

Four Candidates To Appear In Second Primary

Based on unofficial returns, Sherman County polled one of the heaviest votes in the history of the county in the Democratic Primary Election Saturday. According to the poll lists there were 924 votes in the county. The poll lists were composed of the names of those paying their poll taxes and those becoming of age since the first of the year. In the counties of less than 10,000 population, over-age voters who vote without paying poll taxes or making application for an exemption, stormed the polls to work a hardship in precinct 4. They used up the 60 extra ballots provided by law and 20-odd others. Late voters were required to wait until additional ballots were provided.

Several voters lost their votes in some of the races by writing in names without scratching the names of those appearing on the ballot. No one in that bracket received a vote for the office. Still others used the "X" system of voting where there was more than one candidate for office but did not mark an "X" to vote for candidates who were unopposed. Several of the unopposed candidates received only a little more than half of the votes cast.

According to incomplete unofficial returns Gov. Allan Shivers and Ralph Yarborough will be in the second primary August 28 for the Democratic nomination for the office of governor.

The names of A. L. Wilson and Ross Turner will appear on the second primary ballot as candidates for the office of Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector.

Balloon Furnishes Man From Mars Thrill For Many

A large weather balloon equipped with four boxes of instruments, which was launched in Bedford, Massachusetts landed in Stratford at dusk Monday evening. Only the parachute and instruments were visible to those who viewed the sky.

About half of the population of Stratford raced to the Arthur Milton irrigated farm northwest of Stratford. A few of the cars mired in the irrigation ditches while others milled nearby. Raymond Albert, William Leslie Price, Cotton Marvin, Penny Brooks and Bobby Burkham claim credit for being the first to arrive at the scene.

In the melee of excitement Bill Reed claimed the medal, good for \$25.00 for returning the instruments to their point of origin.

Tuesday morning the large plastic balloon which carried the instruments to Stratford was discovered in the K. L. Eller field about a mile northeast of Stratford.

Torrential Rain Played Havoc With Traffic

Torrential rain Thursday evening and night of last week left 1.61 inches of moisture and stalled two produce trucks. A truck filled with grapes and cherries was flipped on its side by a gust of wind one-half mile west of Stratford on U. S. Highway 54. The trailer lay on its side while the truck stood on its rear wheels with the radiator pointing skyward. The driver was not injured.

As the truck was being pulled onto the highway by a truck driven by Jimmy Stewart a car driven by Charles Durr in which A. J. Roberts was a passenger struck the tow truck. The Durr car was damaged but neither of the occupants were injured.

A semi-truck loaded with potatoes swerved from U. S. Highway 287 about 5 miles south of Stratford to avoid a head-on collision with a car whose driver was apparently blinded by the rain. Wreckers removed the truck from the bar pit Friday evening.

Insurance

Under an amended order issued by District Judge J. Harris Gardner in Austin, the Commercial Security Insurance Company of Houston can keep on doing business.

A previous order by Judge Gardner had closed the company, after Attorney General John Ben Shepperd charged that the firm had violated the state insurance laws.

A hearing is due in the case. Shepperd charged that the company borrowed \$200,000 of its \$250,000 initial capital. The attorney general said that the law requires unencumbered assets.

Natural Gas

Two Texas officials have tabbed the Federal Power Commission order freezing natural gas prices on gas sold to interstate pipelines as "serious" to the state's natural gas industry.

Railroad Commission Chairman Ernest O. Thompson and Attorney General Shepperd expressed dismay at the mandate, which was considered to be an initial step by the federal government to take over regulation of natural gas traffic.

Shepperd said that the move means "financial ruin for a large segment of the Texas natural gas industry."

Thompson called the ruling a "tragic blow" to the state treasury. Texas levies taxes on natural gas according to market value.

The people have spoken! And what a speech they made.

So close was the political scene many remained up all night Saturday in hopes of finding out whether there would be a run-off.

Judge Ralph Yarborough was still in the lead at midnight. He left home shortly thereafter for his downtown headquarters in the Littlefield Building. There the elevator jammed. When Yarborough was freed nearly an hour later, Governor Allan Shivers had taken a small lead which he never relinquished.

J. J. Holmes and Cyclone Davis, the two other contenders for the Governorship, polled just enough votes to make a runoff necessary.

It will be the first gubernatorial runoff since the Rainey-Jester campaign of 1946.

A runoff also is in order for a place on the Court of Criminal Appeals. Contenders are Judge Lloyd Davidson of Austin and District Judge Alan Haley of Wichita Falls.

