Texas Rangers search for 12 senators hiding out

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas Rangers and state police searched across the state Friday for 12 senators ordered arrested by Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby after they failed to show up for a Senate session.

Hobby said it was obvious the absentees were trying to block Senate action on a bill the lieutenant governor says will be used to pass a controversial presidential primary mea-

The Senate's presiding officer told reporters he will wait all weekend and possibly until the session's end in 10 days for officers to find the missing

Hobby invoked a procedure last used in 1969 by Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes to hunt down absent senators. By "putting a call on the Senate," members present cannot leave without Hobby's written permission and those missing are ordered arrested.

The Senate needs two-thirds of its 31 members, or 21 senators, to conduct business. By staying away, the 12 absentees deprive the chamber of a quorum.

"I don't think anybody is legitimately gone, except (Raul) Longoria," said Hobby.

Longoria, D-Edinburgh, told Senate workers earlier he would be in federal court out-of-town.

Other missing senators — all Democrats — were Chet Brooks of Pasadena, Ron Clower of Garland, Lloyd Doggett of Austin, Gene Jones of Houston, Glenn Kothmann of San Antonio. Gene Jones of Houston, Oscar Mauzy of Dallas, Bill Patman of Ganado, Carl Parker of Port Arthur, A.R. 'Babe'' Schwartz of Galveston, Carlos Truan of Corpus Christi and Bob Vale of San Antonio.

After waiting 30 minutes for a quorum, Hobby directed Kelly Arnold, Senate sergeant-at-arms, to find the

"Check every office in the Senate," Arnold told his assistant sergeants. "We'll discharge the DPS and Texas Rangers to get those members that are outside the Capitol."

Each absentee has taken part in or supported various filibusters this session. The group unofficially has been dubbed "The Killer Bees. The Hobby primary bill would allow

conservative Democrats to vote in the Republican presidential contest but vote in a separate Democratic general primary several months later.

Critics say the bill would help John Connally's campaign for the RepubliBoth the Republican and Democrat-

ic state chairmen want to hold a 1980 presidential primary on the same day as general party primary elections.

Hobby plans to use a relatively unimportant bill affecting party county chairmen as vehicle for the separate primary provisions. If the bill passes the Senate; he said an amendment would be attached in the House to set up a March presidential prima-

"(Speaker Bill) Clayton has okayed the approach," the lieutenant governor told reporters. "I don't know if he has actually seen the amendment."

After waiting all day, Hobby dismissed the 19 senators who showed up but told them to be available if the others were found. Shortly after 6 p.m., he said the state police were issuing an all-points bulletin for the absent members.

Before going home, the senators in attendance reconvened and took some verbal pot-shots at their "tardy brethren," as one said.

"You play within the rules," said Sen. Jack Ogg, D-Houston, sponsor of the presidential primary bill. "You don't get out in that gray twilight and not know victory or defeat."

Death sentences

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) -Florida Gov. Bob Graham signed death warrants Fridayfor convicted murderers John A. Spenkelink and Willie Jasper Darden, and a prison official scheduled their electrocutions for Wednsday at 7 a.m.

The executions would be the first in the United States since January 1977, when Gary Mark Gilmore refused to fight his exe-cution by a Utah firing squad. Spenkelink and Darden would be the first prisoners to be executed unwillingly in this country since 1967. Flmrida's last execution was in 1964.

Commission created

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - A bill creating a Texas Commission on Human Rights to enforce federal anti-discrimination laws was tentatively approved by an 89-41 House vote Friday.

The measure, sponsored by Rep. Reby Cary, D-Fort Worth, must pass a final House vote before moving to the Senate for consideration.

The bill calls for the establishment of a human rights commission to monitor anti-discrimination policies in employment, accommodations, credit and real property transactions as set forth in federal civil rights

Injunction OK'd

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Texas Utilities Co. has agreed to a temporary injunction covering its operations at the Martin Lake electric plant, the attorney general said Friday.

The agreed judgment was signed by Judge Joseph C. Gladney of the 4th Judicial District in Rusk County, the attorney general said.

