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

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Stain Remover

mover! Whether it's chocolate ice cream on baby's rompers or ink on your school child's clothes, speed is the key to successful removal says Miss Lucile King, county home demonstration agent.

If the stain is treated before it dries, the chances of removing it are increased. Te remove ice cream stains, use cold water immediately and then wash in warm soap suds.

To remove ink stains, let water run through the spot before it dries if possible. Equal parts of glycerin and water makes another good remover, say clothing specialists for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.
