

## Weather Improvement And Insect Control Meeting Wednesday

Lee Cox of the Krick Weather Improvement Association, Denver, Colorado, will discuss the cloud seeding program offered by his company for 1952 in the district court room at the court house in Stratford at 2:00 P. M. Wednesday of next week. He will also show a film of cloud seeding operations in technical.

Dr. Ashdown of the Amarillo Experiment Station, who is doing research work on greenbug control, will discuss the problems he is confronted with in this work and answer questions of farmers about greenbugs.

Mr. Sheer, also of the Amarillo Experiment Station, will report on the grasshopper situation in this area and answer general questions on garden and yard insect control. Reports indicate some grasshopper infestation building up in this area, which may require some control measures in order to eliminate possible infestation in adjoining areas, or a build-up to a more serious infestation this fall that would damage wheat crops. Mr. Sheer has a very definite program of control which he will discuss with the farmers at the meeting.

Farmers are requested to come prepared to advise their directors of the Sherman County Weather Improvement Corporation whether they want a new contract signed for another year. At the present time 62% of the money to finance a new contract has been raised in Sherman County. Farmers must make up their minds now if they want this experiment to be continued for another year. The balance of the money must be raised by May 15 before a new contract can be signed. Farmers and their wives are encouraged to come out to the meeting and discuss the pros and cons of the weather improvement program as well as to take advantage of the research work on cloud seeding and insect control that will be available.

