Chemists are also studying the edible possibilities of the oil, and many believe before long it may be competing with other vegetable oils for a place on the kitchen shelf.

The particular interest of this region, is that the annual safflower does not grow well at less than 3,000 feet altitude, and flourishes at altitudes much above that. And while it does better with irrigation - yielding from one to one-and-threefourths of seed per acre - it will yield from 750 to 1200 pounds of seed an acre on dry land, making it a profitable highland crop where irrigation isn't possible. The plant stands from 15 inches to 30 inches in height and the branches carry spines like a thistle.

As a row crop, cultivation has to be completed about June 20, and the crop is combine harvested 110 days after planting.

Relative oil content in safflower seeds, as determined in chemurgic experiments runs from 28 percent to 32 percent.

Oil from safflower seeds will be shipped from C o l o r a d o Springs in tank cars to eastern and western industries. The proteins will be caked and sacked for distribution among livestock producers in the west and Middle west.



From Ester Anderson, 523 Lebaron Street, Mesa, Arizona: I remember when grandmother cut a ring around her maple tree in Indiana, put a spout in the tree, caught the sap in a bucket, then boiled down the sap into maple syrup and maple sugar for us, the grandchildren.

From Claud L. Gourley, Wea verville, Trinity County, California: I remember when combined harvesters were pulled by 32 mules or horses to harvest wheat and barley in California. The animals were guided by a single line attached to the bit of the near leader and

was known as a jerk line. From H. J. Scott, Manchester, Ohio: I remember when the streets of Manchester were so full of chuck holes and rough that it was almost an impossible thing to stay in the hack. A hack was a closed wagon drawn by two horses. It went outand picked up people and took them to trains or boats. Met them and took them home or where they wanted to go much like the taxi of today. I also remember when people had large fire places and carried in logs and put the ends in the fire. The logs extended out into the room. As the logs burned they were pushed further into the fire. The people sat on each side of the logs. And I remember the old fashioned steam engine thrashing machine. When they left one farm they blew the whistle which was so loud neighbors for miles around could hear it and know when they were moving on to the next thrashing job. The machines were so heavy the bridges built in those days could not hold them, this particular one went through a bridge and the owner was killed by the steam and hot water.



Grove, California: My memory does not go back as far as that of H. J. Scott of Manchester, Ohio. That is, I do not remember the old time hack. And I remember that when we got nice new brass beds, we took the side boards of the old wooden beds and stuck them into the fireplace, same as we did the logs. But we nearly burned the house down. There were three or four coats of paint and varnish on the old sideboards and the heat of the burning ends softened up all this paint and varnish and the flames worked right back into the room. We had a heck of a time getting them out of the fireplace and carrying them outdoors.

From Mrs. Leslie Graham, Mackinaw, Illinois: I remember when every one used large square, ruf-fled pillow "shams" embroidered with flowers and verse. Mother had a "sham" embroidered in lilies. The left one read: "The lilies close their leaves at night"; the right one, "And open with the morning light." Another old favorite read on the left, "I slept and dreamed that life was beauty"; the right one, "I woke and found that life was duty."

From Mrs. E. Maria McNair, 1403 N. St. Clair Street, Pittsburgh 6, Pa.: I remember, 65 years ago, my father had a set of zinc shelves held together by a rope and raised and lowered from the pump bed into the well, but not touching the water. In it we kept our food. One time the rope broke dropping a roast, eggs, butter and milk into the water. He had to clean out the well to avoid contaminating the water, a tremendous undertaking.
