverse, and justifiable.

The fact is that Margaret Thatcher possesses the purest conservative principles of any Tory leader in at least 20 years. By all appearances, she will need both the principles and the toughness required to stand by them in the difficult years ahead.

Certainly, Mrs. Thatcher's diagnosis of Britain's decline is correct. Too much government, too much taxation, and the arrogant power of the irresponsible trade unions have combined to sap the vitality of Britain's economy. The predictable result is that Britain, a country which must export, has seen its industries grow less and less competitive with her rivals in Western Europe, Japan and the United States.

Economic growth has been reduced to less than 1 percent a year and the sluggish rate of capital formation promises continued stagnation.

Mrs. Thatcher's straightforward prescription for reviving Britain is as correct in theory as

Britain's general election was her grasp of the country's underlying ills.

Yet the great question mark even now hanging over the new prime minister and her government is whether fundamental reforms can be implemented without plunging Britain into new bouts of social, labor, and economic turmoil.

Notwithstanding Mrs. Thatcher's margin in Commons, the trade unions must be seduced, not coerced, into accepting new policies which ultimately will benefit all Britons.

As every recent British prime minister can attest, this is no easy

But Mrs. Thatcher most certainly intends to give it a real try.

She has stated frankly that she will strengthen the economy and reduce personal income taxes. And perhaps most encouraging of all, she is pledged to breathe new life into the free enterprise system.

"Overtaxation," she reportedly said in her campaign speeches, "is transparently foolish."

She has said also that most Britons are willing to work for their families and neighbors, but not for the chancellor of the exchequer.

"In a free country, people will work hard if it pays them to do so" she said.

The hope now is that Mrs. Thatcher's shrewdly practical instincts will temper her policies just enough to move Britain in the right direction without triggering a destructive all-out war with the

If Margaret Thatcher can accomplish this, and here's hoping that she can, she will stand an excellent chance of keeping her party in power long enough to propel Britain into a new and more promising era.

# Chilling questions from Cuba must be answered now

#### By ROWLAND EVANS AND ROBERT NOVAK

WASHINGTON — The appearance of a second Soviet submarine in Cuban waters has been definitely established by U.S. intelligence within the last two weeks, raising the question of just what the Soviet Union intends to do with its growing military power 90 miles off the coast of Flori-

With agreement on the new strategic arms limitation treaty (SALT II) having just been announced, Carter administration strategists are maintaining sealed-lip silence to avoid any new U.S.-Soviet hassle. But at high levels of the Pentagon, this question is being asked: is Moscow just "paying off" Fidel Castro for his expeditionary corps in Africa and elsewhere, or is Cuba being surreptitiously converted into a Soviet base for future operations in Latin America?

Submarine No. 1, a diesel-powered Foxtrot model, was delivered to Cienfuegos Feb. 7, along with two hydrofoil patrol boats. U.S. specialists believe the sub will be used to train Cuban submarine crews.

Submarine No. 2, tentatively identified as a W-2 ("Whiskey Two"), is also a diesel-powered boat with conventional torpedo tubes and no nuclear weapons. Although its precise purpose is a mystery, the proven existence of another lethal. snorkel-equipped sub in U.S.-con-trolled Caribbean waters may force the Pentagon into analytical studies that are dangerously overdue.

Surprisingly until now neither the Navy nor the Air Foce has been asked to produce contingency planning for neutralizing Cuba in the event of any



future war. The "consolidated guidance" which, under top secret cover, is sent to the services each year from the office of the secretary of defense has utterly ignored the future possibility that Cuba might pose a threat.

Some responsible and skeptical specialists think they know the reason for this: if Secretary of Defense Harold Brown ordered up contingency plans on how to deal with hostile Cuba in a global conflict, hard answers would be absolutely essential to questions now being ducked.