Kennedy accused

NEW YORK (AP) — Energy Secretary James Schlesinger accused Sen. Edward M. Kennedy on Friday of seeing "pie in the sky" for the energy future of the United States and telling Americans only what they want to hear about oil-supply prob-

Asked on ABC's "World News Tonight" about the Massachusetts Democrat's p. rsistent criticism of President Carter's energy plans, Schlesinger said, 'Senator Kennedy tends to see pie in the sky. There is no great supply of oil out there."

There may be 90,000

Midland's population growing rapidly

Midland County's population may stand at a whopping 90,000 persons

right now. That Chamber of Commerceoriented figure is based on local utility hook-ups and the federal government's current formula for arriving at the average number of persons in

each home. Or the count could be as low as 67,000.

The latter figure — a Chamberdampening one — can be obtained by using an outdated but possibly valid formula worked up by the same source...the U.S. government.

Population figures were compiled recently by the county's tax office and, while there is nothing official about so informal a census, at least some county officials are optimistic about the higher figure.

'You know there's more than that (90,000) here. There's 90-95,000 people in Midland County," voter registration deputy Janeice Builta said Fri-

Commissioner Win Brown earlier this week released population figures pegging the number of inhabitants in the county at 81,753 "based on economic statistics.'

Most recently, the often-discussed question of how many people Midland County contains came up during a discussion on redistricting.

Brown's figure is based on for-

mulas used by the county.

Generally, the county obtains figures reflecting utility connections and multiplies the result by a factor of 2.9, which is the average number of persons residing in a home these days, according to the federal government.

As of April 3, Texas Electric Service Company reported 23,259 residential hook-ups in Midland and 2,266 rural residential connections.

Caprock Electric Co., which serves a part of the county, meanwhile reported another 1,741 rural residential connections throughout the county and 925 connections in the Greenwood

When those numbers are added and multiplied by the federal household average, total theoretical population of the county comes to 81,753, Mrs. Builta said.

However, under a 3.2 household average used by the federal government nine years ago - during the last census — Midland County's population is a resounding 90,211, she

The U.S. Postal Service reported more than 27,000 urban and rural residential post office boxes, producing a total population of 79,810, if the new 2.9 federal household-average factor is followed.

But figures based on gas connections compiled by Pioneer Natural Gas Company show 21,829 urban residential connections and another 1,472

rural hook-ups. Using the 2.9 factor again, one arrives a population of 67,572 in the county. But Mrs. Builta said that figure fails to take into account all-electric

homes and those residences using bu-

Drivers perk up in California

LOS ANGELES (AP) — California drivers perked up slightly Friday when they were told a little relief in the gasoline drought would come this weekend, but lines were still blocks long at many stations.

The state has ordered more service stations to keep pumping Saturday and Sunday, and refiners were told to make more gasoline available, but many motorists think it will be only a drop in the bucket. And drivers were still frustrated,

with lines up to four blocks long in parts of Los Angeles. In San Diego, Johnny Rodgers, wide receiver for the Chargers pro-

fessional football team, got so upset at waiting in line in his Rolls Royce that he bought a gas station.

"I bought it for my friends' convenience too," Rodgers said.

State Energy Commission Chair-man Richard Maullin ordered nine oil refiners in the state to provide an additional 1.6 million gallons of gasoline to stations that stay open the next two weekends.

Although it's a small percentage of the total gasoline used in the state, **Energy Commission spokeswoman** Nikki Case said the additional gallons - 40 percent allocated for this weekend and 60 percent for next weekend — could allow some stations to remain open this weekend.

Last weekend, about 66 percent of the stations in California's major cities were closed Saturday and 92 percent were shut on Sunday.

"I got an extra load of gasoline for this weekend," said C.J. Wesley, owner of a San Fernando Valley gasoline station, which unlike the past weekends will be open at least four hours a day both Saturday and Sun-

"I'll be pumping," Wesley said. "All pumps are go!

Earlier this week Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr. ordered all stations that sold at least 750,000 gallons last year to remain open either Saturday or Sunday, and police in Los Angeles will be out checking to make sure they

"We have a sergeant in each area who has been appointed energy czar and he has little 'czardines' out helping him," said Police spokesman Lt. Dan Cooke. "Any stations not open when they are supposed to be will be written up and the city attorney will be notified."

