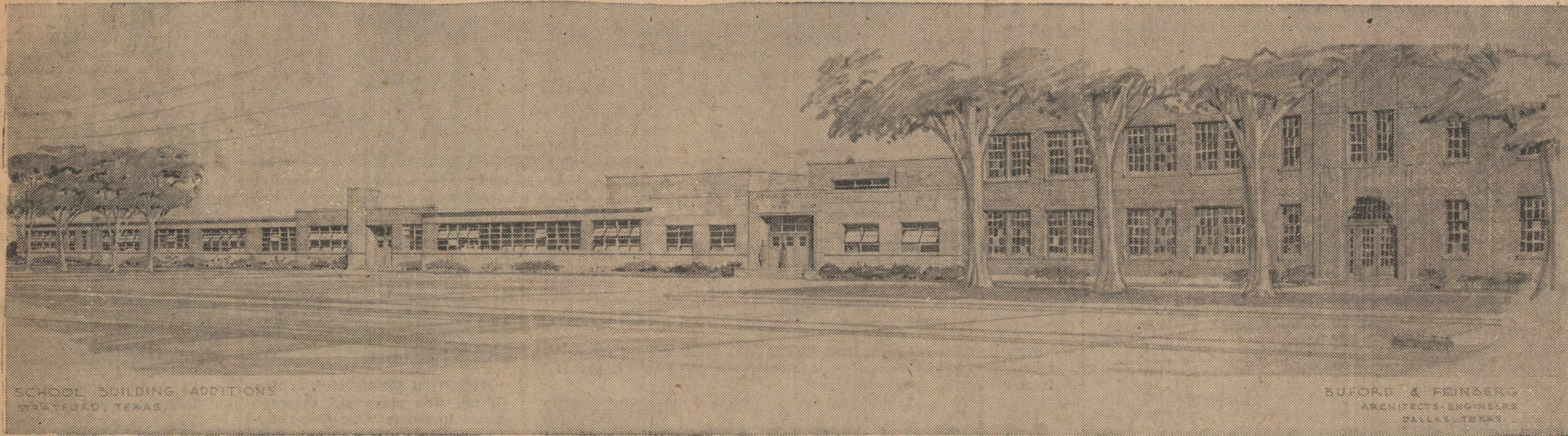


Voters Approve School Expansion Dream

Stratford Independent School District voters authorized the issuance of \$340,000.00 in bonds in an election held Saturday for construction of additional facilities for the school. Sixty percent of the voters cast their ballots. Of the 276 votes cast, 196 favored the issuance of the bonds, and 82 voted against the proposal.

In a meeting Tuesday night the Board of Trustees opened bids of 10 competitive bonding companies. The low bid of 2.658% interest was made by William N. Edwards, C. N. Burt Co., and Keller and Ratliff on the 19-year bonds with a 15-year option was accepted.

The interest bid, one of the lowest in the territory, was made due to the excellent financial condition of the school district.

Detailed specifications for the new addition for the school will be completed in about three weeks. Fifteen days will be allowed for construction companies to place competitive bids. The construction contract will be let to the lowest bidder providing the low bidder is a reputable firm.

Construction work on the new structure will probably start after the 20th of July. The contract will call for a minimum time limit of six months with allowances made for bad weather conditions.

One wing of the frame barracks building at the school will be retained for band and shop classes until the new building is completed.

Six Delegates Attend State 4-H Round-Up

Approximately 1,600 members of Texas boys' and girls' 4-H Clubs arrived at Texas A. & M. College for the annual 4-H Round-Up June 8 to 10. They were accompanied by adult leaders and selected County Extension Agents who will assist with program activities. Delegates attending from Sherman County were Jean Spurlock, Ealon Davis, Wayne Cummings, and Raymond Kirkwood, 4-H members; Mrs. Travis Spurlock, adult leader; and E. Goule, County Agent.

The annual event brings together the state's most outstanding 4-H Club members. As county delegates, they are given opportunities to further develop the leadership, citizenship, and character building phases of 4-H Club work. Hundreds participated in the 17 state-wide judging and demonstration contests.

The program was planned around 19 different subject-matter short courses. These ranged from agricultural engineering to wildlife and included not only agricultural subjects but those involving the home, leadership and recreation. General sessions were held each morning with the short courses, directed by Extension Specialists. The entire day of June 10 was devoted primarily to contests.

