

"For me?" She smiled through tears.

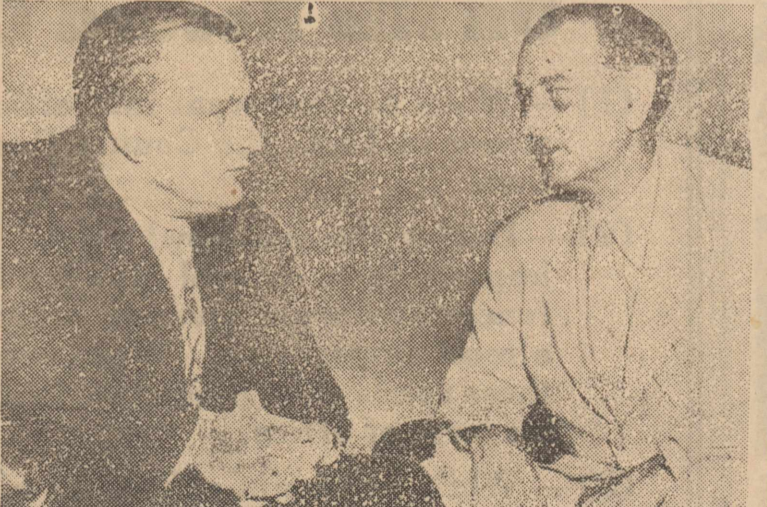
"Yes, didn't you notice I described you when I told you what my girl was like? I have no girl, unless it's you."

"You're timid, too?" He ran around his desk to her.

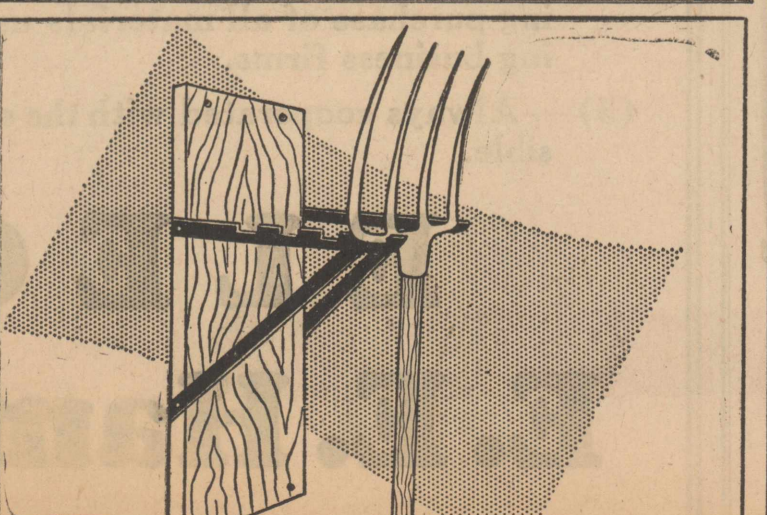
"Yes, dear," she answered and wiped away a tear.

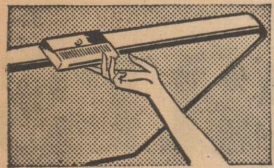
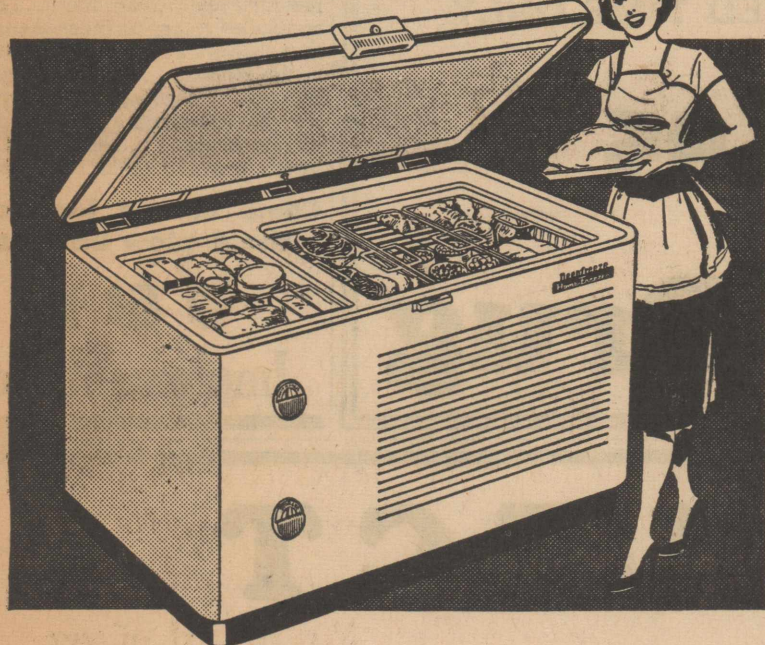

