Every farmer and every water user in the high plains area of Texas should be familiar with this law and how it effects him, states E. Goule, County Agent. Underground water is the greatest natural resource in the high plains area and with the fast de-

velopment of irrigation the farmers are becoming more concerned about conservation of it, he continued.

Bill Broadhurst, Lubbock, Texas, will discuss the geological formations and various water sand and gravel formations common to the high plains. He has a wealth of information about



more than 150 million dollars. This raise alone is more than has been asked in the way of money to be used for loan purposes in meeting the drouth disaster.

The Tax Moratorium

Last week I mentioned the fact that a tax moratorium had been voted by the House for the whiskey distilleries on whiskey still in storage. The moratorium is for four years and it is estimated that it involves approximately 185 million gallons of liquor. At \$10.50 a gallon tax, it would indicate that the collection of over 2 billion dollars was postponed for four years. While at the same time, it was argued that the excess profits tax, which could only bring in 800 million dollars, had to be extended to balance the budget. 