Among these questions: what conceivable purpose does Moscow have in supplying Castro with submarines. no matter if they are new or old, powered by nuclear or conventional engines and possessing nuclear or conventional armaments? What purpose do the Soviets have in supplying Cuba with a squadron - or possibly more - of MIG-23 late-model attack aircraft, whether or not armed with nuclear weapons? Does the Soviet Union plan to support Cuban forces, armed with those Soviet weapons, for future Africa-style exercises in Latin

These are real questions, not to be ducked any longer. There is solid new evidence, for example, that Soviet fishing fleets will soon make their first appearance on the Balboa or Pacific Ocean side of the Panama Canal. Their presence will enhance Soviet intelligence-gathering just as the U.S. begins to phase out total control of the canal under the new U.S.-Panama

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



Cancer is not always attributable to hard luck or a stroke of fate. While some cancers strike unexpectedly. others are more readily predictable.

What can a person reasonably be expected to do to prevent cancer? People grow weary of all the warnings; is everything worthwhile either illegal, immoral, fattening-or carcinogenic? From smoking to sunbathing, from snack foods to saccharine, the hazards seem endless.

The aim of science and medicine is to improve the quality of life, not impede it, and these questions are worth thinking about. Each individual may be entitled to a degree of freedom of choice regarding the risks he or she is willing to assume, but it should be an informed decision, one based on knowledge.

Public health officials have estimated that up to 90 percent of all cancers originate in the environment. We know, for example, that those who pioneered in the use of X-ray equipment, before its potential dangers were known, developed certain forms of cancer. And we also know that excessive exposure to sunlight may cause malignancy. Such experience indicates that cancer is not unavoidable, but can be caused by specific and avoidable environmental factors.

Almost all authorities believe that most lung cancer is caused by cigarette smoking. Some people contend that it is air pollution in general that leads to lung cancer, but air pollution was a problem in some cities in the United States and Europe a hundred years ago. Therefore, the marked increase in lung cancer in men since 1930, and in women since 1960, cannot be attributed to air pollution. Cigarette smoking became popular

with men around the time of the First World War. Women didn't get into the act until around the Second World War. Since the disease becomes apparent anywhere from 20 to 40 years after the beginning of exposure through smoking, we are beginning to see its effects on women today. It is true that smokers who live in

cities do get more lung cancer than those living in rural areas. This suggests that air pollution increases the risk of smoking cigarettes, but is not the chief cause. Cigarette manufacturers have had

some success in developing a product

with reduced tar content. There is evidence that people who use these lower-tar cigarettes have less chance of getting lung cancer.

The ideal solution, of course, would be to stop smoking altogether. Even individuals who have smoked for years can reduce their risk of cancer appreciably. In fact, after abstaining from cigarettes for 20 years, a person's risk of cancer is aimost as low as if he had never smoked.

Diet-caused cancer also is avoidable. Societies which have diets high in fat have a greater incidence of certain types of cancer than those with low-fat diets. For example, the major cancers in the United States, in addition to lung cancer, are cancer of the colon and rectum in men and women, cancer of the breast in women, and cancer of the prostate in men. However, Japanese women have only about 20 percent as much breast cancer as American women, and Mexican men only about 14 percent of the colon-rectum cancer of American men. These differences are largely related to diet.

When people migrate to the United States from these countries, however, their diets change; and, by the second generation, their cancer rates are equal to those of the general population. Furthermore, laboratory animals fed a high-fat diet are more likely to develop breast and colonrectum cancer, thus confirming the evidence.

The United States diet is high in fat, directly from the butter and oils used in preparing foods, and indirectly from meats. Fatty meats, fried potatoes and buttered vegetables are the common choices.

The average Japanese diet is based on fish, rice and bean soup-all lowfat foods. Their diet generally includes about 15 to 20 percent of calories in fats and oils, most of it unsaturated oil. Ours contains about 45 percent in fat, mostly saturated fats from meat and dairy products.

Some risks cannot be avoided. But cigarette smoking and consumption of foods high in fat are two serious risks that can be eliminated.

Is it worth it to you to give up a known pleasure for an uncertain gain in health? Only you can answer thatbut make sure your decision is an informed one, not one based on ignorance or an unwillingness to face

Why does the typical declarer throw his contract away at the first trick? Because he can't do it earlier. Today's South foolishly played the king of clubs at the first trick.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Lynda Bird Robb may have some work ahead to restore the confidence some women activists think is lacking in President Carter's Advisory Committee on

Mrs. Robb, daughter of the late President Lyadon B. Johnson, was named last week to head the committee, replacing former New York Congresswoman Bella Abzug who was fired by Carter. Her dismissal sparked the resignations of about half the committee's 40 members.