A third runoff race is that between Alfred M. Scott of Austin and Justice Few Brewster who seeks re-election to the Supreme Court.

These Breeced Through

Clear winners were Ben Ramsey who defeated C. T. Johnson and George Hinson for lieutenant governor; John Ben Shepperd who defeated Doug Crouch for attorney general, with the biggest majority in any of the races; and Lyndon Johnson who defeated Dudley T. Dougherty for the U. S. Senate.

Elected without opposition were Martin Dies, congressman-at-large; John C. White, commissioner of agriculture; Bascom Giles, land commissioner; Jesse James, treasurer; Ernest O. Thompson, railroad commissioner; Robert S. Calvert, comptroller; and J. E. Hickman, chief justice of the supreme court.

Duke In Trouble

Something new happened in Duval County. George Parr's candidates did not win by a landslide.

In fact, some of them didn't even win.

Duval County votes were impounded after being counted, and locked up in the district clerk's vault, by order of District Judge Maxwell Welch.

Drouth Aid

Twenty-three Texas counties, hard hit by one of the state's worst drouths, have been made eligible for relief by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, with help to be forthcoming immediately.

All in the Central and Western parts of Texas, the counties were among 54 to be listed for federal aid. The others were in Colorado and Wyoming.

Texas counties to receive benefits were Bastrop, Bell, Bexar, Blanco, Bosque, Brown, Burnet, Comal, Comanche, Coryell, Erath, Hamilton, Hays, Kendall, Lampasas, Lee, Llano, McCulloch, Mason, Mills, San Saba, Travis and Williamson.

No details as to the nature of the relief program were made public by the Department of Agriculture.

Canal Suggested

A proposed plan to stop Texas' continuing water problems was explained by Dr. Walter P. Webb of the University of Texas at a conference.

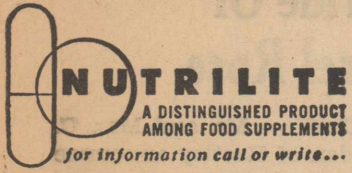
Webb's plan, already widely publicized, calls for a billion-dollar canal that would extend from East Texas through the dry areas of South Texas.

Federal water conservation policy backed by President Eisenhower will not support conservation plans that are "piecemeal," the executive board of the Texas Society of Professional Engineers has been told.

J. S. Hudnall, Texas representative at the National Rivers and Harbors Congress in Washington, said that the president would "look with disfavor" on water projects that do not fit an overall planned program for

Q—Did all U. S. Presidents vote for themselves for the nation's highest office?
A—At least one President apparently did not, because there seems to be no evidence that he ever voted. Zachary Taylor, the 12th President who was elected in 1848, never stayed in one place long enough to qualify to vote, according to George Stimpson's "Book About American Politics." Taylor entered the Army as a young man and retired shortly before his election.
Q—I've noticed when amendments to the Constitution are proposed in Congress—such as the Bricker amendment—they always seem to be in the form of a "joint resolution." Do they have to take this form?
A—According to Senate Parliamentarian Charles L. Watkins, a proposed Constitutional amendment has always been introduced in the form of a joint resolution "by custom." He says there is no requirement that the legislation take this form, that such a measure could be in the form of a Senate or House bill.
Q—Is Congress bound by law to stay in session a certain length of time?
A—If Congress wants to quit earlier than usual, it may do so by passage of a concurrent resolution. The Constitution requires that Congress meet each year, and normally it stays in session at least until July. The Legislative Reorganization Act of 1946 specified that: "Except in time of war or during a national emergency proclaimed by the President, the two Houses shall adjourn" not later than July 31 "unless otherwise provided by Congress." Since the Act became effective, Congress has consistently stayed at work past the July 31 date, except in 1952, when it adjourned July 7.

Controlling Horn Flies On Beef Cattle

It has been proven through research that control of large horn fly populations increase the weight gains of beef cattle 42 to 70 pounds during the normal grazing season. The construction of cable devices for the control of horn flies: Cable type rubbing devices are commonly used. This may be constructed by wrapping burlap sacks around three pieces of barbed wire or chain. If barbed wire is used, the three strands should be twisted and tied together before covering by wrapping with the burlap and tied at intervals of three inches with binder twine. The chain or wire may be any length but most

of them are fifteen or twenty feet long. The ends of the chain are usually tied about four feet high to posts. The chain should be allowed to sag midway between the posts within two feet of the ground. Another method is to tie one end of the chain or wire to the top of the post and fasten the other end to a dead man in the ground by giving the chain a 45 degree angle.