Delegates registered on the afternoon of June 7. The Share-the-Fun Festival provided the Tuesday night program. A chuck wagon feed and entertainment was held Wednesday evening. The annual Recognition Banquet Thursday evening was in Duncan Hall. Special entertainment at Guion Hall concluded the meeting. These two events were provided by the Sears-Roebuck Foundation.

The theme for the Round-Up was "Building a Stronger America."

Allotment For Farms With No Wheat For Three Years

Farmers on land on which no wheat was seeded for grain for all of the years 1952, 1953 and 1954 may apply for a 1955 wheat acreage allotment, according to R. C. Buckles, Chairman of the Sherman County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. To be considered for an allotment on a farm which had no wheat seeded for grain for any of those years, the farmer must apply in writing to his county ASC committee by June 30, 1954.

Blank application forms are available at the county ASC office for use in filing requests for allotments.

DAILY BLAST OF PREVAILING Hot Winds Are Reducing Wheat Yield

Prevailing hot winds with dust and static electricity during the last week have cut the potential yield of wheat in the northern plains area. Irrigated and early wheat are reported to be withstanding present weather conditions in the best shape. Wheat once thought to be dead, which made a marvelous growth after the May rains, has suffered to the greatest extent. It has been estimated that probably half of the late wheat has been ruined.

