the \$100.00 valuation. In 1948 Sherman County voted to re-allocate taxes and set rates in accordance with the election for six years. Saturday the voters must approve the continuation of the law if the county is to continue to enjoy Pre-School continuation of the law if the its benefits.

Passage of the law merely allows the court to set a tax rate which will provide the necessary money for paying county expenses without collecting a surplus for some fund which does not require more than a minimum tax.


The blowing of the land in the great Southwest is one of the No. 1 problems of this nation today. Unless it is attacked immediately, it will spread like