Arlie Scott, vice president of the National Organization for Women, said she felt Mrs. Robb's appointment was made to enhance the president's chances for re-election in 1980.

She said NOW did not consider the committee an effective advocate and did not expect to use it as the group's

link with the administration. Carter "has to talk to the leaders of the women's movement and not deal again through another barrier," Ms.

Scott said. Mrs. Abzug, who was dismissed after the committee criticized the president's economic policies, said she was not sure that Mrs. Robb's selection would be enough to restore the committee's independence.

"It's now under a cloud," she said. "Its mandate has been interfered with by the president."

But Harriet Henztges, executive director of the League of Women Voters, said her group is hoping the appointment signals "a more serious commitment by the administration to the committee. . .. We're willing to give anyone the benefit of the

Several administration spokesmen have said Mrs. Robb, whose husband is the lieutenant governor of Virginia. was picked because of her political connections and her lack of ties to organized feminist groups.

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## Tuscaloosa city employees obey court order to return to work

By The Associated Press

Striking Tuscaloosa, Ala., city employees, responding to a court order, returned to work today rather than see their union fined and union leaders jailed.

"It looks like we've got a full crew here," said Superintendent Carl Henderson of the street and sanitation department. "I'm very pleased to get back to the normal routine and get that garbage up.

Waterworks employees also re-

turned to work in time to meet the 7 a.m. deadline.

In other municipal disputes, city workers were to vote on a contract today in Worcester, Mass., and police in Cookeville, Tenn., continued a 6-day-old walkout.

Tennessee Circuit Judge Jerome Baird issued the back-to-work order Friday, ruling that the 211 strikers had disobeyed an earlier order which banned picketing.

Baird said Local 2237 President James Brown and Vice President Jones Calhoun would begin five-day jail terms today if the workers were not back on their jobs. And he said the local would be fined \$500 a day until the walkout ended.

Tuscaloosa's strike began Tuesday when waterworks, streets and sanitation department employees walked off their jobs in an apparent dispute over Brown's job status with the city. Brown had been on sick leave since October 1977, contending that an offduty motorcycle accident aggravated an on-the-job injury he received in

Mayor Rainey Collins said Brown was dropped from the city's employment rolls when he did not respond to inquiries about his status.

Striking city workers in Worcester, Mass., called off their pickets Sunday. The strike disrupted garbage collections and other city services after it began Tuesday. The union Saturday rejected a contract which would have given workers a 20 percent raise over three years.

Following a second fu-neral service today, Flatt will be buried in Sparta, where he grew up about 80 miles east of Nashville. The singer died Friday at age 64.



'They weren't falling but I wasn't about to stop shooting ... that's my game," said Gervin. "This ballgame is behind us. We just have to be ready to play Wednesday.

## Rick Mears wins pole on last run of the day

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Al Unser and Tom Bagley have put Midland owners back in the Indianapolis 500 while Rick Mears proved last year was no fluke.

Unser, driving the new "ground effects" car designed and owned by Midiand's Jim Hall, earned a front row berth on the starting grid Sunday in the first day of Indy qualifying while Bagley, driving the Penske PC-6 of Midland's Bobby Hillin, earned a fifth row spot with an average lap speed of 185.414 mph.

Last year when Unser brought Hall and Midland an Indy title, he started in the second row. Hillin failed to get an entry qualified for last year's event, but now is insured of a good starting spot for his second Indy run. Hillin had two cars in the 1977 Indy race. So, both Hall and Hillin will be making their second Indy starts in two weeks.

Mears, an easy-going 27-year-old desert racing specialist from Bakersfield, Calif., showed the veterans a faster way around Indianapolis Motor Speedway Sunday and won the pole. position for the May 27 Indianapolis

Mears started on the front row in his debut here a year ago, the first and only rookie to qualify at over 200 mph. He ran in the top five most of the race before mechanical trouble sidelined him, and he was named co-rook ie of the year.