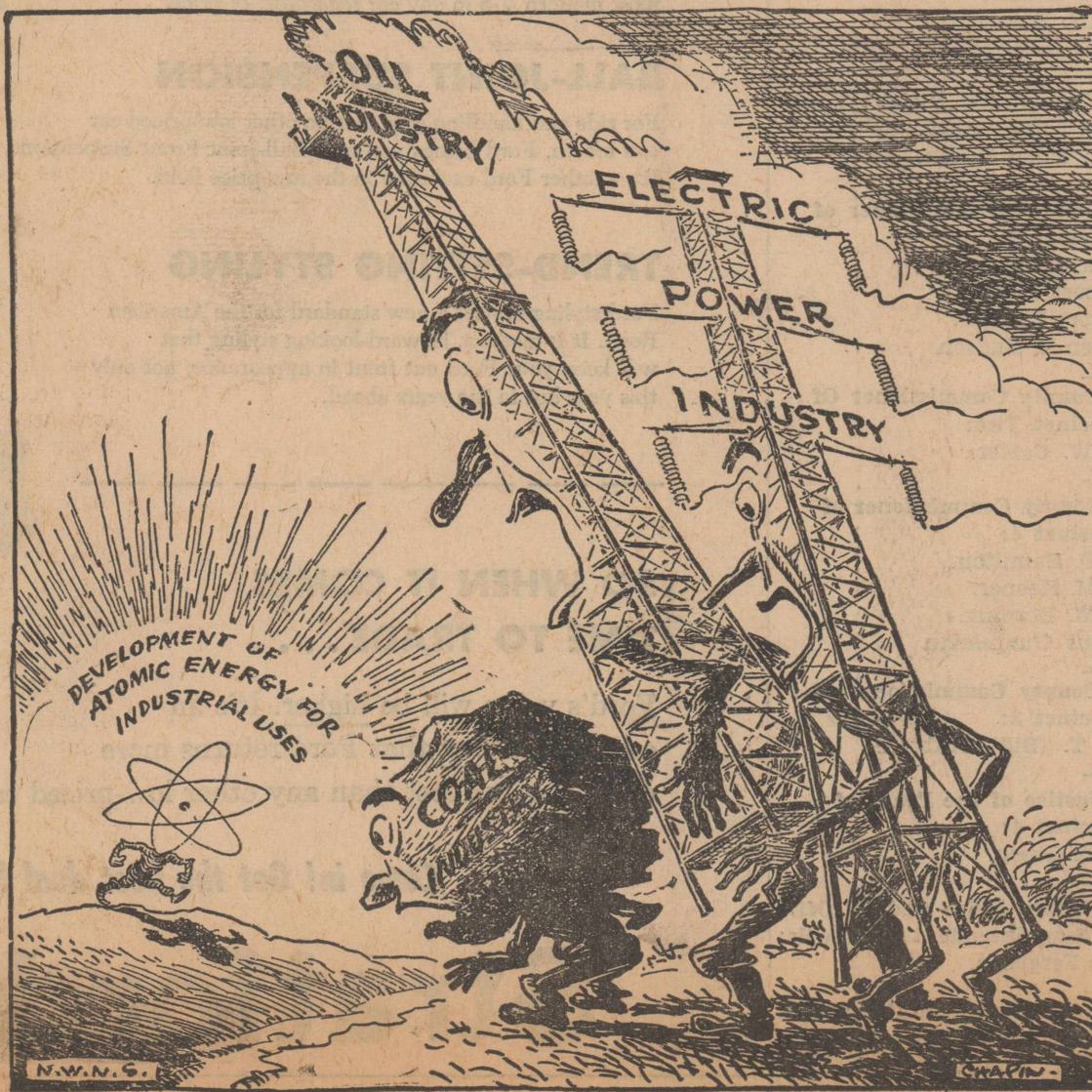

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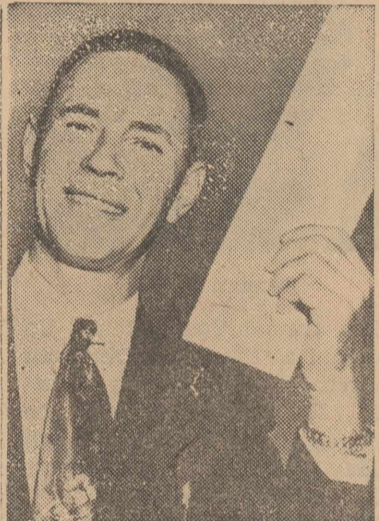

 Amos Condemns Social Injustice
 Lesson for June 6: Amos 7: 10-17;
 8:4-8.
 Golden Text: Amos 5:14.

Amos was a shepherd of Tekoa, a small place not far to the south of Jerusalem. Unlike most prophets, he went into the neighboring country of Israel to deliver his message.

He began his ministry about 750 B. C., and the period was one of great prosperity for the Northern Kingdom. Jeroboam II, the strongest of the Israelitish Kings, had captured Damascus and restored the larger limits of his country. The chief of the people became wealthy and lived luxuriously, but the lowly were downtrodden and oppressed.

Against the evils of the time Amos addressed himself and, evidently a strong preacher, he gained attention and then in no uncertain terms condemned the prevailing corruption. Amos, a priest of Bethel and a wretched synophant, reported to the king that Amos was working up a revolution. Then he met the prophet and advised him to return to his own country. But Amos was not afraid of the priest who closed his eyes to the evils about him, and he refused to depart and continued with his preaching.

The message of Amos was not altogether one of condemnation. He held out hope to the people if they would repent and turn to God. We have evils of our own and we should be concerned to put them down. Let each one in his own place do what he can to remedy evil conditions around him.

