The Japanese political situation is likely to cause the United States a lot of worry within the next few months.

Four weeks ago the right and left wings of the Japanese Socialist party, long divided, reunited.

They have now embarked on a determined, long-range anti-American campaign which they hope will get them into power.

Right Wing in Control

The right wing Japan Democratic and Liberal parties enjoy a solid majority at present in the House of Representatives, which like the British House of Commons runs the country.

These two parties also are trying to unite, to present a solid front against the leftists.

But the Democrats and Liberals are bickering over the leadership. Their merger, which is likely to come soon, may not be a firm one.

The present parliament was elected last February, for a four-year term. But there probably will be another election next spring.

In that one, the Socialists hope to increase their house membership substantially. Then, later on, they hope to force another one in which they will win a majority.

The platform of the United Socialists is frankly anti-American.

It calls for "independence" from the United States, for the cancellation of the Japanese-American security treaty and for a halt in the Japanese rearmament program.

Leftists Led by Suzuki

Sixty-two-year-old Mosaburo Suzuki is the leader of the United party. He was the leader of the left-wing faction before the merger.

Last week the Socialists embarked on a nationwide speech-making campaign, which is to continue until the next election.

The Socialists now have only 158 seats in the house, against 146 for the Democratic party and 117 for the Liberals.

But dispatches say that unless the right wing parties can get together, the Socialist representation is likely to leap upward when the next election comes.

State Health Chest X-Ray Is Nov. 22-23

A free chest x-ray survey, provided by the State Health Department, will be held in the Stratford American Legion Hall Nov. 22-23, Mrs. Ross Wells reports.

The x-ray is to detect any chest abnormality such as lung cancer, heart disease and early signs of tuberculosis.

All Sherman county residents over 15 years of age are eligible for the x-ray. Children contract tuberculosis from adults and if the disease is detected early enough in adults, the youngsters will be protected, Mrs. Wells said.

The whole x-ray procedure requires about five minutes and there is no need to undress, she said. All reports are kept confidential and if any abnormalities are found your personal physician will be notified, the official said.

"A few minutes of your time seems very little to protect yourself and your family," she concluded.

Mayor Sets Friday, Nov. 11 Veterans Day

Veterans Day, Nov. 11, has been proclaimed by Mayor H. M. Flores in Stratford.

"The President of the United States has issued a proclamation calling upon all the citizens of this nation to observe Friday, Nov. 11, as Veterans Day to commemorate and to pay appropriate homage to the veterans of all the wars of this nation who have contributed so much to the preservation of this nation," Mr. Flores said.

"We are asked to solemnly remember the sacrifices of all those who fought so valiantly on the seas, in the air, and on foreign shores to preserve our heritage of freedom.

"Governor Allan Shivers also has proclaimed Nov. 11 as Veterans Day in the entire state. "I call upon every citizen of Stratford to observe Friday as Veterans Day. I request all citizens of the town, business enterprises, veterans organizations and city officials to observe the day in every way possible, with appropriate ceremonies," Flores concluded.

Friday Regular C.-C. Holiday

Friday, Nov. 11, is a regularly scheduled holiday established by the Stratford Chamber of Commerce, President C. C. Plunk reports. It is Veterans Day.

The Stratford city hall and Sherman county court house will be closed Friday, it was learned from W. P. Foreman, city secretary, and County Judge Clyde Hudson.

Dulles Questions Value Of Agreements With Soviets

Senator Johnson Heads Campaign For Heart Fund

U. S. Senator Lyndon Johnson of Johnson City has accepted the state chairmanship of the 1956 Texas Heart Fund campaign during February. Dr. Kleberg Eckhardt of Corpus Christi, president of the Texas Heart Assn., made the announcement.

Senator Johnson — now recuperating at home from a heart attack last July 2 — said:

"During recent months I have had reason to become personally aware of the scope of the lifesaving work made possible by the voluntary contributions of funds for use in research into heart disease."

"In all seriousness, I doubt that I would be here now except for the application of medical knowledge gained from such research prior to the heart attack I suffered last July.

"The money contributed to the Texas Heart Fund, which is an integral factor in the work of the Texas and American Heart Associations, is an investment in human lives. I am confident that the people of Texas will make such an investment in generous measure this year, as they have in the past. "This is a cause in which all of us can work together for the good of humanity. I know Texans will not fail to meet this challenge."

DENVER —UP— President Eisenhower was disturbed Thursday by highlysecret reports from Geneva and the Middle East where his program for world peace appeared to be breaking down under Soviet pressure.

The chief executive was in close touch with major developments in a suddenly troubled world situation as he prepared to fly back to Washington Friday.

Mr. Eisenhower received a detailed report on the international situation Wednesday from Herbert Hoover Jr., the acting secretary of state. In addition to Hoover's report there was a steady stream of intelligence reports to Fitzsimons Army hospital where Mr. Eisenhower has been a coronary thrombosis patient since Sept. 24.

Thursday's first medical bulletin on the President's condition said "the President had a good night's sleep of nearly eight hours. He awoke feeling refreshed and cheerful. His condition continues to be satisfactory."

