It took the jury less than an hour to find Sonny Chavez, Arturo Esquivel and Manuel Flores not guilty of assault on Estevan Sandoval last Wednesday in a Bailey County courtroom.

Sandoval suffered two broken arms after Chavez admittedly hit him twice with a four foot steel pipe. Chavez claimed Sandoval came at him with a knife. Sandoval claimed he was not armed

The state alleged that Flores and Esquivel also hit Sandoval with bats. Wittnessses for Flores and Esquivel said that Chavez was the only person who hit Sandoval.

Rains flood county line northeast of Muleshoe

Severe storms brought one and sixteen hundredths of an inch of rain to Muleshoe early last Thursday morning causing low areas on roads to be flooded. The storm lasted approximately 30 minutes but brought high winds, marblesize hail and torrential rains. A tornado was also reported that same morning near the Tolk Station, but no damages were stated.

Local police get vest grant

The U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) will award a grant of \$4,928 to Muleshoe, under the Bulletproof Vest Partnership Program to help purchase eight vests, U.S. Senator John Cornyn announced today. The Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) approved the payment for the purchase of body armor to help protect local law enforcement officers.

"These brave men and women risk their lives every day to defend our homes and families," Cornyn said in making the announcement. "Providing these grants to help defend them is the right thing to do, and a small way of showing our appreciation for all they do."

The legislation authorizing the grants mandates that priority in awarding grants be given to jurisdictions with populations under 100,000. As a result, all \$59 million in funding this year will be awarded _ the vests.

to grantees in smaller localities.

"I know from my own personal experience that law enforcement in Texas is the finest in the nation. I've been honored to work closely with so many of them, and appreciate all they do," Cornyn said. "Through my travels in the state, and the roundtables I've held with first responders in cities large and small, I'm confident that local, state, and federal authorities must work together as partners to support and protect this critical layer of our homeland security."

More than 6,500 applications for vest grants were submitted nationwide to the BJA this year, and more than 5,700 will be funded. The funds will be available next month. Federal payment can provide up to 50 percent of each. jurisdiction's costs, including costs associated with purchasing and shipping

She was performing with her husband in the WT Jazz Band when "Legacies" band director Steve Hilton saw her perform and asked her to perform with "Texas Express."



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

ETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor:

Unadvertised redistricting meetings were held in several small groups last week, one of which was in Lubbock. I sent in a notice to your paper but it was not published. This is for rural West Texas a very important matter and can be looked at as a partisan issue because it is mainly designed to cut a number of democrats from the Texas legislature and has Tom Delay's hands all over it, even though redistricting was accomplished by the Supreme Court last year. However, more important, it is a Rural issue.

Many rural districts such as our 19th District will be redrawn to include the large cities. Ours will probably include Fort Worth, Tarrant County. We will never have a rural representative again, such as we have now from Lubbock in our newly elected representative Randy Neugabauer who is a republican, but will probably get the representative from Tarrant County and the heavily populated area included.

We in West Texas are barely acknowledged in the Texas Legislature (especially with our loss of Pete Laney, much less the U.S. Congress. If this plan goes through, be assured we will have

little chance of rural representation in the future.

After saying in 2001 that redrawing congressional lines during a special session would be "a waste of taxpayer's money," Perry flip-flopped (with Delay's urging) by calling a special session of the legislature to redraw congressional boundaries in the middle of the decade. In the regular session, the Republican redistricting plan needlessly divided up Texas, marooning rural voters in districts dominated by suburban voters and cutting off urban voters from longstanding neighborhoods. Rural Texans, Hispanics and African-Americans all lose under the DeLay redistricting plan and it's going to cost the people of Texas \$1.7 million for this unnecessary special session. I hope that all rural West Texans will respond by calling our Texas Legislators to stop this effort to make the big cities King.
