Baby Beef calves will be judged in three divisions. The divisions will include senior and junior Herefords, and Angus calves.

The baby beef show is being sponsored jointly by the Stratford Lions Club and the Sherman County Farm Bureau.

## County Declines SCS Conservation Assistance

County Agricultural Committeemen wrestled with the problem of setting up a 1952 soil and water conservation program for many hours Tuesday and finally rejected SCS proposals for assistance in the county program. Reduced county allotment funds make it impossible to hire technical skill for planning part of the permanent type practices without depriving cooperating farmers and ranchmen of the pay they would receive for carrying out the practices.

The meeting was called for the purpose of reviewing and discussing the 1952 ACP program funds and the 5% agreement with the Soil Conservation Service.

Chairman R. C. Buckles gave a summary of the ACP intentions filed by producers in the county as follows: Constructing diversion terraces — 57 3/4 miles (340,920 cubic yards at 8 cents per cubic yard) amounting to \$24,393.60. Shaping and seeding waterways — 38 1/2 acres (amount not included in the total due to the lack of a rate). Subsoiling — 1,583 acres (rate based on an average of \$1.50 per acre) amounting to \$2,374.50. Protecting summer fallowed acreage — 54,732 acres (all acreage to be reduced to 1/3) amounting to \$10,946.40. Chiseling, pit cultivating, etc. — 148,385 acres (acreage to be reduced to 1/3) amounting to \$14,838.50. Control of bindweed 1,116 acres (amount not included in total due to the lack of an average rate.) Drilling wells — 12 (amount based on an average of 200 feet per well at \$3.00 per foot) amounting to \$7,200. Constructing dams — 27 (amount based on an average of 1,500 cubic yards per dam and 10 cents per cubic yard) amounting to \$4,050.00; enlarging dams — 2 (based on 1/2 the average of constructing a dam) amounting to \$150.00. Seeding grasses — 1,753 acres (based on an estimate of \$3.50 per acre) amounting to \$6,135.50. With the intentions filed to date amounting to over \$70,000.00 and the county allocation being only \$39,600.00, the chairman called for suggestions as to how a satisfactory program could be worked out to best meet the needs of soil and water conservation in the county.

The chairman reported that Soil Conservation Service representatives had previously estimated that county producers would carry out the following permanent type practices: Diversion terraces — 39 miles. Waterways — 20 acres. Dams 6. Man hours estimated to be spent on each of these practices were: terraces — 780, waterways 380 and dams — 120. Figured on the basis of a \$4,200 a year man, salary was estimated to be \$3073. Travel at the rate of 7 cents per mile, 90 miles per day, amounted to \$1,008. Leave and per diem was estimated at \$780, making a total of \$4,861. With 5% of the county allocation to \$1,980.00, SCS representatives had reported that under the 5% agreement, technical service would be available as long as funds were available to assist them in securing the personnel to give the service; but with the present estimate applied against the 5%, service to producers would be limited and all producers could not be given technical assistance.

Permanent type practices carried out under the 1951 ACP program included 29,937 linear feet of ridge type terraces amounting to \$374.21, three dams consisting of 5,198 cubic yards and amounting to \$519.89 and one damless tank consisting of 321 cubic yards and amounting to \$25.68.

With several suggestions being offered as to how the program funds could be pro-rated to meet the needs of the county and the possibility that in the event of a pro-ration, farmers would receive so little assistance they would be too discouraged to carry out conservation practices, the joint committees adopted the following: In the future under the 1952 ACP program, no assistance will be provided for carrying out practice No. 2, con-

## School Board Extends Holmes Contract

The contract of Superintendent C. D. Holmes was extended for three years at a recent meeting of the Stratford School Board. Mr. Holmes was under contract with the Stratford Schools for another year at the time the contract was extended.

The issuing of prior approvals for the four permanent type practices was discontinued due to the high cost of planning and construction, which makes them prohibitive with the small county allocation.

## Cut Worms Are Appearing In Moore County

Cut worms in small numbers are reported to have been discovered in wheat fields in Moore County by Dr. Cheda, Denton, Texas entomologist.

Local producers are advised to check their fields every few days for possible appearance of the pest which has caused considerable damage in this section.

County Agent Ernest Goule states that a DDT solution is recommended for cut worm control and that it has been satisfactory in controlling the menace when used under proper conditions.

## Returns To Japan From Korean Duty

JAPAN — Pic. William G. Reed, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Reed of Stratford, is serving with the combat-tested 1st Cavalry Division on winter-bound Hokkaido, northernmost of the Japanese home islands.

With Russian territory at one point only three miles away, men of the division are concentrating on defensive tactics and taking advantage of the snow covered mountains to learn techniques of Arctic warfare.

The division arrived in Japan recently from Korea where it had spent 17 months in the front lines.

Reed, a switchboard operator with the 82nd Field Artillery Battalion's Battery C, spent four months in Korea and was awarded the Korean Service Ribbon with one campaign star.

## County Invests \$119,987.50 In Savings Bonds

Sherman County citizens invested \$119,987.50 in savings bonds during 1951, according to an audit of the purchases released this week. Of the total amount purchased, Series E bonds represented an investment of \$79,987.50 and Series F and G bonds secured represented an investment of \$40,000.00.

## Buckles And Kendrick Are State Officers

R. C. Buckles has been elected president of the Texas Wheat Producers Association and Kenneth Kendrick has been re-elected Secretary and Treasurer. They were elected at the state convention held in Amarillo last week.

A. W. Erickson, soil expert and crop forecaster, of Minneapolis, Minnesota, told the group that poison injected in the leaves of wheat plants by greenbugs feeding on the plants, resulted in wheat turning brown and developed into Mosaic Root Rot. He stated that greenbug infested fields in Kansas are turning brown at the present time.

