Community PMA | Crabtree-Wells Elections Announced

Community PMA elections will be held in each of Sherman County's three farm communities August 21, R. C. Buckles, Chairman of the county PMA committee announced recently.

At these elections, farmers in each community will vote for three farmers to serve on the community committee, for a delegate to the county convention to elect the county PMA committee for 1953, and for alternates. Voting will be by mail. In general, any farmer is eligible to vote if he is owner, operator, tenant, or sharecropper, is participating or is carying out practices in accord with programs administeed by the county PMA Committee.

Chairman Buckles emphasizes that the effectiveness of Agrioperations and of price support and marketing programs will depend a great deal on the community committeemen who are voted in at these elections.

The concentration of Agricultural Conservation Program operations in 1953 on the problems of individual farms adds to the need for able committeemen. Committeemen will be expected mining the conservation needs on his farm and in making the most effective use of ACP assistance and available services in carrying out most needed

Since this program has to do with the protection and improvement of the soil and conservation of water on the farms of Sherman County, community committeemen are in a key position in the fight for continued

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

NO. 20 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to authorize cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide insurance for employees; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to the qualified electorate; and providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE

OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to read as follows: as Section 61 to read as follows:
"Sec. 61. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to enable cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance risk for all employees; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the said municipalities and for payment of the costs, charges, and premiums on policies of insur-ance and the benefits to be paid

thereunder. Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1952, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing Legislature to provide Workmen's Compensation surance for employees of cities, towns and villages"; and

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

Farm safety surveys made by 4-H'ers show that matches within reach of small children and stairways littered with toys, jars and other articles were much in evidence as fire and accident hazards in rural homes.

Chicago—(Special)—More than 575,000 4-H Club boys and girls throughout the nation are receiv- "On several farms visited, ing training in farm accident and fire prevention this year. The outstanding feature of this training in the National 4-H Farm and Home Safety program is to check and remove from farms and homes any conditions likely to cause fire, accidents or injuries. These 4-H surveys are acclaimed a valuable contribution to the nation-wide campaign to reduce the annual toll of 15,000 farm people dying and 1,300,000 being injured as a result of rural ac-

cidents each year.

Here is a report, made by a 4-H girl on behalf of her local club, after making a safety survey of every home in the community:

"In all homes having stairways that we visited, the stairs were full of toys, jars, tools and other articles," she stated. "In many homes people used kerosene to build fires. 










RECIPE OF THE WEEK Chicken and Mushrooms (Serves 4)

3-pound frying chicken, cut in

1/2 cup shortening 8-ounce can mushrooms. drained 11/2 cups thin cream and mush

1 cup milk Roll pieces of chicken in seasoned flour and fry in hot shortening in skillet until goldenbrown on both sides. Add mushrooms and cook until lightly browned. Pour off all but 2 tablespoons of fat. Heat cream and mushroom liquid, add paprika and salt and pour over chicken. Cover and simmer for an hour or until tender. Remove chicken and mushrooms to platter. Add milk to skillet and blend with fat. Mix 2 tablespoons flour and the same amount of water and add to

If your dark cottons need to be starched, it's a good idea to tint the starch you're using. Add bluing for black and blue cottons and tea to starch for brown cottons. Shirts and trousers which have become spattered with paint should be sponged liberally with turpentine. Old paint can be softened first with soft shortening rubbed into the paint to soften, then sponged with carbon tetrachloride. The best way to dry curtains is a stretcher. This eliminates uneven edges. If you don't have a stretcher, use a line, hanging them over and do not use clothespins. Hanging in a strong wind may cause tearing.





Let us mention three problems of tate which are perennial; they ressed hard on Saul, they press on s today.

One is called National Defense. here would be no such problem if ll nations were friendly, but they eldom are. If all nations were on s good terms with one another as ne United States is with Canada nd Mexico, all of us would be etter off. In ancient Israel they ad this problem; they wanted a ing more than anything else so as build up an armed defense gainst a ring of enemy nations.

So in the United States today, the most acute problem, and the most expensive, before the nation, is that of defense and security.

Taxpayers complain without end; ut it should be remembered that hat eats up the taxes isn't the ureaucrats, it's military expenses. Tore than 75 cents out of every tax lollar is spent for wars, - past, present or future. That would not be necessary if all nations were riendly. So the underlying problem of state is: How can we create a nore friendly international situa-

National Unity

A NOTHER PROBLEM of state is that of national unity. This was acute, back in the days of Saul and Samuel. The twelve tribes of Israel had never done anything together since the days of Joshua. They wanted a king not only for the sake of defense but for the sake of national unity.

So it is today on a larger scale. If every congressman goes to the capital just for this own constituency and for nobody else, that makes congress a perpetual dog-

There has to be somebody, or some group of men, who will be statesmen and not mere politicians; some person or persons of vision and influence, who will stand for all of the people rather than for only some of the people, - who will, if need be, stand for all of the people against some of the people. But how are such wide-visioned

men to be elected? A man is not better than his home-district voters want him to be.

Can Democracy Be Efficient? THE FIRST thing that is said of ly centralized power in business, or a nation, or in the church or anywhere, is that such power is more efficient than when it is divided up. Some dictatorships have been highly efficient.

Mussolini, it was said, cleaned out the slums of many a city, and even performed the miracle of getting Italian trains to run on time. But he turned out to be just another tyrant, and his people turned against him, as long ago the Israe-lites turned against Saul.

So a third great problem of state is this: Can a democracy be efficient? The ideal government is one which steers between two extremes: on the one side is anarchy, which is freedom without unity; and on the other side is some absolute centralized power which com-

pels unity without freedom. Democracy is precisely the attempt to take this middle road. It is not an easy problem. Saul did not solve it, nor did David after him; it is not solved today. But only men of wide vision and wide concerns, big-minded, public-spirited, can even see the problem, much less try, under God, to solve it.

Kill Those Ants

Many housewives are aggravated by pesky ants in their pantries, cabinets, and on their food supplies.

Miss Lucile King, home demonstration agent, says household ants can be controlled fairly easy by spraying the interior of the house where they are commonly seen with 2% chlordane household spray. It's also advisable to spray around windows and doors where these insects may enter and around water pipe fittings and sinks where they may come for water.

For a more permanent control treat the outside premises of the house and foundation to destroy the colonies. Miss King says a thorough application of 5% chlordane, either dust or spray, applied on the ground for a distance of 3 to 4 feet from the house will kill ants before they can invade the house.