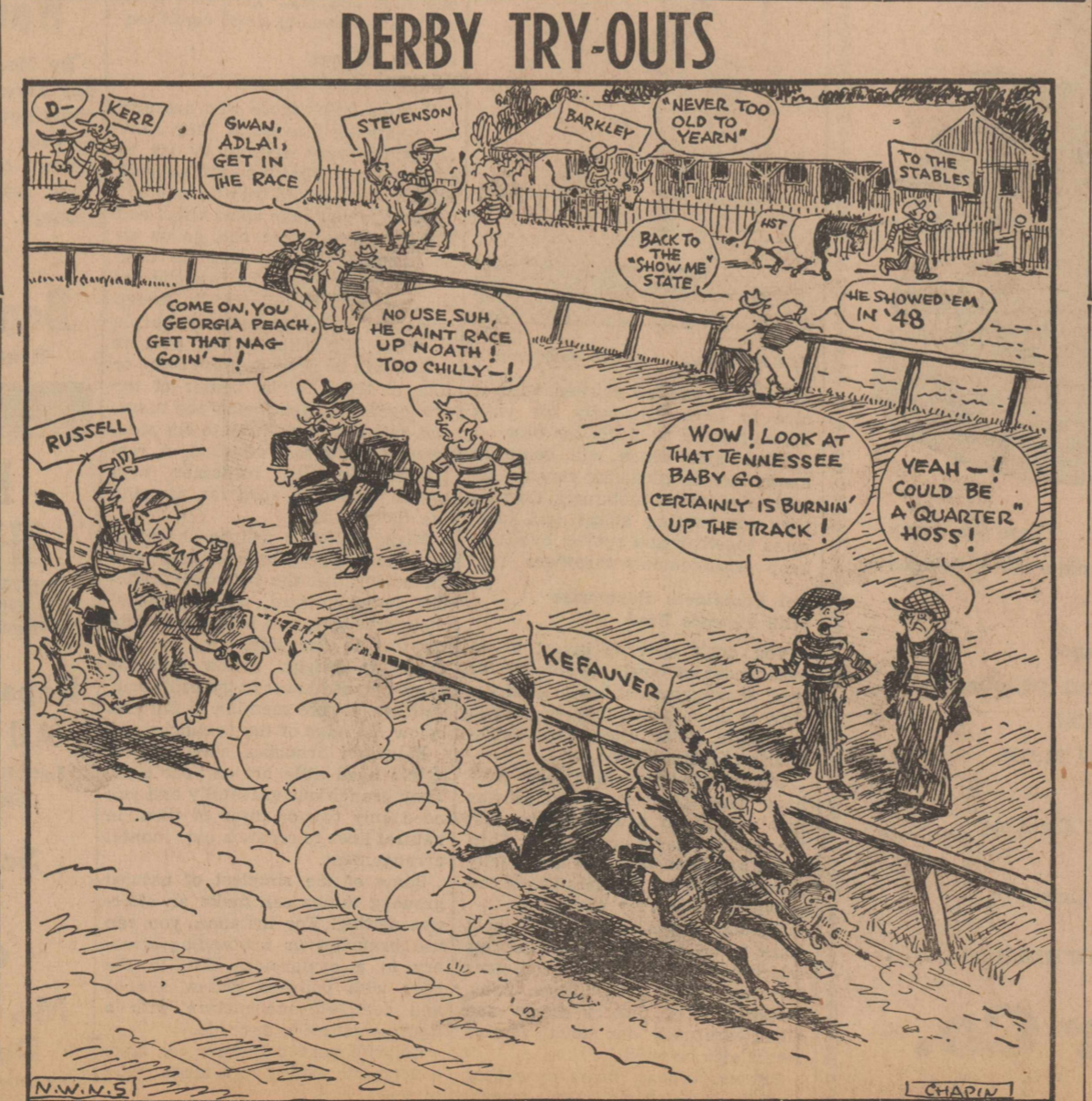

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## WOMAN'S WORLD

### Bring Spring Beauty Into Home With Artfully Arranged Flowers

WHEN YOUR GARDENS start blooming and bushes burst forth with their flower laden branches, there are few who can resist bringing some of the outdoor beauty into their homes.

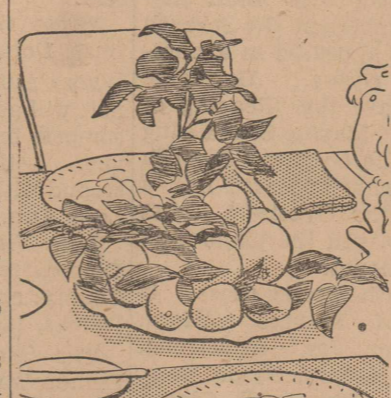
Flowers can give interiors a very refreshing lift, in addition to their fragrance. You don't even need very many flowers for an artistic arrangement, provided you do just the right thing with what few you have, if that's all you can spare from the garden.

Neither is the secret of effective arranging the type of flower used. It's always in what you do with what you have. A few flowers can be just as eloquent in their beauty as two dozen blossoms or sprays, if they are touched with some imagination.

Plan now to do something about a centerpiece for your meals, as well as something for those occasional tables in halls, living rooms or even the bedroom. Keep in mind the kind of room you have, whether it's casual or formal, and arrange flowers accordingly.

The type of room also determines what you'll use as a container for flowers. You may already have a collection of interesting containers, but don't be distressed if you do not. You probably have many things about the house that can be put into service for holding flowers.

One or two flowers in most arrangements are all you really need, so there is no need, really, for trying to achieve a hothouse effect. If what you have are in harmony with the decorative scheme, this can be more effective than many a massed and mixed arrangement.



Simple floral arrangements . . .

Place your flowers where they appear to best advantage, even if you must move some other accessories such as a lamp, books or decorative glass or china. The change will prove interesting.

#### Simple Equipment Helps Arrangements

If you've previously tried arranging flowers with little success, you may not have had the proper equipment. Some of the simplest and most inexpensive aids, and the knowledge of how to use them may spell the difference between poor and good arrangement.

Several types of needle holders are good to have, and in different sizes so they'll fit conveniently into the container you use. There are small and large ones, some round, some square and others rectangular. There are also different size "needles" from which to choose, and you may need a variety because stem sizes vary.

Twisted wire holders with a weighted base are excellent for the large-stemmed, heavy blossomed

flowers. Crumpled chicken wire is nice to have especially for vase arrangements as it fits the best.

Other aids which will come in handy include modeling clay for securing holders to containers, florist's wire for twining stems and blossoms together and rubber bands to keep arrangements together.

#### Let Containers Harmonize With Flowers Used

You don't have to invest in an assortment of bowls and vases for good arrangements, but a good variety of them is nice to have. Search your attic, cellar, kitchen and knick-knack collections first.

Old glassware which you may have used for fruit, or which was just washed on you might be just the thing for some flowers. Then there are bean pots, tea pots, jelly glasses and even pitchers which can prove to be worthy containers.

Shallow trays which will hold some water, are often used. Baskets which can be fitted with a container for water offer possibilities. Urns, water goblets, pottery pieces and silverware used for food service might also be used.

Pewter, bronze, brass or copper containers which may serve merely

as decoration often serve as excellent flower containers.

Flowers should be in harmony with the color as well as the texture of the container used to dramatize them properly. For example, use burnished shades of flowers in copper and brass vessels, with pewter use flowers which are red, blue or gold.