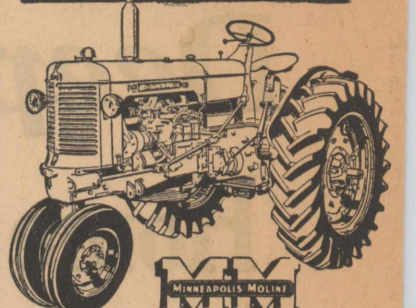

**Peach Tree Borer**

Here is a bit of information that may come in handy to a lot of you peach and plum tree owners.

Miss Lucile King, County Home Demonstration Agent, says that now is the time to spray the trunks of those peach and plum trees to combat the peach tree borer. A good spraying now followed by two more at thirty day intervals should be sufficient to keep damage to a minimum. A good spray to use could be 1 pound of 50 percent Dieldrin mixed with 100 gallons of water. Parathion of Lindane may be substituted for Dieldrin.

For more information on the peach tree borer and its control get a copy of C-321, "Guide for Controlling Insects and Diseases on Fruits and Nuts in Texas," from your county extension office.

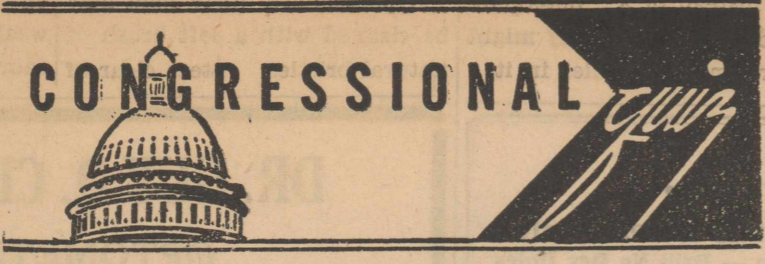

Q-What is the "preference clause" often mentioned in the power policy argument? A-"Preference clauses" used by both federal and state governments, grant priorities in the purchase of government-owned electric power to Rural Electrification Administration cooperatives, cities, counties and other nonprofit organizations. A bill to grant private enterprise the right to further develop power facilities at Niagara Falls, N. Y., was passed by the House last year without a preference clause. Q-Can Congress rescind funds it has voted or authorized to be spent? A-Yes, provided the money has not already been spent. Rescinded funds are no longer available to the agency in question and must be returned to the Treasury. Most rescissions are of funds which the agency has not obligated, because it would normally cost something to cancel a contract already made. There were many rescissions in fiscal 1954, as there are in most years. Among them was \$66,000 previously voted but not spent or authorized for construction of an additional fertilizer facility for the Tennessee Valley Authority. Q-What is parity? A-Parity—as applied to farm prices and income—is a formula to measure the purchasing power of the farmer's income from sale of his produce. Current prices and income are compared to levels in a base period. If a farmer gets 100 per cent of parity for a bushel of corn, the proceeds of that sale will buy him as many Sunday neckties as the price of corn bought during the base period. Corn and some other farm products now are supported at 90 per cent of parity. (Copyright 1954, Congressional Quarterly)

