

The Trip - - Texas To Germany

The first part of this International Farm Youth Exchange started out with a trip to Washington, D. C. Then a longer one to the Eastern Hemisphere, to Germany.

After my folks saw me on the plane at Amarillo at 6:45 A. M., Tuesday, June 9, I found myself arriving in Washington about 9:00 P. M. That air view of our capital city by the night lights is one I shall never forget. Going from the airport to the tourist home, I got a glimpse of Abraham Lincoln sitting in a soft blue light. I'm glad that I got to Washington, D. C. a day early, because I got to visit many places and see many things, including Washington Monument, Jefferson Memorial, Lincoln Memorial, Smithsonian Institute, Melon Art Gallery, Arlington Cemetery and the changing of the Guards, and the wonderful Library of Congress. In the Capitol I saw the Senate and House Chambers in session, and Thursday, I had lunch with Representative Walter Rogers in the House of Representatives Restaurant in the basement.

On Thursday, the I.F.Y.E. orientation program began and I didn't have another minute to call my own, except on Sunday. All this time was spent in learning more about the U. S. the foreign countries, and getting acquainted with the 27 youth going to Finland, Sweden, Norway, Denmark, Austria and Germany.

On Tuesday, June 16, we 27 boarded the Swedish ship, Anna Salin, after having ridden on the Pennsylvania Railroad, all night, from Washington, D. C. to Montreal, Canada. The Anna Salin was hired by the Council on Student Travel to carry students and teachers and religious groups to Europe at a reasonable price. There were 500 of us on the ship, of all races, colors and denominations. We had a wonderful program of lectures, discussions, forums, singing, folk dancing and language study for the 12 days we spent crossing the Atlantic.

It took us two days to go down the St. Lawrence River, and then we ran into foggy weather, and saw no sun 'til the 24th of June.

All the passengers, except about 50, disembarked at Le Havre, France, and Southampton, England, and on Saturday morning, the 27th of June, the rest of us disembarked at our destination, Bremerhaven, Germany.

At Bremerhaven, we seven who were going to call Germany our home for the next few months sadly sent out new friends to their different countries by train. I wish you could know them all in person. You will see a few of them in my pictures, and from time to time I will probably mention the other six here in Germany; so let me give you their names now: Patricia Draney, of Kansas, Eloise Kooksey, of Kentucky, Jerry Davis, of Michigan, Lorna Paine, of Illinois, Bonnie Everling, of Wyoming and Richard Koegel, of Wisconsin.

A Rural Youth Advisor (equivalent to our County Agents), Mr. Heinz Gebbers, met us (seven of us) at Bremerhaven and took us by train to Bonn, Germany. Bonn is the Capital of the Federal Republic of Germany. It is a lovely city, with many new buildings, for the government, being built.

We spent two nights in Bonn, getting acquainted with the system of Rural Youth Work that is getting started here in Germany. It is similar to our 4-H Clubs.

All this time, we seven, were trying to speak the German language, but everyone we met could speak some English, so we spoke a mixture of German and English.

I wonder how the twenty-seven of us looked when we stepped off the boat in Bremerhaven. It felt unreal until I got down town and almost got run over by a bicycle. I've never seen so many bicycles in

Approve Marketing Quotas

Approximately 91 per cent of the producers voting in the referendum election in Sherman County Friday voted in favor of marketing quotas for the 1954 wheat crop. The vote was 359 for marketing quotas and 36 against the issue.

The nation's farmers gave a 7 to 1 majority to marketing quotas in Friday's referendum. Preliminary returns announced by the Department of Agriculture showed 361,392 growers favored marketing quotas and 53,252 opposed the practice.

Quotas will require farmers to plant within acreage shares allotted them or lose eligibility for price supports and become subject to a penalty tax of about \$1.10 a bushel on wheat sold or used from excess acres.

This is the third time farmers have approved quotas for wheat. In 1941 they gave them an 81 per cent majority and the next year an 82 per cent margin.

Byron Fedric Gets Wrong Impression

Byron Fedric jumped at conclusions Saturday and found he had made a mistake. He received a telegram from his son, Sgt. Gordon B. Fedric from Jacksonville, Florida, which requested him to meet him in Amarillo Saturday evening. Fedric knew his son was eligible for a discharge and drew his own conclusions that his son was on his way home as a civilian.

Mr. Fedric informed several of his friends that his son was coming home and left for Amarillo expecting Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Fedric to arrive with all of their baggage.