Auto execs to cooperate for better fuel efficiency

WASHINGTON (AP) — Heeding a call from President Carter, auto industry executives say they will cooperate in a new research program to develop more fuel-efficient cars by

the last half of the 1980s. Presidential science adviser Frank Press told reporters after the executives met with Carter at the White House Friday the research would focus on such areas as superlight materials, combustion dynamics and

new types of batteries. "We're not looking at engines, as such. We're looking at the kinds of materials that you would use in en-

gines," Press said. Lepresentatives of the nation's four leading automakers agreed to develop a proposal for a program aimed at eventually funneling \$50 million to \$100 million a year into research.

Press said industry would share costs with the federal government, in a ratio yet to be worked out.

Carter commented at the beginning of the meeting, "This is a very exciting prospect for me."

The president said the effects of such a program "will be felt, obviously, after 1985," and would be disseminated widely, even to foreign manufacturers.

The Justice Department has ruled antitrust laws would not prevent pooling the research information among manufacturers.

Others injured in the accident included Vickie Rodriquez, the dead man's wife; in surgery late Friday night; Betsy Lopez, Elizabeth Lopez and Joe Lopez, all from Fort Stockton, all expected to be admitted to Medical Center Hospital for treatment; and Pete McGarity, 29, of Odessa, who was treated and re-

According to officials, McGarity was the driver of one of the cars. The Lopez children were in the vehicle with Rodriquez and his wife.

Names of persons in the third car were not available late Friday.

New low income housing under local control suggested

"Poor folks out there will tell you it's probably best to have a local housing program. But they also need a house and they don't care who pays

Mike Williams, local attorney

Big government has been trying to serve as "my brother's keeper" by instituting more and more federally funded programs during the last sev-

Since the Midland City Council has rejected one major source of federal money for housing improvement - the Community Development Block Grants — some are beginning to take a step back and evaluate the whole picture anew. One Midland attorney feels there

may be an alternative without depending entirely on the CD funds. And another resident believes there still may be a way to get funds out of the government, but in such a way that the regulations are much less

restrictive. Mike Williams, the attorney, studied the housing situation in the south part of Midland and wrote his master's thesis on the effect government funds would have on that area.

Williams grew up in the area he refers to as Tract 15, the same section he studied. The people living there "contribute to society. They work in a city and contribute a number of man-hours,'

he said. "The situation is they do not

make enough money to buy a house or

rent a good place.'

A HOUSE FOR PEOPLE in this tract, he said, "is where families get together. It gives them a sense of dignity. It is a home."

Williams listed five possible reasons in his thesis why citles do not get involved in low income housing: Racial - Most people getting it

would be black or brown.

Class — Some people don't want a working class of people in the city. Philosophical - It might mean enabling housing for people on wel-

Environmental - Some oppose high rise apartments for low income people in parts of the city.

Fiscal — A number of Midlanders don't want to build someone a house

with their tax money. Williams is opposed to the Section 8 rental subsidy plan which the City Council has turned down, he said, because we would end up giving more money to landlords who already are renting substandard housing."

Instead, he suggested that constructing new housing under local control would be the best solution.

"If under local control, the planners could tie the housing in with school plans, shopping centers and know best where to locate it," he said. "They could tailor-make a program to fit Midland."

But this suggestion is no good, Williams said, if the city won't do it or does not have the resources to try it. While the Midland City Council refuses to apply for CD funds, Williams said, there are other government-funded programs for housing which the city could use.

"THERE ARE MORE than five single-family home programs, more than five rental programs," he said. "It's unfair to clump them all together. The city could find one to suit its

Or, Williams said, looking at the other side of the coin, if Midland had

the funds, the city should take the leadership role in encouraging new construction of single-family dwellings or multiple-family dwellings in the area where the housing is needed most — the south side.


Instead of moving people out of the area...a characteristic tendency of programs under the Department of Housing and Urban Development...Williams said the goal should be to provide Midlanders in need with a decent house in an area that allows them to retain their communal spir-

That would mean putting housing in the neighborhoods where the people

now live, he said. Referring to the tax base exant within Tract 15, Williams contended that new housing in that section would have a greater market value and produce more tax revenue than what

Friday's clear skies and warm temperatures spread throughout the Basin, with most area towns reporting sunny summer-like weather.

