

Bridge Construction Bond Issue Election To Be Held Saturday

The proposition of issuing |-

\$55,000.000 of road bonds in Road District No. 4 will be before the voters Saturday, November 28, with voting at the courthouse in Stratford from 8:00 A. M. to 7:00 P. M. The bond issue, if approved

Also included in the project will be the construction of bridges on the Frisco north of Stratford between sections 130 and 131, Block 1-T, and south on Stratford on the Coldwater between

sections 198 and 199, Block 1-T. Estimates have been submitted to the Commissioners Court and it is thought that the Beaver Bridge will cost around \$33,000.00 with the remaining funds to be spent on the other two bridges. Many business people in Stratford have expressed the opinion that the construction of a permanent bridge on the Beaver will open a new trade territory for them. 

I would give to have see that." "I wasn't talking about your old football game," says she. "It's this material. Isn't it beautiful."







When she ad enough lye collected, set up an iron kettle on a crossbar The iye was up in the kettle with fat collected from the kitchen and some water. This was cooked until the mixture thickened. This soft soap was stored in the cellar in a big barrel. It was used to wash dishes, clothes and scrub floors. 'I have washed many dishes with this kind of soap