When glass containers are used, consider how the stems will look, as part of the composition as they will have a definite part in the appearance of the arrangement. Some glass containers use a single brightly colored blossom, without the stem, for just this reason.

Pottery containers have infinite possibilities because of their variety. The color of the pottery as well as its texture, whether smooth or rough, should be in keeping with the blossoms used.

#### Flower Plus Its Color

Determines Arrangement

Perfect, unusual blossoms with a dominant character are necessary for line arrangements. Hot-house flowers are usually used because of their perfection of form. Select several lines and arrange them in relation to each other. Curves, properly balanced, are important.

Small or large flowers, in profusion, are used for massed arrangements. These may look casually arranged, but they are usually done stem by stem, so that colors will blend well together.

A classic arrangement which will serve almost any purpose is one which is based on three lines: one which rises above the container, another which goes downward to one side, and then a half-way point between the two. Greenery may be used for the high and low lines and a few blossoms for the center line.

It's always important to create a center of interest in an arrangement, something which draws the eye first and last. This is a focal point and serves to avoid confusion.

#### How to Arrange Seasonal Flowers

It often helps those who are new at arranging flowers if they have something very definite to use as information. What flowers go with others? How should they be treated?

Perhaps you have some tulips and lilies to use. These can go on an occasional table or may be used for a centerpiece. The branches of lilies should be allowed to sweep upward, and they may be purple or white. Six tulips in red, pink or yellow will be needed. Mass three or four of these to the center of the arrangement, right below the lilies, and extend two or three to one side, sweeping low and outward. A rectangular pottery container with needle holder is good for securing the flowers.

Mixed daffodils will be charming in a block type container, with wire for holder. Let the tall white daffodils sweep upward, with a little of their greenery, and place one white blossom to one side, about at the center in height. Yellow daffodils can be placed lower in the container, with one or two seeming to fall just below the edge of the container.

Flowered branches such as forsythia need little art on your part. They branch out gracefully and you need only two or three of them in natural lines to create a nice mantel arrangement.

Some of the simplest of natural growing things can make an effective setting. For instance, you can use branches or upstanding greenery in a centerpiece. Fill in the base with polished yellow lemons and complete the picture with a figurine set off to one side.

Colorful garden flowers can have a dramatic setting in a large water pitcher.

#### Popular Recipe

A FAVORITE for an easy luncheon is Welsh rarebit which is made simply by melting some processed cheese and blending with milk and a bit of mustard. Serve over toast, garnished with grilled tomatoes, hard-cooked eggs, quartered or cold ham.

For those after-school snacks, children will cheer if you serve them toast spread with honey which has been blended with grated orange rind.

To heat iced coffee cakes or rolls, place uncovered in a skillet and bake at moderate temperature for two or three minutes.

A gay salad quickly made is done by blending cut-up marshmallows with a can of fruit cocktail, drained. Spoon into halves of canned yellow cling peaches drained set on a nest of greens.

#### RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Supper Sandwich

(Makes 6)

6 frankfurter buns, split

1 1/2 cups baked beans

6 teaspoons catsup

6 frankfurters, cooked

Toast the cut side of buns until golden brown. Heat baked beans. Place one frankfurter on each bun, spread with one teaspoon of the catsup and 1/4 cup baked beans. Close top to make sandwich. Serve warm.

Cook rhubarb in this way to preserve the color: slice one pound rhubarb into 1/2-inch slices. Add 1/4 cup water and 1 cup seedless raisins then cover and boil gently for 5 minutes. Stir once or twice. Add 1/2 cup brown sugar; stir until dissolved. Serve chilled.

Try some diced pears in lime-flavored gelatin. Add diced pimiento for color, shredded cabbage for texture interest. It's a delightful salad.

Let the children use cookie cutters while they help you make their favorite sandwiches. It keeps little hands busy and out of mischief. If the sandwiches are open-faced, the eyes, ears, nose and mouth can be marked with raisins. Add a delightful contrast to soups with crisp bacon croutons. Drop small cubes of bread into hot, bacon drippings and stir until they are coated with fat. Spread the bread cubes on cookie sheet and toast under a low broiler flame.

School For Mothers Of Deaf Children

A summer school will be held at the Texas School for the Deaf beginning May 27 and closing June 7. Actual instruction will not start until May 28, but mothers and children will be expected to arrive sometime on May 27.

