To Reduce Sewer Rates May 1st

City sewer rates will be reduced approximately ten percent on May first. The decision was made by a unanimous vote of the City Council at their regular February meeting.

On and after May 1 the sewer rate will be \$2.00 per month for each residence or family unit. The present rate is \$2.25 a month.

All business houses now paying \$4.50 a month, will be reduced to \$4.00. Service stations using wash racks, now paying \$9.00, will be charged \$8.00. Other rates in effect will be reduced not less than ten per cent.

In making this reduction the City Council wishes to emphasize that this will require the prompt payment of sewer fees in order to maintain the service and provide funds to pay off the bonds as they come due. This reduction does not apply to the trash and garbage service as funds raised for this part of the sanitary service are a little short of self supporting. However, as in tht past, the ten per cent will be allowed for advance payment on both sewer and trash and garbage.

CONEGRESSIONAL

Q—Do the letters "H. R." in front of numbers of legislative measures mean House Resolution?

A-The H.R. preceeding a number means House of Representatives, and designates the measure as a House "bill." H. Res. means House Resolution. A House bill originates in the lower chamber and when passed by both chambers and, normally, signed by the President becomes law (just as does a Senate Bill). A House Resolution requires for its adoption, only passage by the House of Representatives, and does not become a law.

Q-How many times has Congress declared war?

A-Congress only eight times has passed acts which could be considered declarations of war. They were: War of 1812, June 18, 1812; Mexican War, May 13, 1846; Spanish-American War, April 25, 1898; war with Germany, April 6, 1917; war with Austria, Dec. 7, 1917; war with Japan, Dec. 8, 1941; war with Germany, Dec. 11, 1941; and war with Italy, Dec. 11, 1941. The Acts did not say, "War is declared . . . etc." They usually declared the existence of war or a state of war. War was never actually declared against Tripoli in 1802, the Confederate States in 1861, or North Korea in 1950.

Q-What is the difference between a bill and an act? A-A bill is a legislative measure introduced in either the Senate or the House and proposing enactment of a law. When it is passed by either chamber the bill becomes an act of that branch of the Congress which passed it. However, the term "act" is commonly used to refer to a measure which has been passed by both houses

Q-What U. S. President served the shortest length of time? A-William Henry Harrison died in office after serving only from March 4 to April 4, 1841.



Dredge short ribs with flour and brown in lard. Pour off excess fat. Add onions, tomatoes, green peppers and worcestershire sauce. Season with salt and pepper. Cover and cook 11/2 hours or until meat is tender Remove short ribs and thicken liquid for gravy.

heated canned fruit to which some additional sugar has been added. Leftover mashed potatoes? They make a handsome dish if you heat in the top part of the double boiler with enough cream to moisten them thoroughly. Then beat, adding an egg, some grated onion and a bit of salt and pepper. Pile lightly into a greased casserole and bake until puffy and golden brown.

Here's a good luncheon dish, even if you have guests. Make French toast and cover with sauteed canned or fresh mushrooms with frizzled ham.

For a quick supper, try toast or English muffins spread with deviled ham and a topping of scrambled eggs. Fruit for dessert with this makes a good team.