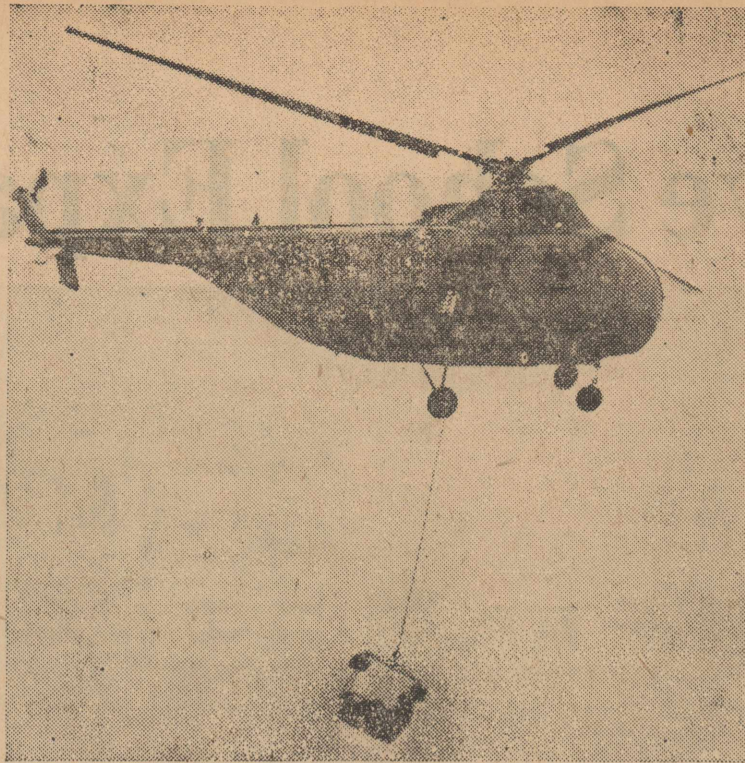

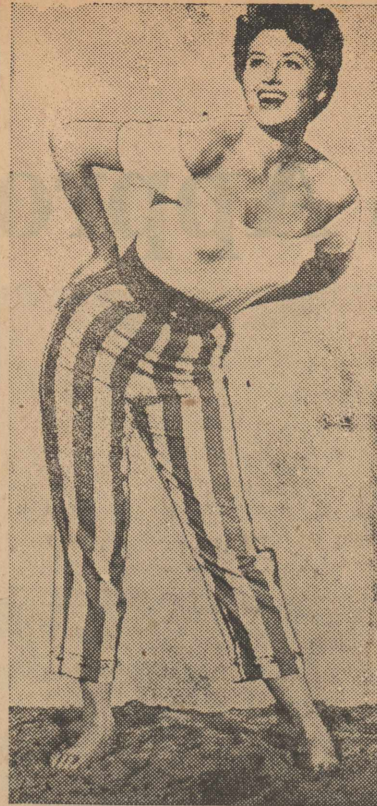

- Q—How would the President's proposal for federal reinsurance of private voluntary health insurance increase my protection against medical debt?**
 A—Although Mr. Eisenhower did not spell out details in his Jan. 18 message to Congress, Administration and Congressional sources have explained that a federal agency would insure private health-insurance systems against abnormal losses. The private plans would buy insurance from the government, which would help pay certain claims to individuals. Thus, advocates of the proposal hope, private insurance systems could offer broader coverage at lower rates without much risk of going broke.
- Q—Does the Mutual Defense Treaty with the Republic of Korea obligate the U.S. to help South Korea if it starts a war to win back North Korea?**
 A—No. The treaty, approved by the Senate Jan. 26, promises American aid only if outsiders attack South Korea's present territory or areas which the U.S. later recognizes as legally brought under the Republic's control. Although Secretary of State John Foster Dulles assured the Senate Foreign Relations Committee that the treaty required aid only against external aggression, the Senate attached a reservation to pin the point down.
- Q—Are there any official statements in the statute books pledging the federal government to promote full employment?**
 A—The closest approach is the Employment Act of 1946, in which Congress declared that "it is the continuing policy and responsibility of the Federal Government to use all practical means . . . to promote maximum employment . . ." One tool created by the Act is the Economic Report, submitted by the President Jan. 28.

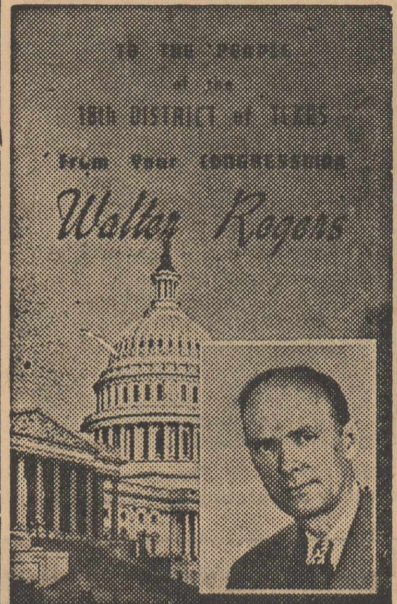
Keith Green Receives Degree

Gagged Again
The Social Security Bill that recently passed the House of Representatives was passed under the "gag" rule. This was the second time this session that major legislation originating in the Ways and Means Committee was forced through the House of Representatives while Members stood handcuffed and gagged. The other time was when the voluminous tax revision bill was shoved through. One of the members of the Ways and Means Committee, appearing on television just before the tax bill came to the Congress, stated that the bill was being written by the Ways and Means Committee and that the House of Representatives would not be allowed to dot an i or cross a t. That is exactly what happened. The bill was printed on March 9, contained over 800 pages (small print) and was voted on, on March 18. This procedure simply means that sixteen members of the Ways and Means Committee of the House of Representatives can dominate and control 435 duly elected Members of Congress, insofar as legislation before that particular committee is concerned. The Social Security Bill wasn't even printed when the House began considering the rule to debate the bill. An attempt was made to open the bill for certain types of amendments, but this was soundly defeated by a vote of 270 to 76. The great majority of the 76 were Southern Democrats. Men who have always believed in the real democratic processes, and who realize that the "gag" rule practice is nothing less than steam roller politics, and that a slightly expanded use of the practice could do tremendous damage to the legislative processes so necessary in a democratic form of government. We sincerely hope that the Senate (where the "gag" rule does not apply) will remove some of the iniquities of the bill.

