4-H Round-Up Announced In June

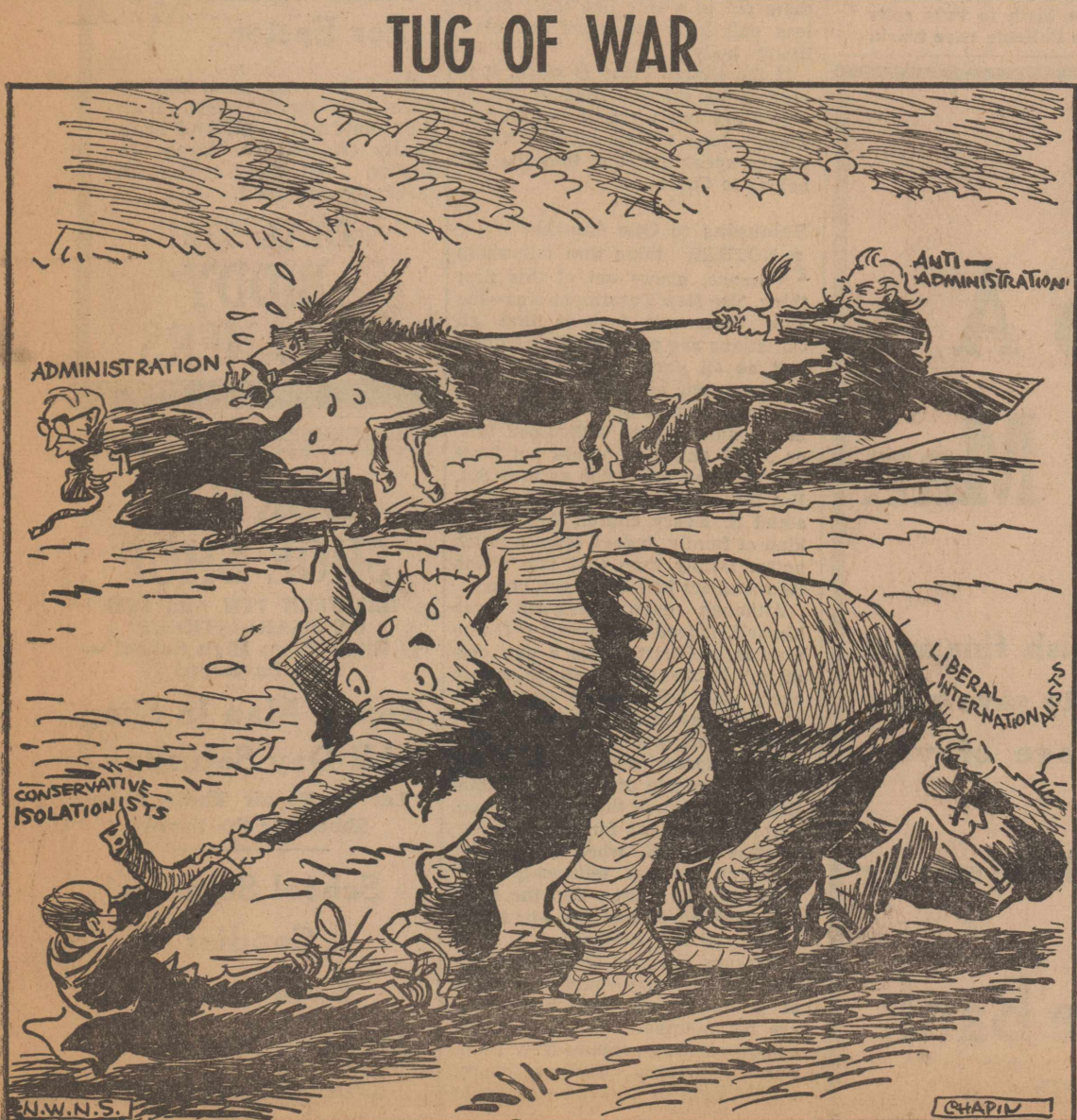

Four Drilling Locations Listed For Sherman Co.

