MANY RUG STAINS can be re-M moved easily if you get to them while the stain is still fresh. Clean lukewarm water sponged into the stain is often all that's need-

In the case of rug stains where you know just what the stain is, you can treat it more effectively with the proper solvent. For example, if you know it's grease, sponge with cleaning fluid, and work to the center of the stain, to avoid spreading it and also to prevent a ring around it.

canvas of one "big top" weighs 11 When you're using professional liquid cleaners for rugs, or dry powders, use a brush which fits neatly in the hand. A scrubbing brush, purchased and used just for this purpose, is ideal.

For a homemade rug shampoo, dissolve 2 cups detergent or soap in a gallon of water. If desired, add a drop or two of ammonia. Beat to a lather with an egg beater, then apply with a brush or sponge. Wipe off with a damp sponge or piece of terry cloth wrung out in clear, lukewarm water, taking up all soiled lather. Rinse a second time, the same way, then go over area-with dry cloth.

Handhooked rugs can be washed successfully at home, either by the above method, or in the washing machine, if they're a small enough size. The same applies to small cotton rugs and mats.

## **Bird's Nest Barely Precedes the Egg**

F IT WEREN'T for such things as weather and accidents, most birds would be as predictable as the cliff swallows of San Juan Capistrano, which seem to come and go by the calendar and the clock. Or as the puffins of Labrador, which give up a carefree life at sea at a definite time each spring to take up nesting duties ashore. In general, a bird's behavior-migrating, singing, mating, building a nest, incubating the eggs, feedng the young—is controlled by two major forces, which apparently eave little room for the use of inteligence. These forces are described by Arthur A. Allen, professor of ornithology at Cornell. There is first, the physiological control from within the body, apparently governed largely by the activity of the bird's pituitary Second is the force from gland. without in the form of what students of bird behavior term "releasers." Most of the releasers are visual, Dr. Allen says, but many are associated with hearing, and a few are due to the senses of touch and smell. Thus the urge from within to migrate, breed, and so on is not necessarily obeyed unless surroundings look, sound, feel, or possibly even smell right.

Experimentally, autumn has been turned into spring for captive sparrows, crows, pheasants, and other wild species. Gland activity is stimulated by gradually increased doses of light in a manner corresponding to the lengthening days of spring. Hand-reared grouse and quail will



Make safe driving a habit ... check your car ... check accidents but birds trapped in the wild do not proceed quite so far, since nest building and egg laying are controlled by releasers which are not so easily supplied.

With song, plumage, and fancy strutting, the male contrives liter ally to raise the rate of the female's pulse. It is usually the female's job to build the nest. In most species, nest building appears to occupy the six-day period required for forming and developing the first egg. 





To examine the stalk, begin at the lower end. Peel off the leaf and the leaf sheaf. Use a **Nheat Damage** Insurance companies selling selling early in April. We recommend that every a-gent go out into wheat fields razor blade or a sharp knife, or Then examine the stalk. Some you will find have silvery patches, which is the lightest damage or the first visible evidence.

Freeze damage makes itself evident in other ways: there may be a surrugation or rough-ness which can be easily seen, and can be felt with the finger.

Or the stalk may discolor, turning various shades from tan to brown. Or part of the stalk may shrink. Stalk shrinkage is in the lower joints. Freeze damage becomes more evident as the growth of the plant progresses, and freeze damage can ensue even in a crop which has been closely

grazed, or which was apparently in the grassy stage at the time of the frost or freeze. When the crown or roots are

damaged by freeze, the stool may tiller in the usual way. The stalks will grow up straight and tall, the head will come out in the normal manner, and the head will even bloom.

The head may begin to fill But as the grains fill into out. the milky stage, the nodes (com-monly called joints) of the stalk will begin to contract and turn black, or the frozen stalk (which has just been described) will begin to deteriorate to the stage where no sap can reach the head

The grain stops growing, it finally hardens into a small shriveled quarter or half-size grain. The farmer whose field looks like 20 bushels of wheat produces 3 to 5 bushels of wheat o an acre. Sometimes the farmer makes a couple of rounds with his combine, then with-draws from the field disgustedy because the wheat grains are o light that they are blowing ut with the chaff. Frost sometimes attacks only the heads, in which case a part of the head may never fill out, houh the remainder of the head may produce grain of fair

to good quality. One sign of damaged stalks as well as of frost, after the head emerges, consists of beards which flare out or are tangled ooking, instead of straight and parallel as normal beards are. Further, such beards have a peculiar whitish appearance, intead of their customary healthy

We are not telling you that wheat in your territory has been damaged by frost or freeze. We are just asking that you go into the fields, secure the samples (including the roots,) examine those samples carefully after peeling down the leaves and examine the heads, and and

then make up your mind. Obviously, there is no hail loss to the farmer when hail breaks over a stalk which is alrady doomed to die before it produces marketable wheat. Neither you nor we want to be