Puerto Ricans Go On Trial
The Puerto Ricans, three men and a woman, are now on trial in Washington for the March 1 shooting in the House of Representatives. The woman undertook to make a speech when the case was called for trial, but was quickly hushed by officers of the court. It would be a good guess that she was going to make a speech on freedom for Puerto Rico. The poor gal doesn't seem to understand that the place to get water is at the well. Puerto Rico can save its independence if Puerto Rico wants it. The place to determine this is in Puerto Rico, not in the United States, either in the Congress or before a district court. If justice prevails, I would venture that it will be several years before this woman or her thick-headed pals have an opportunity to visit Puerto Rico or any place else. One of the witnesses who appeared in the beginning of the trial was my good friend, Congressman Ken Rogers, from Alabama. He was shot in the leg and has had a pretty tough time of it. In fact, he was the last one to get out of the hospital. He is still on crutches and has a specially designed chair in which he sits. The chair is fixed so that it affords a special support for his

left leg.
Attorney General's Speech
I did not like the statement of the Attorney General to the effect that the recent segregation decision of the Supreme Court was a complete answer to Communist propaganda criticizing racial segregation in this country. The Communist propaganda agents could very easily say that such a statement was an admission on the part of the Attorney General that the United States of America had been guilty of something before the Supreme Court made this segregation ruling. We should spend our time telling the world about the shortcomings and viciousness of Communism, rather than trying to answer some false criticism thought up by some expert Communist propaganda spreader. We are all going to wake up some morning and find out that Communist criticism and condemnation can not be satisfied by sacrificing our basic rights that distinguish Americanism from Communism. If propaganda is the weapon that is going to be used, it is time that we got on the offensive with it, rather than being on the defensive.

AN INFLUENTIAL national magazine recently came up with a "Rate Your Town" survey-questionnaire which received widespread publicity and use throughout the country.

The order of business is always a concentrated discussion of whatever is making news on the local or national scene. Philosophy, business, even religion, are subjects for discussion.
My only complaint about such organizations is that, according to custom the member who loses out in a guessing game or a game of chance picks up the tab for the membership. It's always me.

THE then nine-month old Small Business Administration, under fire from some Senators as too conservative in its loan policy, at the end of April had made disbursements on 37 small business loans.

SBA, established by Congress last July in terminating the Small Defense Plants Administration and the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, has stepped up the pace of its loan approvals. A total of 261 business loans had been approved by May, the figure not including disaster loans, which SBA also handles.

The total of 261 loans approved was \$15,777,000, and Wendell Barnes, SBA Administrator told the Senate Select Committee on Small Business that loan applications are now being received at the rate of 400 a month.

Chairman Edward J. Thye, (R Minn.) told Barnes the SBA should adopt a more "liberal" lending attitude. Other Senators also questioned SBA policies, but Sen. Barry Goldwater (R Ariz.) indicated that he believed SBA was carrying out the intent of the act by which Congress created it.

The act empowered the agency to: Make loans, from a revolving fund authorized to run as high as \$150 million, to small businesses unable to obtain credit from private sources, within an upper limit of \$150,000 for any loans. Loans may be either direct, with the SBA supplying all the funds, or partici-

patation loans in which private sources and SBA both share, SBA's part being limited to 90 per cent.

Help small concerns get government contracts, and take up to \$100 million in prime contracts from defense procurement agencies for parceling out among small suppliers.

Make disaster loans up to a total of \$25 million.

Congress' SBA appropriation for fiscal 1954 was \$55 million. Chairman Thye said that under the first administrator, William D. Mitchell, SBA failed to "get airborne." When Mitchell resigned on Oct. 20, no loans had been approved. In part, observers say, the slow start may have been due to administrative delays coincident with the establishment of a new agency, but two other factors may have been:

Caution on the part of the new Administration lest the so-called RFC scandals be repeated, and Reservations, among some top Eisenhower Administration leaders and supporters, as to the suitability of the lending business as a government function.

Barnes, former general counsel of SBA, became head of the agency in November. On Nov. 13 the first two loans were approved, and on Nov. 16 a new loan policy was announced, that "any small business enterprise with a good management record and able to give reasonable assurance of repayment is eligible to apply to SBA for a business loan."

Select the right kind of potatoes for the kind of cooking planned.

Potatoes are rich in minerals and vitamins. One medium sized potato gives 95 calories.

Eat a potato a day.