Four new drilling locations are announced for Sherman County amid a new oil and gas play which promises the renewal of leasing of most of the land in the county where leases have expired in recent months.

Puckett & Wertz Nancy No. 1 is located 1,400 feet from the north and west lines of section 88 in Block 1-C. Probable depth of the well will be 3,200 feet.

Shamrock Oil & Gas Corporation Pollan No. 1 is 1,250 feet from the west and 1,320 feet from the north lines of section 84 in Block 3-T. Potential contract depth of the well is 3,400 feet.

Shamrock Oil & Gas Corporation Emma D. Young No. 1 is 1,320 feet from the south and east lines of section 422 in Block 1-T. Potential contract depth is 3,500 feet.

Stanford Oil & Gas Company Sewell Gas Unit No. 1 is 2,490 feet from the north and east lines of section 103 in Block 1-C. Potential depth of the well will be 2,996 feet.

Happier Facing Fear

MISS WILLIE BRYANT, Geneva, Ala., had always been afraid, but here is the way she overcame her fears.
Her first fear was of being ignorant. Born on a little farm three miles from Geneva when times were hard, her family couldn't even take a newspaper. There were no school buses then and she walked those three miles twice a day until she graduated from high school. Her books showed the great world outside her narrow life and she had the strong desire to learn more.

She grabbed the opportunity of attending a business school, walking three miles twice a day to learn shorthand and typing. Later, through a friend, she got a chance to attend Radnor College, Nashville, Tenn., and pay her way by office work. Early in the morning she took dictation, had classes most of the day followed by study, then went back to the office and typed letters until midnight. There was no time for college fun or good times. But she graduated! She had faced her fear of ignorance.

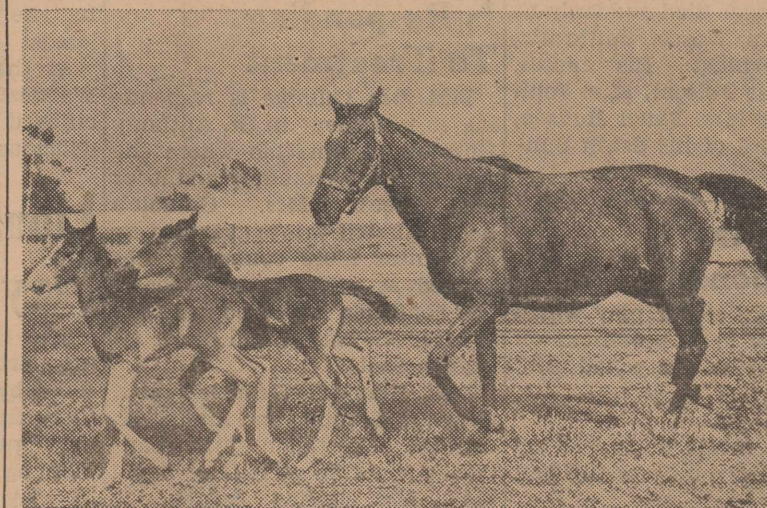
Later she faced a worse fear, that of being physically helpless from arthritis. It was agony to move, but the most terrible thing was she couldn't use her hands, couldn't work. Sometimes she couldn't stand. She then went to the bottom of her courage; she wouldn't give up and go to bed. Sometimes when walking around the block, she fell on the pavement. But she got up and went on. She forced her stiff, swollen hands to do whatever she could, fighting the disease with needles, drugs—everything she heard about. Today she can work.

She says fear has come near to beating her many times, but she will never give up. She is happier facing it than succumbing to it.

Fellowship Supreme

Lesson for April 6, 1952

THE church of the twentieth century is taking a beating. We are living in one of the dark eras when the Christian church in large parts of the world is on the retreat. One-sixth of the earth's surface, that used to be called "Christian," is now dominated by anti-religious powers.

There were once 8,000 missionaries in China where now there are 200, and the number is growing fewer still. An inquiring minister in Georgia recently asked a number of American church leaders whether they thought we can call the United States a "Christian" nation. Most of them said No, and most of them thought that America is at present slipping farther away from Christ.