"He didn't look like a rookie today," said 44-year-old A.J. Foyt, whose disappointing run put him only sixth on the grid in quest of an unprecedented fifth Indy victory. "He's one of those guys who will be the Foyts and Unsers of the 1980s.

Mears' qualifying speed of 193.736 mph — more than 6 mph slower than last year because of new power restrictions - ruined Tom Sneva's bid for an unprecedented third straight start on the prestigious Indy pole. And Mears did it with the final run of the

Two days of qualifying were sand wiched into one because of a total rainout Saturday.

"I thought that would be too good to be true - to be the last guy out and win the pole. I figured that only hapmovies,

Sneva had averaged 192.998 mph on a surprisingly strong run a few minutes earlier. Early qualifier Al Unser held the pole most of the day with his speed of 192.503 mph, which ultimately was good for third best.

After that trio, there was a decisive dropoff in speed to Bobby Unser's 189.913, Gordon Johncock's 189.753

mph and Foyt's 189.613.

Six of the top eight qualifiers were members of the dissident Championship Auto Racing Teams group whose entries were rejected by the sanctioning U.S. Auto Club, then reinstated by a court decision 10 days ago. CART drivers took 13 of the top 18 spots.

Hillin and Hall are both members of CART. Hall is on the board of direc-

"I think that's significant," Mears said. "It shows the differences in the level of competition between CART and USAC.

Mears felt it was also significant that the CART entries did so well using USAC rules. CART racing permits higher power settings.

"We beat them on their own terms," he said.

USAC tightened the rules on power settings for qualifying early Saturday, hoping to cut down on anticipated cheating. A number of teams were quite upset by the 11th-hour changes.

"It really didn't hurt us any because we told everyone all along we were running legal. They just didn't believe us. I think they realize now they should have listened to us, Mears said.

Mears said he elected to use his 1978 model Penske chassis in this race, rather than the 1979 model his teammate Bobby Unser chose.

"I felt more comfortable in the old car, although the new Penske is just as good, if not better," Mears said.

Unser said the 1979 Penske "is the car of the future. It's a good design. I used it because the crew and I have been working on it since December. I think it will be a good car for 500

Although he was more comfortable in the older model, Mears said his pole run was not a comfortable one.

"On the first lap, going into the third turn. I thought I was going into the wall. I put a little more distance between me and concrete on the next three laps, but on the whole run I ran closer to the fence than I ever have here before," he said.

Missing from the weekend's qualifiers was speedster Danny Ongais, one of the prequalifying favorites. Ongais escaped serious injury in a pulveriz-

Ongais was due to be released today from an Indianapolis hospital, where he had been held for observation. Doctors said Ongais suffered a concussion, whiplash and bruises, but no broken bones

He is expected back in competition in time to qualify next weekend for the \$1 million race



# Kennedy unleashes attack on President

WASHINGTON - Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., unloaded a harsh new attack Saturday on President Carter's oil decontrol plan, calling it a sham that will set poor against rich and worsen inflation.

Kennedy told a friendly commencement audience at Howard University here he found it "incredible that a Democratic White House would push

a program that would most adversely affect low and middle-income Ameri-

The senator awarded an honorary doctorate by the university deep in a low-income neighborhood, stressed the "unfair" burden he said Carter's decontrol plan would put on the

"Is it fair to ask those who are poor to pay a much larger proportion of their income for energy than those who are more affluent?

"Is it fair to ask poor elderly citizens in Northeast Washington to shift to cat food so they can afford to pay their heating bills?" Kennedy asked.

THAT QUESTION drew one of the warmest responses of the day hearty applause and a smattering of "that's right" from the crowd of 4,000 or more graduats, parents and friends in the Howard football sta-

The White House, meanwhile, responded with minimal enthusiasm to a suggestion from Senate Majority Leader Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va., that Carter hold a meeting with the congressional leadership to try once more to win passage of a standby gasoline rationing plan. The House rejected Carter's plan last week.

