socks! Are you laundering them so they remain soft and fluffy? Are they still fitting properly? If not, brush up your technique on launlering.

Before socks are used, make cardboard or heavy brown paper impressions of them by tracing on paper; or, buy forms to the correct size.

Socks should be washed after each wearing so body salts and acids as well as perspiration stains do not dry in the wool fibers and cause them to rot and weaken.

Use warm, tepid water. Flick some on your wrist and if you can't feel it, this is the temperature to use for your woolens. Make nice fluffy suds for the washing.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Ginger Cookies (Makes 5 dozen) 1/2 cup soft shortening 1/2 cup brown sugar

2 eggs 3/4 cup molasses 3 cups sifted flour

1 teaspoon soda

3/4 teaspoon salt 2 teaspoons ground ginger

1 teaspoon cinnamon Cream together shortening and sugar: add molassas and eggs and beat with rotary beater until smooth. Sift together dry ingredients and work into first mixture. Chill dough several hours. Remove from refrigerator and roll on lightly floured board ¼" thick. Cut with floured cutters. Bake on lightly greased baking sheets in a moderately hot (375°F.) oven, or,

when lightly touched, no imprint remains. Socks or other woolens should never be soaked. Keep the socks

under the water and squeeze the suds in and out of them, never wringing or twisting them.

Wash the socks on the wrong side first, then turn to the right side and wash again. Rinse thoroughly so there are no suds left in the socks. When the rinse water at last turns clear, they're free of suds. The more extra moisture you can

get out of the socks before actual drying, the more quickly they will dry. A good way to do this is to place the socks in a Turkish towel, roll, and then knead out the moisture.

Beachy Head Guards England No Longer

Beachy Head, Britain's majestic chalk promontory overlooking the English Channel, has lost its professional sentinel status.

The 575-foot headland from which watchers have squinted toward the French coast through countless centuries is reported to have been relinquished as a modern naval and coast guard station, leaving the observation chores to be carried on from neighboring points to the east and west.

The stretch of Sussex coast 50 miles southeast of London commanded by Beachy Head has many landmarks of the martial events that helped shape Eng-land's story, says the national geographic society. At the little bay of Pevensey, half a dozen miles to the east, William, Duke of Normandy, landed with his army in 1066, while King Harold was defending his throne in the north.

The Normans leisurely unloaded their horses, coats of mail, longbows and lances. They evien brought along carpenters and materials to build the wooden structures that were soon to rise on the Pevensey beach and at the nearby port of Hastings.

The invaders had time to sack the countryside before Harold, routing his northern enemies, rushed with hurriedly augmented forces to meet the foe at the English Channel. The famous Battle of Hastings which followed, and which gave William his "Conqueror" title and ushered in the new era of Norman rule and culture, took place about 15 miles northeast of Beachy Head.