Much to Mr. Fedric's surprise Sgt. Gordon B. Fedric and Sgt. Glen Shows of Orlando, Florida, stepped from the train in full uniform, each wearing side-arms. The boys were on their way to San Francisco, California to pick up a deserter and had a 24-hour lay-over to visit in Stratford. The Sergeants spent Sunday with Mr. and Mrs. Byron Fedric and left Amarillo for San Francisco Sunday evening.

PICK-UPS FOR SAFETY
There are a lot of hot and sharp articles around the house that the housewife has to pick up. For this reason, Miss Lucile King, Home Demonstration Agent, says more care should be taken in handling these safety hazards.

Tongs to pick up hot articles at the stove, kitchen sink and out door fireplaces will save many burned fingers. Use tongs to lift jars from hot water when canning, large vegetables from cooking water, baked potatoes from the oven or lids from pans. She suggests tongs to take silverware from hot rinse water. Pins and needles may be picked up easily from the floor with a small magnet. To save fingers and hands when a glass crashes on the floor, use damp cotton. The small splinters of glass will stick to the cotton. Miss King says pot holders are for service and for ornaments, therefore be sure they are thick enough to prevent burning your hands when removing containers from the stove.

Safe Baby Sitting
Baby sitting, a once-unheard of practice, has practically become a profession with which nearly every family is familiar. According to Miss Lucile King, County Home Demonstration Agent, baby sitting can be safe and pleasant for the sitter, the children and the parents. The person who becomes the baby sitter should know what to do in case of an emergency, have explicit instructions as to special care of the child, and know exactly what is expected of her by the parents. For safe, pleasant baby sitting, remember that the sitter should know the child's name or his nickname and the schedule for meals, play, bath and sleep. She should know where his clothes, play equipment, bath articles and sleeping garments are kept

and the customary undressing and bathing procedures.

Help her to know that the fires or heating systems are under control, and how the kitchen range is lighted and turned off and how to use or regulate fans or cooking systems. She should be familiar with the safe areas where the child can be taught to play, and what first aid supplies are available in the house for treatment if necessary.

Miss King suggests to parents they prepare such instructions to leave with sitter before they leave the house. This will give the baby sitter a sense of understanding and relieve the parents themselves from worry.

Such a prepared statement for the sitter might include routine care, special instructions, other instructions including locking doors and answering telephone calls as well as what to do in illness, fire or other emergencies. Some parents include the name and telephone number of the family doctor along with the information as to how and where they can be reached.

Scanning the NEWS

NOW that the Korean truce is a reality, what is the general reaction to it in Washington's official and semi-official circles? What are diplomats who gather there thinking?

Generally, they can be classified in three groups:

1. This group believes that the Korean truce was the thing to do and will mean peace in the world. They believe that those existing difficulties in the unification of that war-torn country can be solved by negotiation.

2. This group believes the truce agreement which the United Nations signed was a tragic betrayal of our policy of Communist resistance. They say this agreement will haunt the politicians in the years to come and is only prolonging the date of the final struggle, during which time the Chinese Communists will build up their depleted power.

3. This group's thinking is something in between group one and two. They believe the truce was the best that could be achieved under the circumstances and hope that the scheduled parley between the Reds and the United Nations will be fruitful.

All, however, are agreed that this is not the time for the western world to relax its guard against Communism or to think about demobilization.

Which of these three groups is correct in its thinking will be answered within a month or so after the negotiations begin.

And what will be the American approach in the talks?

Reliable sources in Washington are saying the administration will tell the Reds:

1. We will continue to train and build up the South Korean army and will maintain large armies there. The only way to get these forces to leave will be to agree to unification of Korea.

2. We will continue our embargo of Red China. (This many believe troubled the Reds more than anything during the war and was one of the main reasons for the truce.) The only way this embargo will be lifted is to agree to a unified Korea.

3. We will continue to resist China's admission to the United Nations as long as Korea is divided. (Some observers believe the United States used this point in obtaining the truce.)

The question in many minds is "what will happen" if our plans get nowhere and the conference gets nowhere and we walk out?

No one knows the answer to the \$64 question. As of now there seems to be only two answers:

1. The present armistice could continue permanently if neither side chooses to break it, but it would be an uneasy situation, to put it mildly.

2. War will erupt with a violence as yet unwitnessed in modern warfare.

the agent will be helpful. Probably select a pattern with as few pieces as practicable, and buy only the amount of material actually needed. The approximate amount is specified on the pattern envelope.