'The president would be willing to meet if Byrd thinks it will help,' Stuart Eizenstat, Carter's chief domestic affairs adviser, said Saturday. "But we think the burden is now on Congress to come up with something.

Kennedy's renewed criticism of Carter, mentioned the president's name only twice — seen as certain to intensify congressional debate over the decontrol plan.

Kennedy and Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., are major critics of the plan that will take effect next month unless stopped by Congress. In stages through September 1981, it would renove federal controls from the prices of domestically produced oil.

KENNEDY REPEATED his theme that the Carter plan does not go far enough to tax "windfall profits" and that it does not require the industry to

#### Coast Guard ends search

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) - The Coast Guard has given up its search for seven men lost at sea when the offshore oil drilling rig they were working on collapsed and sank in the Gulf of Mexico

The body of an eighth man on the missing list was recovered from the submerged rig by divers Sunday afternoon just before the search was called off. He was not immediately

identified. Officials involved in the three-day rescue and recovery operation said there was little hope that any of the missing men will ever be found alive, but Coast Guard Lt. Gabe Kinney said the case is not yet closed.

"We've had instances where people have drifted for weeks, but they are few and far between. We don't close a case until we have it completely resolved, so we will continue to carry this as 'pending,'" he said.

The men have been missing since a support leg collapsed, toppling the 1,300-ton Ranger I platform into the water about 12 miles south of Galveston late Thursday. It is now resting in 60 feet of water, with the top 29 feet below the surface.

Thirty-four men were aboard the rig when it went down. Twenty-six were rescued, including four seriously injured.

The eight missing men were identified as Eddie Fredericks, John Perkins, Lee Cruidy, Dennis Smith, Walter Fobmogie, Ed Hanks, Barton Sealy and Cruz Pallmarez. The Coast Guard did not list hometowns or

Divers explored the sunken rig on the chance some of the missing men may have found air pockets, but gave up the search Sunday night after finding no sign of life. The compartments where life-sustaining air could have been trapped were all filled with water, divers said. 'Chances are pretty slim anyone is

in there," said Jess Stark, 43, of Houston, supervisor of 21 civilian divers who participated in the search. He said choppy seas and high winds

on the surface and treacherous currents underwater menaced his divers in and around the rig as they worked and way have swept away the victims. "The people missing are probably scattered to the sea," he said.

The rig is owned by Atlantic Pacific Corp. of Houston and leased to the Mitchell Energy Development Corp. Officials of the two companies would not speculate on what caused the rig to collapse.

He called decontrol "the worst form of rationing, because it is rationing by price.

Another Kennedy question: "What possible gain can there be for America from an energy policy whose primary effect is to boost the already ample profits of the oil industry, put millions of consumers through the wringer, and sharpen the class divisions of our society?"

Byrd said Saturday Carter might still salvage a gasoline rationing plan if he would "get all the principal players together and talk it over."

BYRD TELEPHONED Carter to discuss the prospects for rationing plans Friday night, just after the president had blasted the House for rejecting his proposal. "I told him he could be a catalyst if he would get together" with the energy leaders in

Byrd said Carter had responded "amenably, with interest" to this suggestion. But Eizenstat, discussing the Byrd proposal Saturday after-

noon, did not sound very interested. "Byrd asked him to get together with Tip O'Neill," the House Speaker, said Eizenstat. "Of course, anytime the leadership wants to meet with the presidnet, he'd be glad to have a meeting. But we continue to think the burden is on the House.'

Asked whether he expects the House to take any positive action on a rationing plan of its own, Eizenstat replied, "No."

A task force representing several federal agencies met at the White House Friday to talk about whether and how the administration might act to deal with possible gasoline short-

ages this summer. Eizenstat said the group's first job is "to try to answer some question about what we're facing. Do we have a shortage that is severe enough to require some special response, or is it a minimal shortage with panic buying

on top of it?" Eizenstat said the group also will consider options for dealing with a shortage, although "the House didn't leave us with a hell of a lot of

choices." One possibility, Eizenstat said, is a nationwide version of the odd-even gasoline sales plan now in effect in parts of California.