Any mother and pre-school deaf child who is a resident of the State will be potentially eligible to attend this school. Mothers who attended the same school last year, of course, will not be eligible this year, since it is assumed that they will carry on from their experience of last year. Any child who has a considerable degree of deafness is eligible to attend provided he is not over eight or nine years of age. Precedence will be given those children who will become six years of age by September of this year. However, any pre-school child is eligible. Difference in planning for age groups will make it impractical to accept children of more than eight or nine years of age. Any seven, eight or nine year old child may already have been in school other than the school for the Deaf. But they might be eligible, if the teacher or parents consider that they are having difficulty in continuing school because of their deafness.

The mothers, with their children, will be provided room, board and laundry as guests of the Texas School for the Deaf during this ten-day period. Each mother with her child will have a separate room in one of the dormitories during the session. The instruction and lectures will be primarily designed to aid each mother in the care of her child before the child is eligible to attend school. No attempt will be made to train the mothers as teachers, but to help them understand the problems and development of a young deaf child before entering school. Mothers interested in attending the school with their child, should contact Mrs. Clara S. Murphy, State Department of Public Welfare, at the court house in Dalhart, Texas. She may be reached by mail through Box 10, Dalhart, Texas.

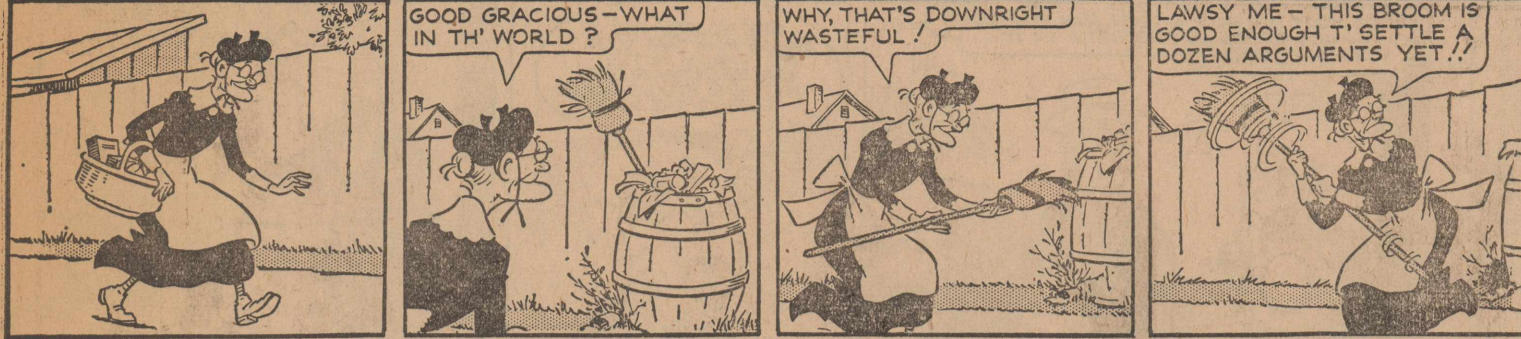

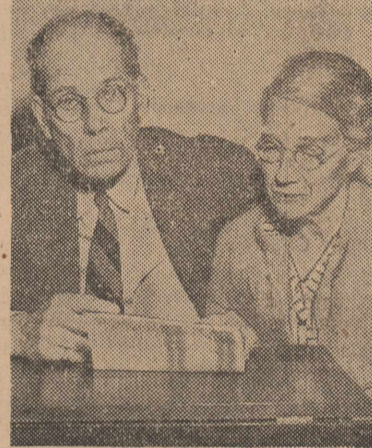

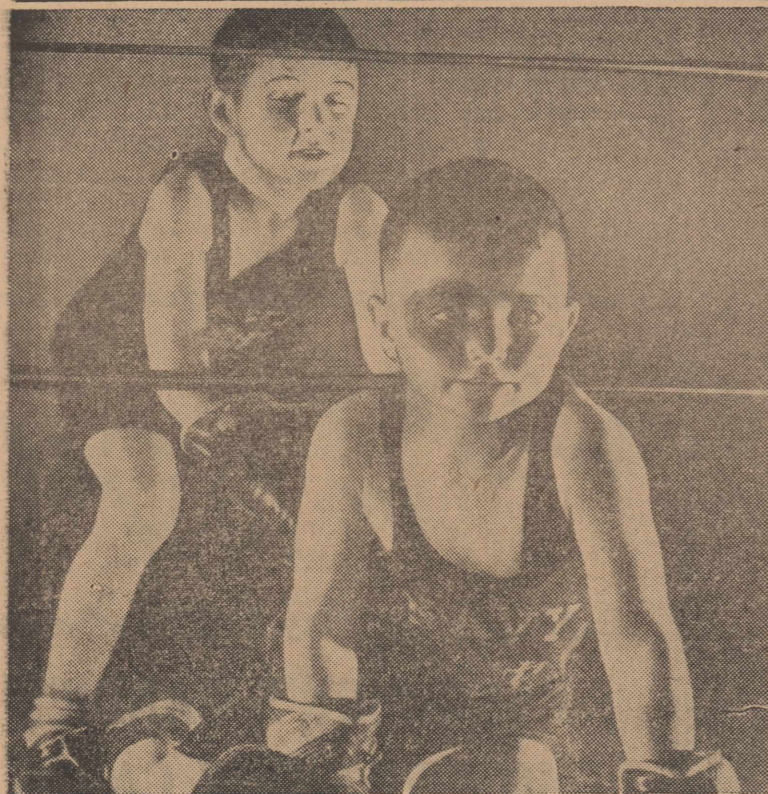

### Profane Living

Lesson for May 4, 1952

NO ONE has ever claimed that profane language is good language, not even the people who use it. But there is something worse than profane language: a profane life.

We are told in the New Testament that Esau was a profane man, but in all that the Bible tells of him we never hear him uttering a single bad word. The Third Commandment is: Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain. (In some numberings it is the second commandment, but it's not the number that is most important, it is what is in it that counts.)

Most people think that all that means is that we should not take lightly the name of God. Indeed we should not; it is surely a sin to treat the Almighty God with less respect than you would treat your own parents. But irreverent language is only a symptom; the disease is the irreverent life.