Silkwood heirs awarded \$10.5 million by court

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) - A federal jury awarded the three children of the late Karen Silkwood \$10.5 million Friday, finding that the Kerr-McGee Corp. was negligent in its operation of a nuclear fuel plant where she worked when she became contaminated with plutonium.

It is the first time a U.S. nuclear products firm has been held liable for radioactive contamination that occurred outside its plant.

Several organizations hailed the verdict as a victory for workers' rights and women's rights and said it will set a precedent for other radia-

tion contamination cases. "We will definitely, absolutely appeal," said Bill Paul, Kerr-McGee's

chef counsel. Miss Silkwood, 28, was a lab techni-cian at Kerr-McGee's fuel processing plant at Crescent, Okla., when she died in a Nov. 13, 1974, single-car crash, the week after she and her

apartment were found to have been contaminated with radioactive pluto-The three-man, three-woman jury that returned the verdict of \$10 million in punitive damages and \$505,000 in actual damages rejected the com-pany's assertion that Miss Silkwood stole plutonium and took it to her Edmond, Okla., apartment to spike her urine samples. The company con-tended that she did this to back her

charges of unsafe working conditions at the plant.

Amid loud applause from one side of the courtroom when the verdict was announced at 10:40 a.m., Silkwood lawyer Gerry Spence blew kisses to the jurors, who had spent 50 days hearing testimony.

Miss Silkwood's parents, Bill and Merle Silkwood, fought back tears.
"I just think it's wonderful and I'm

finally glad they've got Karen's name cleared," said a sobbing Mrs. Silkwood. "She was only trying to help those people get a clean plant. She was just trying to help."

Except for attorneys fees, the money from the judgment would go to the Silkwood estate. The sole heirs are Miss Silkwood's three children, Beverly Meadows, 12; Dawn Meadows, 8: and Michael Meadows, 10. The administrator of the estate is Miss Silkwood's father.

Midlander jailed on drug charge

A 38-year-old Midland man was in city jail Friday night after being ar-rested for alleged felony possession of marijuana and alleged unlawful car-

rying of a weapon. The man was arrested about 3:30 p.m. Friday near Lee and Wall streets, and police confiscated 10 bag-gies of a substance believed to be marijuana, police reports said.

The arrest was made on information supplied to Midland police by an informant, the arrest report said.

sus study, Williams said there are about 1,728 acres in the tract - with about 4,100 people in 1,250 house-

If a low-income housing facility were built with 100 units, it could house about 329 people, he said.

"Although the city would still lose money on this, as far as taxes are concerned, the amount would not be quite so much as it is losing now.

WITH THE 100 families moved into the complex, there quite naturally would be vacant houses left behind. Williams offered a complementary idea aimed at raising more tax money by wau of those empty ex-homes and the lots they would be on

He suggested that builders should tear down the vacated houses and constructhomes costing around \$40,-000 for neighborhood residents able to afford that level of housing.

Such an approach would not involve just a house or two, but a whole development, he stipulated.

"These people (in the new homes) then would be contributing more property taxes to the city," he held. When figured on a per-acre basis, expenditures on assisted housing would run less, but would be higher in the amount of revenues, said Wil-

"Taking local monies with federal monies, if properly applied, we could design a program that will revitalize southeast Midland," Williams said. "And it would increase its fiscal contribution to the city.'

IT ALSO WOULD help alleviate the burden the rest of the city is carrying in supporting the southeast section, the attorney said.

Bulk of the city revenues come from property taxes. Since people in northwest Midland have more expensive homes, they are paying more in taxes than the southern section to keep the city government operating.

Raising property taxes just to get more money out of South Midland would solve nothing, he said.

That would merely take away money which could be used to accomplisha measure of rehabilitation.

"They would have no incentive, then, to fix the houses," he ob-

Taking another tack, the Midland Housing Association is looking into a different type of government-funded housing program, also under Section

But its plan has fewer government strings, according to Don Hellinghausen of the Association.