Mixing of insecticides to be used for control of flies on the above type of devices for beef cattle: D. D. T., Toxaphene, TDE or Methoxychlor at 5% strength may be used on the back rubbing devices. D.D.T., TDE and Methoxychlor usually are available in 25% oil solutions or emulsion concentrates. Wettable powders are not satisfactory. A 5% mixture may be prepared by mixing one quart of the 25% emulsion concentrate insecticide and four quarts of fuel oil. If 60% emulsion concentrate Toxaphene is used, mix one quart of it with fourteen quarts of fuel oil to make a 5% solution.

It has been found that one back rubber is adequate for treating about seventy-five animals. The insecticide to be used should be applied slowly

and evenly to the burlap sack at a rate of approximately one-half gallon for each back rubber. Applications will have to be repeated at about three week intervals.

Cautions: 1. Do not use crank case oil or lubricating oil for diluting the insecticides. 2. Do not spray the oil solution with or without the insecticide di-

rectly on the cattle. 3. Do not use excessive amounts of the insecticide solution on the burlap. 4. Use only Methoxychlor or Pyrethrum on dairy cattle. 5. Almost all insecticides are poisonous to humans and should be handled with care. If spilled on the skin wash thoroughly with soap and water.

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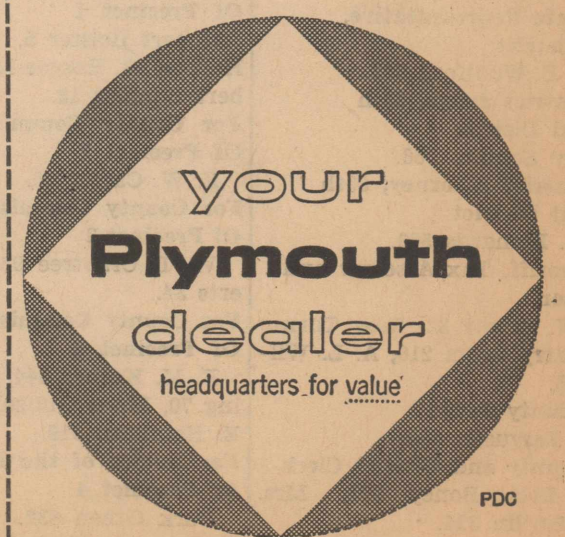
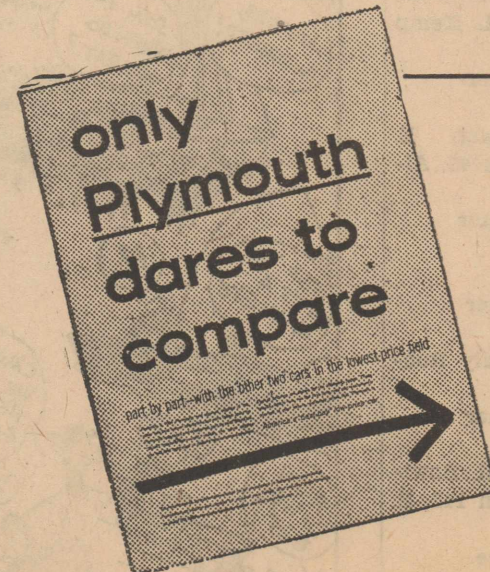

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section, to be known as Section 52-b, prohibiting the Legislature from ever lending the credit of the State, or granting any public money, or indebtedness of any individual, person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, public agency or political subdivision of the State, now authorized, or which may hereafter be authorized to construct, maintain, or operate toll roads, or turnpikes within this State; and providing for the submission of the amendment to the voters of this State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section, to be known as Section 52-b, which shall read as follows: "Section 52-b. The Legislature shall have no power or authority to in any manner lend the credit of the State or grant any public money to, or assume any indebtedness, present or future, bonded or otherwise, of any individual, person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, public agency, public agency, or political subdivision of the State, or anyone else, which is now or hereafter authorized to construct, maintain or operate toll roads and turnpikes within this State."