**God's Name Should Mean Something**

LOOK at that Commandment a little more closely. What does "in vain" mean?

In the Old Testament the same word is often used to mean useless, uselessly, or to no purpose. (See, for example, Psalm 60:11; 89:47; 108:12; Jeremiah 4:30; 46:11.)

What the Third Commandment means, then, most of all, is this: Do not take the name of God and make a lie out of it. Do not take the name of God to no purpose.

**If This Is Your Father's World—LET'S ASSUME you are a Christian.** If so, you have already taken God's name, when you were being baptized into "the Name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Ghost." You have taken upon yourself the great Triune Name of the living God, you are one of his name-bearers, you have acknowledged your place in his family.

Now then, look on the world around you, the stars above you, the atoms below and in you, all that lives and moves and is . . . Do you sing, "This is my Father's world?"

MY Father's world—do you mean that? You ought to mean it. If you do, you will always treat that world with respect; you will not, for instance, waste its resources. If you own land you will treat that land as if it were your Father's—which it is. If you own animals you will remember that the same Lord who made you made them, and you will not be cruel.

**You Have a Birthright**

ESAU is called a profane man, and in the same sentence it is said that he despised his birthright. Profane living means not living up to the plans God has for you, it means living below your true self.

The man who lets the image of God in him get all smeared over with sin and self-indulgence, the man who prefers the society of God's enemies to that of his friends, the man who in spite of his baptism lives as if he had never been baptized, the man who never reminds any one of God even though in some card-index he is listed as a "church member," the man who though he is God's name-bearer is a God-forgetter, living as if the devil were his father and not God,—this is the profane man.

If such a man uses profanity of speech, and he probably will, his language is only the bubbles on the top of a very sour life. You the Christian have a birthright as a child of God; do you live up to it?

**Whose Plans?**

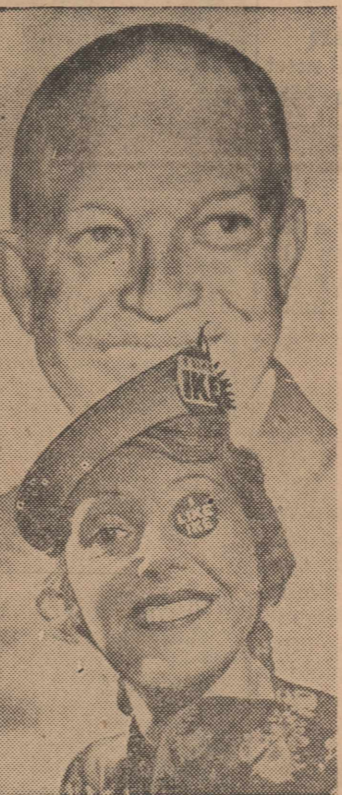
IF you are a name-bearer of God, then if you live up to that name the least you can do is to take God into your plans, or rather to fit yourself into his plans.