## Light Rains Bring Hope To Producers

Light rains falling over the Texas Panhandle section Monday gave many producers hope of reaping a wheat crop this summer. The rain was spotted. Some sections received more than half an inch while in other localities the rain varied from a sprinkle to a little more than a quarter of an inch.

In Stratford the rain Monday registered .80 of an inch and Tuesday night's shower brought .03 of an inch.

Conditions in wheat fields over the entire territory are varied. Early wheat that received rain after it was growing and that has been moderately pastured shows evidence of being the most healthy in this section. Early wheat which received rain under similar circumstances that has not been pastured looks good.

Late wheat that did not receive rain after germination may be classified in three distinct conditions. Some of it is small but looks healthy. Some of these fields are turning brown. Other fields look as though there might be a loss of several acres of wheat unless abundant moisture falls.

### Selecting the Top Football Coach

BEVERLY HILLS, Cal.—Who should be named as the top football coach of all time? I have a hunch that if this query should ever be put to a national vote the winner would be Knute Rockne. The Rock was one of the greatest. "That would be on account of Rockne's rare personality," a veteran coach out this way said, "not because of his coaching ability, which was not abnormal." They have two candidates out this way along the Pacific's placid rim. The two are Glen (Pop) Warner and Alonzo Stagg. "Warner and Stagg," an old-timer of considerable repute says, "were great inventors as well as great coaches. Between them they gave the game something beyond all others—the single wing, the double wing, the direct pass to the ball carrier, the spiral pass from center, early use of the forward pass as a real offensive weapon, these and many other things that all other coaches used later. Both Warner and Stagg had new and baffling formations they alone devised and used. Knute Rockne was a great all-around coach, where his personality counted immensely, but he never gave anything to football to be compared with Pop and Lonnie. Think what these two gave to great teams as well as to all teams."

Pop Warner had star teams at Carlisle, Pittsburgh, Stanford and Temple. Stagg worked at Chicago until he was 70, when the retirement rule sent him to the College of the Pacific. Stagg has been a coach for over 60 years and is still on a working job. Pop Warner retired after a career that began in 1895 and ended only a few years ago. Certainly Pop's single- and double-wing attack has been the most famous in football—far overshadowing the loud heralded T. Nearly all of the top teams used the single and double wing this season. Princeton, Tennessee, Maryland (plus other varieties), UCLA (the strongest November team on the West Coast), Michigan State, etc.

"I would be delighted," Pop told me, "to have two squads practically even in playing strength. Let any other coach use the T on one squad while I used the single and double wing. I think it would be a slaughter—against the T."

If ever such a contest was staged, I would love to be on hand to take it in.

## Homes for Christ

Lesson for February 17, 1952

**WHAT is a Christian home? It is no solemn place, for "solemn" is not another word for "Christian." It is not an "American" home, because while Christians can be Americans, and vice versa, the two words do not mean the same thing. Sending off the little ones to Sunday school every Sunday morning, or even piling the whole family into the car and going to church 52 times a year, will not quite do it. For church-going is only one part, and the easiest part, of being Christian. What about the rest of the week?**

**Does Jesus Get Beyond the Front Door?**  
The home of Mary, Martha and Lazarus, where Jesus often visited, we can think of as in many ways a Christian home. Jesus was welcome there; he dropped in any time, he felt at home.

Now Christ is most at home (as any one is) where people are congenial, where the attitude to the things men live by—work, play, love, worship—is the same as his attitude.

Also in the Bethany home they listened to Jesus. It is well to have a Bible in the house; but that alone will not make it Christian. Is it read? Do the children when growing up hear the words of Jesus from the Gospels? Do they hear his voice as often as they hear the voice of Mr. Cassidy or the Lone Ranger?

**How the Home Can Serve**  
THERE are three ways in which the home of today can serve Christ. One is in connection with the church. Except in rarest cases, every Christian home should be an actual part of some Christian church. A church which has no cooperation from the homes in its community will be a dying church.

The liveliest churches, on the other hand, are those where homes and church do the best team-work. To take only one example: Does your home work together with your church in the recruiting of ministers?

Ministers have to come from somewhere, and the best ministers don't all come from preachers' homes by any means. How about the boys in your home? If one of them felt an urge to be a minister or a missionary, would the rest of you laugh him out of it?

Another way for the home to serve Christ is in treatment of strangers. When strangers move into your community, or live there for a short time as school teachers sometimes do, is your home open to them? Is your house a "home away from home" for lonely people? When you have a party, do you invite always only those who can invite you back, or do you (as Jesus suggested) include people who will probably never be able to repay you? A home that prides itself on being "exclusive" has forgotten Jesus' words—"I ... as a stranger, and ye took me not in."

**Serving the Children**  
A Christian home, moreover, will serve its own children in Christ's name. In it children will hear about Christ, not as a past figure in history but as a Living One. Parents will teach them Christian patterns of living.

This will not be merely something they hear about in Sunday school, it will be the pattern of life in which they are trained from day to day, beginning even before they can remember. This home, if it serves its children as it should, will show them how to help Christ. The children will know about the church ("His body," said Paul) and what it is doing in his name around the world. From their earliest years they will be helpers in this work. They will rot grow up thinking of "missions" in some vague way, but they will know and be thrilled by the great story which that single word carries.

And the children in a Christian home will be helped by Jesus far more than they help him. Even at the beginning of childhood they will learn to say "Dear Jesus, help me," when the mean word or the angry act are just almost exploding. Even as children they will learn something of what in older years will mean much more, the "practice of His presence."

But no one can learn from the ignorant. And children will never learn these things at home without help. A home does not begin to be Christian with the children, but with the parents. Whatever good the children learn, father and mother must learn it first.

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