# Who would receive tour groups at 1:45 a.m.? Other insomniacs!

BALTIMORE (AP) - Audree Verguin was standing in the misting rain alongside the grave of Edgar Allan Poe. It was 4:30 a.m. and she was celbrating Mother's Day — one of 120 persons taking a six-hour Insomniac Tour of Baltimore, an all-night sojourn for tourists who can't sleep.

'This is my Mother's Day present," said Mrs. Verguin who with her husband, Elwood, of Toms River, N.J., were among the tourists who paid \$25 each to tour the city in the predawn

The Insomniac Tour, created by Ruth Fader and Roxy Lipsitz, was started in November 1977. The two women operate Baltimore Rent A Tour, a business that offers daylight

Three buses left the Maryland Science Center in downtown Baltimore promptly at 1:30 a.m. Saturday. "Hi, I'm Ruth and I'm going to spend the night with you," said Mrs. Fader, the tour guide on the first bus.

The first stop was Barre Street where the tourists tromped through

three renovated rowhouses. Why anybody would open their homes to a group of strangers at 1:45 a.m. was anybody's guess. But Quinn Peitz, one of the homeowners, explained, "The honest answer is - I get to go on the Insomniac Tour."

"You see all the cars on the street?" Mrs. Fader asked. "There really are an awful lot of night people in Baltimore.

The sounds of an organ filled the Mount Vernon Methodist Church, the next stop on the trip. The Rev. Kenneth Jones had found someone willing to come out at 3:30 a.m. and play for the insomniacs as they sat in the church fry of the 1selves and listening to his "sermon" - a history of the 107-year-old church.

'We made plans to come to this before we planned to get married,' said Paul Newbury of Pittsburgh, honeymooning with his wife, Nancy. "We're on our way to the Virgin Islands."

Mrs. Newbury called the trip "a

Mrs. Fader pointed to a pink sand-

real memory. Across the street from the church, stone building with Tiffany windows that happened to be "the longest rowhouse in Baltimore." At the turn of the century, Mrs. William Garrett Jacobs spent \$6 million to renovate the house, now the home of the city's Engineering Society.

Later, clustered around Poe's grave, everything seemed to darken as the rain fell and one of the tourists read a few lines from Poe's "Annabel Lee" and another placed some tulips

at the base of the grave marker. The bracing aroma of the city's wholesale fish market perked up several tourists starting to nod. "Sure smells like a fish market," said Noel Bautro, 39, of Baltimore, looking at the dead fish being scaled at the world's third-largest seafood mar-

## Sadat says sale of fighters to Saudi Arabia is 'shaky'

Egyptian President Anwar Sadat says he no longer expects Saudi Arabia to buy 50 F-5E jet fighters for his air force.

"It seems from what is going on these days that the Saudis are trying to withdraw from their commitment," Sadat told a university group Sunday on a tour of construction projects 50 miles north of Cairo. The contract is shaky.

The Saudis have broken diplomatic ties with Egypt over the peace treaty with Israel, and Sadat said last month he would not be surprised if the Saudis canceled plans to pay \$525 million for the F-5Es which Congress

agreed to sell Egypt last spring. The New York Times reported Sunday that Sadat said he would appeal to the American people for donations to pay for the F-5Es if the Saudis reneged.

Sadat also said he will use \$1.5 billion in U.S. military assistance credits to buy Phantoms and that the jet fighters will be flying over Egypt by October.

The United State has promised Israel \$3 billion in loans and grants over the next three years, but the cost of Israeli withdrawal from Sinai is \$4 billion and the Israeli government must finance the rest from an already strained economy

Israeli Finance Minister Simha Ehrlich introduced a five-year economic plan Sunday to help pay for the Sinai withdrawal and also stem inflation. He said the plan involves reshuffling funds from other departments to the Defense Ministry and drawing \$200 million from foreign currency

## Money matters dominate as Legislature nears close

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Threepronged negotiations on money for schools, state agencies and - possibly - taxpayers are warming up as the legislative session enters its final two weeks.