If, for instance, you are going to be married you will not leave God out. You will want to be married in a Christian way, and take the Christian vows. The word "God" used hurriedly in a merely legal ceremony is taken lightly and vainly enough.

But even more profane is the married life which began in a church at an altar, with the most solemn vows; but ends in loveless neglect or in cruel bitterness. Don't leave God out!

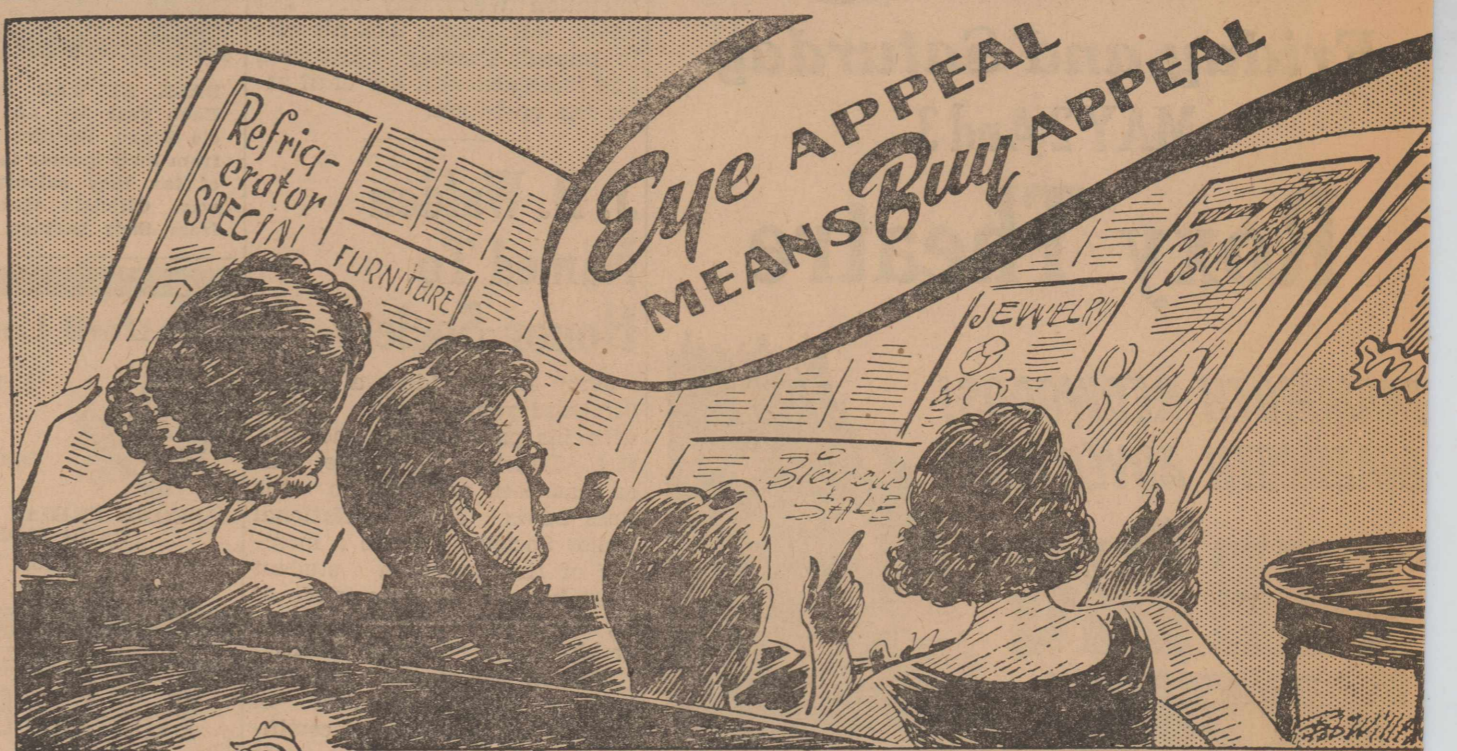

Make a Meal a Treat with Prune Muffins
(See Recipe Below)

Tempting Quick Breads

IF YOU'RE HAVING one of those
hurry-up meals, or those made
with leftovers, or if you just want to
give the family a special treat,
there's nothing nicer than some
fragrant rolls, muffins or bis-
cuits.

