
> The value of farm surpluses now owned outright by the Government is close to \$2,500,000 000. In addition, the Government has outstanding nearly two and one-half billion dollars in price support loans on various commodities, many of which will no doubt be acquired and put in storage. Thus the American people have the record high amount of nearly 5 billion dollars invested in farm surpluses. It all adds up to well over \$100 worth of farm products for every American family. This investment will certainly increase unless ways are found to avoid further surpluses. Some of these commodities can be stored longer than others, but even such things as wheat and corn deteriorate in time. None of them can be stored forever.

It is costing the American taxpayer more than 14 million dollars a month just to store these commodities. And realized losses under price support operations for the first three months of this fiscal year totaled nearly 47 million dollars.

An important cause contributing to our ever-increasing surpluses of some crops is the sharp drop in agricultural exports. Here's what has happened. In 1940, U. S. exports of farm products averaged 738 million dollars a year. Then the war came and blasted millions of foreign acres out of production. By the time the war was over, millions of people in other countries were hungry and markets for food mushroomed. During the 1947-48 marketing year, \$3,505 million dollars worth of American farm products were





Your Senator Reports (By Lyndon B. Johnson)

Farm Program The President's farm message proposes a number of changes in the present program, Some of these changes, I believe, would result in less protection and less income for the farmer. I cannot support any proposals that would have such an effect. The recent trend in the farm economy has been downward. It is the duty of Congress to take action designed to halt that trend. I do not believe a flexible price support system - even if it is called a "modernized" parity concept -- is the answer. **Livestock Industry** The President stated in his

farm message that no new laws are needed to deal with problems of the livestock industry. He recommended that "existing conditions with respect to meat animals be continued."



Q-Why are Congressional committee chairmanships concentrated regionally?

A--Under the seniority rule, the chairman of a committee generally is the member of the majority party with the longest continuous service on that committee. Members of Congress from states which habitually vote for one party tend to build up the greatest continuous seniority. Under Democratic control, most committees were headed by Southerners and members from Democratic strongholds in the West. In the 83rd Congress, the bulk of chairmen are from "safe" Republican states in the Eastern, Central, and Western regions.

Q-Why are Congressional tours around the world called "junkets?"

A-The derivation is believed to stem from the Latin "juncus," meaning "rush" or "reed." The French called a dessert served in a rush basket a "junquet," while the Italians call a similar sweet dish a "giuncata." In old English, a junket was any sweetmeat or delicate food. Later, a junket became a feast or party away from home, and finally a trip by an official at public expense. Some Congressional "junkets" are paid for by the participants.
