

U-3 Bermuda is the result of several years research work by this Station on thousands of strains of Bermuda as well as other lawn grasses.

U-3 is much hardier than other strains of Bermuda. It is disease free, Dark Green in color and makes a thick velvety mat that crowds out other grasses or weeds. While it is an aggressive grower, it does not grow nearly as tall as other Bermuda grasses and consequently needs mowing only about a third as much as other Bermudas. Its foliage is very fine and does not show discoloration after mowing as do some of the other fine foliage types of Bermuda.

Those of you who attended the Texas State Fair at Dallas and visited the grass demonstration plots, saw this new grass under the name of "Evergreen" Bermuda, and while we are not optimistic enough to think this grass will be ever-green in the Texas Panhandle, we do know that it starts out earlier in the Spring and stays green longer in the fall than the common Bermudas.


Due to the fact that it makes less vegetative growth it requires less moisture and is more drought resistant. We think it is going to prove enormously popular when it is known and available in Stratford.

It is too new to be available in quantity and we have only a moderate amount of the Sod to offer to our customers this Season. One square foot of the sod cut in 2-inch squares will plant about 80 square feet of lawn if planted 18 inches by 18 inches. Sod planted now will make a lawn quickly from this spacing.
