The finance committee which made erection of the church possible was composed of Joe Billington, Herbert Folsom, J. C. O'Brien, and Leslie Parker.

The building fund for the new church was started in 1948 and approximately \$169,000.00 has been raised for construction of the new edifice. Actual construction of the new church was started the first Monday in August of last year and services in it will start on June 28.

Only half of the air conditioning units for the new building have arrived but church leaders assure the public that those installed will keep the building comfortable.

Attendance at the Christian Church has increased over 50 per cent since Rev. John W. Reaves took over the duties of the pastorate six years ago.





It has been estimated that 15 counties in Texas, 3 counties conduct services at the church in Oklahoma and 4 counties in Colorado will have from 55 to uate of Abilene Christian Col- 100 per cent of their land unprotected from wind erosion if allotment acreages are imposed on them this fall.

The producers in these drouth sections will ask that they be allowed to plant their entire acreage, and if necessary hold over the harvested grain until the following year from the acreage which is planted above the allotment quota.

R. C. Buckles, president of the Texas Wheat Producers Association, and Kenneth Kendrick, vice-president of the National Wheat Producers Association, met with an Agriculture Committee of the Dumas Chamber of Commerce Wednesday, working out a plan with the Amarillo and Lubbock Chambers of Commerce for a meeting with Secretary Benson Saturday to present him with the true picture of the situation facing the wheat growers of the high plains area. In the Texas Panhandle, Western Oklahoma, Eastern Colorado and Western Kansas producers want the privilege to plant their entire acreage to wheat this fall as their land has been summer fallowed and has no vegetation of any kind on it. If they receive sufficient moisture to drill, they believe this will be their only opportunity for a cover crop to protect the soil.

(By H. W. Stillwell) (Editor's Note: This is the first of a series of three articles explaning the mirimum foundation or Gilmer-Aikin, school pro-

gram.) A 1947 legislative fight over teacher's salaries led to complete reorganization in 1949 of Texas' public school system and gave the state, almost overnight a high ranking in education.

Texans had been working toward such a goal for more than a century. Mirabeau B. Lamar and Sam Houston both had urged high quality, state-supported public schools. The State Constitution directs the Legislature to "estabish and make suitable provision for the support and maintenance of an efficient system of public free schools.'

Three years after Houston's victory at San Jacinto, the state made the first important provision for appropriating lands to be used in establishing a perschool system. Texans have sought better schools ever since; passage of the Gilmer-Aikin school reform laws in 1949 climaxed a long struggle.

In 1947, when the Legislature studied a proposed \$2,000 minimum salary for teachers, its attention was called to the rising cost of education, the failure of the public schools to reach nearly one-third of the school age children in Texas and unsatisfactory methods of distributing state funds for education. These, things, coupled with a shortage of qualified teachers and the prospect of a rapidly growing population, prompted the late Gov. Beauford Jester to suggest a comprehensive study of public education.

Senator A. M. Aikin, Jr., of Paris and Representative Claud Gilmer of Rocksprings sponsored a resolution which created an 18-member committee to make such a study. This committee, of which former Senator James E. Taylor of Kerens was chairman, worked for eighteen months, and drew on the advice and suggestion of an estimated 100,000 laymen, before making recommendations to the Legislature and to the Governor.

This resulted in the introduction of the three Gilmer-Aikin bills and a dramatic legislative fight, which lasted five months over them.

Their passage started a new era in public education in Texas. Under the minimum foundation program, every child of school age in Texas is guaranteed a minimum standard of education, including nine months of schooling a year. More than 400 school districts had previously had shorter school years.

The cost of the program depends on school attendance, which determines the number of teachers to be employed and the amount of operating costs; the training and experience of teachers, which determines their positions on the salary scale; and the number of school children transported in school buses, which determines the transportation costs.

Thus, the cost of education can rise only in proportion to the increase in the number of children attending school and the standard of teachers employed. State financial assistance is provided in accordance with local communities' ability to support public education. This ability is measured by use of an economic index formula set forth in the law.

The minimum foundation program sets certain bare, minimum standards for the public schools. These standards, below which no school can fall, determine the amount of money needed. Each local district contributes to the cost in proportion to its ability, and the state then provides the additional money needed to maintain these minimum standards.

PRESERVE fresh green colors in vegetables by cooking without the cover. Some vitamin loss will occur, but short cooking can prevent much of this, and vegetable will be eaten if it's more attractive. Freshen cold baked potatoes for a second meal by dipping in cold water and then place in a moderate oven until heated through.

Use fresh drippings to season your cooked vegetables if you're trying to save on butter. More salt and pepper may be needed for next day servings. Stale vegetables are freshened if they're soaked in cold water to which lemon juice is added. Don't soak too long, however, or food values may be lost. Cabbage and cauliflower should be washed carefully to prevent any