Just watch the
family go for
those delicious
breads, piping
hot right out of
the oven! You'll
certainly wonder
why you don't do it more often, and
especially when it's so simple.

You can make up biscuit mix in
quantity, you know, or buy the
packaged variety. Either way you'll
have them easily and quickly. The
same is true of muffins, and basic
recipes for either can be varied,
just for extra interest.

Here are some unusual muffins,
light as a feather, deliciously filled
with prunes. They can hold their
own at breakfast, lunch, dinner or
supper:

Prune Muffins
(Makes 12)
2 cups sifted, all-purpose flour
1/2 teaspoons double-acting baking
powder
2 tablespoons sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
3/4 cup cut-up prunes
1 egg, well-beaten
1 cup milk
4 tablespoons melted butter or
shortening

Sift flour once, measure, then add
baking powder, sugar and salt; sift
again. Add cut prunes. Combine egg
and milk; add to flour mixture. Add
shortening. To mix, draw spoon
from side of bowl toward the cen-
ter, about 15 times, turning bowl
gradually. Chop spoon through bat-
ter, about 10 times. Then stir only
enough to dampen the flour, about
5 strokes. Turn into greased muffin
pans, filling each 3/4 full. Bake in a
hot (425°F.) oven until done, about
20 minutes.

Even raised rolls are quickly pre-
pared with a packaged mix, and the
plain kinds can be varied in many
ways, like this, for example:
Pineapple-Butterscotch Rolls
(Makes 20)
1 package roll mix
1/2 cup butter or substitute
3/4 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup drained, canned, crushed
pineapple
1 teaspoon cinnamon
3/4 cup sugar

Prepare roll mix as directed on
package. Melt butter in a 9x13-
inch pan. Sprinkle with brown sugar.
Cover with crushed pineapple. When
dough is ready to be shaped, roll
into an oblong, about 20 x 12 inches.
Brush with melted butter and
sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon
blended together. Roll tightly, be-
ginning at wide end. Seal well by
pinching edges of dough together.
Cut into 1-inch thick slices and
place cut side down over pineapple.
Cover and let rise until doubled in
bulk. Bake in a moderate (350°F.)
oven about 25 to 30 minutes. Cool
5 minutes, then turn upside down
on a large tray.

If you use lots
of biscuits and
muffins, better
make a batch of
this biscuit
dough which can
be used for bis-
cuits or muffins.
It will yield 5 batches of biscuits,
using 2 cups of the mix to a batch.
Homemade Biscuit Mix
8 cups sifted, all-purpose flour
3/4 cup baking powder
4 teaspoons salt
1 1/2 cups lard

Baking Powder Biscuits
(Makes 10)
2 cups homemade biscuit mix
3/4 cup milk

Add milk to biscuit mix and stir
until dough follows fork around the
bowl. Turn out on
lightly floured
surface; knead
gently 1/2 minute.
Roll or pat to 1/2-
inch thickness
and cut with bis-
cuit cutter. Bake
on ungreased cookie sheet in hot
(450°F.) oven for 12 to 15 minutes.

Sugar Frost Muffins
(Makes 18 small)
3 cups homemade biscuit mix
2 eggs
3/4 cup brown sugar
1 teaspoon nutmeg
1 cup milk
1 tablespoon water
2 tablespoons granulated sugar

Beat one whole egg and one yolk
together, reserving one white for
topping. Add brown sugar, nutmeg
and milk to eggs and mix thorough-
ly. Combine liquid with biscuit mix
and stir only until dry ingredients
disappear. Fill greased muffin pans
1/2 full. Add water to egg white and
brush over tops of muffins. Sprinkle
with granulated sugar. Bake in a
moderately hot (425°F.) oven for
25 minutes.

Then there are many quick breads
which can be made with your fa-
vorite flavors. Here are two which
are bound to please as well as add
intriguing variety to menus:

Banana Bran Nut Bread
(Makes 1 loaf)
1 1/2 cups sifted, all-purpose flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 cup chopped nuts
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup sugar
1 egg, beaten
1 cup bran cereal
1 1/2 cups mashed bananas
2 tablespoons water
1 teaspoon vanilla

Sift together flour, baking powder,
salt and soda. Add nuts. Cream to-
gether sugar and shortening, until
fluffy. Add egg and bran. Combine
bananas, water and vanilla and add
to creamed mixture alternately with
sifted dry ingredients. Pour into
greased loaf pan (8x4 inches) and
bake in a moderate (350°F.) oven
for 1 hour.

