Minimum Price Support Set For '54 Wheat Crop

The U.S. Department of Agri-The U. S. Department of Agri-culture announces a national average price support of not less than \$2.20 a bushel for the 1954 wheat crop. This minimum support price is 90 per cent of the August 15 wheat parity price of \$2.45. Support for 1953 wheat, now eligible for loan and purchase agreement, is a nation-al average of \$2.21 a bushel.

purchase agreement, is a hatton-al average of \$2.21 a bushel. To be eligible for wheat price support in 1954, a producer must (1) be in compliance with his 1954 wheat acreage allotment and all other 1954 allotments which have been or will be es-terbliched for basic commodities tablished for basic commodities in which he has an interest on the farm, (2) obtain wheat mar-keting cards for all farms in the county on which he has an

the county on which he has an interest in the wheat crop. A minimum support price is announced at this time in ac-cordance with "forward pric-ing" provisions of the Agricul-tural Act of 1949. If the wheat parity price as of July 1, 1954 (the beginning of the marketing year for the 1954 crop) is high-er, the support level will be in-creased to reflect 90 per cent of the wheat narity price at that the wheat parity price at that time. In no event will the sup-port be lower than the \$2.20 national average announced on

October 8. The 1954-wheat crop will be supported through farm-storage and warehouse-storage loans and by the offer of the Commo-dity Credit Corporation to pur-chase wheat delivered by prochase wheat delivered by pro-ducers under purchase agree-ments. Loans and purchase agreements will be available from the time of harvest through January 31, 1955. In Texas loans will mature on March 31, 1955, or earlier on demand. Producers who elect to deliver wheat under purto deliver wheat under pur-chase agreements must notify their county Production and Marketing Administration committee within a 30-day period ending on the maturity date for the State.