What Did the Early Church Have That We Haven't?

Now the question is: What did the early church have that we don't have? Why did they succeed where we have not been succeeding?

One quality which was strong in the early church, weak today, is fellowship. Let us first see what the New Testament idea of fellowship is not. It is not organization. It was not any one Big Man or Big Church or any pattern of organization that made the early church "click." Also, it was not simple nearness.

For many persons today, "belonging to the same church" with another person means no more than that on occasional Sundays they find themselves sitting within a few yards of each other. They do not know each other's names, perhaps, much less take any personal interest in each other's affairs.

Furthermore, the New Testament does not hold up subscription to a creed as the main feature of fellowship. All mathematics teachers believe in the truth of algebra and geometry, but that does not make a fellowship out of mathematics teachers. So you can have several hundred or several thousand people repeating the same Creed without ever being a fellowship or even knowing what the word means.

No Tinker-Toy Business

ONE thing that fellowship did mean, when it meant something, Jesus made very plain. It is like the life of a growing vine. You cannot think of the branches without the vine, nor of the vine without the branches.

Carrying on the same idea, Paul (1 Cor. 12) speaks of the church as the "body" of Christ. Christian fellowship is first of all an intimate growing-in to the life of Christ, sharing the same life with him.

You can make a tinker-toy man with two arms or no arms, you can pull the legs and arms out and stick them in again as you like, because the tinker-toy man is not real, it is only blocks and sticks. But you cannot stick branches in and pull them out of a vine like that; much less pull legs and arms out of a living body.

If the church today is weak, it is because too many individual "members" are not members of Christ. They belong to the church, statistically speaking; but they do not belong to Christ.

Belonging to One Another

ANOTHER thing that fellowship means, grows out of this first thing. The New Testament idea—the New Testament fact—is that all Christians are parts of one another, just as all parts of a living thing belong to one another.

It is quite true that not every one in the church then understood this, or Jesus and Paul would not have had to speak and write as they did. But the church at large did understand it. Every church then was a kind of family, indeed often a much better family than that into which its members had first been born.

Although each Christian was himself, indeed a new self ("If any man is in Christ, he is a new creation," Paul said), yet in the church every one belonged to every one else, just as in a good family. The good of one was the happiness of all; the sorrow and trouble of one was the trouble of all; the temptation of one gave the others an opportunity to fight for his rescue.

The church, when it IS the church, is the fellowship supreme, the united life, the life of God shared by those who love him and one another.

Perhaps the best thing the Christian church today could do, instead of getting more "members" who are not members, would be to rediscover and re-practice New Testament fellowship. Such a church would begin to win victories again.

Let Skin Tone, Hair, Eyes Help Determine Wardrobe Colors

THE BEST PLANNED wardrobe can fall far short of expectations in what it does for you if the colors chosen are not selected with the utmost care.

Many women will choose colors which are their favorites, rather than those which they should wear. Perhaps they have seen a particularly lovely color on someone else, and feel they fall in the same general category, and thus get one for themselves. It won't always do what's expected in the way of compliments!

It may take a bit of scientific deduction and careful analysis to choose your best colors, but then you'll know them for all time! No need to wonder, then, whether you can wear this shade or that, so you actually save time in the long run.

There was a time when you wore colors determined by just hair and eyes. These still influence the color choice, but the most important factor in determining suitable color is the skin tone and the skin coloring.

Have you ever looked carefully at your skin? Do you know whether it has a yellowish, pinkish, orange or purple cast? Then, too, there are skins which have a definite gray cast, and still others which seem to have some green mixed in with their other colors.

Take a careful and analytical look at your own skin so that you'll know just what it is. Another way to find what tones are in the skin is to remember what colors just do not flatter. These are colors which your skin has, and thus they intensify the cast and make it unpleasant looking.

Petal Collar

Determine costume colors expertly...

