value in the United States. "I think no one can deny that we are mortgaged to the hilt, Byrd (D-Va.) said in an address to the final session of the 43rd anial meeting of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce.

"Today the direct debt of the federal government is \$280 billion,' Byrd said. - "Percentagewise this is an increase of nearly 1200 per cent over our debt in 1933.' Byrd praised the Eisenhower ad ministration's efforts to balance the budget. But he also charged that President Eisenhower has advocated the "longest step yet to federal paternalism" by recom mending "the greatest increase in federal grants to states yet under-

Byrd cited the President's multioillion dollar proposals for increased federal aid for highway and school construction and for creation of a so - called federal health payment program.

In an earlier address to the chamber, a Commerce Department official said "aggressive venturesome policies" in foreign trade by the United States can make the next 12 months "one o the better periods of our history. E. E. Schnellbacher, of the de partment's bureau of foreign com merce, said prospects are good for rising exports and imports in the vear to come

By JOSEPH W. GRIGG BONN, Germany -UP- Wes Germany regained its place among the free nations of the world Thursday, almost 10 years to the day since Hitler's "thousand year Reich" crumbled with the unconditional surrender of his ar-

A series of brief diplomatic cere monies here, in Paris, in Washington and in Brussels made Germany free once again, allied with the western nations and pledged to raise a 500,000-man force for

the defense of West Europe. The key ceremony was held at noon when the British and French high commissioners deposited with the Bonn government the docu ments signifying ratification of the Paris treaties. The United States did this in April.

In that brief noontime ceremony Germany regained its sovereignty but there was no rejoicing. The country is divided by the Iron Curtain, and 18 million Germans live under Soviet domination in the East, their future obscured by the clouds of the cold war.

West Germany is among the most prosperous nations of Eur ope, but there are penniless refugees from communism. The na tion will rearm to seek unification through strength but to many the unconditional surrender of May 6 1945, is too fresh to make rearmament popular

Thursday's diplomatic activities completed the ratification of the Paris accords, signed on Oct. 23, 1954, and pushed them through to success despite Communist threats that final ratification will seal the

division of Germany. The Paris acts do four things: 1. They make Germany an independent nation.

2. They enable Germany to begin raising a 12-division army and an air force and navy-placing 500,000 men under arms. 3. They admit Germany into the

North Atlantic Treaty Organization as its 15th member. 4. And they admit Germany to a seven-nation western European union together with Britain, France, Italy, Belgium, Holland and Luxembourg - its friends and



Polio Cases **Under 1954**

Polio cases this year are lagging behind the pace set in 1954, even hough 38 children inoculated with Salk vaccine have been afflicted, a survey showed Wednesday.

A United Press check of 44 states and the District of Columbia show ed 1,138 cases of infantile paralyis, compared to 1,573 at this time last year. Six of this year's vic tims have died — two each in Lousiana and Idaho and one each in Illinois and Minnesota. The Idaho victims were among

the estimated 500,000 youngsters who had received inoculations of Salk vaccine manufactured by the Cutter Laboratories of Berkeley,

Temporary Ban On Cutter The vast majority of polio cases among vaccinated children occur-

red after inoculations of Cutter vaccine. A temporary ban has been placed on Cutter vaccine, although scientists emphasized that there was no evidence that it or any other kind of Salk vaccine was to blame for the 38 polio cases. A breakdown of the 38 case

showed 16 in California, 11 in Idaho, three in Oregon, two in Louisiana, and one each in Missouri, Georgia, Colorado, Washington, Texas and Illinois. There were two suspected cases among vaccinated children in Nevada.

The latest cases to be reported were three children in the Portland, Ore., area. They were among 1,800 Oregon children who have received inoculations of Cutter vaccine from private physicians.