Rich Peanut Butter Bread
(Makes 1 loaf)
2 cups sifted, all-purpose flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup sugar
3/4 cup peanut butter
1/2 cup shortening
1 cup milk
2 eggs

Sift dry ingredients together. Work
in peanut butter and shortening. Stir
in eggs and milk, beaten together.
Bake in a greased loaf pan (8x4
inches) in a moderate (350°F.) oven
for 1 1/2 hours.

LYNN SAYS:
Do you have a bit of leftover bac-
con or sausage meat? Pop this into
your biscuit mix and you'll get de-
liciously savory biscuits that are
just enough different to tempt the
palate.
Biscuit mix can be used for a
meat pie topping. Use leftover meat
and vegetables with the gravy from
your roast for the filling, and then
add a pinch of marjoram and basil
to the biscuit mix for the topping.
Making corn muffins? The last of
the green pepper, chopped, added to
the dry ingredients, will give you a
flavorsome variation.

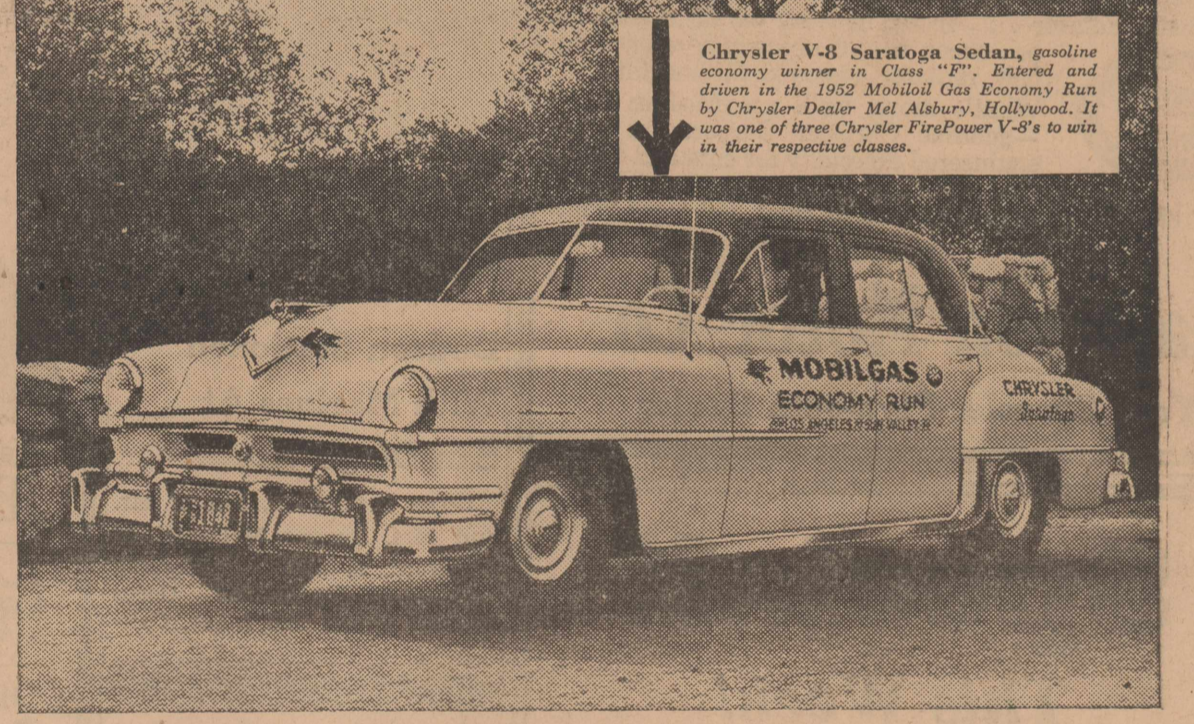

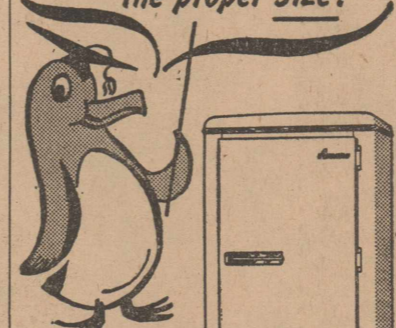