By multiple cutting, the mother can cut two or more garments by the same pattern. This would be especially good for play clothes such as shorts and overalls, using different fabrics with the same basic color used in the design so the same thread can be used. The garments can be styled differently by adding or omitting certain decorative details. Be sure the fabrics are the same width to simplify cutting, and are guaranteed not to shrink.

Save shopping time by buying all findings when pattern and fabric are purchased. The agent recommends heavy duty thread for sturdy garments. Regulate the tensions and check length of the stitch on the sewing machine as you prepare for sewing. Twelve to fourteen stitches to the inch are used for cottons, and six to eight stitches are used for gathering or machine basting.

Certain helps such as a seam gauge on your machine for stitching all seams, a cutting table of comfortable height, bent handle shears for cutting with long strokes, and planning the method of stitching so similar processes follow each other, will aid in home sewing.

Insects May Take Over

Household insects may take advantage of the owner's absence from home to do a lot of dirty work. Vacationists returning home may find the insects in control and damage considerable, says Miss Lucile King, Home Demonstration Agent, unless advanced precautions are taken before closing the house.

The kitchen is always a favorite "hand-out" for household insects and trouble can be avoided by leaving this room clean and free of any traces of food. Cupboards and shelves may be sprayed with a 5% DDT spray to get the stray insects which get into flour, cereals, crackers or dried foods during the hot season.

Chlordane, says the agent, is more effective against cockroaches or waterbugs. She recommends using a small amount of 2% chlordane on the baseboard behind and under the sink or refrigerator and other places where these insects run. She cautions against using this insecticide where food or cooking utensils will be in contact with it.

Cleaning the floors, rugs and upholstered furniture by vacuum is advised to pick up lint, bits of fur, hair or feathers on which insects may live and any larva or eggs of insects which may be in the house. Protect rugs by spraying with a DDT spray and use the same material on the baseboards and other places where insects may hide.

If pets are allowed in the house, the cleaning and spraying will take care of the fleas which may hatch from eggs previously dropped from the family cat or dog.

And finally, says the agent, it is just good housekeeping to do these jobs before leaving on the vacation.

When Mother Sews

When mother sews for the children, she has certain decisions to make. Is it more economical to make garments or buy them ready-made? Does she sew well enough to satisfy herself and the child with the garment she makes. Is the time spent sewing justified, or is it necessary to neglect some responsibility to the family?

Miss Lucile King, County Home Demonstration Agent, says each mother must answer these questions for herself. For the most part, the agent says seasonal clothing may be made more cheaply at home for the child's quick growth causes quick discard.

Comfort and freedom of action is more essential than dollars and cents. Therefore, mothers may wish to buy knitted underwear for both boys and girls rather than to sew them at home. And, another advantage, is that clothing made along the same style during the training period must be less confusing to the child.

The Christian's Prayer Life
 Lesson for August 23: 1 Timothy 2: 1-8; Romans 8: 26-28
 Golden Text: 1 Timothy 2: 1-2

Writing to his "son in the gospel," Paul advises Timothy concerning prayers in the sanctuary. Some churches follow ritualistic prayers; others are led by the minister in "extemporaneous" prayers. But even so-called "extemporaneous" prayers fall in about the same pattern Sunday after Sunday.

If all men in government life had more of prayer for them instead of harsh criticism, there would be a better service on their part.

We are dependent upon the Spirit to lead us into right praying. He makes intercession for us, and we should yearn and strive to come into harmony with his will, both in living and in praying.