UNDER THE MHA PLAN, private developers could come into Midland, sell bonds to finance a housing project and then build it.

According to Helling hausen, HUD enters the picture because the project would be rented only to those who qualify for rental subsidy.

"This could be our prime weapon in working on the housing program," he said. "This has nothing to do with (Community Development) Block Grant funds, even though it is under Section 8. It's in a different cate-

gory.
"There is less red tape and interference from HUD this way," he said, adding that HUD does play a role in site selection

"But this Section 8 program is worthy of some exposure. It could solve the problem we have.'

TO WILLIAMS, at least, the city government appears to have given up hope on Tract 15, also known as The

Hellinghausen agreed. "The city has worked on its drainage problem and transportation, but it never men-

tions housing.
"Midland has not, as a community, admitted the problem (housing) is as big as it is," Hellinghausen said. "To solve the problem, the community must first admit the problem is

He liked Midland's attitude to that of other cities containing large metropolitan areas which have been termed

'dead.' But he feels Midland has not rightfully reached that point yet.

"Midland is not like New York City or Los Angeles, (cities) that already have dead areas," Williams said. "Midland is so small, (a plan) could

southeast is dying, but it isn't dead yet. They (city government) shouldn't give up and forget about the stepchild.

WHAT BAFFLES Williams, he claimed, is the abundance of knowledge in many areas in Midland.

We have all these companies that have the expertise to go out and keep finding oil wells. But they can't sit down and look for a solution to the housing problem.

Busing, though it may have satis-

fied the courts, possibly could bring more problems in the future, Williams said he believes.

"These kids go out all over town and see the contrasts in their houses with others. That makes it hard on the kids. It brings distrust and frustration," he said.

If problems with housing are not handled appropriately at the right time, the city may find itself with a "monster on its hands," he said.

"And the problem there (in Tract 15) is acute right now."

The commission followed staff recommendations that enough safety improvements have been made for Duke Power Co. to operate its three Oconee reactors at Lake Keowee, S.C.


NRC staff members said improvements have moved swiftly at eight nuclear plants designed by Babcock & Wilcox Co., which designed the Three Mile Island plant, near Harrisburg, Pa.

The commission on April 27 ordered that the plants either close or stay out of operation until they were reviewed because the Babcock & Wilcox systems seemed sensitive to malfunctions and hard to control Oconee Unit 1 was allowed to continue operating temporarily.

Harold Denton, NRC director of reactor regulation, said Friday that Oconee Unit 1 would have had to shut down Saturday if the commission had not lifted its pre-



Beef prices rise in April, but not as fast as earlier

it was the smallest increase of the year, new government figures showed

Also, the Agriculture Department said, retail pork prices dropped an average of 4 percent last month. That was the sharpest drop in pork prices in about two and a half years.

Farmers have stepped up hog production this year and their market prices have dropped sharply.

But the beef supply depends on much longer breeding and growth cycles for cattle and it will be several years before production is able to match demand again.

The April decline was the second in a row for retail pork prices, following a dip of 0.1 percent in March. According to department records, the 4 percent drop was the sharpest since retail pork prices dropped 5.9 pertent in Nov. 1976.

Prices of U.S. Choice-grade beef averaged a record of almost \$2.33 a pound on an all-cut basis in April, compared to slightly less than \$2.26 in March.

Last December, beef averaged less than \$1.97 a pound and then rose 5.8 percent to almost \$2.05 in January, 5.1 percent to more than \$2.15 in February, and 4.9 percent to about \$2.26 in March.

Compared with \$1.76 a year earlier, the April price of \$2.33 a pound was up by 32.3 percent

The all-cut April average of pork in retail stores was slightly less than \$1.51 a pound, down from almost \$1.57 in March and more than \$1.57 in February. The all-time high for pork was more than \$1.58 a pound in Octo-

New Exxon device results in savings

NEW YORK (AP) - Exxon Corp. on Friday unveiled a new electronic device that it said would provide "significant" energy savings for electric

The device - called an alternating current synthesizer - would allow the speed of fairly large industrial alterpating-current electric motors to be varied efficiently. The company said small-scale test applications of the system have produced savings in power costs of as much as 50 percent.

