tion, which has been defined as the wise use of water for maximum benefit to mankind, was recognized by the 51st Texas Legislature and a bill known as the Underground Water Conservation District Law was passed. This law provides for the creation and organization of water conservation districts. It applies only to underground wa-Surface waters, rivers, creeks, run-off and the like, are not affected in any way.

One district, embracing 6,815,-000 acres and including all or parts of Potter, Deaf Smith, Randall, Parmer, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, Bailey, Lamb, Hale, Floyd, Cochran, Hockley, Lubbock, Crosby, Terry, Lynn, and Garza counties, has already been established.

The district is managed by a Board of Directors of five members. The district is divided into five precincts, and one director is elected from each precinct by the voters in that pre-

My Second Home In Germany

(By Mildred Bennet, International Farm Youth Exchange student)

The last two weeks of July I spent at my second home. On a rainy morning in July Mr. Baxmann came in his car to take me to his home in Hiddestorf, which is just south of Hannover. Mr. Baxmann's wife is not living so his daughter, Lore, who is 24 years old, has accepted the household duties. An aunt also helped in the home, and the son, Herman, was at home for only a ten day vacation from his Agriculture College in Celle.

I shall never forget my first two days there. On the first day, Lore and Herman and I drove one of the tractors around and around the huge yard. It was a small diesel tractor with a foot throttle and gears like a car. It came as a great surprise when Herman asked me if I would like to drive the tractor. The second day, I went to the field with Mr. Baxmann, Herman and the workmen to watch the beginning of the harvest. At first three men cut a starting place for the tractor and binder with their scythes. I learned to make a bundle that morning and to tie it with the straw, before we started with the tractor.

I rode on the tractor for the first two rounds and then Mr. Baxmann gave me the wheel. I learned very quickly the signals for stop and go. The language difference was about the only thing that made the work difficult at first. I also worked two other half-days, binding the oats, wheat and barley. The bundles were shocked to dry and later carried to the barn. In the winter after sugar beet harvest the grain is threshed.

Besides working in the field, I helped Lore in the kitchen. We baked many cakes and I learned to make delicious salads. We had a large coal stove and a small electric stove. One morning Lore and I started out on bicycles at 9:00 and did not return until 3:30. We rode in the hills and saw a huge park for animals and had dinner in a lovely little cafe. That was all quite a surprise to me because I had no idea where we were going. While here at the Baxmann's I also got to see the city of Hanover, and an operetta in an outdoor theater; I visited a dairy, a sugar factory and a museum at different

Near the last day of the harvest, Lore and I carried dinner to the field with a horse and wagon. A lot of the soup was spilled before we got there, but enough remained for the 4 men to eat. We always have a soup before the main course at din-


I had several connections with the community. One was through the school and another through the church. I met the preacher and his family, and one Sunday afternoon my family and I and the preacher went to the church. While Hermann pumped, I played a few songs on the huge old organ. Mr. Baxmann's grandfather had given the organ to the church many years ago.

Also, one night I showed my slides of Texas at a meeting of the Land Youth. This was a group like our 4-H Club, except that the boys and girls met together. At this meeting the district agent was present and spoke to the group and also exhibited some practical work clothes for the girls and boys. Then all sang some lovely songs. These meetings were usually directed by Lore, my host sister, since she is the leader for this group of 30.

By the time the two weeks were over, I had learned much more German. (I find that my dictionary is the most used piece of literature I have.) I had also made friends of the two huge dogs, one a Doberman Pincher and the other a German Shepard, before I left.

The good byes were very sad on the morning of the first of August when I went to Hanover to catch the train to Munich. I had been very well accepted into the family life at my second home.

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



If a water-user objects to the actions taken by a district, he can file a suit against the district in the proper court.

The district can not pro-rate water or otherwise force wellowners to cut down on production of water unless the water is being withdrawn at such a rate that salt water or some other harmful matter is coming into the reservoir. Otherwise the district can only recommend but cannot force any limitations on withdrawal of water.