Skin tones can be modified by the colors you wear. This modification is what you're after, then, for the skin tone cannot be changed.

How to Modify Problem Tones

The most desirable skin tones are white, pink and orange. In cases where these are the primary tones, let the hair and eye color be the most determining factors, as skin tones will be correlated to that, inasmuch as it offers no problem.

In cases where the skin has a definite yellowish cast, you can wear yellow near the skin provided it doesn't reflect the light. If the skin is too yellow to have you wear the same color near the skin, separate it from the skin by one of your better colors.

With a yellow skin, you can often wear yellow-green or yellow-orange, especially if you separate them from the face with a contrasting color which is among your best hues.

Skins with a purplish cast call for bright purple or light red-purple



Redheads Should Never Tone Down Coloring

Red or auburn-haired people should take advantage of their distinctive coloring by highlighting it, emphasizing it, and never playing it down.

Certain colors are to be avoided. These include those which are red, pink, and deep purple. White, ivory and black can all be stunning if the skin is clear and glowing.

Colors for the redhead are always clear and distinct. For brown or hazel-eyed red-heads, the following are recommended: dark brown, light chartruse (with mostly yellow), pale gray green, clear true green, dark green or pale, grayed blue, orange with a slight bluish cast, light or deep clear yellow or a brown with some yellow cast.

Redheads with blue, gray or gray-green eyes should pick from the following list: light blue-gray, teal blue, deep blue green, powder blue, mauve, a grayish lavender, orange, brown, bright yellow, or yellow-brown.

Dark Brunette Needs Vivid Colors in Clothes

True colors, that is, vivid hues, rather than those which have been grayer or softened, are designed for the brunette with high or intense color.

Those with fair skin and blue eyes can wear mauve, clear red, bluish purple, medium blue, dark teal blue, pale green with a slight yellowish cast, or dark green, and some medium tones of gray.

Brown-eyed brunettes do especially well with a very light pink with a beige cast, a red with a slight tinge of orange and a deep brown which has enough red to make it lively.

Sallow-skinned brunettes would do well to avoid greens which have too much yellow in them or the orange shades which intensify the skin tone.

Medium brunettes may wear many of the same colors that the dark brunettes wear with the exception of gray. All the colors for medium brunettes, however, are toned down considerably from the intense shades prescribed for the dark types. Beige, ivory, cream and especially maroon are excellent choices for the brunette.

Medium brunettes, the most predominant type in the country, are especially good in all shades of blue and green and combinations of these. Pink as well as an orange-pink are good for brunettes no matter what color the eyes are.

Type of Blondeness Determines Colors

You may be classified as a blonde according to hair color, but you'll have to determine which type you are before going into the colors that show you off to best advantage.

or blue-purple which have a great deal of gray in them.

Gray skins will not look well with bright colors. Your best choice is to select, not necessarily gray, but those which have a very dull cast. Always avoid the intense shades.

Intensify Hair Color With Complementary Shades

There are certain general rules which can be applied to selecting color schemes when hair is being considered as a guide. Blonde hair, generally will look well with purple or related tones of this color. Yellow can be repeated, if not too intense, near the hair, also.

Brown haired types should choose from blue and related tones. Brown, also, can be used near the hair, if desired. If the complexion is a bit sallow, bright yellow may help counteract the sallowness, when used with or without brown.

Those with gray hair have a wide variety of color choice, because the eye color will influence the selection, as well as skin tone. With gray hair and hazel eyes, for example, blue green, dark green, gray-blue, a deep orange red, very light gray with a slight purplish cast or a blue cast may be best.

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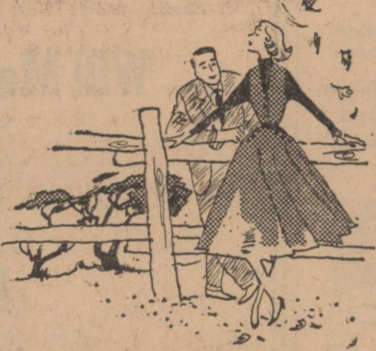

Grand Jury Indictment Often Confused With Conviction
What does indictment by a grand jury mean? Lawyers find that many persons are inclined to confuse indictment by a grand jury with a court conviction for a crime.