Section 2. The foregoing amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 2, 1954, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon, or in counties using voting machines such machines shall provide for the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment prohibiting the Legislature from lending the credit of the State or granting public money to, or assuming any indebtedness of, any one authorized to construct, maintain, or operate toll roads or turnpikes in this State." and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment prohibiting the Legislature from lending the credit of the State or granting public money to, or assuming any indebtedness of, any one authorized to construct, maintain, or operate toll roads or turnpikes in this State."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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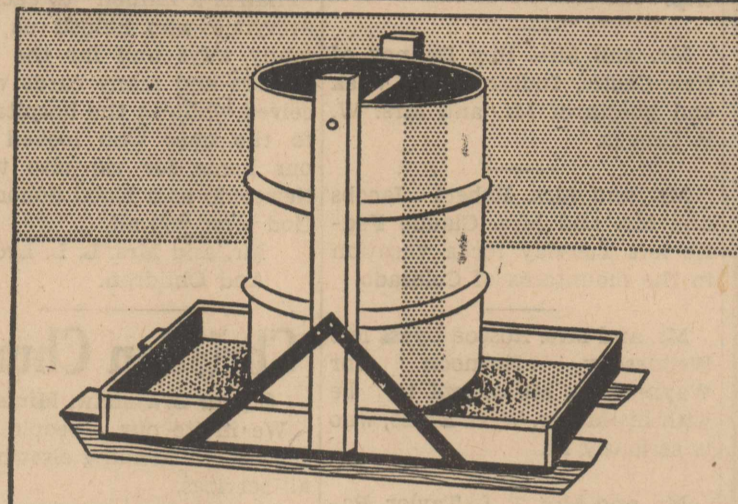

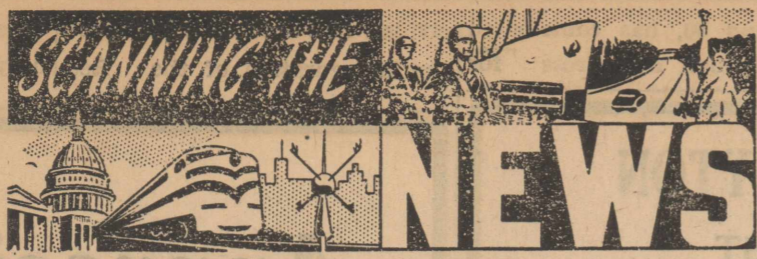

ORGANIZED LABOR is in the midst of one of the biggest get-out-the-vote drives in its history, determined through posters, increasing funds and a core of politically experienced workers to elect candidates considered pro-labor.

Officials of both the American Federation of Labor and the Congress of Industrial Organizations say the stakes are high and the obstacles great, but they're out for success.

Labor's three-pronged political action campaign is designed to: (1) persuade as many as possible of the nation's 15 million union members and their families to register, (2) inform them concerning major issues, (3) make sure they get to the polls on election day.

"Hardly pleasing to labor and liberals," says labor of the record of the 81st Congress. They single out the "millionaires tax bill," the effort to scuttle public housing drive to make the Taft-Hartley labor law stricter, and a social security program which unionists feel doesn't go far enough.

Unionists say their task of getting out the vote is made more difficult because it is a mid-term election and the turn-out at the polls is usually relatively light when the presidency is not being contested. They feel they will not be able to completely match the money, public-relations work and advertising they believe will be used in efforts to elect some candidates whom labor considers unfriendly. Yet, there is optimism among labor spokesmen, who claim a larger number of politically ac-

pinched back. Miss Lucile King, County Home Demonstration Agent, says plants will have time to harden before cold weather.

Deep watering and heavy mulching will bring many plants through the dry season. For the most part, it is safe to leave off fertilizing. In special instances, light fertilizing may be done.

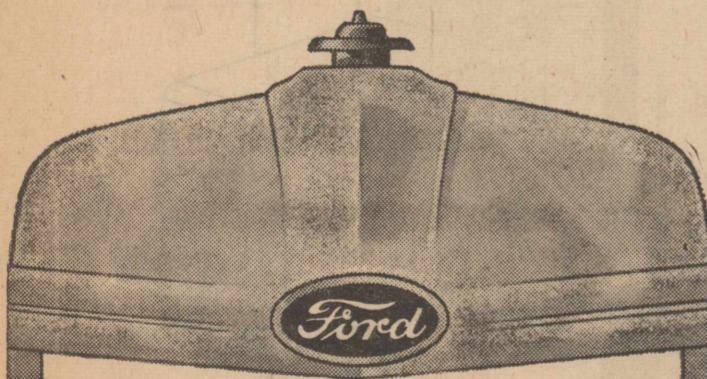