Exxon, the nation's largest oil company, predicted that by 1990 the synthesizers could produce a savings of equal to 1 million barrels of oil daily - about 6 percent of current oil consumption.

"We are dealing with a technology that we are convinced will result in a significant saving," said Joseph Graves, senior vice president of Exxon-Enterprises' energy group. Exxon Enterprises is a division of the company set up to explore non-oil business ventures

Exxon said it planned to acquire Reliance Electric Co. to help it market the new technology. The Cleveland-based maker of electrical components and systems grossed nearly \$1 billion last year.

Large oil companies have come under fire in recent years for diversifying into non-oil areas. Exxon President Howard C. 



King James Testament updated by scholars

DALLAS (AP) - An updated King James New Testament, with a decidedly fundamentalist-view, has been introduced amid predictions it will replace the "Revised Standard Version" as the predominant text in protestant pews "The New King James Bible," edit-

ed by the Rev. Arthur Farstad of Dallas and published by Thomas Nelson Inc. of Nashville, Tenn., was introduced in New York Wednesday. The work is expected to appeal

primarily to ultra-conservative protestants who have clung to the King James Version published in 1611. "We have applied the best of both Greek and English scholarship to preserving and enhancing the King James Version for 20th Century read-

ers." Farstad said in New York Farstad, a former faculty member at Dallas Theological Seminary, headed a group of more than 100 conservative scholars and pastors who worked on the New King James

Bible during the past four years. He said the version follows a traditional - "even fundamentalist" interpretation of scripture, and counters the more moderated Revised Standard Version that was published by Thomas Nelson in 1946.

Nazarenes have roots

The Church of the Nazarene, which had its origins in Texas and is deeply rooted in Oklahoma. Texas and elsewhere in the Southwest, nevertheless is worldwide in scope, says the Rev. Harold Quarles, pastor of Midland's

According to Quarles, the vision of Dr. P.F. Bresee, the founder of the denomination, is being fulfilled nowadays, since "the sun never sets on the Church of the Nazarene.

The Midland minister points out that the Church of the Nazarene has made a strong commitment to higher

education, supporting as it does 10 liberal arts colleges, a seminary, 28 Bible colleges and more than 160 special schools around the world.

Of his denomination, Quarles adds that Nazarenes are "just ordinary people, made up of all different backgrounds, yet who in the tradition of Augustine, Luther, Wesley, Moody and others have discovered a meaningful relationship with Jesus

The church is Wesleyan-Arminian in doctrine.

Quarles came to Midland from the

pastorate of a Nazarene church in San Benito, in Texas' Rio Grande Valley. Before that, he had served as pastor of churches in Oregon and New Mexi-

Born in Alabama, Quarles grew up in that state and lived there until entering military service in 1952.

After several years in the service. he enrolled in Pasadena College in Pasadena, Calif., where he received a B.A. degree in religion in 1962.

Quarles and his wife, Ruth, are the parents of three children: Daughter Terri, 21, and twin sons, Donald and Ronald, 18.

Terri is married to Steven Ballew, a member of the Odessa Police Department, and the couple resides in Odes-

Donald Quarles is completing his freshman year at Bethany Nazarene College in Bethany, Okla., where he is majoring in art education. Ronald Quarles has just finished his fresh man year at Midland College and plans to major in government.

Bishop W. McFerrin Stowe of Dallas heads the North Texas Conference, whose meeting is scheduled for May 27 through 30 in Lovers Lane United Methodist Church of Dallas. Bishop Stowe will preside at the Central Texas Conference meeting, scheduled for June 3 through 6 in Waco's Convention Center.

A spokesman for the Houston-based railroad said U.S. District Judge Oren Harris issued a temporary restraining order at 10: 40 a.m. from his bench in Pine Bluff, Ark., just six hours after members of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers began setting up pickets at 4:30 a.m.

'This apparently was served to the workers prior to 1 p.m. because the picket lines began coming down on the Cotton Belt at that time," said Jim Bart of Houston, public relations manager for the Southern Pacific Transportation Co.