This misconception is unfair to anyone who becomes the subject of a grand jury investigation. Justice, in the United States, is based on the theory that a man is innocent until proven guilty, and public opinion should withhold its verdict

until the courts have had an opportunity to determine guilt or innocence.

An indictment is simply a written accusation presented by a grand jury to the district judge. It charges some person or persons with a crime. It is not a conviction. When a grand jury indicts a person it merely affirms that there is sufficient reason for him or her to stand trial. That is as far as the grand jury goes.

After that, the judge and the trial jury take charge of the case. At the trial the indictment is simply the State's pleading in the case, to which the defendant may plead "Not Guilty." The trial jury is instructed by the judge that it must not consider the indictment as any evidence of guilt.

All felony offenses in Texas, that is all offenses punishable by imprisonment in the State penitentiary, must be prosecuted on an indictment by a grand jury. A grand jury may indict an individual for a misdemeanor, an offense punishable only by a jail sentence or by fine, but this is rather an unusual procedure.

Misdemeanor cases are customarily prosecuted on the basis of an "information" filed by the County Attorney. This serves the same function as a grand jury indictment.

The importance of a grand jury verdict is this: If it votes a "True Bill" — that is, if some one is indicted — the District Attorney must prosecute the person indicted; but if the jury votes a "No Bill" — that is, not to indict, the suspected person cannot be tried.

In most cases, the District Attorney informs the grand jury of persons or crimes to be investigated and produces the evidence for it. However, the jury is free to order any further witnesses it may wish to hear brought before it, and is by no means limited to the evidence the District Attorney produces.

A grand jury cannot require a suspect to testify before it. But suspected persons sometimes ask to be allowed to appear before a grand jury to testify in their own behalf. They may do so and still be prosecuted and convicted.

The grand jury procedure is

CLARENDON — Top district officials of The American Legion and its Auxiliary will be named at the spring convention of the 18th District to be held here Saturday and Sunday, April 5 and 6. Attendance is expected to pass the 300 mark.

Delegates from the district's 45 American Legion Posts will elect a commander and vice commander to serve for the next two years, according to Rhea Smith of Amarillo, whose two-year term as district commander expires at the State Convention in August. Smith said that five delegates and five alternates to the Legion's National Convention will also be elected. The delegates chosen will represent the district at the National Convention in New York City August 24-28. The convention will consider resolutions during the Sunday afternoon business session. All resolutions must be submitted in writing by 11 a.m. Sunday, Smith said.

Rev. William Arms of Fort Worth, State Legion chaplain, will be the principal speaker at the Sunday morning joint session of Legion and Auxiliary delegates at the American Legion Home. The Legion and Auxiliary will hold separate business sessions at 2 p.m. Sunday.

New members of the 40 and 8, fun and honor organization, will be initiated or "wrecked" Saturday afternoon. The business session of the colorful 40 and 8 organization also is set for Saturday afternoon. Visiting Legionnaires and Auxiliary members will attend a child welfare banquet Saturday night.

