

tion 2 (a) of Public Law 38 of the 81st Congress. When the drouth conditions in Texas began to reach a peak (we hope) about June 15th, there was approximately 17 million dollars on hand, which could have been loaned to relieve the situation. More money is coming into the

The Secretary of Agriculture has had the authority since 1949 to put a price support under cattle. He presently has that authority, but has refused to exercise it or to even consider it on numerous recent occasions. The drouth relief law that was recently passed was an amendment of old Public Law 38. Actually it did very little to expand the authority of the Secretary, simply because the Secretary had complete authority under the old law to meet the situation head-on. The new law has one provision for special livestock loans. These loans are (Continued on Page 8)

Recipe of the Week Beef 'n Spinach Scramble (Serves 4)

1 package frozen spinach 1 10½-ounce can cream of mushroom soup 1/2 cup milk

1 2½-ounce jar dried beef 1/2 cup grated cheese

Cut frozen spinach into quarters and place in 11/2-quart casserole. Combine milk and mushroom soup in saucepan, then heat until smooth. Stir in dried beef. Pour mixture over frozen spinach and top with grated cheese. Cover and bake in a hot (400°) oven for 30 minutes.

Freeze small quantities of leftover cooked meats as they gather. When you have enough on hand, prepare hash, stew or meat pie from them.