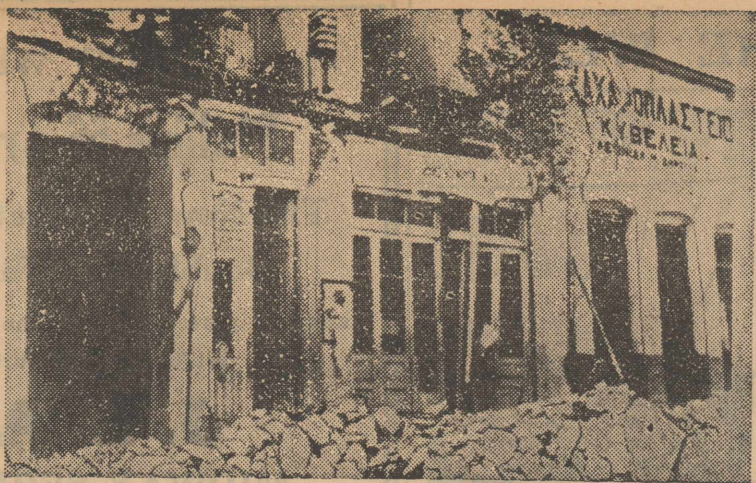

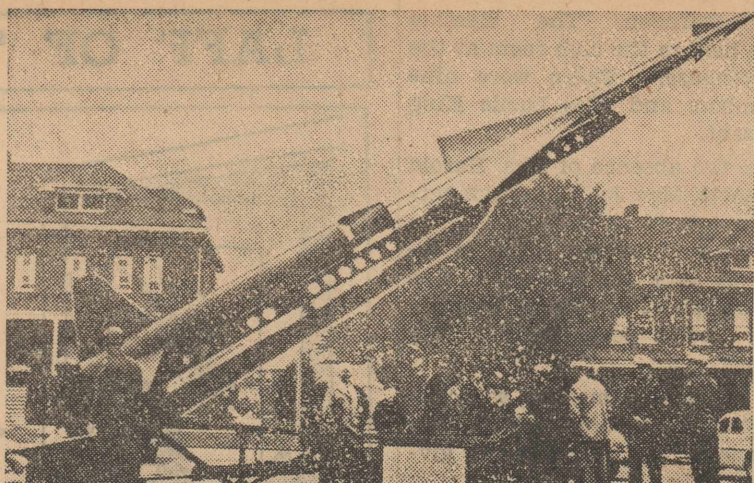

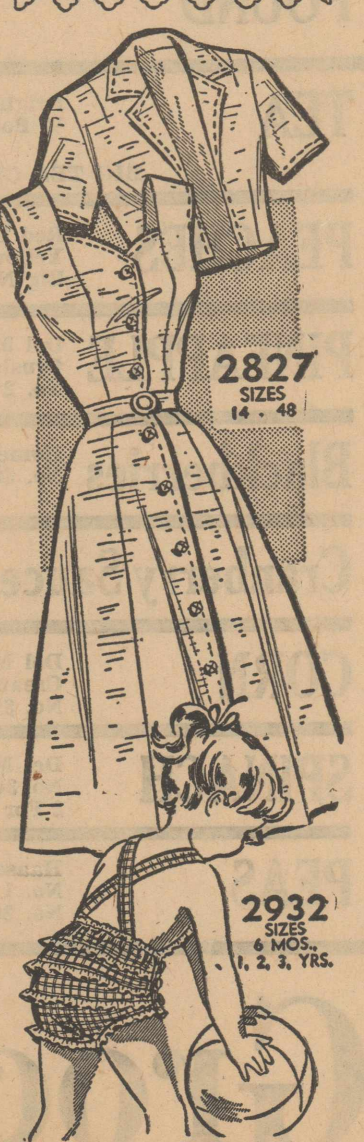

Amos Denounces Intemperance (Temperance Lesson)
Lesson for June 13: Amos 2: 11-12; 4: 1-2; 6: 1-7.
Golden Text: Romans 13: 13.

In this lesson we find Amos giving attention to a very distressing thing in regard to the use of strong drink — the efforts put forth by drinkers to induce others to share in their carousals. For they offered wine to Yazarites, the members of a very strict sect who gave themselves wholly to the service of God and denied themselves the use of wine.

Amos also found that women were indulging freely in strong drink. In no flattering terms, the prophet called them the "kine," or "cows," of Bashan. It is a lamentable thing that so many women of the present are indulging in the use of strong liquor. The whole attitude of the large number of women in our country seems changed toward the matter of drink. It is seen in the glittering cocktail bars and cocktail lounges present nearly everywhere.

The prophet warned the people in general against the evils of strong drink and urged them to think of the doom that threatened their nation with the continuance of their carousals. The nation, he insisted, was in imminent danger from foes that were attacking from within, and the men and women who were holding high carnival would be the first to be taken captives into a strange land.