'There are 4,000 people working for Cotton Belt, and all of them were affected by the strike," he said. "But operations were just about back to

New rules offered for flying smokers

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Civil Aeronautics Board proposed new smoking rules for airlines Friday, suggesting that pipe and cigar smokers be separated from non-smokers by at least seven rows

Also among the new proposals are rules that would establish a buffer zone of at least one row between smoking and non-smoking sections. The proposed regulations also would require cigar and pipe smokers to sit by air vents or at the back of the plane and would require smokers to be separated from non-smokers by a partition.

Other proposals being considered would require smokers to extinguish cigars and pipes on request, ban cigar and pipe smoking on domestic flights, prohibit all smoking on aircraft with 30 seats or less or on flights of one hour or less.

The public and the airline industry have until Aug. 20 to comment on the proposed smoking rules. The public may write the CAB at Civil Aeronautics Board, Washington, D.C., 20428. After that the CAB will decide whether to implement any of them.

The only existing restriction on smoking in airliners is a CAB regulation requiring airlines to segregate smokers and non-smokers. Any airline could ban smoking on its own, a board spokesman said. But the majority of CAB members has made clear it will not order such a ban

A final CAB rule issued in January ordered airlines to take precautions to ensure that non-smokers are not subjected to unreasonable amounts of cigar and pipe smoke. But that rule was left vague to give the airlines time to experiment with solutions to the smoking problem. The CAB said it would propose detailed rules later.







Ongais may lose chance for qualifying run

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Injured race driver Danny Ongais failed medical tests Friday when he returned to the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, keeping him out of this weekend's final round of time trials for the Indianapolis 500 May 27.

Speedway physican Dr. Tom Hanna and Ongais' neurosurgeon agreed that Ongais, who suffered a concussion and whiplash injury in a crash last Saturday, should not resume driving until at least next week, track officials said.

Another driver could qualify the car for Ongais this weekend, but no immediate word was available if the Interscope Racing Team would move in that direction. If they did, Ongais would start the May 27 race in

the back of the pack.

Ongais, who will be 37 on Monday, was one of seven drivers to top 190 mph in practice and had been considered a strong contender for a second straight front-row starting position at Indy. However, his primary car was destroyed in the accident when Ongais hit the wall backward twice at tremendous speed after spinning in the fourth

Members of Ongais' team had readied his backup car, which cleared USAC's technical inspection Thursday. However, the car has ot been tested since mebers of his team had planned to have Ongais in it Friday when he returned from Califor-

Ongais went to California

after being released from the hospital on Monday.

Meanwhile, Larry Cannon, the slowest qualifier among the 25 drivers who earned a spot in the 1979 Indy 500 last Sunday, said he wouldn't mind a wet

Cannon completed his four-lap 10-mile qualification run with an average speed of 180.932 mph. He's in the race now, but once eight more cars qualify faster the first driver topping Cannon's speed will knock his Wildcat-Drake out of the race.

"I'd like it to start raining at 11:01 a.m. (the time Saturday's time trials are scheduled to start) and just keep on," said Cannon Friday during the final full day of practice for the May

'We're in the race and there isn't anything we can do about our situation now. As to our chances for staying ... I'm not a Johnny Carson and I don't have a crystal ball to predict.'

Cannon, who hopes to start the race for the first time since 1976. refused to second-guess the time accepted by his crew. "Our engine was in terrible

shape, but we didn't know it until we took the car apart after qualifying," he said. Cannon's crew still was hav-

ing problems during Friday's practice, which was a busy one. He had to take the car back to the garage when it developed a clutch problem early Friday.

"That's the type of thing our operation runs into. We don't

have the big money like some other teams and the smallest problem becomes a major one for us," he said. At least 16 unqualified cars,

including several back-up cars which their owners might qualify with a second driver, have topped Cannon's speed in prac-


"I think it will take at least 182 to qualify," said Australian native Vern Schuppan, who added he was confident he could place his car in the 63rd running of the race. "We've been over 184 with an older engine and think we can improve on hat with some changes.