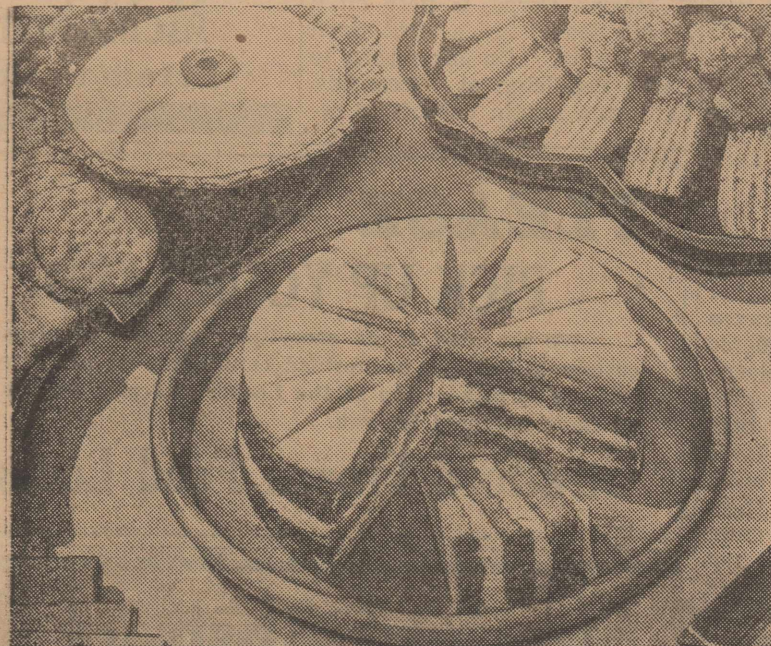

Tasty Cheese Makes Appetizing Snacks (See Recipes Below)

Tasty Snacks

THERE ARE MANY occasions for snacking in every home, especially when the family is social. Perhaps you have people dropping in before dinner, and like to serve something in the living room whether they stay for dinner or not.

Then, too, there are evening get-togethers when a bit of snacking is in order. Perhaps you bring the evening to a close with a tasty snack, something not too much, but just enough to fill you, once the conversation or games have fanned the appetite.

Both men and women appreciate a snack which has some zest to it. If it's before dinner, a salty or tangy type of tidbit is indicated. After dinner and dessert, the same type of snack is in order since the sweet tooth has already been nourished with dessert.

Tangy meat spreads, tasty breads, salty crackers and various cheeses fill the snack role to perfection. Here are many suggestions from which to choose.

These tiered sandwiches may be made in advance and chilled. The base is a round loaf of pumpernickel bread and makes an attractive sandwich piece to set on a platter.

Tiered Sandwiches
(Makes 24 wedges)

- 3 ounces chive cheese
- 3 ounces relish cheese
- 1 6-ounce round loaf pumpernickel bread
- 3 ounces deviled ham
- 2 tablespoons catsup
- 2 ounces Gruyere cheese
- 2 ounces very sharp cheese

Let cheese stand at room temperature until soft enough to spread. Remove bottom crust from pumpernickel. Cut three 1/2-inch thick slices crosswise. Spread one slice with chive cheese; cover with second slice of bread, spread with relish cheese. Cover with third slice of bread. Mix deviled ham and catsup; spread third slice. Cut Gruyere and very sharp cheese portions in triangles and arrange on top layer of bread, alternately, with the pointed ends toward the center. Chill thoroughly. Cut in wedges, following outline of cheese slices.

Rye bread can be made into tasty sandwiches with relish cheese and olive-pimiento cheese spreads. Wrapped in waxed paper, they'll keep in the refrigerator until serving time:

Cheese Rye Wedges
(Makes 44)

- 1 loaf salty rye bread, about 2 1/2 inches in diameter
- 1 5-ounce jar relish cheese spread
- 1 5-ounce jar olive pimiento cheese spread

Slice rye bread into 66 slices about 1/8-inch thick. Set aside 11 slices. Spread remaining slices with cheese spreads, using about 1 teaspoon for each slice. Alternating the cheese spread, stack five slices together, topping each stack with one of the 11 unsliced slices. Wrap stacks in waxed paper and chill thoroughly. Just before serving, cut each stack into four wedges.

Celery stalks can be filled with this mixture: mashed avocado seasoned with lemon juice, salt and onion juice.

Perhaps you like as a snack just a thin slice of bread with well-flavored butter. Ground shrimp mixed with an equal quantity of butter and a seasoning of lemon juice is delicious; ground ham mixed with half as much butter and some sieved egg yolk is appetizing.

Garlic Cheese Dip
1 6-ounce package garlic cheese

3/4 cup soured cream
Let cheese soften at room temperature, then beat until light and fluffy. Blend in soured cream and then chill until ready to serve.