While international developments piled up on the ailing chief executive, his staff kept an anxious eye on weather reports which indicated a heavy snow for Friday morning, the scheduled time for the President's departure.

Forecasters said it will begin snowing Thursday night and that by noon Friday, the snow should extend as far east as the Kansas border. There was no indication whether the President's departure will be delayed.

Mr. Eisenhower, appeared more concerned about major developments in the world situation than the prospect of bad weather.

These developments include the blow-up of the Big Four foreign ministers' conference at Geneva, where Russia has refused to agree to any plan for re-unifying Germany.

Hoover brought the President first-hand reports on the Big Four conference and upon the crisis between Egypt and the Arab nations. Afterwards, Hoover read a statement by Mr. Eisenhower appealing to Russia—though Russia was not mentioned by name—not to start a Middle East arms race by selling guns to Egypt.

GENEVA —UP— The divided western powers met Thursday to mend their own broken fences on disarmament and were hit by a new Soviet propaganda broadside that sent hopes for a Big Four agreement plummeting to zero.

The western foreign ministers, fearful of some Russian propaganda coup in the ill-starred conference, joined their top advisers Friday to try to hammer together some joint approach to disarmament, already at an historic impasse.

As they met at the home of the British foreign secretary, the Communist newspaper Pravda for the second straight day sharply attacked U. S. armament policies. It blamed the United States for "intensifying the arms race" and failing to reach agreement on disarmament.

The tone of the Pravda editorial indicated clearly that Russia was preparing to be as stiff-necked on armaments as it proved in the deadlocked talks on European security and German unity—which all but made an agreement impossible.

In the background was Secretary of State John Foster Dulles' acid question, "I wonder whether agreements with the Soviet Union are worthwhile?"

The deadlocked conference abandoned in despair Wednesday its efforts to agree on a security pact and German unity and turned to the equally deadlocked question of disarmament. There were angry western charges that Russia had broken the agreements of the Geneva "summit" leaders.

Dulles, British Foreign Secretary Harold MacMillan and French Foreign Minister Antoine Pinay called in Harold Stassen, President Eisenhower's disarmament expert, for Thursday's session with the Soviet's Vyacheslav M. Molotov.

Texas County Pioneer Killed

E. H. Wilbourn, 72 — pioneer Texas county, Okla. farmer and R. F. Conway, 63, Berger, were killed in a highway collision a mile and a half north of Texhoma on State Road 95 at 10 a.m. Monday, Oklahoma Highway Patrolman Jim Cross reports.

Another Berger man, G. H. Turpin, was hospitalized at Guyton, but reportedly was not seriously injured.

The collision occurred during the snow storm Monday and the roads were snow-covered, the patrolman said.

McCann's Analysis

By CHARLES M. MCCANN

Soviet Russia's readers may be wondering whether their attempt to make up with President Tito of

Yugoslavia is really paying off. They have failed completely to get Tito back into the Soviet bloc. They have failed to weaken Tito's alliance with Greece and Turkey, which are members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

Tito's relations with the United States have been strengthened, not weakened, since Premier Nikolai A. Bulganin and Communist party boss Nikita S. Khrushchev made their pilgrimage to Belgrade last May. Now Tito has agreed with Sec-

etary of State John Foster Dulles that Russia's Eastern European satellites ought to be free. The statement which Dulles made after his conference with Tito Sunday, and to which Tito agreed, on the satellite situation must have caused considerable annoyance in the Kremlin.

Increasingly Worried
There are many signs that the Russian government is increasingly worried over the problem of keeping the Eastern European satellite countries under its heel. None of them is really Communist, of course. In none of them would communism have the least chance of approval in a free election.

There are signs also that the Russian attempt to woo Tito has served to weaken the Kremlin's hold on the satellites. The Soviet government has been compelled to press the Hungarian and Bulgarian Communist governments to follow its example in trying to be friends with Tito.

Such friendship can hardly strengthen the Kremlin's position. Developments ever since Tito's break with Russia in 1948 have tended to suggest that he may be the smartest of all Communist leaders.

Despite his break with Russia, Tito remains a Communist. But he certainly does not seem dedicated to the Kremlin's obsession with the necessity for Communist world domination.

Tito seems increasingly to be the sort of Communist with whom the United States and its allies can do business.

Popular With Yugoslavs
Yugoslavia no longer is a police state. Tito has veered away from the Communist insistence on collective farming. He is trying to transfer priority from defense spending to increased food production and the making of consumer goods. He seems to be really popular with Yugoslavs.

At 63, Tito has a record of continued success for more than ten years. He organized and led the partisans who fought the Germans and Italian Fascists so successfully in World War II. He made himself Yugoslavia's leader after the war with little trouble. He got away—to the astonishment of the world—with his defiance of Josef Stalin because he insisted on putting his own country's welfare ahead of Russia's. Now it is reported that the Kremlin is thinking of breaking up, for Tito's benefit, the "cominform" propaganda agency which was made the me-


