Wohlford Fights To Preserve Irrigation

Representative Sam Wohlflord entered the fight to preserve irrigation on the high plains this week by introducing a House Concurrent Resolution to make it possible for oil companies to supply producers with natural gas without being classified as utilities

The Phillips Petroleum Co. has given notice to producers that they would terminate their gas service in 30 days to prevent being classified as a public utility subject to State regulations as a utility. The Phillips Company contends that they are strictly an oil company selling their products to pipe line firms which operate as a utility. It is understood however that since the controversy started a court ruling has already classified the Phillips Petroleum Company as

a public utility. **House Concurrent Resolution** WHEREAS, the development

of irrigation for increasing the productivity of the soil is a conservation measure of great importance to the public welfare of this State, and

WHEREAS, the development and utilization of water resources for irrigation purposes is hampered in some parts of the State by a lack of adequate power-producing means; and

WHEREAS, the utilization of er for operating irrigation sys- 50 percent of parity.

Wheat growers in Sherman County are being contacted for the purpose of collecting wheat acreage and production data to bring farm-program records up to date

If production and marketing controls are proclaimed for the 1954 crop of wheat, this data would be needed so that each farm growing wheat might re-

With wheat supplies beginning to outstrip demand, prowheat crop will probably be necessary, as directed by law.

The Secretary of Agriculture is required by law to proclaim not later than July 1 - a national marketing quota for wheat whenever the total supply exceeds the normal supply by more than 20 percent. "Normal supply" means the estimated domestic consumption plus exports plus 15 percent.

Legislation also directs the Secretary of Agriculture - not later than July 15 — proclaim a national acreage allotment for the 1954 crop of wheat.

When marketing quotas are effective, the quotas are converted into and operates through acreage allotments. In such case, proclamation of both marketing quotas and of acreage allotments may be made at the same time.

Except under emergency conditions, proclamation of a national wheat acreage allotment is mandatory whether or not marketing quotas are required. Proclamation of both quotas and allotments may be dispensed with by the Secretary, however, because of a national emergency or a material increase in exports. If quotas are proclaimed, a referendum among wheat growers who would be subject to quotas must be held by July 25. At least two-thirds of the growers voting must approve quotas before they may be made effective.

If growers approved marketing quotas, price supports on the 1954 crop of wheat would be available to cooperators at 90 percent of parity. If growers. failed to approve marketing quotas, they would be subject only to acreage allotments, but natural gas as a source of pow- the price support would drop to



What has been proposed for the government-owned rubber plants? President Eisenhower recommended to Congress April 14 that the

\$550 million rubber plants under government ownership be sold to private industry. He said the disposal must be in line with three objectives: The facilities should return to the government "their full fair value;" they should be disposed of in a manner that would insure the public and fabricators "the benefits of fair competition;" and they should be sold "on such terms as will guarantee their ready availability . . . in time of emergency.'

-What procedure is required for amending the U.S. Constitution? -The Constitution itself states in Article V: "The Congress, whenever two-thirds of both Houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose Amendments to this Constitution, or, on the Application of the Legislatures of two thirds of the several States, shall call a Convention for proposing Amendments, which, in either Case, shall be valid to all Intents and Purposes as Part of this Constitution, when ratified by the Legislatures of three fourths of the several States, or by Conventions in three fourths thereof, as the one or the other Mode of Ratification may be proposed by the Congress . Could a Constitutional amendment be proposed and ratified without


a vote of Congress?

According to the American Law Section of the Library of Congress, this is an academic question since all amendments so far have been proposed by Congress. However, the legal specialists said even if Congress did not propose the amendment and the alternative method for proposing an amendment - by Constitutional convention - were employed, the Congress probably would have to vote on a resolution to submit the amendment proposed by Constitutional Convention to the states for ratification.



more than 3 percent of the county allotment shall be apportioned to farms on which wheat has not been planted during any of the 3 preceding years. Wheat acreage allotments for individual farms are determined by the County PMA Committee with assistance of the community committee.

Any farmer may appeal to the County Committee for a redetermination of his farm wheat allotment. If he is not satisfied with the Committee's decision, he may appeal to the State PMA Committee, and then to the Director of the PMA Grain Branch, Department of Agriculture, Washington 25, D. C. When wheat acreage allot-

ments are in effect, price support is mandatory only for producers who comply with their wheat allotments. When wheat quotas as well as allotments are in effect, a farmer who does not comply with his acreage allotment would be subject to a penalty on his farm marketing excess. The penalty may be avoided or postponed, however, by withholding that part of the crop from the market.
