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

Home Demonstration Agent. Miss King says the number of drownings is in proportion to the care that is exercised by those who participate in water sports. She points out that if the seven cardinal water safety rules are followed closely. water accidents can be greatly

Here are the safety rules: Never swim alone or in unfamiliar water. Don't try to swim long distances, especially in cold water, unless followed by at least two people in a boat. Never dive into water until you are sure that no underwater obstructions are present. Don't go into the water for at least one hour after eating and don't stay in the water after you become tired.

Miss King adds that the careful water sportsman never takes a chance with a small boat in rough water. Last but not least in importance, safety leaders caution against moving around or "cutting-up" when out in a small boat. There is an old story about a pastor who talked with a very sick man about his spiritual condition. A DD a tablespoon of kerosene to a gallon of soapsuds if you want to cut the greasy film on woodwork and make cleaning easier.

Pour a film of paraffin over the bottom of your garbage container to prevent rust from forming. This makes it much easier to clean out, also.

Paraffin also has another good use: for drawers and windows which stick, rub paraffin on the slides of drawers and ropes on windows. This same lubricant may also be used on tops and bottoms of doors which tend to be sticky.

Tack some tiny corks on the backs of picture frames. This will prevent dark lines from forming on the wall paper or painted walls. Red ink may be removed from floors or desks by washing first with soapsuds. Follow this with a rinse of vinegar and water.

Dessert Dumplings
(Serves 6)

1 cup orange marmalade
1 6-ounce can frozen orange

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



A-The 1873 law upheld by the Court was passed by a District legislature, not by Congress. The local assembly later was abolished, and Congress has since been serving as the District's city council. In its opinion, the Court ruled, in part, that Congress had the right to give the local lawmakers power to enact D.C. legislation. Therefore, doubts about Congress' legal authority once again to delegate some of its powers over local affairs to a District legislature have been eliminated. A home-rule bill, which would estab-



Texas Car Inspections To Start Sept. 15

AUSTIN - Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announces that motoring Texans will have from September 15 until next April 15 to have their cars checked and approved under the new vehicle inspection law.

The old law will die on August 25, and the new law will become effective the next day, August 26. Garrison said no inspections will be made between that date and September 15.

The modified law was enacted by the last legislature and calls for an inspection limited to brakes, lights, horns, rear view mirror and windshield wipers.

The old law, which spawned prolonged debate in the last session of the legislature, included detailed inspection of such items as wheel alignments and mufflers. Motorists howled objections and politicians ran for office on the promise of repealing the act. Inspection stations were swamped.

Lawmakers eased the new law for farmers by exempting vehicles of 1935 or prior vintage not used on state or federal highways. All other cars will be required to have a sticker.