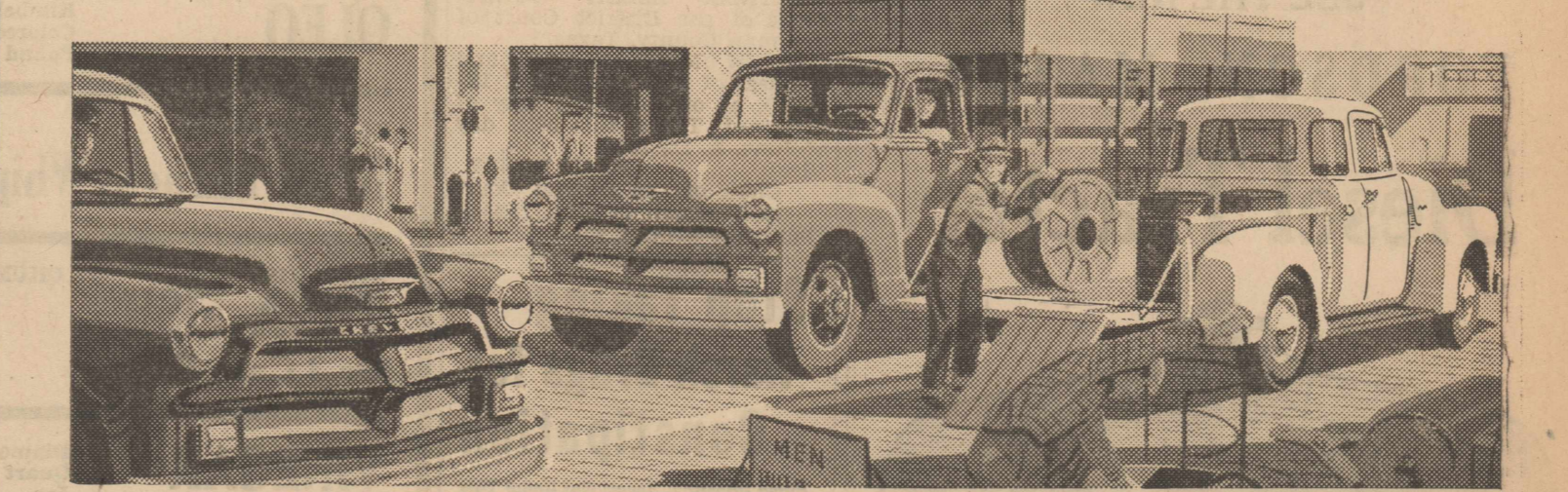

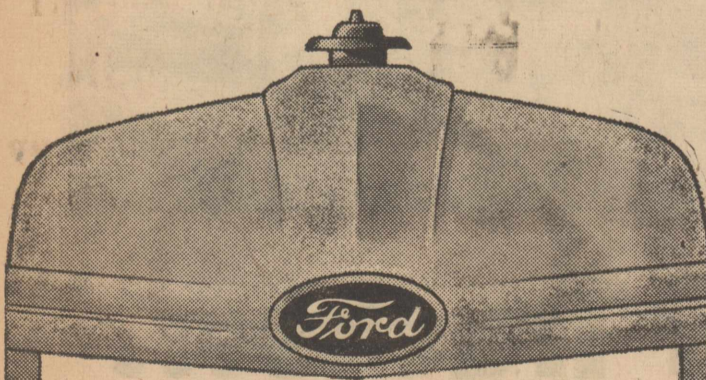

**Here's How To Wash Stiff Full Petticoats**

With stiff, full petticoats in vogue this summer, it's a wise lass who knows how to keep it crisp by careful washing. The secret is gentle care. Different types demand varying treatments says Miss Lucille King, County Home Demonstration Agent. Permanent crinoline may be washed many times without starching. If the label says it is permanent, wash it gently. Soak in mild suds, then swish suds through the petticoat. Rinse carefully but well, and roll in a turkish towel.

After many launderings, even permanent crinoline may need to be starched. But one heavy starching will last through several washings. Starch when completely dry. Gently squeeze out excess starch and shape carefully. While it is still slightly damp, iron with a moderately hot iron.

Nylon taffeta or net petticoats may be washed by hand, using a soap instead of a detergent. Let it drip dry. Wringing might put permanent wrinkles in it. A particularly dirty hem may be cleaned with a soft brush of natural bristles. Steer clear of chlorine bleach which may weaken permanently stiffened fabrics.