Other drivers who hope to qualify were also confident, but the weather was a key question. The weatherman was predicting

a 40 percent chance of afternoon showers and thunderstorms for Saturday and more rain was included in Sunday's forecast. And the drivers have no guarantee of being allowed an attempt. The U.S. Auto Club reserves the right to fill the field by invitation if it is not filled by 6 p.m. Sunday when the trials are scheduled to







Spain will miss U.S. submariners

By FENTON WHEELER

ROTA, Spain (AP) - Sometime in June the last of 10 U.S. nuclear-armed Poseidon missile submarines will move quietly across Cadiz Bay, leaving Spain without the worry of nuclear weapons for the first time in 25

"Our business will go down 30 to 35 percent when the Americans go,' šays Rafael Aguilar, a car dealer who has been selling Volkswagens, Volvos, Audis and Fiats to U.S. Navy personnel for 22 years.

So will the business at Benny's, The Missouri, The Top Ten, The California and The Old Hong Kong, or any of nearly two dozen bars that stretch from Rota's downtown plaza to the sprawling Navy base just outside the

"We will miss the submariners," says an English-speaking barmaid.

They gave the place some class." Over two decades, the presence of the Americans has turned the oncesleepy fishing village into a kind of pizza-paella port.

Old men with black berets still manage their share of the street but they are likely to arrive home to find an American sailor, one of hundreds who live off the base, sipping a beer on the patio next door, or dating his granddaughter. Yankee accents somehow mix with the slow Spanish of Andalucia, the sherry, the sunshine and the olives.

Squadron 16, one-fourth of the U.S. Navy's strategic missile submarine force, is expected to leave without fanfare.

Its long-range impact, however, could be more telling. By taking away the Poseidon missiles the Navy is unintentionally blunting a favorite argument of the Spanish left — that U.S. nuclear strike capacity compromises and endangers Spain. The result could help Premier Adolfo Suarez open the door wider to Spain's eventual entry into the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, some military men

The submarines are leaving under a 1976 U.S.-Spanish military bases treaty that calls for "phased with-

drawal" by June 30, 1979. Squadron 16's commander, Capt. James D. Williams, says the pullout, including the missile-storing submarine tender USS Canopus, the floating drydock USS Oak Ridge and three support ships, will come about two weeks before deadline. The exact de-

parture time is classified. Capt. Williams says the squadron has been slipping away quietly since December.

Under a pre-treaty agreement in 1971, the United States agreed to turn over the 6,600-acre base to the Spanish navy. Spain now gives facilities to the Americans, whose primary function is to service and supply the U.S. 6th Fleet.

Navy officials estimate that 30 percent of the base's population of 13,000 American military and civilian personnel and dependents will be affected by the submarine squadron's departure to a new home at Kings' Bay,

"Day-to-day activities are bound to be affected, as will business in the local economy," says Capt. Edwin E. Hanson, commander of the American part of the base and the head of all U.S. Navy activity in Spain. He says the base will continue as a major supply and support facility for the 6th Fleet but he is concerned that some recreational activities might have to

be reduced. 'This generally has been a very friendly and cooperative arrange-

ment," he adds. Not everyone agrees. The news magazine Cambio 16 calls Rota a "Little America," corrupted by dollars, language and American soft

Few Spaniards have forgotten their worst nuclear scare - the 1966 air collision of a B-52 bomber and a KC-135 tanker that dumped four unarmed H-bombs on southern Spain. Neither have they forgotten the original assurances from American military men that there were no nuclear weap-

ons involved. The submarine squadron arrived in 1964, two years after the H-bomb accident, and therefore always has been

a little suspect in Spanish eyes. The submarine pullout will leave the U.S. Navy with other squadrons at Guam, Holy Lock in Scotland and





No clues as to why platform toppled

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) — Three days of testimony before a Coast Guard board of inquiry ended Friday without yielding a clue to why the Ranger I oil drilling platform toppled into the ocean May 10.

There were 34 men aboard the rig when one of its three legs apparently collapsed, dropping it into the Gulf of Mexico 12 miles south of Galveston. Twentysix were pulled from the water, three bodies have been recovered and five men still are missing.

The Coast Guard said salvage operations on the rig are continuing, but it could be days before anything is brought to the surface.