Conference committees on the state budget, school finance and tax relief must make joint decisions because all three bills dip into the same pot of state money. House members and senators have

passed their own versions of the bills. and three 10-member conference committees will try to compromise the differences.

The 140-day regular legislative session must end, constitutionally, at midnight on Monday, May 28.

Conferees on the general appropriation bill held a preliminary session Friday toward resolving differences between the \$20.67 billion House bill and the \$20.79 billion Senate bill.

Passage of a bill financing state operations the next two years is considered the primary duty of the Legislature.

Gov. Bill Clements has threatened to use his line veto power to assure a budget leaving a surplus that could be returned to the taxpayers through the school aid system for property tax relief.

But Clements has done less saberrattling in recent weeks, and both houses have passed budget and school finance bills that spend nearly every cent of anticipated state revenue.

Clements said Friday he was optimistic that the conference committees would trim spending enough to provide about \$500 million for tax

The budget must be approved in time for state agencies and departments to begin operations of the new fiscal period on Sept. 1.

# Kaufman disturbed by society's reaction to tonight's TV special

NEW YORK (AP) - Barry and Suzy Kaufman wanted their young son, Raun, to have an alternative to conventional therapy for autistic children. They spent three years, Kaufman says, "in Raun's world," gradually pulling the child into their own. Now, as the Kaufmans' story is

about to be broadcast for the first time, the couple has become embroiled in a dispute with the National Society for Autistic Children. 'We're extremely concerned,"

says Kaufman, "because they've attacked the program and us persona-"We did something very special, something nobody else had tried to

such a way as to create bridges with him, so he would understand us." "Attack" is, perhaps, too strong a word, though the society most certainly has suggested to local chapters that letters of protest be directed to

do. We tried to parallel his world in

Autism is defined as "a severely incapacitating life-long developmental disability." The society says there are 108,000 people in America with autism.

the Kaufmans.

In Raun Kaufmans' case, he seemed locked in his own world, unresponsive to verbal or other stimulation. He was diagnosed as an infant as autistic, but the Kaufmans were told treatment could not begin until he was at least 3 years old.

The Roslyn Heights, N.Y., couple truly attempted to enter the child's world. They mimicked his characterstic rocking, arm-flapping movement, spending 9,700 hours with the child over three years.

The effort was a success; the child now 6 — is normal in appearance and action, far above average in intelligence, and attending school with youngsters his own age.

The controversy — stirred initially by Kaufman's book, "Son Rise," published three years ago, and intensified many times over by the film to be broadcast by NBC at 8 p.m. today is hardly clearcut.

Indeed, the society, representing about 6,500 parents and professionals, describes "Son Rise: A Miracle of Love," as a "beautifully done movie" that "will give the American public a view of autism that it has never had

Yet it suggests a grave reservation: "It will cause many parents of children with autism deep and unnecessary feelings of guilt:

Says Robert J. Griggs, the society's executive director, "The movie is telling some parents their kid didn't get well like Raun because they didn't love him enough.

Kaufman, to that point, suggests at the outset of the film, "It-concerns an alternative created and chosen by our family, which in no way is meant to be a commentary on others who may cumstances." He calls "Son Rise" an

"expression of hope and possibility." Griggs, asked about the suggestion

that parents critical of the film write the Kaufmans directly, said: "Some people may take exception to implications of the book and movie, some may take exception to the portrayal of behavior modification.

In fact, the Kaufmans' approach was in a sense in reaction to "behavior modification," as one conventional method of therapy is called. The society says the view of behavior modification in "Son Rise" is "gross-

ly unfair." 'Most treatment programs are based on disapproval of the child's behavior," says Kaufman, "and we felt the underlying point of view was that all professionals we talked with felt that being autistic was a trage-

"We tried to say to Raun, 'Hey, it's OK where you are. We love you the way you are, and want to be with

The society, in sum, declares: "A child with autism and his parents are fairly portrayed in this movie until this business of love and acceptance overcoming a neurological disorder

"It's a story of loving and accepting someone," says Kaufman, clearly disturbed by the controversy. "The society is supposed to be neutral, but they support programs for behavior have found themselves in similar cir- modification and won't accept the way we did it.