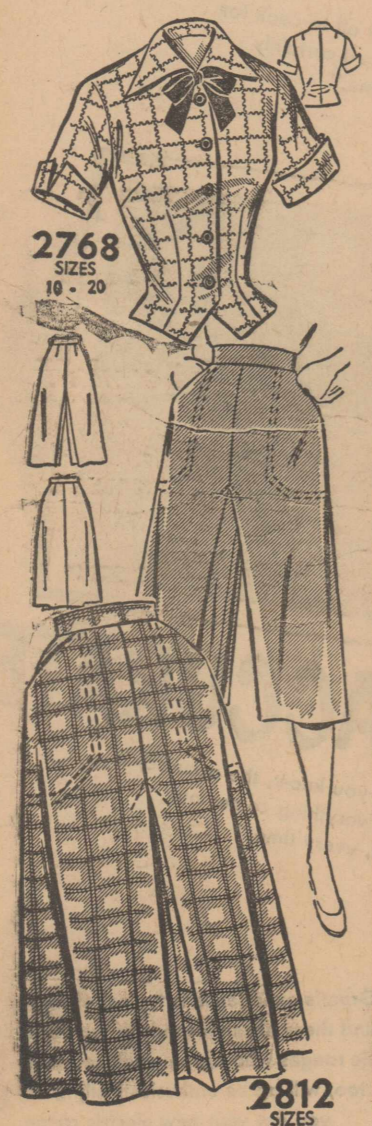

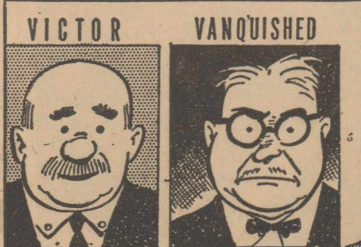

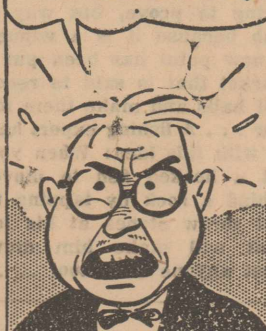

Cut hard-cooked eggs in half. Remove yolks and put through a sieve. Add all remaining ingredients and beat until smooth and fluffy. Refill egg whites and top with a dash of paprika, a sprig of parsley or chopped chives.

fore serving time. When cooking fresh vegetables, use a minimum amount of water. This means from 1/2 to 1 cup depending upon the amount of vegetable and its type. Cook quickly, covered.

To thaw frozen vegetables before cooking, leave them at room temperature for 30 minutes. This speeds the cooking process. Water may be brought to boiling point before the vegetables are added, if desired.

Overcooking decreases the palatability of vegetables. They should have some crispness when they're served. Season to taste after cooking with butter, meat drippings, salt and pepper or spices, as desired.

"Looks like an old mop, if you ask me."

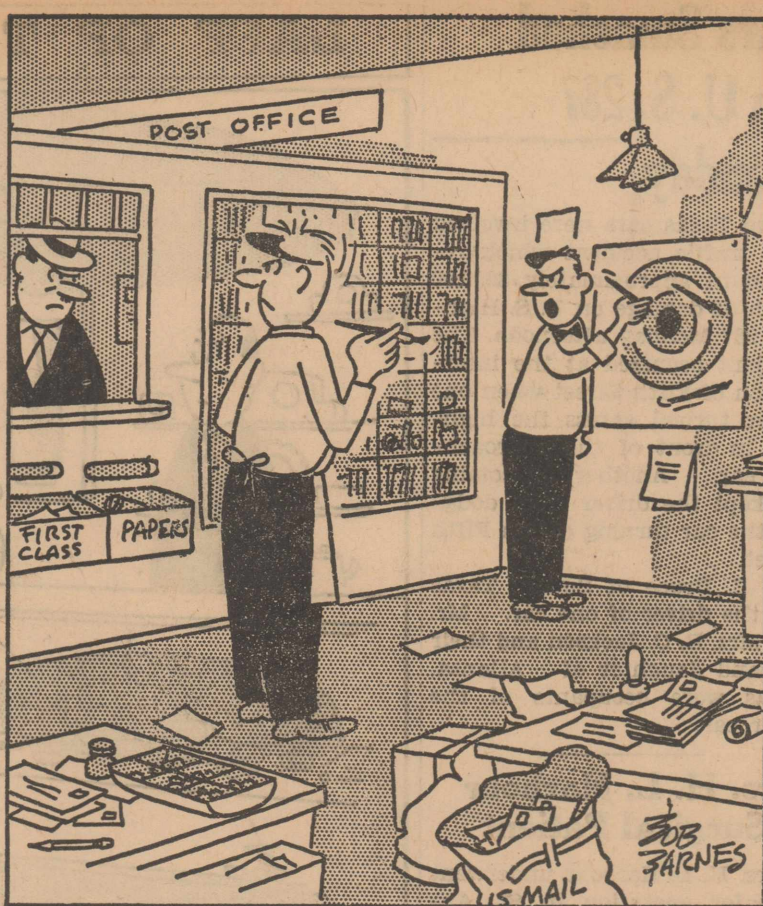
"Beast!" she screamed at me. "That old mop has just cost you \$50. And besides Andre said you had no artistic soul. A child could have done better than you did."
