Previously this project had been sponsored by the Stratford Lions Club and young men of the city had volunteered their time to do the work. Friction developed when citizens argued over where the numbering of the houses was to start. Young men who had volunteered their services became disgusted and the project was dropped.

In this effort, the Chamber of Commerce hopes that citizens will not differ on the proposed civic project and accept whatever plan that is introduced.

die in highway accidents dur-Fourth weekend, according to a prediction released by the Association of Casualty and Surety Companies.

The Association's estimate based upon "a conservative expansion of the accident rates of three-day Independence Day holidays in the past," breaks down the causes of the fatal accident into six principal cate-

Speeding is expected to kill 123 persons; excessive use of alcohol will account for 82 more, both motorists and pedestrians; failure to keep to the right of the centerline, 37 deaths; failure to yield the right-of-way, 26 deaths; over-fatigued drivers or drivers actually asleep at the wheel, 23 deaths; miscellaneous causes, 79 deaths.

In releasing the estimate, Thomas N. Boate, Accident Prevention Department manager of the Association, pointed out that the Association's figures for the recent Memorial Day weekend were "grimly close to reality." The national highway death toll for that holiday, not counting those who were injured but didn't die until sometime after the weekend was over, was 362. The Association had predicted 380 deaths.







AUTHOR OF "HOW TO STOP WORRYING AND START LIVING"

W HEN RUTH M. KENNEDY, 45 New Lawn Avenue, Arlington, New Jersey, graduated from high school, she had her heart set on going to college, but because of an eye condition, the doctor advised against it - and almost broke her heart. She had been preparing for four years and the letdown was too much. She had not the qualifications for going right out into the business world so her parents suggested a secretarial school for a year. This was the

last thing she had wanted to do. But to please her parents, she graduated - and made a flop of it. She got to the point where she was building up resentment toward everyone. She would cry if anyone dared make a remark to her, but she would tell no one what troubled her. By the time she got a job the change was too much for her.

There were no signs of nerves in the beginning but she had pains in her stomach, refused to eat, and finally was sick in bed. She lost over forty



pounds and the doctor finally said she must go to CARNEGIE a hospital for intravenous feeding. The intravenous feedings did give her a little strength, but they didn't help her otherwise. The doctor finally brought in a psychiatrist who recommended shock treatments. These helped a lot, but it wasn't until she realized that nothing would cure her completely except her change of mental attitude that she began to help herself. With God's help, eleven months later she was back on her feet; but not until she had caused a terrible heartache for all concerned. Today when things don't go just right she talks it over with God in prayer, and she doesn't wait until she gets to church

CONEGRESSIONAL

Q—Is wire-tapping a federal crime?

A—Under a 1934 federal law, and subsequent court interpretation, wire tapping is illegal only if the information obtained is divulged without prior authorization of the sender. No one has ever been convicted of wire tapping under this law, although wire-tapping is practiced by such agencies as the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Many federal convictions based on wire-tapped evidence have been reversed. Despite numerous court rulings, the wire-tapping issue has not been resolved.

Q-How can the Administration predict both a \$2.9 billion budget deficit for fiscal 1955, and a \$100 million "cash" surplus?

A--Part of the federal government's income and outgo passes through trust funds-such as the Social Security retirement "kitty." Trustfund dollars are segregated from the conventional budget books, but are counted in the cash budget because they reflect actual money transfers between the government and the public. The trust

funds so far take in more than they pay out.

Q-The Constitution provides that one-third of the Senate's seats—32 will be filled by election every two years. How much above this quota have we gone in recent years, because of deaths and resig-

A—Thirty-five Senators were elected in 1952, 34 in 1950. In 1954, 35 seats will be at stake—more if additional vacancies occur before then. Q—Are all imported Mexican farm laborers illegal "wetbacks?"

A-No. Congress Aug. 1 extended the law authorizing controlled re-cruitment and importation of Mexican farm laborers. More than 197,000 were contracted for in 1952. (Copyright 1954, Congressional Quarterly)







Vegetable-Egg Salad

6 hard-cooked eggs, diced ¼ cup chopped pimiento 2 cups diced cucumbers 1 cup diced celery 2 tablespoons chopped onion 1/2 teaspoon salt

34 cup salad dressing Combine all ingredients in folding motion. Serve in lettuce cups garnished with sliced tomatoes and black olives.

Cleaners which cut grease, especially on kitchen jobs include baking soda, sal soda and ammonia, may be used in strong solution on heavily greased equipment.

Rubber and cellulose sponges have many uses and save time. Use these on cleaning walls, woodwork, upholstery, furniture, rugs and

Scouring pads and powder may be used to clean off metal rust, spots on linoleum and on aluminum parts to prevent corrosion.

A long-handled dust pan is much more practicable than a short-handled one which requires you to stoop. Use the dust pan for all manner of cleaning, sweeping jobs.

It's a good idea to keep a disinfectant handy in several places besides the laundry. Chlorine bleach can be used in drains and basements as well as the kitchen for disinfecting jobs.





Frankly, I find it most difficult to understand how the best interests of this country will be served by doing the injury to each individual's economy. Of course, I am using the old-fashioned method of viewing the situation strictly from the standpoint of this country and the people who make it up. Perhaps if I took into account the three and one-half billion dollars that has been proposed as foreign aid this year and the peoples who will be benefited thereby, my understanding might be cleared up. However, I do not intend to use any such the concern about this growing crazy formula. If you want to know why a farmer's children do not have shoes on their feet, it is not necessary to burden your brain with a long, complex international-domestic formula. All you have to do is to ask the farmer. If the farm economy of this country is allowed to sag, you won't need to ask some statistician what happened to the little businessman and the small towns and communities, and then the wholesalers in the larger towns and the cities. Just