Blue Cheese Spread

- 3/4 cup blue cheese
- 1/4 cup cream cheese
- 2 tablespoons mayonnaise
- 3/4 to 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- Onion juice
- Lemon juice

Soften cheese and blend together with mayonnaise. Season with Worcestershire sauce, onion and lemon juice to taste.

Deviled Ham Dip

- 4 tablespoons deviled ham
- 4 tablespoons horseradish
- 1 teaspoon grated onion
- 2 table. acid chives
- 1 cup heavy cream, whipped

Blend deviled ham with horseradish, onion and chives. Fold in whipped cream and chill before serving.

Dried Beef Dip

- 6 ounces cream cheese
- 1 wedge blue cheese (about 1 ounce)
- 3/4 cup dried beef, finely cut
- 1/2 small onion, grated
- 1 tablespoon horseradish
- 1 tablespoon mayonnaise

Let cheese soften at room temperature. Blend together both kinds, and then mix in other ingredients. Serve with crackers or potato chips.

Avocado Dip

- 4 strips bacon
- 2 avocados
- 1 tablespoon grated onion
- 1 tablespoon lime juice
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise

Dice bacon, fry until crisp, then drain. Peel avocados, mash fine and add lime juice and seasonings. Soften with mayonnaise and add bacon bits. This may be used for dipping or for a spread on crisp crackers.

When you want a hot appetizer, these little meat balls are tasty and easy to serve as well as to eat:

Spicy Meat Balls
(Makes 24)

- 1/2 pound ground beef
- 1 egg
- 1/4 cup dry bread crumbs
- 1 1/2 teaspoons minced onion
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 3/4 teaspoon prepared horseradish
- 3/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- Dash of tabasco sauce
- Grated American or Italian Style cheese

Combine all ingredients except cheese, blending well. Shape into tiny balls. Sauté in hot fat until all sides are lightly browned, which will take about 4 minutes. Roll each ball in grated cheese. Insert toothpick and serve hot.

For a spicy snack to serve before dinner, try some thin slices of salmon spread with cream cheese, then wrap around 2-inch sticks of celery.

You'll like these hot tidbits to serve before a meal: spread strips of uncooked bacon with peanut butter; roll tightly, fasten with a toothpick and broil until bacon is crisp.

Like to stick tasty tidbits into a grapefruit for snacks? Wrap rolled anchovies in a half slice of bacon and broil until bacon is crisp. Or, wrap shrimp in bacon and broil.

Popular Recipe

SHELLACKED or varnished surfaces which have spots are most easily cleaned with kerosene and powdered tripoli. Use a light pressure and make certain the surface is dried carefully.

Faded fiber rugs can be renovated by using a coat of good quality house paint which has been thinned with turpentine. Use three parts of paint to one of turpentine. Work paint into fiber thoroughly with brush for best results.

Wash brooms and brushes occasionally in two quarts of warm water to which has been added four tablespoons of ammonia. Let the straws and bristles soak for half an hour, rinse thoroughly and hang in a cool place to dry.

To give linoleum a high polish as well as aid in cleaning it, add paraffin to the water with which you scrub.

Keep floors clean when it's raining by nailing a scrub brush upside down right outside the door so shoes can be wiped before entering the house.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK
Party Sandwiches
(Serves 8)

- 8 slices bread
- 1 6 1/2-ounce can crab meat, flaked
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1/4 cup chili sauce
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 cup salad dressing

Trim crusts from bread. Toast bread on one side; spread untoasted side with butter. Combine crab meat, lemon juice, chili sauce and Worcestershire sauce. Spread bread, top with salad dressing and broil until bubbly and heated through.

Old rugs can be stiffened if they are first cleaned then have the underside painted with starch. Leave the rug in the sun until it is completely dry.

Worn places on the wooden or linoleum floor can be re-waxed separately from the other parts. However, make certain every three or four months that all old wax is removed and new wax applied to the whole floor.

An inexpensive floor wax can be made at home to use on hardwood floors. Melt a half a cake of paraffin and add to it one cup of turpentine.
